Cisco Lime Discovery Assured By Cities Service Noelke Well

Cities Service Oil Co. No. 1-E Noelke, Crockett Co. Cisco lime discovery in 32-GG-GC&SF, nine miles northeast of Sheffield and one mile west of production in the Clara Couch (Cisco) field, flowed 174.24 barrels of water in 17 hours.

Flow was through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,580-85 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

On the first four hours of the test, it flowed 62.33 barrels of oil plus 22.41 barrels of water. It then flowed 38.63 barrels of oil, plus 22.02 barrels of water in five hours. Tubing pressure was 575 pounds, then in eight hours, it flowed 73.28 barrels of oil plus 21.98 barrels of water. Flowing pressure was 575 pounds. Gas-oil ratio of 675-1.

Perforations between 5,584-5,589 feet were squeezed off in an effort to eliminate sulphur water.

Production was assured when the project flowed oil at the rate of 120 barrels per hour on a drill-stem test between 5,511-5,590 feet.

Operator has requested discovery allowable and suggested the field be designated as the Willtex (Cisco lime) field.

UT Freshmen May Not Have Cars Next Year; Sophs Banned In '56

Austin, Texas — University of Texas freshmen, except Travis county residents and the physically disabled, are forbidden to own or operate automobiles here beginning next Sept. 1.

Beginning Sept. 1, 1956, sophomores also come under the no-car ban, ordered by the Board of Regents for the Main University where 17,500 or more students are expected for the 1955-56 session.

Tom Sealy of Midland, regent chairman, said the Board's action was on recommendation of the administration and faculty committees, and was "occasioned by the dearth of parking space and the extremely crowded traffic conditions at the campus of the Main University."

University President Logan Wilson said the regulation not only will help alleviate the parking situation, but is "considered by the faculty and staff to be a desirable move from an academic point of view."

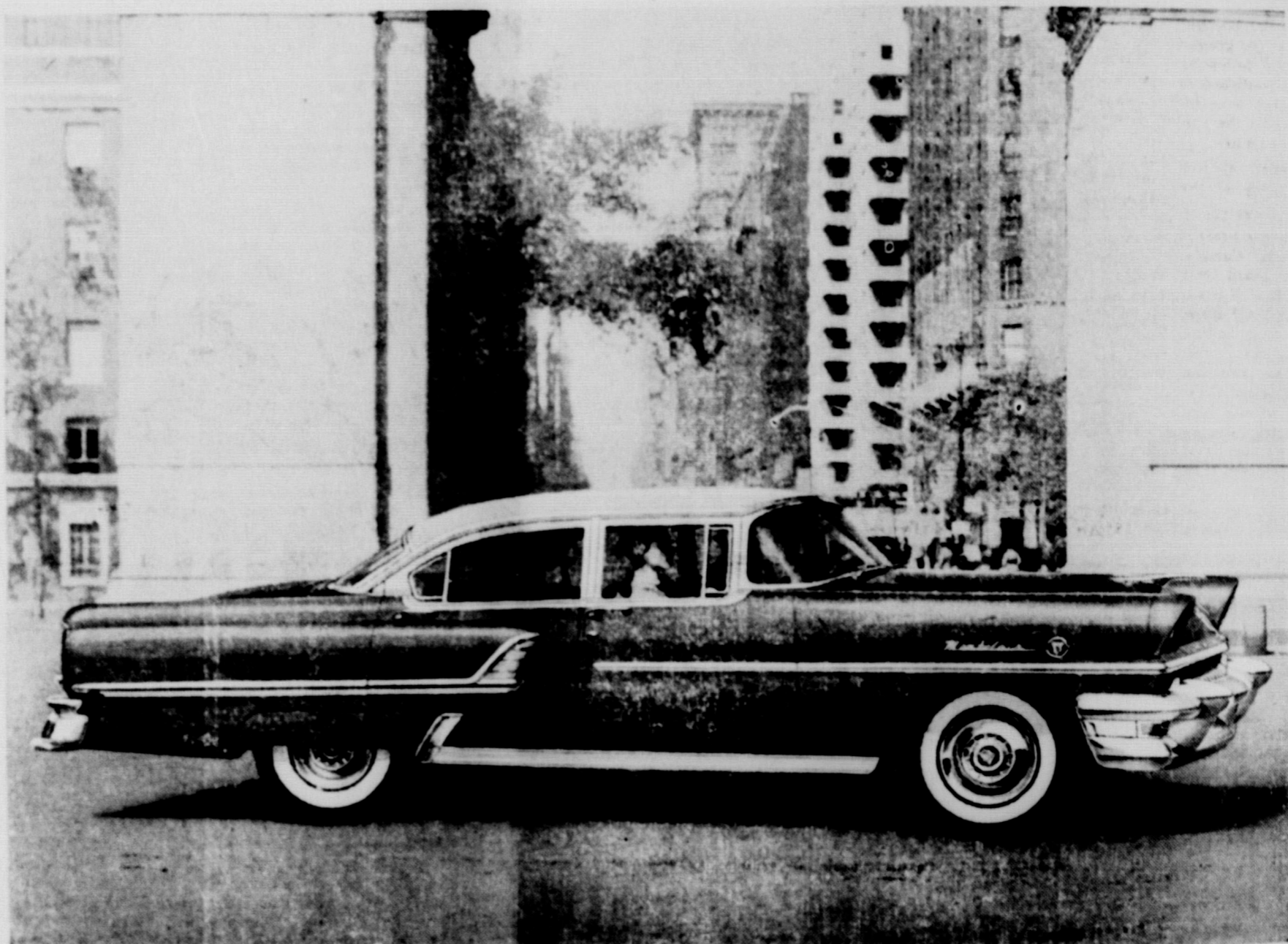

And Shortage Characterize Water Problems of Present

subject of water as it relates to the overall plant, soil, water conservation program on a marked interest to the Crockett Soil Conservation District. Following the flood last year, interest has been brought into the area and new meaning to rural and urban residents of the area.

May 13th the State Soil Conservation Board approved an action for flood prevention on the Johnson Draw. This type program was made possible by PUD. It involves a somewhat new concept of water or flood control, beyond that of simply holding excess runoff water. This type of upstream prevention is to make economic use of water where it falls, and conservation ranching, with the flood water retardation structures to control excessive flow. By following this procedure the proper relationship between plant, soil, and water conservation can be more easily obtained. Another phase of this problem, being brought to light, is that of our ground water reserves. The following from a column published in Virginia describes some interesting developments in the study of ground water supplies:

water," this acts as a tractor. "It slowly disintegrates at a well-known rate, and as the rain falls and sinks into the ground, and keeps percolating downward through the rocks, its age dated from the time of its striking the earth can be measured by measuring its degree of radioactivity, by techniques developed by Dr. Willard Libby of the University of Chicago, and reported in a recent meeting of the American Chemical Society.

"An interesting and significant part of this report is that which states that water from a 900-foot well in Texas had an age of over 50 years. A sample of water taken from a 2,225 gallon-per-minute well 296 feet deep west of Champagne-Urbana was of greater age than 50 years. Some steam condensed and collected from volcanic fumaroles near Pisa, Italy, turned out to be also more than 50 years old.

"Why are these reports significant? Because we are daily using billions of gallons of ground water in this country and we are much concerned as to how long those supplies take to build up and whether we are using them faster than the re-charge rate. Water is our very life. And it may well be some day in the not-too-distant future that large watershed acreages will be farmed as much for the water-crop as for any other."

The relationship of plants, soil, and water is inseparable in the conservationist's eyes. Obtaining a proper balance and control of these three natural resources is one of the goals of soil conservation districts, in striving for a balanced agriculture.

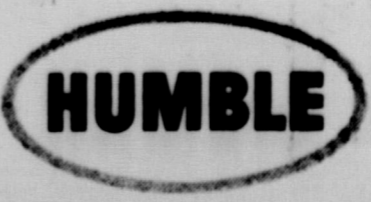

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — It's amazing how quickly pennies can grow into millions of dollars.

But, it is with pennies that Texas is solving its financial problem.

Big discussion of the week has been the proposed two cents increase in gasoline taxes. Right behind that big topic has been the 1-cent increase in cigarette taxes and the hike to 1-cent per bottle (\$1.30 per barrel) in beer taxes.

With these topics before them, the Legislators came back almost to where they started — namely Gov. Allan Shivers' original tax recommendations. Tossed out by the Senators, after many hearings on numerous phases of taxation, were virtually all other tax proposals.

When the tax bill bogged down in the Senate, Governor Shivers threw in a surprise strategy move.

By message, he told the House and Senate — now working without pay — that if they wanted to end this session, he would call them back in a special session when they could be paid \$25 a day.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and speaker Jim Lindsey at once responded that the session could complete the tax chore, unblock the billion and a half dollar appropriation bill, and finish its job.

Filibuster Record Busted
For the third time during the 1955 Legislative session, a new talkathon mark was established by a member of the usually sedate Senate.

This time the speaker was Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock who took 28 hours, 25 minutes against a state water project financing plan.

Rain Steals the Show
General rains throughout the state stole the spotlight from the Legislators the past week. It was NEWS — BIG news. Even where there were floods, there were smiles of gratitude for the moisture.

As for the capital city, weathermen here report that Austin already has received more rain this year than it did throughout 1954. Recent almost statewide rains have changed Texas' crop outlook from "dismal failure" to "fairly good". Rain came too late to help the wheat and oats, but benefits to pasturelands were rated "excellent".

Probe in Senate

Lack of information prompted them to approve veterans land deals as a matter of routine. So said two state officials testifying in the Senate phase of the Land Office investigations.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and State Auditor C. H. Cavness were the witnesses.

Cavness showed a form used by Giles to request funds for loans. Bearing the seal of the land board, the form carried no signature other than Giles'.

"Nothing came to us to cause us to have any suspicions," Cavness said, adding that he had assumed the deals had been approved by a majority of the three-member board.

Governor Shivers and Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard recently have made affidavits to the effect that they were absent from board meetings on certain dates when the minutes cited that they were present.

From San Antonio, the district attorney's office announced it was demanding the maximum 10-year prison term for Giles, in his scheduled trial on charges of accepting a \$20,000 bribe. Also that C. V. Wynn and Arthur McKenzie of San Antonio, charged with offering the bribe, would "turn state's evidence" against Giles.

Week-end discussion of a further postponement of the trial was based on the reported employment of an unnamed member of the Legislature as counsel. This is automatic grounds for continuance until 30 days after adjournment of the Legislature.

Short Shorts

Venue in the future income tax trial of George B. Parr, political boss of the Duval County area, has been transferred to Austin.

Sen. William H. Moore of Bryan has pending in the Senate a resolution to investigate Southwest Conference athletic recruiting, following accusations against A&M

College.

A Senate committee struck from the House-passed "unfair sales" bill authority for a trade association to sue a merchant for selling goods below cost. Sponsors said they wanted that proviso because an individual merchant might hesitate to sue — and give housewives the idea he was trying to keep them from buying as cheaply as possible.

Cuts in allowable oil production, made by the Railroad Commission whittled the State's prospective revenue from oil. June allowable was cut 64,820 barrels daily, and July 67,219.

The Senate joined the House in passing Rep. Dolph Briscoe's stringent bill regulating veterans' land sales and outlawing block deals. Briscoe's constitutional amendment replaces the Governor and Attorney General as Veterans Land Board members. Two appointive members would serve with the land commissioner.

has long been a chief proponent of this constitutional change, and it is hoped that the Senate will repeat its action this year and that the House will look with more favor on the proposal this time.

Abolish the Electoral College

The amendment would abolish the archaic and outmoded electoral college. Each state's total electoral vote toward the selection of a President would remain the same but it would be counted without intervention of "dummy" electors, and it would be credited to the candidates for President and Vice President in proportion to the direct popular vote cast in each state. In other words, if a candidate receives three-fourths of the popular vote in a state, he would receive three-fourths of the electoral vote of that state instead of the entire electoral vote as under the present system.

Under the present system the candidate who receives only a one-vote majority in New York would receive the entire 45 electoral votes of the state. Under our proposed amendment, these 45 electoral votes would be divided in accordance with the popular vote, each candidate receiving approximately one-half of the 45 electoral votes. The votes would be counted as they are cast. Each voter would have his vote reflected in the

final electoral vote of the state.

So long as the present electoral college method exists, each political party will continue to concentrate its campaign in the heavily populated states of the North and East. Each party will continue to out-promise the other in appealing to minority and pressure groups which might hold the balance necessary to win the majority popular vote and therefore the entire electoral vote in the pivotal states. If the proposed change is made, a vote in Texas will be worth as much as a vote in New York, and the same will be true of individual votes in every state. Presidential candidates would campaign in the South and West in the future instead of concentrating most of their efforts in the densely populated states.

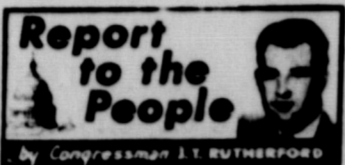

The combination of the two items mentioned above, and other factors, worked on the National Reserve Act in Congress late last week and as a result the badly sliced bill limped back into Committee for major surgery.

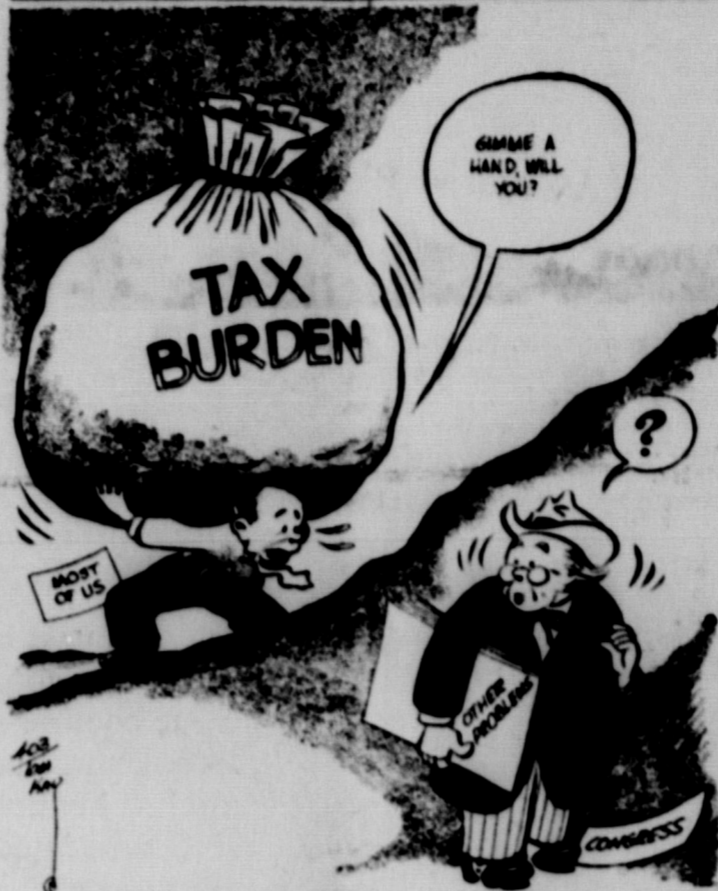
So many amendments were offered that the measure bore little resemblance to the well-polished plan which came to the floor.

During some of the more bitter fights on the floor, if you keep your ears tuned you will hear some strange things.

For instance, in advocating adoption of the National Reserve Program, Congressman Robinson (R-Kentucky) was recounting his own World War II experiences. Saying he was 38 years old when he went into service, Mr. Robinson said: "As a result I lost my business; I lost my home; and I lost my wife. But I did not lose my life like many others did, and before you start feeling sorry for me, may I say that I got a better business, a better home and a better wife."

One of the strongest supporters of the National Reserve Program on the floor was a Maryland Congressman with the lengthy moniker of James Patrick Sinnott Devereaux.

He was in command on Wake Island when that island was being defended by a handful of gallant Marines against swarming hordes of Japanese soldiers.

During the terrible fighting, the Pacific high command contacted Devereaux and asked what the situation was on the island, and what was needed.

Devereaux then sent his famous quote to the world: "Send me more Japs". He was later captured and held prisoner by the Japs.

Judge Langdon's Pay Cut By Bill But New One Repairs Damage

Austin. — A bill which has passed the Legislature redistributing some Southwest Texas judicial courts would cut the salary of one district judge, lawmakers have discovered. So, a bill correcting the situation has been introduced.

Judge James Langdon of Upton County is the judge affected. The redistributing would accidentally cut \$2,700 annually off his salary. Under a law enacted in 1951, he receives extra pay for juvenile cases and other extra duties in two counties. The law is so worded that he gets this because he now has five counties in his district, two of which overlap with another district.

The redistributing bill cuts him down for four counties, thus voiding the setup whereby he now gets his extra pay. Kimble was taken from his 112th District leaving him Pecos, Upton, Sutton and Crockett.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman and Rep. Joe Burkett, who handled the redistributing bill, said they had no intention of cutting the judge's pay. A bill has been introduced allowing the counties left in the 112th to pay him the extra if they wish.

The redistributing bill created a second 38th District Court, taking counties from the old 38th, the 33rd and the 112th districts.
