## Deferred Grazing Period Begins In This Area May 1

Ranchmen planning to use deferred grazing to earn payments under the AAA's range conservation program must submit in writing a designation of the acreage to be deferred before the practice is started.

Ranchmen should notify the county Agricultural Conservation Association committee as to the acreage to be deferred in ample time before the deadline for their sections, Howard T. Kingsbery, state ACA committeeman from Santa Anna, pointed out.

In Wichita, Archer, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Jones, Taylor, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Reagan, Crockett and Terrell counties and all counties to the east with the exception of those in the Valley, the period extends from May 1 to October 1.

By deferring 25 per cent of the range land in the ranching unit from grazing during the specified period, the ranchman may earn 40 per cent of his maximum range-improvement allowance. He may earn an additional 35 per cent by adopting supplemental practices if the county committee so recommends. Thus, Kingsbery said, up to 75 per cent of the maximum allowance may be earned by this one practice. If grazing is deferred on less than 25 per cent, proportionate payments may be earned, he added.

## Baptist Spring Revival Meeting Starts March 8

### Rev Childers to Preach; Waco Minister Leads Song Services

Rev. Clyde Childers, pastor of the Ozona Baptist church, will do the preaching during the annual ten-day Spring revival meeting at the church which starts Friday, March 8. The meeting will continue through March 17.

Song services will be under the leadership of Rev. Sam Cluck, music director of the North Waco Baptist church in Waco, Texas. Rev. Cluck comes to the local church with high recommendations as a splendid singer and song director, and will also have charge of special groups to be assembled in connection with the series of services.

Services are to be held at the church twice daily during the ten days, morning services being slated at 10 o'clock, and evening services to start at 7:45. The church and its membership extends a cordial invitation to all Ozona and surrounding territory to attend these revival services.

One ewe had triplets and each of the other four produced twins—all doing well, thank you.

## Ft. Worth Group Drill Wildcat Test On Hoover

### Spears Interests To Start 2,500-Foot Well March 25

The Spears Interests of Fort Worth have filed notice of intention to drill a wildcat well on the A. C. Hoover Live Oak ranch in Crockett county about 30 miles west of Ozona.

The scheduled 2,500-foot cable tool test is due to start about March 25, it has been announced. Location is to be in the center of the southwest quarter of section 10, block 1, GC&SF Ry. Co. survey.

Oil men look to the Hoover country as among the most promising for oil production in that section of the county. Five or six shallow wells have been drilled on the ranch, good oil shows being found in all of them except one.

## Owner of Santa Anita Race Winner Has Bank Account-Property Here

It made little difference, no doubt, to most Ozonans whose horse won the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap race in Los Angeles Saturday, but it was of little more than passing interest to the force at the Ozona National bank, for a customer of the bank and a Crockett county property owner had a horse entered in the running.

And, by the way, the horse, "Whichee" by name won third money in the rich handicap, a matter of some \$10,000 for the owner.

"Whichee" is owned by Maj. Austin C. Taylor of Vancouver, B. C. Major Taylor owns some oil royalty interests in Crockett county and maintains an account in the Ozona National Bank.

"Microscopic" Billions

It was recently stated that the total indebtedness of federal, state and local governments did not increase during the seven-year period from 1932 to 1939. In that period, according to this statement, the federal debt increased "some-what" but was offset by a corresponding falling off in the debt of states, cities and political subdivisions.

The exact figures, as published in the Annalist and compiled by the national industrial conference board, tell a vastly different story. Says the Annalist: "In the seven years ended June 30, 1939, the federal gross debt (not counting the government-guaranteed debt, which on June 30, 1939, amounted to \$5,469,591,592), increased somewhat from \$19,487,009,766 to \$40,439,532,411. Total state and local debts in the meantime decreased from \$19,330,000,000 to \$19,626,000,000, so that the total indebtedness of the federal, state and local governments remained practically unchanged, having shown the negligible, microscopic, infinitesimal increase of \$21,249,000,000 from \$38,817,000,000 to \$60,066,000,000."

If the increase in the federal debt had been offset, as reported, by a corresponding decrease in local debt there would be no local debt. In fact state and local governments on the whole would have a small surplus in their treasuries! So it looks as if one more effort to alibi our national debt has flopped.

Fair Play In Murder

There is macabre humor in the excited plaint of the Nazi government over the Altmark incident. "Law-breakers!" shriek Nazi spokesmen because a British warship rescued 300 captured English seamen from a Nazi prison ship in Norwegian territorial waters. This from the nation that has broken virtually every "sacred promise" it gave the rest of the world, the nation which shattered all the rules of decency in its treatment of its minorities, the country which so brutally seized Czechoslovakia and Poland. Whether under the rules of warfare the British had a "right" to raid the prison ship in neutral waters seems a hair-line point. But the cream of the gruesome jest lies in all this

indignant bullabalo over "law and fair play in the midst of the monstrous crime of the mass murderer that is war.—Philadelphia Record.

British Manner

The British Admiralty's communique on the rescue of more than 300 British seamen from the German naval auxiliary vessel Altmark in Norwegian waters is a model of British official utterance. When it is recalled that the British destroyers involved first compelled the German tanker Baldur to sink herself, and that hand-to-hand fighting in the style of long ago took place on the decks of the Altmark, the restraint of this official paper becomes, even more noteworthy—from the literary if no other point of view. "In the early days of these proceedings," says the Admiralty ("proceedings" is a perfect British choice of words), "the German tanker Baldur, passing by outside territorial waters, was summoned to stop by the destroyer Ivanhoe, Commander P. H. Hadow, Royal Navy, and thereupon scuttled herself in German fashion." Thus the paper ends, the final sneer carefully and deliberately understated, as no other admiralty in the world could have done. Our bet is that Winston Churchill wrote it himself.—New York Post.

MARFA.—A revised water rate scale for customers of the City of Marfa's water system was announced this week by the city commission, following its meeting Tuesday morning. The new rates: First 2,000 gallons for 75 cents (minimum \$1.50); next 3,000 at 33 1/3 cents per 1,000; next 15,000 at 15 cents; over 20,000 at 12 1/2 cents. 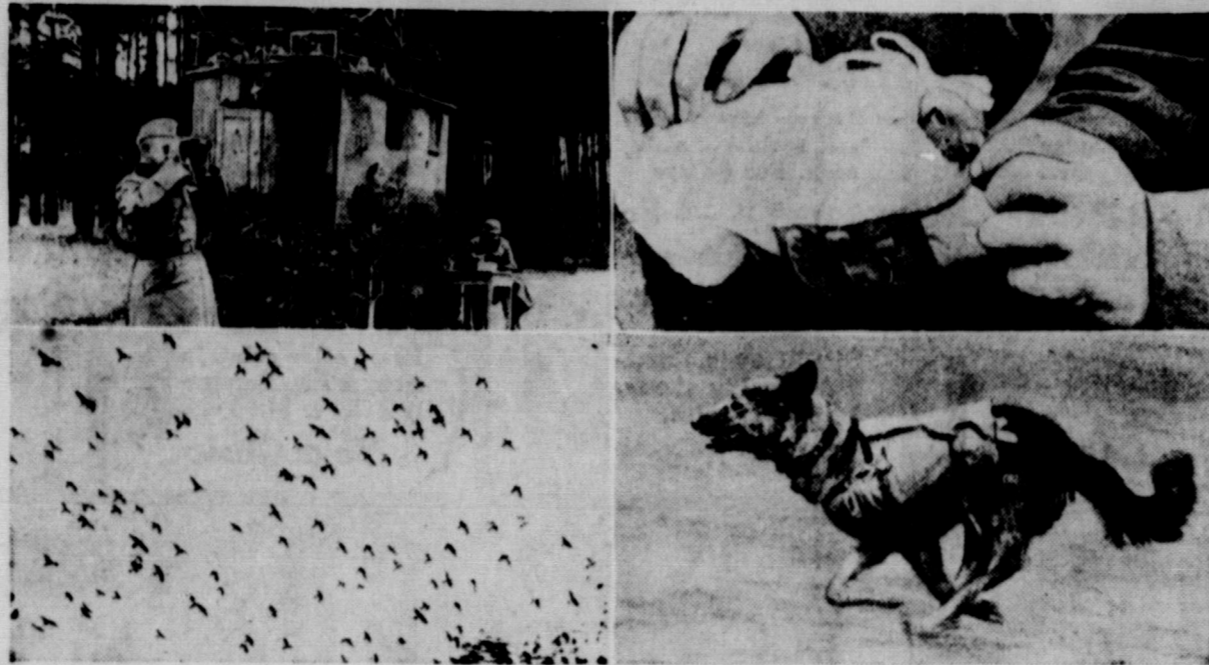

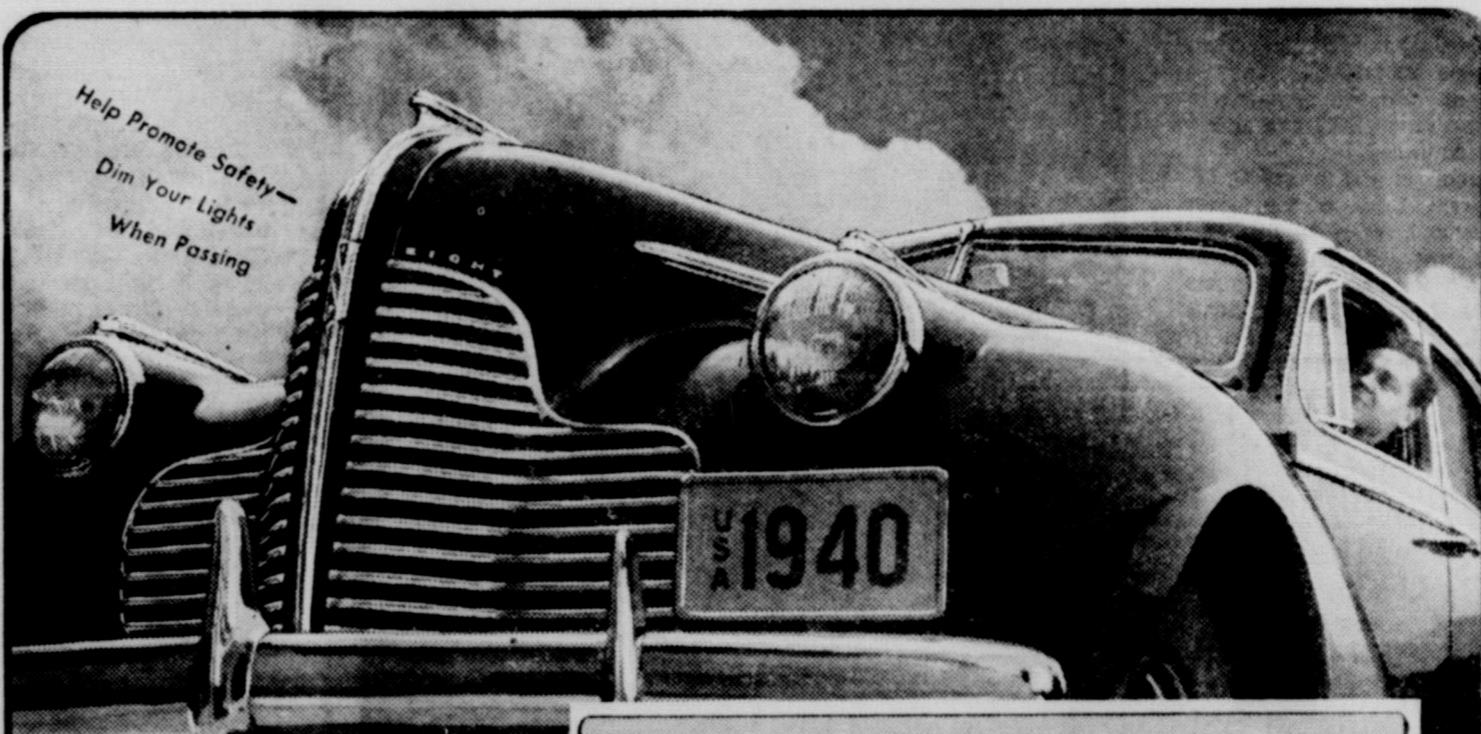

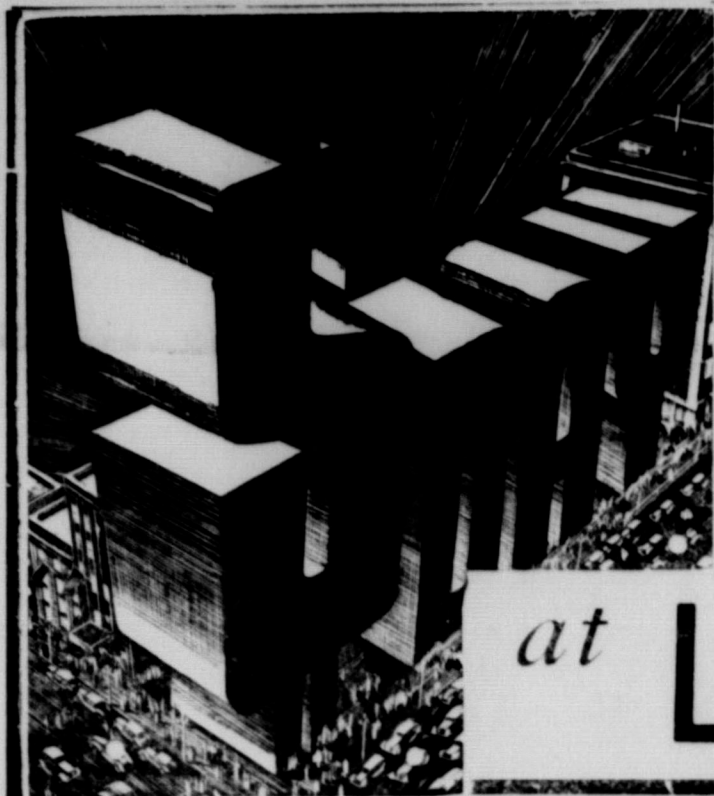

**Texas Farm Income To Be Up In 1940 Authority Predicts**

AUSTIN, Mar. 6.—Texas farmers will have more cash to jingle in their pockets this year than last, Dr. F. A. Buechel, University agricultural authority, predicts.

Despite a 10 per cent drop from January, 1939, farm cash income for the first month of 1940 points to better finance during the remainder of the year, the bureau of business research statistician believes.

The slump was due entirely to a sharp falling off in livestock shipments, which he expects to boom later in the season.

The number of animals on Texas farms and ranches on January 1, 1940, was approximately the same as a year earlier, from which he deduces that shipments in succeeding months will at least balance those of 1939.

Actual receipts from livestock and farm products in January totaled \$16,878,000 or 72.1 per cent of the average January income for the period 1928-32.

**High Spots on Record-Breaking Run**



Signs of the times in a motor age—these highway markers tell the story of a two-year, 100,000-mile truck test run recently completed by Chevrolet. In Canada, Mexico and every state of the Union, the truck operated on all types of highways and under every conceivable weather hazard, setting a new world mark for sustained and certified automotive operation, under the sanction and official observation of the American Automobile Association. The unit carried a 4,590-pound "payload." An average of 15.1 miles per gallon of fuel was maintained throughout the 100,000 miles, at an average operating speed of 33.07 miles per hour. Oil mileage was correspondingly high—1,072 miles per quart.

He fished her out—dead as a doornail—and took her in the house where he applied the prone pressure method of resuscitation learned in a first aid course. The hen revived.

**TURKEYS DRIFT LONG WAYS**

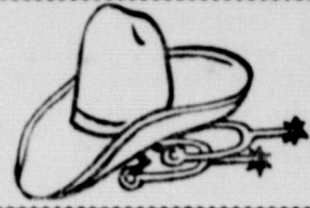
Wild turkeys generally locate themselves in one area, but the lack of food or proper cover will often force them to travel long distances in search of new range. During the past season a Texas hunter killed a banded turkey in the Center Point country that had been banded at the head of the Medina river more than 30 miles away, a check of the state game department records reveal.

Veteran game observers remember a large flock of turkeys which drifted out of Kerr county in the hill country into Sterling county, a distance of nearly 150 miles. The birds remained nearly two years before starting back to their native range.

### A BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK HISTORICAL TRIP

On Friday, March 15, Dr. G. P. Smith of Sul Ross college at Alpine will lecture to the high school and show pictures concerning the Big Bend park of Texas. The pictures are in color and will be of interest to those interested in the area. For several years, the Texas legislature has worked toward the idea of establishing a national park in the area. The federal government has finally given its consent to take over the park and maintain it if the state will donate 788,000 acres of land. Approximately 225,000 acres have been obtained by the state, and it is striving to obtain the remainder. The Mexican government has consented to give 400,000 acres to establish a Mexican park opposite the Big Bend. The establishment of such an international park between the U. S. and Mexico will tend to improve the relations between the two nations. Of course, the tourists that cross the border back and forth will involve some complications. **Behind The Scenes In American Business**

By John Craddock

NEW YORK, March 4.—BUSINESS.—Another two months of gentle downward sloping in the business curve, then a gradual turning upward that should continue through the latter half of the year—that seems to be the consensus. Nobody seems much alarmed that the industrial index slumped from the all-time high of 128 (for December, 1939), to 120 for January and is expected to slide on down to 110 for February, because this is the natural follow-up to any feverish "stocking up" such as came with 1939's final quarter. Some time late this month the production and consumption figures will draw level with each other—and what happens at that point will show how the wind blows for the second quarter. Meanwhile, some industries still have big backlogs of orders to keep them buzzing. Aviation is still the fair-haired boy, with backlogs of some \$700,000,000 on the books and plans for hitting a \$60,000,000-per-month production pace before the year is out. Others are sitting pretty are electrical equipment, machine tools, shipbuilding and transportation equipment.

WASHINGTON.—On the surface, you might get the impression that the hullabaloo being raised about the census-taking questions being too personal and "prying" was in the same vein as anti-New Deal complaints against business baiting and bureaucracy. But it is interesting to note that, actually, "business" has long desired answers to questions of this kind, since statistics on geographical distribution of income by ages and occupations are obviously of considerable value to makers, distributors, sellers and ad-

vertisers of goods. Besides, these same questions have been part of the census query schedule for 75 years. And there has never been much objection to questions included in the housing census, some of which like "how many bathtubs, if any, have you?" are a sight more "intimate" than any being put by the population counters.

BITS O' BUSINESS.—Makers of drug and food products are turning to larger packages and multiple-unit offerings in their efforts to cut distribution costs—two-quart containers, both glass and cardboard, are being tried in larger cities for milk; coffee is

being packed in two-pound containers, toilet soaps are being cast in oversize cakes, toothbrushes sold by pairs and half-dozens . . . Surplus soil moisture is now ample in many parts of the country, including the heretofore extremely dry midwest . . . A merchant who figured that the \$60 worth of work his employes did on February 29 (Leap Year's extra day), was "velvet," sent a check for that amount to Finland's war chest—P. S. The man is Scotch . . . U. S. railroads set a new record in freight train average speed in 1939, of 401 miles per day; the 1938 mileage was 398, and back in 1920 it was only 247 . . . British Empire tobacco interests are figuring on resuming buying of American leaf tobacco, halted last September to conserve foreign exchange.

**Texas Livestock Shipments Decline**

AUSTIN, March, 6.—Movement of livestock from Texas ranches slumped 29.4 per cent in January from shipments during January, 1939, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Shipments of cattle dropped from 4,505 carloads to only 2,761 cars, calves from 976 cars to 847, and sheep from 522 cars to 409. Hog shipments numbered 669 cars, a gain of 4.7 per cent. Total movement of all classes of livestock was 4,686 cars.
