**Wolfcamp Discovery Seen In Superior Oil Co. Shannon Wildcat**

A Wolfcamp discovery was indicated in Crockett County and pipe was being run at another wildcat. Superior Oil Co. No. 1-10 Shannon Estate, in 10-BB-ELARR, 20 miles southwest of Big Lake, and 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Shannon (Strawn) field, reversed out 34 barrels of 34 gravity oil on a drillstem test in the Wolfcamp between 6,646-6,673 feet.

On the 1 1/2-hour test, gas surfaced in four minutes. Recovery below the circulating sub was five feet of oil.

The project, slated for a 9,800-foot bottom, was drilling below 6,891 feet.

Pure Oil Co. was waiting on cement after setting 5 1/2-inch casing at 8,833 feet at the No. 1-C University, wildcat in 26-7-University, 12 miles southwest of Big Lake, drilling mud with slight shows of oil and 90 feet of gas-cut mud with slight shows of oil on a drillstem test between 8,435-44 feet.

The Farmer (San Andres) field has been extended one location west with completion of Plymouth Oil Co. No. 4-P University, in 8-50-University, 10 miles southeast of Big Lake, for a daily flow-

ing potential of 144.09 barrels of 30.3 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 427-1.

Production was through a 5-1/2-inch choke and perforations between 2,508-526 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing cemented at 2,579 feet on total depth of 2,580 feet. Top of pay was picked at 2,508 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2,683 feet. Pay section was fractured with 5,000 gallons.

Tubing pressure was 400 pounds; casing pressure, 100

pounds.

Val-Carroll Oil Co. of San Angelo will drill its No. 1-Y J. M. Shannon Estate 3 1/2-mile west of (San Andres) field, 22 miles north-west of Ozona.

The project will be drilled with cable tools to 2,000 feet, with operations beginning Nov. 4.

Location, on a 120-acre lease, is 330 feet from the north and 2,863 feet from the west lines of 18-14-GS&SF. Elevation is 2,424 feet.

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base & surfacing on Farm to Market Road 2083 in Crockett County was awarded in Austin this week, J. A. Enell, District Highway Engineer at San Angelo has announced. The firm of Angelo Constr. Co., San Angelo submitted the low bid of \$81,471.90 on the project which runs from 16 miles southwest of Ozona, southwest 5 miles.

Resident Engineer Robert A. McCulloch of Sonora will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 100 days to complete.

Fort Worth — The Monday morning line on salable receipts of livestock around the major market circle this week showed about 21,000 fewer cattle and calves, about 10,000 fewer hogs and 9,000 fewer sheep and lambs.

Since this followed a definite tapering off of receipts in the closing days of last week, it clearly indicated that the farmers had taken a hand in righting the upset caused by near record amounts of meat being marketed this season.

Comparative prices showed: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$17.50 to \$21.50; common and medium grades \$10.00 to \$16.50. Fat cows \$9.00 to \$11.00; canners and cutters \$6.00 to \$9.50; bulls \$9.00 to \$12.50, odd head \$13.00; good and choice slaughter calves \$15.00 to \$16.50, few fancy heavies \$17.00 to \$17.50 and above; common and medium \$11.00 to \$14.50; culls \$8.00 to \$10.00. Stocker steer calves \$19.50 down; steer yearlings \$18.00 down, replacement cows \$8.00 to \$12.00.

**Incentive Payment Important**  
Current low offers for wool, which reflect the world-wide decline of around 25 to 30 percent in fine wools and 15 to 20 percent on crossbred wools (USDA Wool Situation Oct. 20, 1955), make the certificate the sheepman needs to present to his local ASC office for payment doubly important.

To save time and trouble the producer should get certification at the time he sells. At a recent meeting at Fort Worth approved forms for use in establishing the claims of the seller to get these incentive payments were worked out and are in use at Fort Worth. Unless the information needed is shown the producer might be unable to qualify for his incentive payment.

**Lambs Under Pressure:**  
Fat lambs topped at \$17.50 in the wool and \$17 for shorn lambs at Fort Worth Monday. This represented a 50 cents lower market than last week's close. Prices were around \$1 to \$1.50 under prices a week or so earlier, despite continued small receipts here and all around the market loop. Old ewes sold better, most ewes at \$5 to \$6, some fresh shorn cull ewes down to \$4. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12. Yearling muttons sold from \$10 to \$15.

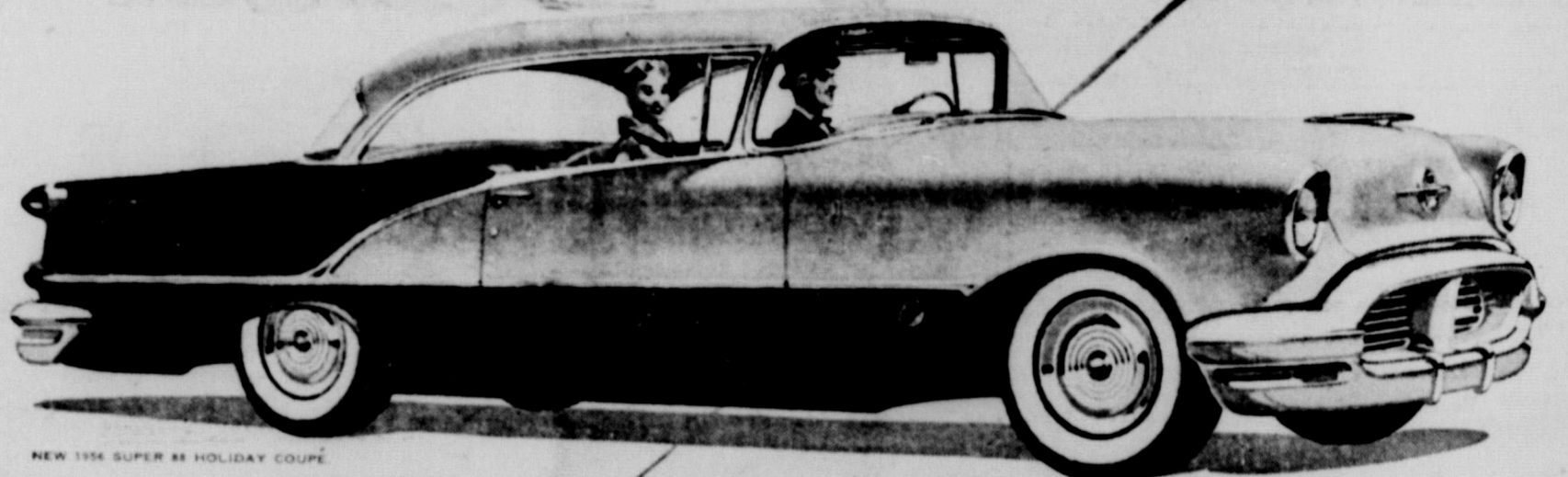

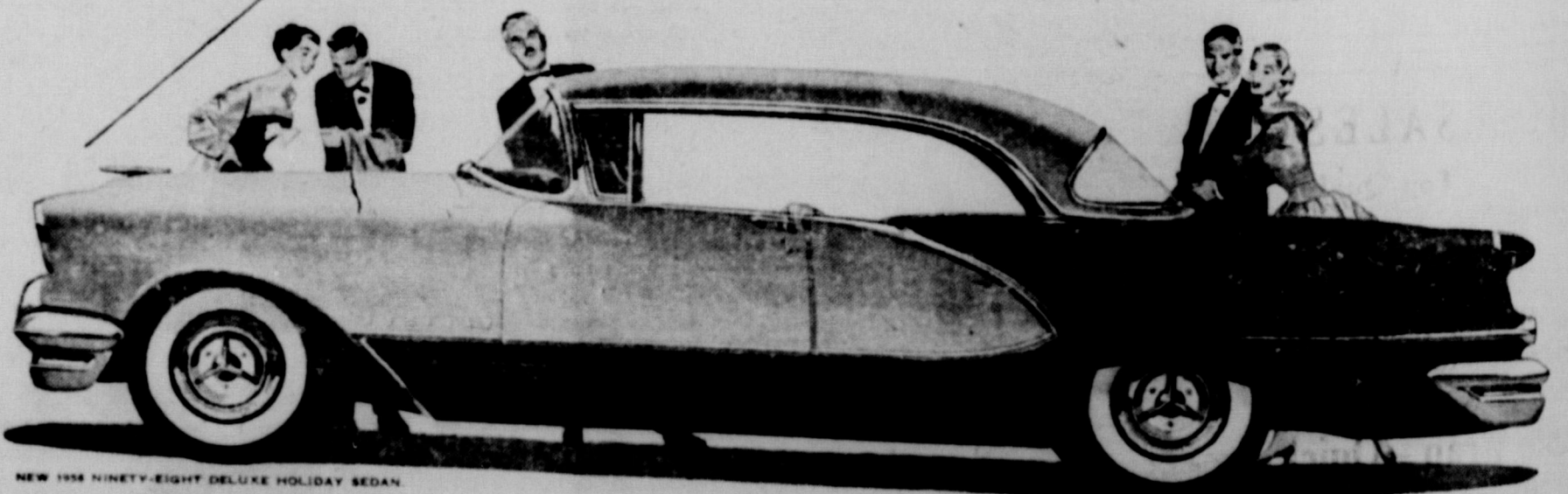

**PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT**

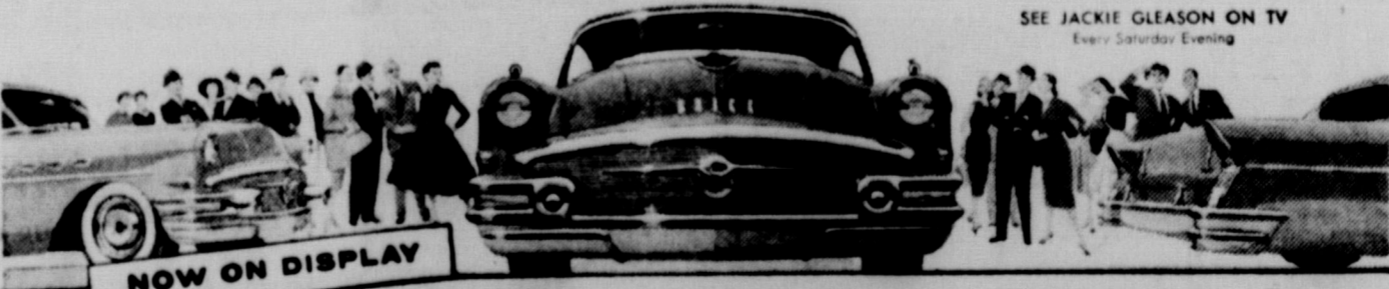

The win brought the 1953 Lions

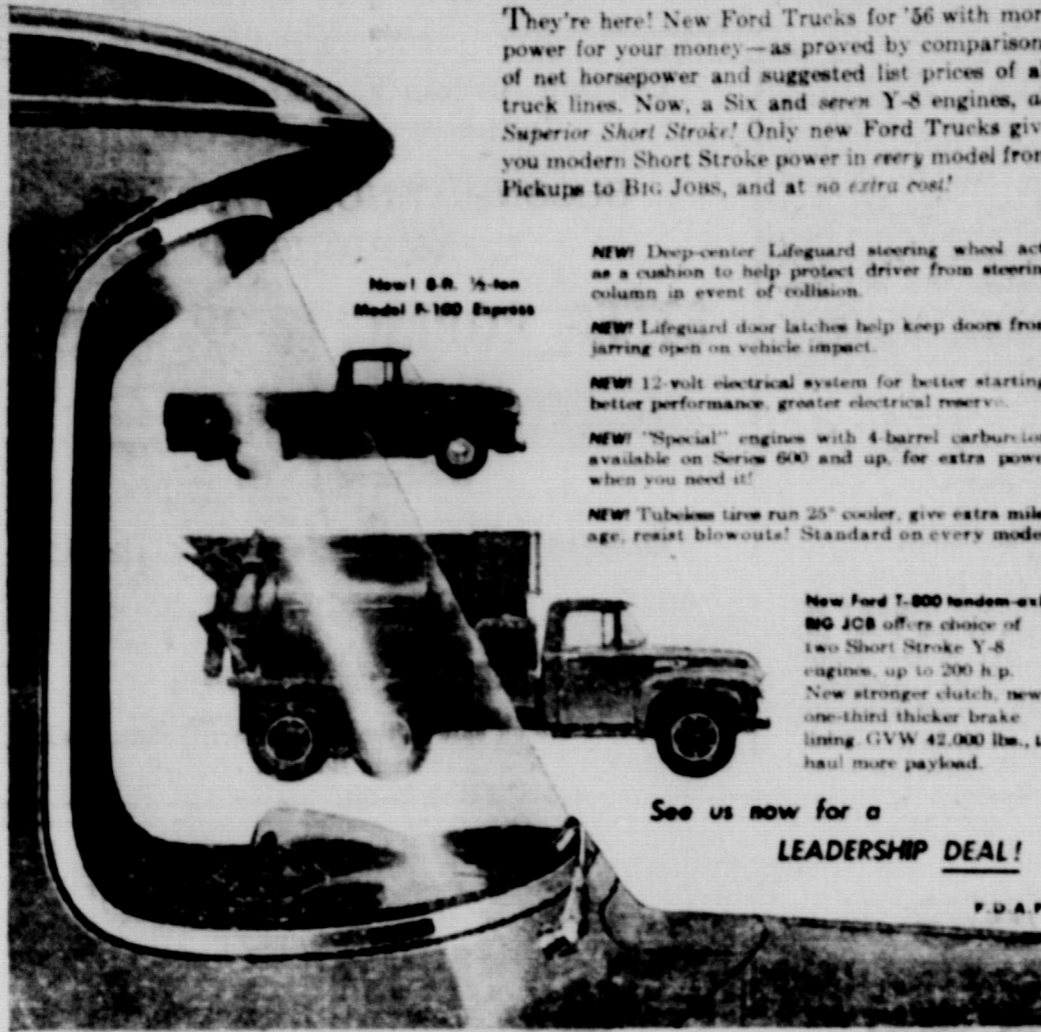
above the 500 mark, the first time since 1947 for an Ozona team and equaled the Lions' best mark for

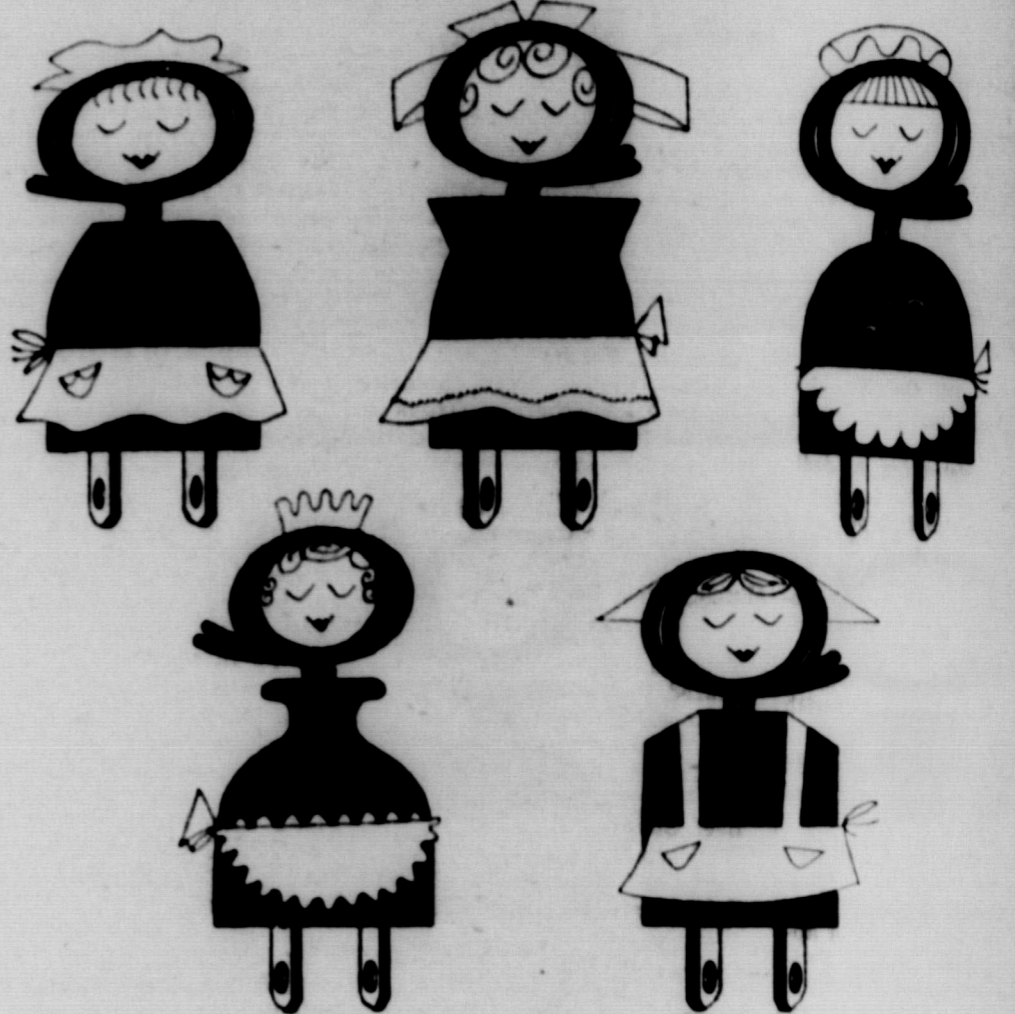
