**World Day of Prayer To Be Observed Here Friday, February 25**

World Day of Prayer, sponsored by the General Department of United Church Women of the National Council of Churches and observed simultaneously in 125 countries around the globe, will be observed with a special day-long service at the Ozona Methodist Church on Friday, Feb. 25.

The World Day of Prayer will start at 9 a. m. here and a special program will be arranged for the day's services.

In 1954, the day was observed in more than 19,000 communities

in the United States and in 119 countries around the world. Each year the national World Day of Prayer Committee asks a woman or a group of women from one of the countries observing the day to write the services.

Miss Jorgelina Lozada of Buenos Aires, Argentina, has written the service for the 1955 observance. The theme is "Abide in Me".

One of the first two graduates of Instituto Model, now the Union Seminary, Miss Lozada was as-

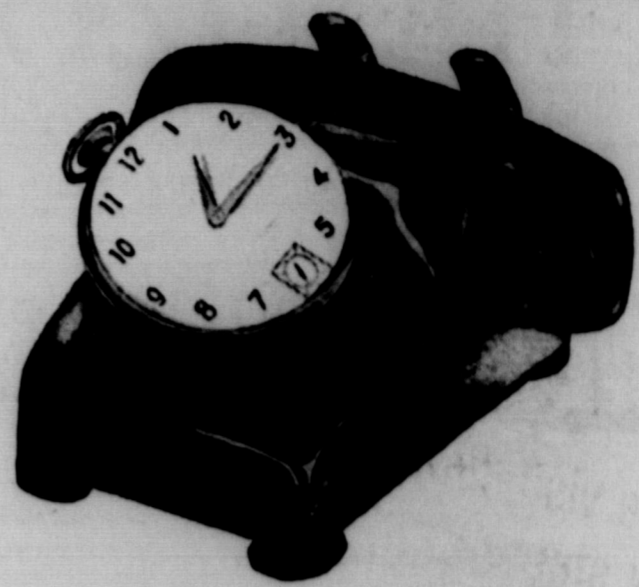
signed responsibility for children's work among the various Disciple churches in Buenos Aires. She was ordained in 1930, however, and two years later became one of the very few Argentina women pastors. She has continued her work with children, however, in addition to her pastoral work. 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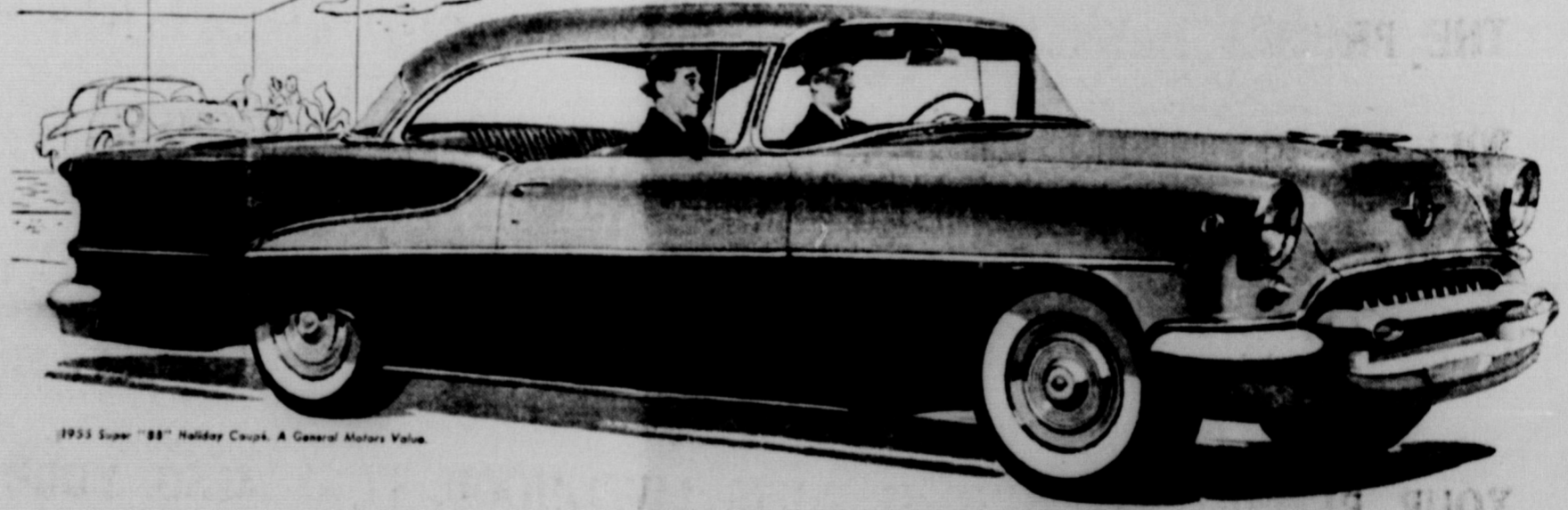
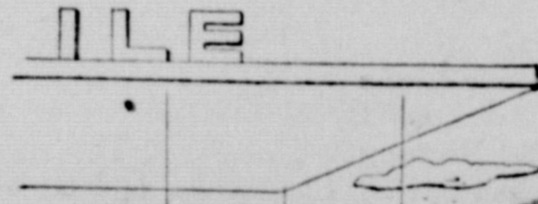
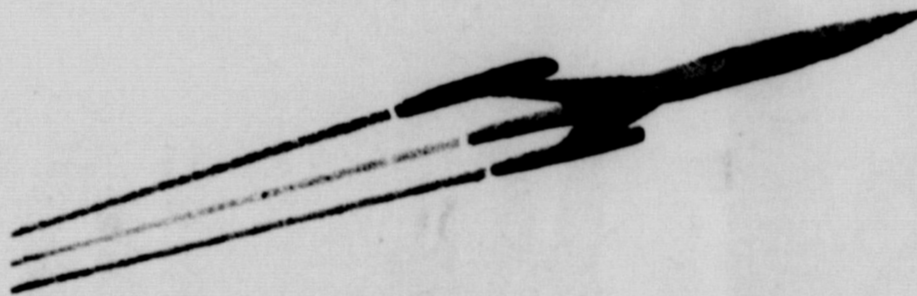

## TEACHER OF THE WEEK

On July 4, 1932, in Gainesville, Texas, our football line coach was born. This is none other than Coach Byron Elvis Cleere!

He stands six foot and one inch and weighs 195. His eyes are blue and has dark brown wave hair.

He attended junior high and part of high school in Taylor, Texas. The last two years of high school was finished in Alice High School, Alice, Texas.

During high school, he lettered in football all four years and was captain his senior year. Lettering three years in track, he did three events. These are shot put,

100 yard dash, and discus.

For college he chose to attend Abilene Christian College. Again in college he was active in sports. In football he lettered all four years and was captain one year. He was the fastest guard in the nation. His sophomore year he made the second team all-conference. Both his junior and senior year he made the first team All-Conference. Also his senior year he made All-Texas College and the Chicago Bears drafted him.

Track was the other sport in which he won high honors. He lettered three years and entered in these event: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, Sprint Relay, 880 relay, and shot put. He ran the 100 yard dash in 9.7 seconds and the record


is 9.4. He was not only active in sports though. In college he was a member of House of Representatives, President of Frojan Club, and member and secretary of the Coral Club.

Another important event happened while he was a junior. He met Lola Anderson who at the time was a sophomore majoring in Elementary Education. It seems that each meeting became a little more serious. They are to be married February 12, 1955, in Lubbock, Texas, at 7:30 p. m. in the Broadway Church of Christ. Coach Cleere has received kidding from the student and teachers since the beginning of school about his get-

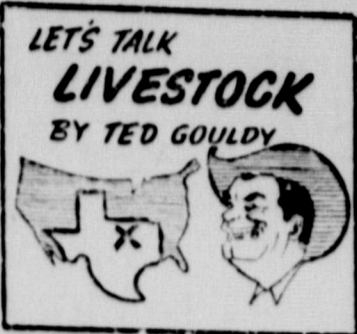

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Fort Worth — Well finished cattle found an active, strong market in Fort Worth. Some sales were higher than last week. Choice slaughter steers brought up to \$25 and medium grades sold at around \$20.

Cows and bulls were mostly steady. Good young beef cows brought up to \$13. Bulls sold mostly at \$14 down but some individuals sold above \$14.

Calves were strong with some spots higher. A few choice slaughter calves sold at \$19.50 to \$20.

Stockers and feeders continue in good demand and not enough high quality kind to supply the needs of order buyers. About three loads of good and choice feeder steers sold at \$21.50. Stocker calves were in small supply with a few good steer calves selling at \$21.

Good and choice beef steers from \$21 to \$25 and good fed heifers brought up to \$23.50. Lower grade butcher cattle sold from \$13 to \$20.

Fat cows drew \$11 to \$13, and canners and cutters cashed at \$7 to \$10. Shelly canners sold around \$7. Bulls sold mostly at \$10 to \$14 with some individuals higher.

A generally steady trade prevailed on most classes of sheep and lambs at Fort Worth. Some light weight, clipped lambs were higher. Feeder lambs were steady. Good, woolled feeders, which demand the best prices, were not present.

Choice, woolled slaughter lambs brought \$21, and choice, shorn lambs cashed at \$18.50 to \$20. The higher price was for fall shorn lambs. A few plain kinds of lambs drew \$15 to \$17.

High quality feeder lambs were absent. Plain to medium feeders sold from \$16 to \$18.50, the latter price for medium woolled feeders. Other classes of sheep were scarce. Fat ewes were quoted at \$7 to 8.50, old bucks at \$4 to \$5 and yearlings at \$14 to \$16.

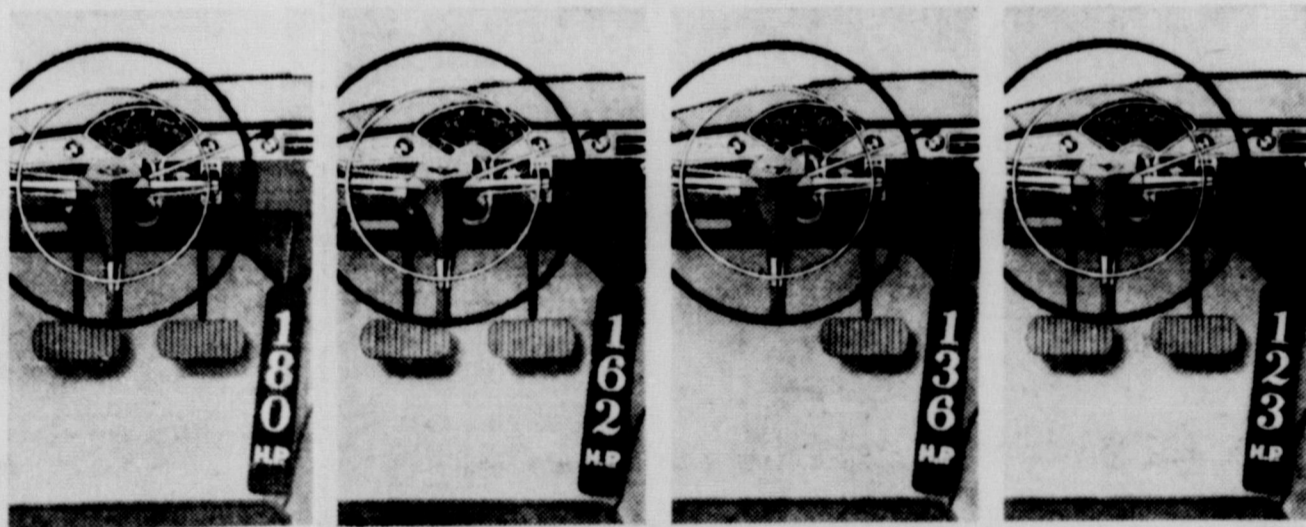

One does not always see that the missing element is our old friend, necessity. We are better off when circumstances hold our hopes right up against the grindstone, whether we know it or not.

Our young people also suffer from the same malady. Time was when the country kids had to hurry home from school and do their share of the chores. In those days it took the whole family to make a living. It wasn't a matter of the children loving to help — most time they didn't but of their having to.

There isn't much for a child or young person to do nowadays around the place. However we may love him or want him as a person, no longer does he pull his own weight in the family economy.

It is not for school activities, time would hang heavily on his hands. About all he could do would be to ride up and down the streets in a car and think up new things the others had and he didn't. For many youngsters, athletics, school affairs, and the picture show are the difference between a life that is bearable and one that is not.

That isn't to say that there are not good things about the modern prosperous age. In so many ways, its wonderful. But you never can get the coons all up the same tree. Prosperity and leisure, like everything else, have their liabilities.

What we are really striving, I guess, is freedom from necessity. But when we get a measure of it,

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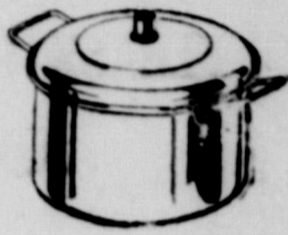

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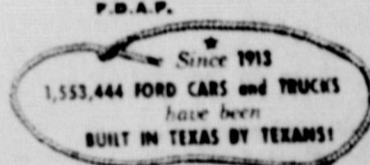
