

Members of the school board, in a called meeting here Tuesday voted to sponsor a petition to the Crockett County Commissioners Court asking that body to call an election on the question of issuing \$30,000 in bonds for the purpose of constructing and equipping a new school building for Mexican children of the commun-

Board officials indicated that the petition would be framed and, headed by school board members, would be circulated for the necessary number of signatures in time for presentation to the Court at its April term.

Tentative drawings and estimates on the new structure, on which the amount of the proposed bond issue to be requested was determined, provide for an 8-room building, facilities sufficient for 300 pupils. The tentative floor plan makes it possible to add additional rooms in the future should it become necessary. Trapping quail in Mexico is an interesting process. A V-shaped brush fence not over a foot high is constructed, with the point running into a woven wire funnel some ten feet long. Quail herders. upon discovering birds, walk slowly toward them, herding the birds inside the brush enclosures. The birds follow the brush until they come to the narrow opening in the wire trap and walk in. They are then caught and placed in crates to be transported to the United States. It is a simple process, but tens of thousands of quail are captured in Mexico each year.






