Appointed To New US SCS Engineers Air Force Academy

Washington, D. C. - (Special) Congressman J. T. Rutherword of the 16th Congressional District has announced the appointment of John Butterfield of Ozona to the United States Air Force Academy at Lowery Field, Colorado.

Rutherford said Butterfield will be notified by the Department of the Air Force to report for a fourday mental and physical test probably within the next two weeks.

"I was fortunate in that I was able to appoint all the eligibile young men from the 16th District who made application for the Air Force Academy," Rutherford said. He said that while he realizes the strict and extensive examination the Ozona boy faces, he feels Butterfield will "give an excellant account of himself."

Young Butterfield is interested in music and engineering and is member of the First Baptist Church in Ozona. His father works for the Pure Oil Company.

Rutherford said the deadline for appointments is at hand and that all vacancies open to the 16th District for the first session of the Air Academy have been filled. The Congressman said he was not able to make appointments to West Point or Annaoplis, as his predelessor had filled the quota from the 16th District.

To Study Flood **Control Project**

Visit Feb. 17-18 To Determine If Project Will Qualify

Upon the results of a field examination to be made by engineers of the Soil Conservation Service next week will depend the final decision as to whether or not the Johnson Draw watershed will qualify for assistance under U. S. Public Law 566 for a flood control

Norman Leach and Mel Husa, SCS engineers from Fort Worth, will be here Feb. 17 and 18 to make a field survey of the watershed area and to gather all possible information on the damage wrought by the disastrous flood which struck Ozona in the early morning hours of June 282, 1954. The engineers will come here after a similar survey of Kickapoo Creek watershed near San Angelo.

Verne Marshall of the State Soil Conservation Board, with headquarters in Temple, likely will accompany the Fort Worth engineers, C. A. Rechinthin, area conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at San Angelo, will also assist in the examination, according to Bob Scott, local conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.
