HOSPITAL THOUGHTS

Life is the flesh in this world of ours, that you can be about your business one day and suddenly find yourself in the hospital, just like that and without any forethought. It happened to me not long ago, and I want to tell you about it.

I was pretty thankful to have doctors and nurses handling my problem. There's something called a hospital atmosphere called to reassure, if you are sick. I was lying there thinking that the hospital is probably the civilization's foremost institution.

At the same time, I was a little frustrated at being in a helpless position and a little frustrated trying to fit into a routine laid by someone else. Hospital are designed to minister to patient health, not his ego. The little hospital world for a few days is what you can get from your bed. You run this grind through the mill of mind, over and over again. Results surprise you. You see things you never saw before, and see them up close. You realize later before what a blessing it is.

There comes a time in the hospital experience when you walk a little. Then you begin to see others. And there will always be someone worse off. On the floor was a boy in the teens who was hurt more than three days ago in an oil field accident. All of his body has been in the hospital. He faces much serious things.

On the same floor was a man who gets around only in a wheelchair. Each morning and each evening he went past my door. His eyes says he will probably never leave the hospital.

Some things make your own illness seem small. You feel a sense of pity for another human creature whose plight is so sad. Lying around a hospital can give you a point of view a little different. You see so many people who are sick with so many different things. It almost looks like the whole world is sick. Then it seems to walk over to the outside world and look down on the hospital. There other human beings come in their normal ways. It restores your perspective. The inside of a hospital is a world entirely different. Nurses help bring the patients a little of the outside world. At the hospital when I was in the period from sundown to dark was a favorite visiting place. Members of families, having finished the day's work, came to their loved ones. Neighbors and friends brought in flowers. The beds were full of life, and you could feel the happiness.

I think I rediscovered once again the old truth I have always known. Sometimes do not feel; the society of the human family. In times of trouble, a man alone is less than sufficient. But long as you or I in our trouble are one or more human beings to whom we can cling, we have comfort and hope.

When you look in the face of trouble, the false values fade away. You seem to see the ultimate more clearly. And I felt again, there in the presence of my own trouble and that of many other people, that the New Testament is right, eternally right. It is the only thing that lasts, the only thing that satisfies the heart, the only thing worth living for.

And I felt, as I had not before, that love comes to us through human beings. Although love it is of God, it comes through people; and it reaches other people through us. One of us is more alive than when he is being or receiving the love of another person.

And I felt that, after all, nothing less than love is worth living for. For one by one all the things we seek will fall a-

Livestock, Grass Judging Teams To A&M State Meet

District Winners To Compete For State Judging Honors

Crockett County livestock and grass judging teams, both District 6 champions, will try for the state title at A&M College in the state judging contests slated for this morning at the College.

County Agent Pete Jacoby and eight boys composing the two teams left Wednesday morning by car for A&M where they will remain through Friday, attending the 4-H Club Roundup and Short Courses Thursday afternoon and Friday. Returning Saturday, the group will stop in Kerrville to attend the Real Lamb Sale where they expect to make some purchases of lambs for 4-H Club feeding projects.

Both the livestock and grass judging teams from Ozona won first place in 25-county District 6 in recent competition, thereby winning a chance at the state judging title. There will be some 2,000 4-H and FFA boys attending the A&M round-up and judging contests.

Boys composing the livestock judging team are Brock Jones, Jr., R. J. Everett, Benny Friend and George Banger, Jr. On the grass judging team are Carl Conklin, Erby Chandler, Roy Mann and Johnny Jones.

The local wool and mohair judging team, which won first place in a District 6 practice judging session recently at Sul Ross State College in Alpine, will go to San Angelo Tuesday, June 14, for the state contest to be held in that city. Competing will be judging teams from the wool and mohair producing counties of West Texas principally, District 6 and 7, but with some teams from other sections possibly to enter.

The wool and mohair judging team is composed of Carl Conklin, Erby Chandler, George Banger and Pierce Miller.

Superior Stakes Deep Wildcat On Shannon Estate

Shallow Wildcat Set By McCamey Pair In Tippett Area

Superior Oil Co. will drill its No. 1-B Shannon as a 9,800-foot combination wildcat 1/4-mile south of its No. 1-22 Shannon Estate, Crockett County indicated Strawn discovery 19 miles southwest of Big Lake.

Elevation of the new prospector is estimated as 2,710 feet.

Location, on a 160-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of 22-BB-EI&RR.

The prospector is also 2 1/2 miles north of the Shannon (San Andes) field, producing from approximately 2,398 feet.

Superior 1-22 Shannon Estate has been rescheduled to drill to 9,850 feet, after a 30-minute drillstem test between 9,316-535 feet in either the Mississippian or the Ellenburger recovered 20 feet of mud, no shows. It indicated discovery production from the Strawn with recovery of free oil on a drillstem test between 9,024-950 feet. Original scheduled depth was 9,600 feet.

Ployhan and Reaves et al. of McCamey, have staked a 2,500-foot cable tool test 1/4 mile west of production in the Tippett (lower Clearfork) field of Crockett County, nine miles southeast of McCamey. The project will be drilled as the No. 1-E J. H. Tippett.

Location, on a 160-acre lease, is 1,004.4 feet from the northwest line and 5,500 feet from the northeast line of 38-31-H&TC.

The Tippett (lower Clearfork) field produces from approximately 4,195 feet.

Dust Cloud Blanks Out Ozona As Front Rolls In On Wind

A performance that at least equalled if not outstripped anything the so-called "dust bowl" days ever had to offer in their worst moments was executed by another weather freak here late Wednesday afternoon.

A dust cloud the like of which has not been witnessed in these parts, perhaps since the 1917-18 drought era, rolled over Ozona about 5:30 Wednesday afternoon completely shutting out the sun until at ground level it was as dark as midnight on a dark of the moon. Traffic was stalled on streets and highways as the dust cloud, several hundred feet thick, closed in, and lights went on in homes, on streets and business houses.

The choking duster lasted a comparatively short time before the high wind had carried in on south, a gradual clearing taking the dust out of the air and leaving a cool north wind, with threatening clouds. Light rain, measuring one-tenth of an inch followed close behind the dust and served to clear the murky air.

A welcome rain, covering a considerable section of Crockett and surrounding counties fell here Saturday afternoon following a terrific wind from the west, which damaged roofs, trees and signs in the downtown area. The 400-foot community TV antenna tower on Tandy hill was twisted and bowed at the top by the almost hurricane wind. A repair crew from Oklahoma City came Wednesday afternoon to pull the tower back into plumb and tighten guy wires.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Troy Dale, pastor. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery, with the Cody Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Haire, who was an employee of the Terrel Petroleum Co. had been a resident of Ozona 15 years. He was born Jan. 14, 1898, in Granger, Williamson County, Texas. He and the former Jessie Marshall were married Oct. 22, 1916, in Killeen, Texas.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Scottie Houston of Ozona; four sons, Norris Haire of Big Lake, Dorris Haire of Ozona, Allen Haire, in the army at Ft. Campbell, Ky., and Cecil Haire, who lives at 1115 E. 22nd St. in San Angelo; two sisters, Mrs. Sam Houston of Ozona and Mrs. Charlie Jones, Memphis, Texas; seven brothers, Elmer of Ozona, Elbert and Wayne, both of Clarendon, Clarence of DeKalb Newell of Grand Prairie, Orville of Memphis, Tex., and William Haire, who lives in California; and 10 grandchildren.

Big Lake Man Gets Two Years In Trial Here

Women Jurors Serve In Trial of O. I. Merrifield

O. I. Merrifield of Big Lake was found guilty Tuesday by a Crockett county jury of receiving and concealing stolen property and assessed a two-year term in the state penitentiary.

The case marked a "first" in this county, the first case in which women jurors served in trying a case. The two women jurors were Mrs. Katherine Fuentos and Miss Sandra Verver, Miss Jeannette Trotter, sheriff's deputy, served as bailiff for the lady jurors.

A motion for a new trial was filed by attorneys for the defendant. One of the points on which the motion alleges error on the part of the court was that members of the jury were allowed to separate, the law which requires that jurors in criminal cases must stay together still being on the books while a constitutional amendment now in effect permits women to serve on juries. The legislature did not set up any rules by which mixed juries are to be operated and the question will have to be resolved by court rulings.

A companion case of Merrifield, that of a theft charge against Henry Russell of Big Lake did not come to trial. The men are charged in connection with the alleged theft of oil field equipment from fields in Crockett county.

Two Stepouts Slated In Crockett Fields

Shell Oil Co. will drill its No. 2-B Forristall one location northwest of its No. 1-B Forristall, assured extension to the Tippett field of Crockett County, 12 miles southeast of McCamey.

Rotary drilling to 6,500 feet will begin immediately. Estimated elevation is 2,550 feet.

Location, on a 329-acre lease, is 2,200 feet from the southeast and 5,812 feet from the northeast lines of 41-31-H&TC.

Haynes & V. T. Drilling Co. has filed application to drill its No. 3 University one location north on the east side of production in the Farmer (San Andes) field of Crockett County, 16 miles southeast of Big Lake.

The project will be drilled with rotary to 2,700 feet. Elevation is 2,705 feet.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 2,330 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the west line of 4-50-University.

Rutherford Seeks High Priority For Ozona Flood Plan

Congressman To Meet With DA Officials This Week

Washington, D. C. (Special)—Congressman J. T. Rutherford was to have met with officials in Washington early this week to discuss the possibility of Federal aid for Crockett County in conjunction with proposed flood control structures.

Rutherford, who has talked with Carl Brown of the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service in Washington about the project in the past, says he will meet with Brown and H. N. Emith of Temple who is the State Conservationist for Texas.

Smith was due in Washington Monday, and Brown has indicated to Rutherford that he will welcome a conference sometime during the few days the State Conservationist is to be in Washington.

Congressman Rutherford said Brown told him Smith was making the trip to discuss "the entire small watershed project for the state of Texas." Currently, Brown told the West Texas Congressman, 17 projects have been approved by the State Soil Conservation Service for the State of Texas. He said Smith has indicated that he will probably be able to initiate the development of work plans in two additional watersheds "with-in four to six weeks."

"My main purpose in meeting with these officials is to see if the Department of Agriculture here in Washington will be able to put the Crockett County project high on the priority list," Rutherford said. He said that while the officials could not make any commitments at present, "they have promised to give me their full consideration." Rutherford said that he has talked with Brown on several occasions but "with-held any public announcement or discussion until the groundwork had been well-laid by Crockett County officials."

The Texas State Soil Conservation Board must first declare the Crockett County Project to be of a high priority nature before the Federal government can make extensive plans. Rutherford said Brown told him.

Telegrams were dispatched by the local flood committee to Congressman Rutherford and other area congressmen thanking them for their interest and help and urging the necessity for prompt action by the government to avoid a repetition of last year's disastrous flood.

Paving Plan To Be Explained In Meeting Monday

Commissioners Invite Citizens To Talks On Street Paving

With cost figures now assured, property owners on unpaved streets in Ozona will have an opportunity to hear a full explanation of the proposed paving plan when the Commissioners Court meets next Monday in regular session.

The court has been busy the last week gathering cost data from contractors on curbs and gutters and has invited all interested persons to meet with the court next Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock to discuss the paving plan.

At the request of property owners along several unpaved blocks, the court has agreed that county machinery will be used in the paving work, the grading, filling and rolling of the caliche base to be done without cost to the property owners. The surfacing work, asphalt and crushed rock or gravel, will be applied by the county crews at cost, this cost having been determined at 25 cents per square yard.

During the past week bids were asked by the court on curb and gutters and a price of \$1.20 per linear foot was bid by Dudley McCary. This figure will be used in determining the cost of each property owner's front footage of paving.

Arrangements will also be made by the county for a time payment plan for those who can not pay paving costs in all cash. All of these details will be explained at the meeting next Monday afternoon.

Brahma Bulls And Bucking Horses For All Colored Rodeo

Unconquered "Juneteenth" To Have Help Of Artesia N.M., Stock

Famed "Juneteenth," the unconquered bundle of dynamite wrapped in a coal black pelt, the nemesis of the best bronc busters in the country, will have some help in unseating the ambitious colored cowboys who will "come a' gunnin'" for that black critter" here June 18 and 19 when the seventh annual Ozona All-Colored Rodeo is to be unreeled at the fair grounds.

A string of eight wild broncs and eight equally wild Brahma bulls have been contracted from a breeder at Artesia, N. M., for the All-Colored rodeo spectacle. Bud Cox, chairman of arrangements for the Ozona Roping Club, sponsors of the show, announced this week.

And "Juneteenth," well he's been in the "rain belt" and his range is in good shape, plus a few delicious mesquite beans he's been picking lately, a little before their most luscious ripe stage, but good nevertheless. The young black outlaw, never yet conquered by a human rider, has grown some in stature, is in fine shape and perhaps just for the heck of it has been practicing up on his jumps and jerks while idling away his time in the wide open spaces.

In equally good shape is "Bitterweed" the sorrel terror, a fit companion for Juneteenth who will be in there "keeping 'em loose" in the coming rodeo. And to add to the Artesia string will be a third horse, a dun which the Roping Club owns and who shows lots of promise as a buckler.

The All-Colored Rodeo will be run off Saturday night, June 18, starting at 8 p. m. and again Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m. The festivities will begin with a downtown parade at 4 p. m. Saturday.

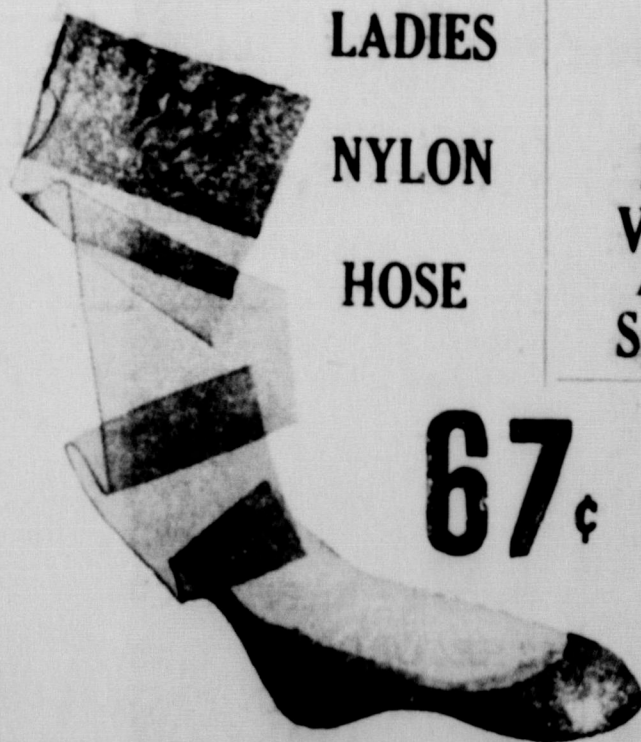

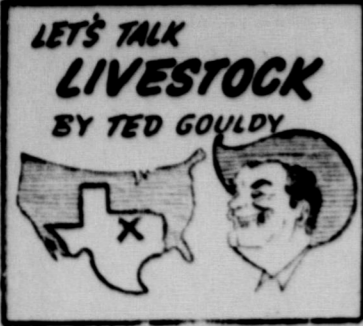

Meat - Type Lamb?

This year at Fort Worth the medium to good types have been selling at prices very near the extreme top for fancy choice kinds. In fact, feeder buyers have been getting fewer of these just "meaty" lambs than ever before, because packers have been so eager for them.

We have been hearing a lot a-

bout "meat-type hogs" but it looks like the country is going for meat-type lambs in a big way, too!

Many half-fat lambs selling in the \$19 to \$21 bracket at Fort Worth Monday look a full two grades below the choice \$22 and \$23 kinds. Shorn old crop lambs Monday sold up to \$18, the highest since around Easter for the class. The trade credits cool weather in many parts of the country, and a late start on the Southeastern states lamb crop for the good market at Fort Worth.

Monday Spring lambs were 50 cents to \$1 higher and old crops were 50 cents to \$1.50 higher. Other sheep steady, breeding ewes in very active demand in view of the improved pasture outlook.

Cattle Steady:

Cattle prices at Fort Worth Monday almost identical with those in effect a year ago at this time.

Fed steers and yearlings are about \$2 per hundred lower than a year ago, but cows, bulls, slaughter calves and stockers are all selling just about like last year at the same time.

So we can quote you prices for this levels, with the above mentioned exception.

Prices Monday: Good and choice grainfed steers and yearlings \$10. to \$22.50; common and medium grassers \$12. to \$18.00. Stocker steer yearlings \$21.00 down. Fat cows \$11.00 to \$14.00; canners and cutters \$7.00 to \$11.00. Stocker cows \$7.00 to \$12.00. Bulls \$10.00 to \$14.50. Good and choice fat calves \$16.00 to \$20.50, few higher. Lower grade calves \$10.00 to \$15. Stocker calves \$23.00 down.
