Ferguson, Evangelist city of Memphis, now a TVA customer, decided to build a \$100,000,-000 municiual plant of its own and, as a result, TVA wouldn't need the Dixon-Yates production.

The ballyhoo, obviously, marks an attempt to make political capital of what has happened. It certainly has small basis in fact. The President's position was and is that federal power systems, such as TVA, should not be enlarged with the money of all the taxpayers when local groups can meet local needs. If Memphis wishes to go deep into debt to build a power plant, that is the business of Memphis citizens.

The Wall Street Journal expressed a view widely held in informed and reasonable circles when it said, "Memphis will built its own power plant and no longer will taxpayers from all over the nation pay to supply Memphis with cheaper electricity. And that was a defeat for those who support TVA's unwarranted expansion.

It isn't likely that many people will long be fooled by the everlasting efforts of federal power groups to make white out of black and vice versa.

Most of the cures, of course, come from this sense of the committee and court group.

Something is being done to provide adequate facilities for the mentally ill we are sure to have in future years. Legislators are appropriating more money for more and better mental institutions. There are also 400 associations and societies over the country, some city-wide, and some state-wide, who are working in the interests of the mentally ill. These are coordinated under the National Association for Mental Health. Many of their members do parttime volunteer work in private and public institutions with the mentally ill. Others take convalescent mental patients into their homes under a supervised outpatient plan. Others help find staff members and better facilities for our mental hospitals, still others campaign in the interest of better mental institutions.

Probably the most hopeful sign of all is that we are at last doing away with the old attitude of saying and doing nothing about our mentally ill. We realize that they are sick, just as people can be sick with other diseases, that many can be well again, and that all are entitled to the best treatment society can give them.

If, as has been said, "Civilization is judged by its treatment of its misfortunates," then ours is surely getting better. Even so, we have yet a long way to go.


