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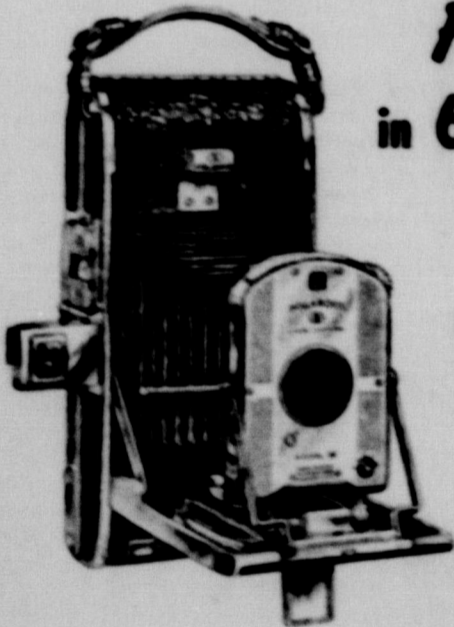

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK

Fort Worth—Movement of live- stock to market at the start of the week was moderate at Southwest markets, but heavy at mid- and Western Centers. Denver reported a huge sheep run, Omaha had almost 30,000 cat- tle on Monday.

Prices were stable at Fort Worth Monday. Some interests bid for prices on cows and bulls, were unable to get many at that way. Steers, yearlings and stockers were firm. Some top- at calves sold up to \$15 to \$20, and a few to \$16 were de- cidedly higher.

Good and choice slaughter steers yearlings sold from \$17 to \$22, choice to prime cattle are able to \$25 or better, some club- ers late last week selling to Common and medium grassers for \$10 to \$15, and cutter sold from \$7 to \$9.

Fat cows cleared at \$9 to \$11, with some heiferish kinds to \$12. Cannors and cutters drew \$5.50 to \$9, some old shells down to \$5. Bulls drew \$8 to \$12, odd head above and below that range.

Fat calves of good and choice kinds sold mainly from \$12.50 to \$15, with some around 500 pounds and over strictly fat kinds to \$15.50 and \$16. Common and medium sorts sold from \$9 to \$12, with culls from \$6 to \$9.

Good and choice stocker steers calves sold from \$12 to \$16.50, and plainer kinds sold around \$9 to \$11. Stocker and feeder steers and steer yearlings cashed at \$9 to \$15.50. Stocker cows were slow at \$8 to \$12.

Many financial backers of stock men are dropping broad hints at this time to the effect that feed bills of the size of those paid last year can not be financed by them this year.

This situation may result in heavier than planned liquidation of herds in many cases. It will surely result in increased pressure for cheap feed through a govern- ment program.

The financiers take the stand that a cow or a ewe that already is carrying a heavy feed bill from the past two or three years of dry weather can very easily "eat her entire value up between now and

spring."

Good and choice lambs sold from \$17 to \$19, culls, common to medium kinds drew \$10 to \$15. Feeders sold around \$12, and are quotable to \$13.50. Old ewes drew \$4.25 to \$6. Old wethers and two's sold from \$7 to \$9. Fat yearlings drew \$11 to \$12.

By the way, last week some lambs from Brewster County (Big Bend Country) and a long way from Fort Worth, came in and sale weight was within a pound and a half of the weight when they left home. They really took to the alfalfa hay and water to make a remarkable small shrink like that.

Mike and Alena Faye are still hitting it off or so they tell me. They're always seen around together.

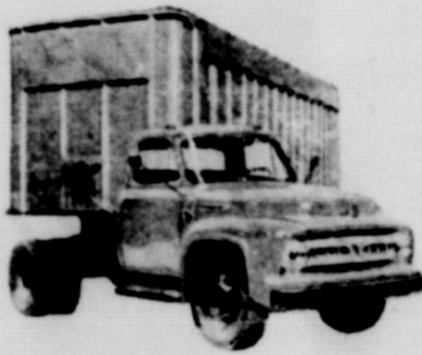

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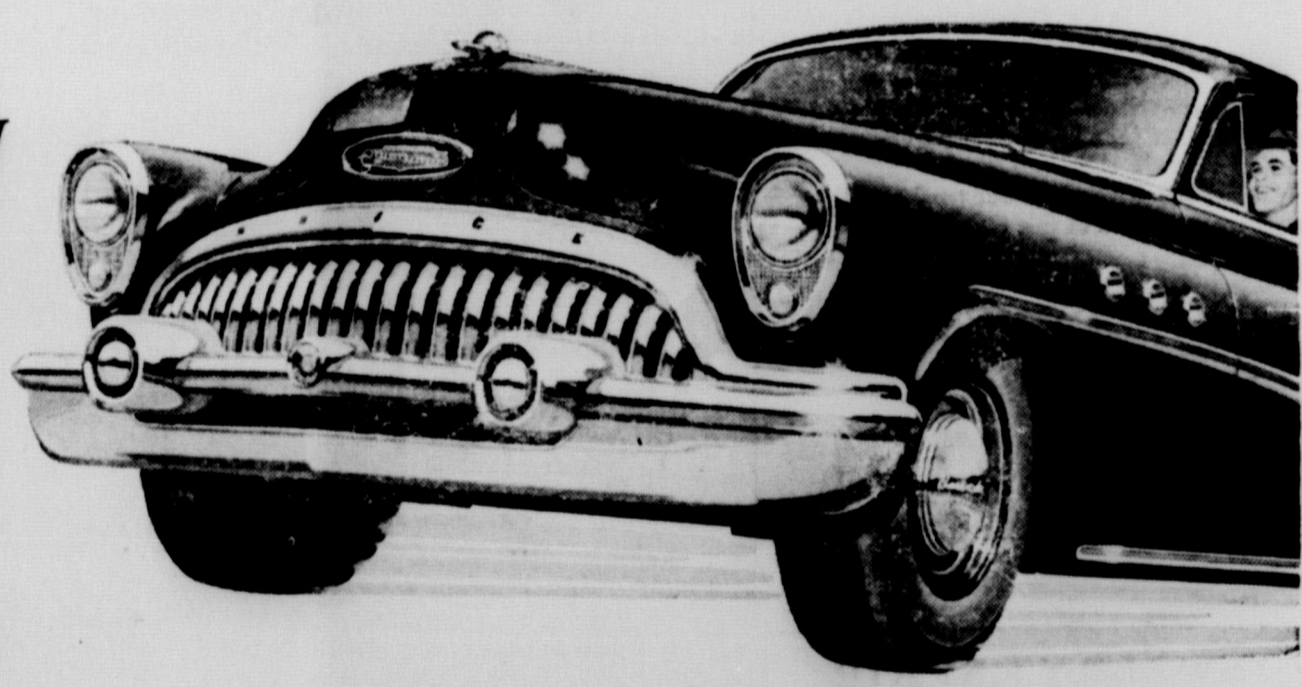

Juan Delgado who took Friend's place last week, relieved both Brock Jones and Friend during the contest showing well in both positions.

The Lions rushed for 263 yards and passed for 163 more for a total of 426 yards. The Lions garnered 16 first downs and captured three Rankin fumbles.

For the Red Devils, quarterback Arthur Dean sparked play for the night picking up 39 yards rushing and 4 passing as well as bracing up the lagging defense. Comparative scores indicated that Rankin would be at least a match for the Lions but rapid improvement in the Lion squad is tending to make early season scores unworthy.

Charles Garlitz was the leading ground gainer for the night

with 101 yards. Garlitz was also the total offense leader with 143 yards passing which ran his total to 244 yards.

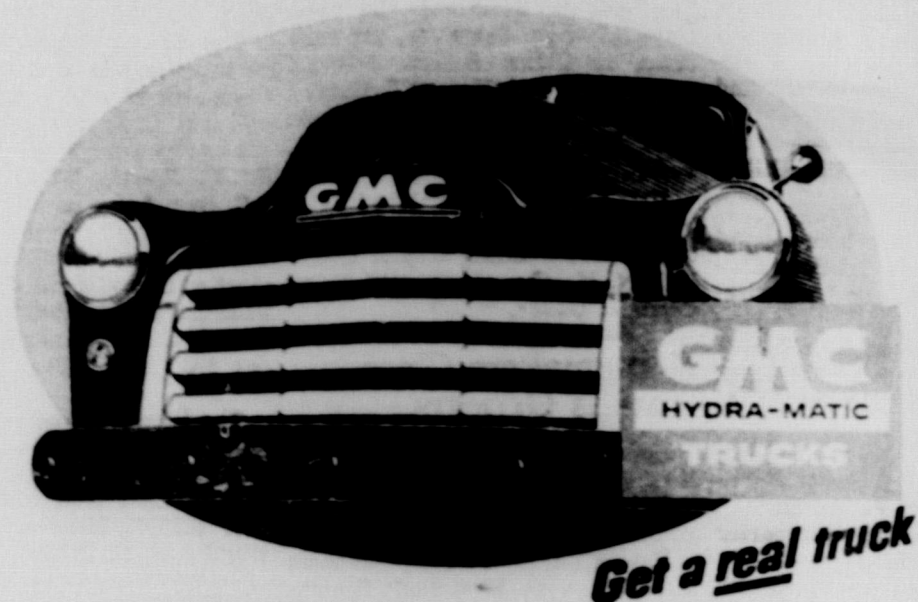
