



covery in 38-31-H&TC, one mile southwest of the Tippett (Wolfcamp) field of Crockett County. 11 miles southeast of McCamey, was continuing to test.

The project flowed 10 barrels of cil and 103 barrels of water through tubing and perforations between 4,195-4,350 feet in 213/2 hours. Operator acidized with 3,-000 gallons. The project flowed 20 barrels of load oil and 18 barrels of acid water in one hour, then died. After being swabbed one time, the well kicked off and flowed eight barrels of oil and 158 barrels of water in 91/2 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 78,050-1.

Total depth is 6,911 feet; plugged back depth, 4,617 feet.
