DESTINY'S CHILD

These are doleful days for the Democrats. With the Presidential election campaign just over the horizon, they haven't a man with a chance against Ike.

History plays some interesting games. A few brief years ago the Democrats were in the saddle, riding high. In Franklin Roosevelt they had an unbeatable candidate.

Out of the unbroken years of Democratic ascendancy came a dream. It was a dream of rock candy mountains in which little men got big incomes. And out of those years came a fact, — waste. It was the age of The Great Waste. In it were nurtured men like Whitaker Chambers and what he represented.

The chapter climaxed in Harry Truman, a man who never could manage to be as big as his job. The plodding patience of ordinary people like you and me finally got fed up with New Deals, Square Deals, Good Deals, Fair Deals, and assorted Deals. A little bit mad, we went to the polls and voted for a change.

And we got a change. We didn't know how good it would be. It has proven to be better than we hoped. We got a man who, to use the words of the Biblical queen, Esther, "came to the kingdom for such an hour as this."

Conservative and conciliatory in his politics, liberal in his humanities, and a Christian gentleman in his conduct, Ike has weathered every storm at home and abroad. He has been immune to the knife wielded by colleagues in his own party who owed him loyalty and gave him less. He has come unscathed through the fires of irresponsible criticism by members of the opposing party, whose highest motive is another term at the feed trough. This pea-shooting was dramatized last week when, of all people, Harry Truman called him a "demagogue."

But people will not be misled this time. We never had it better than we have it now, and we know it. Wages are higher than ever in peacetime history. The Korean War is over. The outlook for world peace — or truce — is better than it has been in two decades. The stock market, industrial production, the business level, employment, all are high. There is even a prospect of a balanced budget. The upward creep of the tax level for the first time in 30 years is about to reverse itself.

We have in Eisenhower a man whom the world respects. He has the control of his temper. He is neither a pianist or a letter writer. He stays in Washington to the limit of human endurance, then has sense enough to go fishing. It was said of our Lord that when he got all he could stand of people and events, he arose early in the morning and went out to a deserted place to pray. When he got replenished with his Father's strength and calm, he went back to the people again.

Although Eisenhower has not said he would run, we believe that he will. There is not another man in the depleted Republican ranks who can win an election in 1956. And in the Democratic camp there is not a man who can touch the fringe of Ike's garment.

This is not to say that Ike is perfect. Being human, he shares in a degree the frailties common to us all. No doubt he has made many a mistake, and will continue to do so. But thus far he seems to have a rare touch for public affairs. It is a part of instinct for the right action, the right gesture, the right word. And his years in the army as a fighting man — a circumstance which many feared

Football Season Opens With Non-District Tilt On Tap

The 1955 football season will open in Ozona Friday night at Lion Stadium when the Lions play host to the Big Lake Owls. The kickoff is slated at 8 p. m.

The Owls hold two straight wins over the Lions and will be strongly favored to trip the lighter Lions again this year.

Big Lake slipped by the Lions on their home field last year 12 to 7 and have most of last year's team back this fall. The Owls will boast one of the largest teams in the area this year and may hold much as a forty pound advantage over the Lions.

Reagan County Coach Louis Hayden will be expected to operate from a wing T with an unbalanced line. Neither the Lions nor the Owls had outstanding records last year but the number of returning lettermen at the Reagan County school has brought some optimism among Owl followers who are thinking in terms of a better season this fall.

Coaches Pete Hickman and Sonny Cleere have found themselves with a small squad both physically and in number but have been encouraged by the squad's spirit and willingness.

In spite of the lack of size the Lions will field a hard hitting team that boasts 14 seniors among its some eighteen first line performers.

Loitering, Vandalism In Postoffice To Get Attention Of Officers

Continuing outbreaks of vandalism in the lobby of the Ozona postoffice during nighttime closing hours, has prompted Postmaster Floyd Hokit to enlist the law's protection and to ask public cooperation in stopping the practice.

There has been tinkering with postoffice box locks and damage to some of them, damage to lobby furnishings and penciled vulgarity on the office bulletin boards, the postmaster said. The sheriff's department has been alerted to the situation and asked to help the postoffice staff prevent loitering in the lobby, forbidden under government regulations.

"Unless the situation can be controlled," Postmaster Hokit said, "it may become necessary for us to lock the lobby doors at a certain hour. We hope this will not be necessary because it will be an inconvenience to many people."

Persons guilty of damaging government property are subject to severe penalties, the postmaster pointed out.

Ozonans will have an opportunity to get a close-up of the processes by which crude oil is refined into gasoline and other petroleum products when a model laboratory and refinery aboard a huge trailer comes to this city on Tuesday, Sept. 20.

The mobile exhibit has been assembled by the Cosden Petroleum Corporation and will be on display here all day Sept. 20 at the Ozona Oil Co. Cosden station.

The big trailer contains working models which tell the fabulous story of oil, each unit giving a graphic illustration of some phase of the refining industry from the oil well to your gas tank. The big trailer is 35 feet long, 10 feet high and is equipped with a 2,000 watt generator. The display is titled "Petroleum In The Making."

School Enrollment Up Slightly From First Day Figure Last Year

School enrollment figures for the opening of the 1955-56 session, released this week by Supt. L. E. T. Sikes, reveal a slight rise in enrollment over last year's opening but with indications that the next few days will bring a sharp rise from last year's figures.

Strangely, the total enrollment figures for the high school, junior high and two elementary schools was exactly the same as in those schools at the opening last year, 819. There was, however, a rise of five pupils in the Lockett school in the Harlem addition, and school authorities feel that late arrivals will swell the total enrollment in the system by at least fifty more pupils before the first month has passed.

The high school enrollment dropped off nine pupils, 158 this year against 167 last year. Comparison was difficult in the junior high school since one grade was removed from that school this year. The total for the two grades this year was 127 against 165 for the three grades last year. The sixth grade, which was moved to the North Elementary, has an enrollment of 46 this year, which would indicate a sharp gain in the Junior high grades. The North Elementary was up from 247 last year to 298 this year and the South Elementary dropped from 240 last year to 236 this year. The Lockett school enrolled 22 against 17 last year.

Prolific Oiler Added In World Field Extension

The World, West (Strawn) field of Crockett County has been extended one location southeast and southwest with completion of Cities Service Oil Co. No. 2-E Shannon, in 18-Q-EL&RR, 15 miles southwest of Big Lake.

It was finalized for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 1,515 barrels of 49.3 gravity oil, plus 1.65 barrels of basic sediment and acid water, with gas-oil ratio of 1.766-1.

Potential was based on an actual four-hour flow of 252.47 barrels of oil through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 8,106-16 feet. Tubing pressure was 800 pounds; with packer on casing.

Reed Sales of Abilene has filed application to drill a 1,300-foot cable tool wildcat in Crockett County, 21 miles southwest of Ozona and 3/4-mile north of the three-well Cox field. It will be the No. 1-I V. B. Cox.

Operations are to begin Sept. 15. Location, on a 20-acre lease, is 2,107 feet from the south and east lines of 39-ST-TCRR.

It is separated from the Cox field, producing from the Queen topped at 855 to 883 feet, by depleted producers.

It used to be said that well-to-do and rich people could pay most of the taxes, so the rest of us needn't worry too much about the cost of government. But that situation is as dead as the Pharaohs.

The federal individual income tax starts at 20 per cent. Then, as income levels rise, surtaxes of from two to 71 per cent are added on, making the maximum tax a staggering 91 per cent. Despite this, some 84 per cent of our total individual income tax revenue comes from the base rate of 20 per cent — while only 16 per cent comes from the surtaxes. 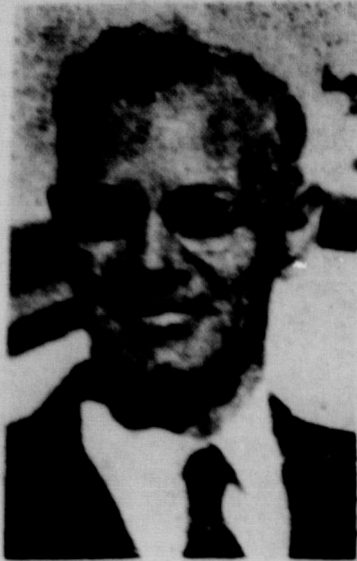

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Probers Seek Answer To Why Flies Attract Others While Feeding

College Station. — Scientists are hot on the trail of a mysterious substance which may make fly control much easier.

The clue, according to Extension Entomologist F. M. Fuller, was supplied by Army scientists several years ago when they discovered that as flies feed, the material upon which they are feeding becomes more attractive to other

flies. Apparently feeding flies deposit some unknown substance which is attractive to other flies.

Now entomologist of the USDA's research laboratory in Orlando, Florida, have actually collected some of the material which they refer to as "fly factor." By dissolving sugar upon which flies have fed in water, acetone or ether and then removing the sugar, "fly factor" was collected.

Fuller says the entomologists, turned detectives, don't know what they have, but it works: Fresh sugar treated with "fly factor"

attracted more flies than untreated sugar.

Efforts at isolation of the material will continue and the secret of its chemical makeup studied. If it could be produced artificially, Fuller believes it would greatly increase the effectiveness of present fly-killing insecticides by making them more attractive to flies.

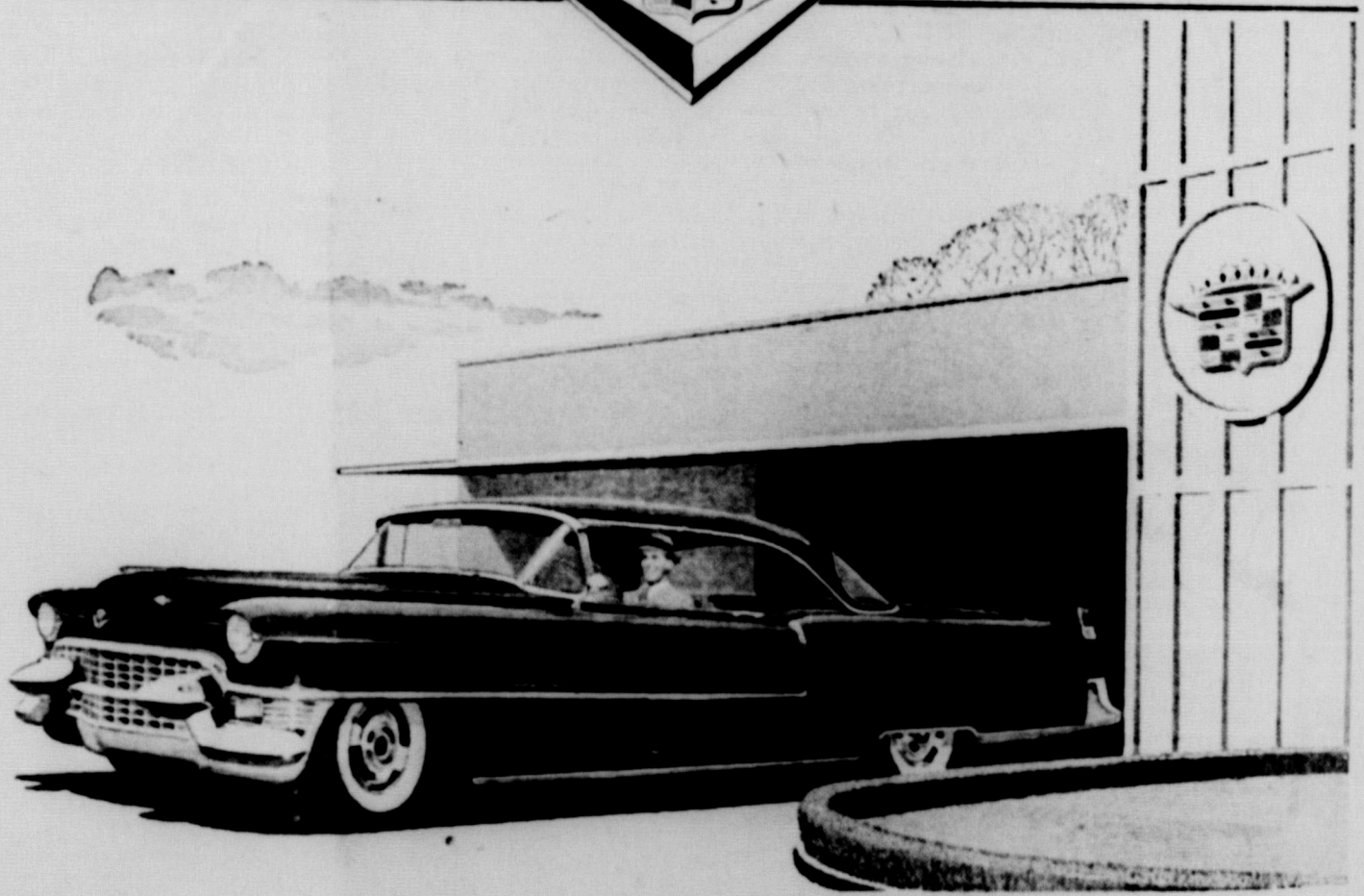
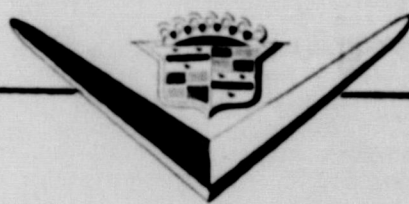

Ozonia Operator To Get Telephone Award For Service In Flood

An Ozonia telephone operator has been chosen to receive the LaCroix Certificate of Meritorious Service, one of the high awards for heroic service available to telephone company employees.

Mrs. Gladys Cox, an operator here since 1951, will receive the LaCroix Certificate along with a \$50 award for her service beyond duty during the Ozonia flood on June 28, 1954.

W. G. Wright, president of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, announced the award today. He will present Mrs. Cox with the LaCroix Certificate at a dinner in Ozonia next week.

During the early morning hours before the flood became imminent, Mrs. Cox made frequent calls from her home to the operator on duty

to offer her help should the relief operator need assistance. As soon as Mrs. Cox, who was off duty at the time, became aware of the flood danger, she immediately left her home and went directly to the telephone office, arriving at the office about 4:45 a. m.

She then endeavored to clear the switchboard of the many signals and in many instances handled calls for help and assistance from subscribers. One such call notified Mrs. Cox that an elderly invalid was trapped in her bed and that the flood waters had risen to the bed. There was serious danger of the invalid drowning. Mrs. Cox contacted her husband who, with the help of another citizen, went to the invalid's home and removed her from danger.

While working at the switchboard, Mrs. Cox became aware of a fire in the equipment in the telephone office and notified the plant man immediately. The plantman

then ordered the operators out of the building for their own safety. When Mrs. Cox left her switchboard, not only was the equipment on fire, but the flood waters had become six inches deep in the exchange.

Mrs. Cox's service did not cease when she had to leave the exchange. She went to the sheriff's office and requested them to notify by radio the telephone people in San Angelo of the flood and its damage to the telephone facilities. She then worked throughout the day and late into the night assisting in every way possible to carry out the responsibilities of the telephone company during this emergency.

Mrs. Cox is a native of Hamlin, Texas, where she attended high school. She is married to Glenn Cox, who is in the masonry and brick-laying business in Ozonia. They have no children. The Coxes have lived in Ozonia eight years.

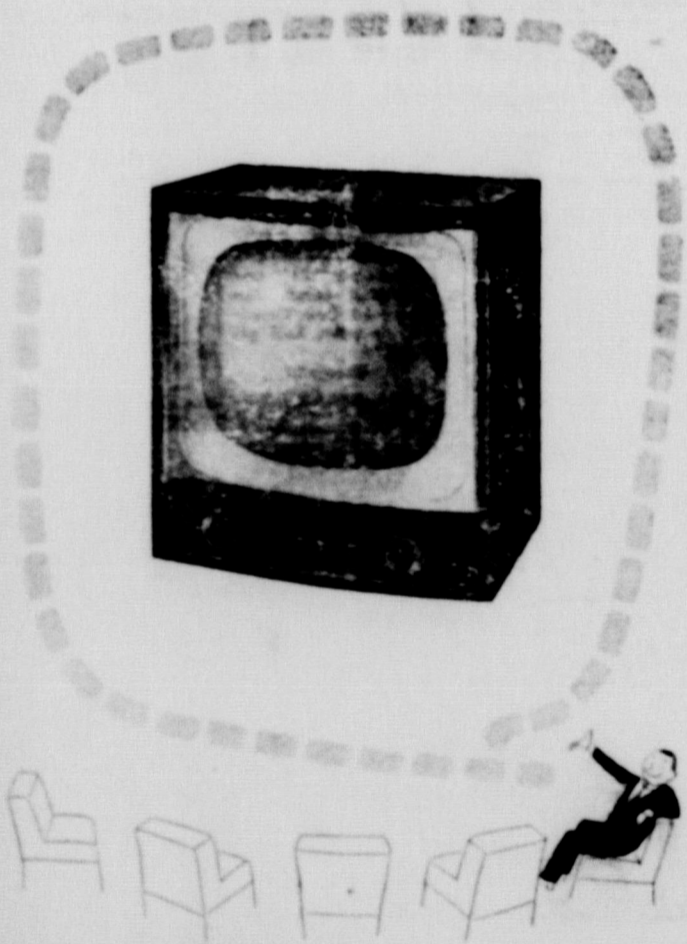

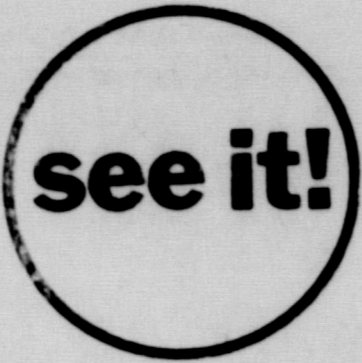

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Congressman Speaks At Informal Meeting Of Ozona Citizens

An intimate glimpse into the inside working of the national Congress was given by Congressman J. T. Rutherford of the 16th Texas district in an informal gathering of interested Ozonans in the district courtroom here Tuesday afternoon.

The freshman Congressman who has an almost perfect roll call attendance record, having missed only one out of 76, touched on the record of the recent session and pointed to some of the important questions to come before the Congress when it reconvenes in January.

Of the three major legislative issues in the president's program which were left over to the next session, federal aid to education, health re-insurance and the federal highway program, Congressman Rutherford singled out the highway program for a little fuller discussion. He explained that he, as are most of the Texas delegation, is opposed to the program because it is a move toward federal encroachment, he said, and is primarily for the benefit of the congested east and north, besides being impractical as a financial venture for the government.

"The plan contemplates 90 percent federal financing and 10 percent state," the Congressman said, "which means 90 percent federal control and 10 percent

state — the latter just about what a husband has in the home. I am in favor of a coordinated system of roads, but roads built by the states."

Rutherford is making a quick tour of the district talking with constituents and getting the low-down on how folks at home are thinking.
