Proceeds Of Prison Rodeo Finance Inmate Education, Recreation

Huntsville-Proceeds from the 22nd Annual Prison Rodeo which opened here Sunday October 4th and has played to 50,000 spectators the first two performances will furnish the monies needed to carry out the Texas prison board's educational program for the prisoners. The final performance of the 1953 Prison Rodeo will be next Sunday, Oct. 25.

By means of monies earned by the annual rodeo the prisoners of Texas provide for themselves schools that provide compulsory attendance for illiterates, elementary and high school subjects and correspondence courses. In correlation with the matter, vocational and trade training is carried on with on-the-job training program in the penitentiary's numerous industries.

While provisions for such a program were made by the State's legislature many years ago, no appropriation of funds was ever made available for the purpose.

Neither were provisions made for a recreational program for the Texas convicts, but through their annual rodeo the prisoners also provide themselves a budget for motion pictures, sports equipment and libaries.
