## Forward Hospital Contract After Plans Are Pared

### Construction Cost Cut To \$211,195; Rutherford To Build

After several days of conferences by the Commissioners Court, Hospital Board and contractors and architect, costs were pared to a point where contract could be awarded for construction of the new Crockett County Hospital.

W. C. Rutherford of San Antonio, low bidder out of six contractors who submitted bids when they were opened by the Court last week, was awarded the contract on a total bid cost of \$211,195. Mr. Rutherford's original bid was \$268,200, but by changing and eliminating certain unessential features, the plans were shaped to the point where the cost approach of the money available from the \$200,000 bond issue approved by voters recently for the hospital construction.

To meet the costs in excess of bond money available, the Commissioners Court plans to issue time warrants sufficient to cover the amount at such time as they will be needed to pay for the work.

To make funds already on hand in county depository available for use in meeting excess costs on the hospital, the Commissioners Court is considering submitting to a vote of the people the question of permitting re-allocation of county funds, now restricted by the constitution but which can be altered by a vote of the people.

Should such a plan be submitted and approved by the voters, an excess levy now made for the hospital fund could be converted for use in the building of the hospital, thus obviating the necessity for issuing time warrants. This question will be submitted to voters by the state in the form of an amendment to the constitution in November, 1956, but can be accomplished sooner by a special countywide election.

## Lions Rack Up Season's 7th Win Over Grandfalls

### Non-District Opponent Downed 48-0 In Last Lion Home Game

The Ozona Lions chalked up their seventh win of the 1955 season Friday night as they closed their year's home schedule with a smashing 48-0 win over a big opponent Grandfalls team. The win brought the Lions' season record to seven wins and one tie and left them on top of the district 6-A league chase.

The Lions were in complete control of the situation all night as a hard hitting defense limited the visitors to a mere 22 yards rushing. Unable to run, the Cowboys resorted to a passing attack which gained more yardage than the ground attack, but was equally unproductive.

The Lions defense was sparked by a host of Lion defenders but it was Jake Young, playing with a injured nose was outstanding in stopping the invaders' wide plays as well as contributing a fine pass to the offense. Guards Juan Magado and Roy Glen Sutton both played well as did tackles, Benny Mendez, Luis Vela and Jess Marley.

After a slow start the Lions launched two scoring drives in the second quarter to seize a lead which was never threatened.

Fullback Mike Clayton, operating from behind a good blocking forward wall, paced the two drives of 65 and 70 yards for the first two scores. In the first drive Clayton contributed runs of 17 and 25 yards in addition to the scoring thrust from the three. Clayton converted after the first score and the Lions lead 7 to 0.

## Inter Club Council Discusses Community Projects In Meeting

The Inter Club Council, composed of representatives from the various civic groups in Ozona, met in quarterly session Wednesday afternoon and heard reports of projects under way by the various organizations represented and made plans for community development projects.

New officers were elected by Council, with Vernon Ratliff, Rotary Club president, as chairman and Mrs. James Baggett, P. T. A. president, secretary.

Bob Scott, representing the Lions Club, reported that organization plans to erect the usual Christmas tree in the park this year and is working on a project to get a Highway Patrol station here. Mrs. Charlie Black, representing the Woman's Forum, said that her club is working on supplying Christmas needs for tuberculosis hospitals.

Mrs. R. A. Harrell of the Ozona Music Club said that the club is planning Christmas carol singing in the high school auditorium during the Christmas season. Aaron Bledsoe, Ozona Volunteer Fire Department representative, announced that the department will again bring Santa Claus for his pre-Christmas visit.

Mrs. Evert White, representing the Ozona Woman's Club, said that her organization is collecting clothes for Indian children and materials for needy German children.

Mrs. James Baggett of the P. T. A. announced that Tommy Thompson, president of the State Teachers Assn. will speak in Ozona on Jan. 16, reviewing the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in November, 1956, and on the question of teacher retirement and pay.

Bob Scott precipitated a spirited discussion when he announced that the Lions Club plans to recondition the sign which has stood at the highway intersection in downtown Ozona for nearly a quarter century. The sign, reading "Ozona, Biggest Little Town in the World," had its champions and its opponents in the meeting.

But Mr. Scott got more harmony when he suggested that the civic leaders keep informed on progress of the flood control project and to be ready to work for the bond issue to pay this county's share in the project when time comes for its submission.

## Block 47 Shallow Field Is Extended; Two Tests Spotted

The Block 47 (Shallow) field of Crockett County has been extended 3/4-mile west with the completion of E. V. Mitchell Oil Co. No. 1-P University, in 9-47-University 15 miles southeast of Big Lake.

It was completed for a daily pumping potential of 61 barrels of 32.5 gravity oil, plus 49 per cent water.

Production was from open hole between 2,114 feet, where 7-inch casing was set and 2,325 feet, total depth. Completion was natural.

Top of pay was picked at 2,165 feet on elevation of 2,704 feet.

The project is also 1/2 mile east of production in the Farmers (San Andres) field.

Trans-Pecos Corp., Iraan, has filed application to drill the No. 1 J. S. Todd, one location east of production in the Todd, West (San Andres) field of Crockett County, 26 miles northwest of Ozona.

It will be drilled to 2,500 feet. Elevation is 2,485 feet.

Location, on a 240-acre lease, is 2,310 feet from the south and 1,650 feet from the west lines of 15-10-GH&SA.

H. L. Hunt, Dallas, has filed application to drill the No. 29 J. M. Shannon Estate, 3/4-mile west of production in the Midway Lane 1300 field of Crockett County, 12 miles north of Ozona.

It will be drilled to 1,400 feet with rotary. Ground elevation is 2,649 feet.

Location, on a 784-acre lease, is 7,274 feet from the most northerly north line and 330 feet from the most westerly east line of 2-3A-Mrs. Oglesby.

## Rotary Club To Sponsor Turkey Shoot Here Sun.

### Nimrods To Be Given Chance To Limber Up Hunting Guns

Ozona Rotary Club will sponsor a Turkey Shoot Sunday afternoon, beginning at 1:30 p. m. The Shoot will be held on the Gene Williams ranch, two miles west of town, adjacent to highway 290 on the south side of the road.

Shooters are to furnish their own rifles and ammunition for the Shoot. In addition to turkey shooting, there will be target shooting for both large and small bore rifles. The small bore rifle will be limited to the .22 calibre rim fire rifle with .22 long rifle ammunition.

There will be a target range for zeroing rifles with special targets for this purpose. It is also planned to have a range for deer shooting in which deer silhouettes will be used for running and standing shots.

Many valuable prizes will be given to winners of group shooting, such as turkeys, hams, and many others furnished by Ozona merchants.

The large bore range will be 100 yards and the small bore at 50 feet. Only targets will be used for the small bore range.

Shooting matches will be held for groups such as the three school groups, elementary, junior high, and high school; also groups for both men and women and a special group for Ozona school teachers.

With the hunting season opening up next Wednesday, this is a good opportunity to limber up the old shooting iron and get that eagle eye in focus, so the Rotary Club invites everyone to come out and get in on some target practice and win turkeys and other valuable prizes this coming Sunday afternoon.

## Former Ozonan Kills Huger Wolf On Ranch Near Hugo, Colorado

An account of the recent slaying of a huge wolf by Dock Lee, former Ozonan, son of Mrs. Pat Lee of this city, now ranching near Hugo, Colo., appeared in a recent issue of the Denver Post.

The wolf, said to be the first to be seen in Colorado in a quarter century, weighed 89 pounds and measured more than six feet in length. It had not been identified as to type.

A neighbor of Lee's spotted the big animal and drove to Lee's house. The two men and Lee's son, Tommy, 10, went to the area and Lee shot the animal with a rifle.

The newspaper account said that the wolf is believed to have been the same one which menaced two children in a pasture of a ranch near the Lee place some weeks before. A small dog accompanying the children barked at the huge beast and scared him away. Witnesses said that the wolf was larger than the "lobo" wolves which prowled the plains in the pioneer days.

## Lubbock Minister To Preach Here In Baptist Revival

## Wet Snow Blankets West Texas Section Ahead Of Norther

A very wet snow, with a maximum of moisture for its bulk, blanketed a wide section of West Texas ahead of a norther which blew in early Tuesday morning.

The snow here measured about two inches and was so heavy with moisture that it swayed tree limbs, still holding their leaves, and in several instances broke large limbs from trees. The actual moisture from the snow was estimated from a quarter to a third of an inch.

## Slick Oil Co. Sets Outpost, Stepouts To Crockett Co. Fields

Slick Oil Co., of Houston, has filed application to drill two stepouts to the Farmers (San Andres) field and one outpost to the Weger (San Andres) field of Crockett County 18 miles north of Ozona.

The No. 4 V. V. Weger, 3/4-mile southeast of production in the Weger (San Andres) field, will be drilled to 2,650 feet. Kelly bushing elevation is 2,605 feet.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 330 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west lines of the southeast quarter of 49-GC&SF.

The No. 6-A University, one location south of the Farmer (San Andres) field, is 1,650 feet from the north and east lines of 11-50-University. Elevation is 2,722 feet.

The No. 8-A University, 3/4-mile southwest of production in the Farmer (San Andres) field, is 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of 11-50-University. Kelly bushing elevation is 2,724 feet.

The later two projects, which are on a 169.6-acre lease, will be drilled to 2,750 feet with rotary.

## Hancock Schedules Stepout To Farmers

Hancock Oil Co. has filed application to drill the No. 3-X-B University, one location southeast of production in the Farmers (San Andres) field of Crockett County and 8 1/2 miles southeast of Big Lake.

It will be drilled to 2,800 feet with rotary. Estimated elevation is 2,720 feet.

Location, on a 166.08-acre lease, is 1,002.5 feet from the west and 990 feet from the north line of the southeast quarter of 9-50-University.

## 40 Residences To Be Built For Radar Personnel

### Air Force Seeks Land Near Site For Family Type Houses

Forty family type residence houses, in addition to the two big dormitories originally contemplated, will be built at the site of the radar aircraft control station to be built for the Air Defense Command, U. S. Air Force, five miles east of Ozona on the Davidson ranch, it was learned here this week.

A Colonel Phillips, from Sweetwater, and a Col. Cole of Oklahoma City, both Air Force officers and in charge of planning the radar station installation here, were visitors to Ozona last week-end. They conferred with Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., on whose ranch the station will be located.

The two Air Force officers told Mr. Davidson that the government will seek to purchase an additional plot of land adjoining the entrance road to the radar site as a location for the 40 residences to house married personnel at the base. These 40 houses will not be sufficient to take care of all married personnel, they said, the others probably to live in Ozona.

While here the two officers and a civilian engineer employed by the Air Force visited the radar site and took copious notes on what they saw and suggestions they heard from Mr. Davidson and others. Contracts will soon be let by the Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth district office, for construction of the installation, it has been announced.

Col. Phillips, who told Mr. Davidson that he would be making frequent visits to Ozona in the next few weeks and months, made a ground location of the site for the proposed 40-unit housing installation and took the name and address of the land owner, Mrs. Mark Garver of Little Rock, Ark. Mr. Davidson's sister, with a view to contacting her to arrange for purchase of the additional land.

**Permian Discovery Indicated In North Crockett Co. Show**

A Crockett County Permian discovery has been indicated with the recovery of oil and gas on a core cut between 2,241-2,295 feet at Thompson-Powell-Derrick Drilling Co. et al of Abilene No. 1 Maggie S. Neal, in 66-BB-GC&SF, nine miles south of Big Lake and 3 1/4 miles southwest of the Weger (San Andres) field.

Recovery was 54 feet of which 40 feet was well-saturated and bleeding oil and gas. The upper 44 feet of the core was in the Grayburg, the remainder in the San Andres, tentatively topped at 2,275 feet.

Operator was preparing to core another 50 feet.

Williamson & Kotzya of Midland will drill a 2,500-foot cable tool wildcat in Crockett County, 14 miles northeast of Sheffield. It will be the No. 1-20 A. C. Hoover. Operations are to begin immediately.

Location, on a 320-lease, is 330 feet from the south and east lines of 20-1-GC&SF.

The project is separated from the Hoover field by a 2,220-foot failure.

### Seven New Oil Fields Opened In County First 9 Months of 1955; Oil Production Totals Near Four Million Barrels During First Six Months

Seven new oil fields were opened in Crockett County during the first nine months of 1955.

The county's 42 producing fields produced 3,977,385 barrels of oil during the first six months of 1955.

The Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field produced the most oil with a total of 666,593 barrels; second, World field with 596,641 barrels; third, Vaughan, 345,933 barrels; fourth, Todd Deep (Crinoidal) and fifth, World, West, 157,624 barrels.

Weger, San Andres — Slick Oil Co., Ltd., and Findley W. Holbrook No. 1 V. V. Weger et al. in 49-GC&SF, nine miles daily pumping potential of 93 barrels of 30 gravity oil, no water, through perforations between 2,282-2,302 feet. Pay section was fractured with 15,000 gallons.

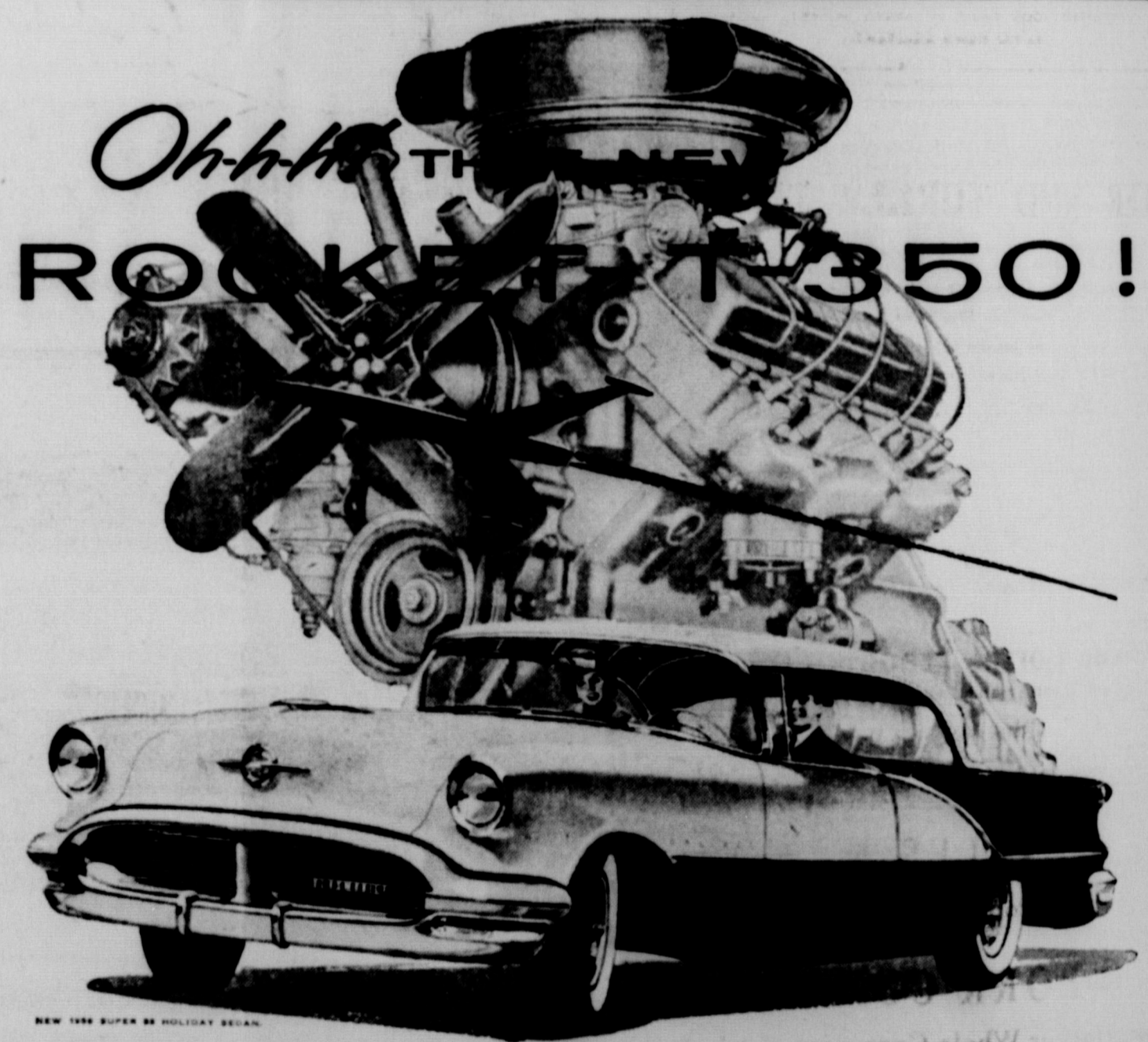

Grandfalls received the kickoff but could make no headway. Quarterback Dean Taggart kicked out of bounds on the Lion 30 yard line. The Lions wasted little time on the second drive as they put together short gains with two ten and one twenty-five yard run by Clayton for the score. This time Sutton's try for the extra point was wide.

The Lions turned out the lights for the Cowboys in the third quarter as they rushed across three touchdowns while pulverizing the offensive efforts of the invaders.

The first tally of the third quarter came on an 80 yard drive the last 54 of which were made by Mike Clayton who tallied his third counter of the night. Clayton converted after the touchdown and the score rose to 20 to 0.

Following the Lions kickoff the Grandfalls team tried a run on fourth down needing one yard but Luf Vela broke through and spilled fullback Ronald Phipps for a two yard loss and the Lions took over on the Cowboy 39.

Halfback Orville Paulk paced the goalward drive as he reeled off runs of 8 and 18 yards. Bobby Sutton drove into the end zone from the 3 yard line and Clayton again chalked up the extra point, this time running with a fumbled snap.

The next touchdown came before the fans quit yelling about the last one as Kent Babb covered the fumbled kickoff and put the Lions in business on the Cowboy 24 yard line. Three plays later Babb rammed into the end zone from the 2 and Clayton split the uprights for the extra point. The score was now 34 to 0.

Early in the fourth period the Cowboys finally got something to be encouraged about. Taggart passed to halfback Bill Tucker for 55 yards before Bobby Sutton overtook Tucker on the Lion 13 yard line. That was all for the Cowboys, however, as four plays later the Lions took over on the 16.

The Lions moved eight yards before Taggart intercepted a pass from Bobby Martinez, on the 17 yard line. The Lions promptly returned the favor, however, as Juan Delgado picked off Taggart's pass and returned it forty yards to the

Grandfalls thirty-three. Martinez hit Johnny Ramirez for a 23 yard gainer to the 10 and from there Martinez carried over on a quarterback sneak.

The final score of the day was largely a Lloyd West endeavor. Quarterback Bobby Martinez hit West with a beautiful strike and the fleet Lion end eluded two defenders and raced into the end zone for what appeared to be a 59 yard scoring thrust but the Lions were offside and drew their only penalty of the night to rub out the play.

The penalty, however, merely delayed the Lion score. Martinez hit West for passes of 5 and 32 yards and then Jake Young made a falling catch for nine more. West moved into the fullback slot and rammed over the score in three plays.

The Lions rolled for 333 yards on the ground and 93 more in the air as they gained a total 426 yards for the night's effort while limiting Grandfalls to 22 on the ground and 71 in the air for a total of 93 yards.

Mike Clayton was the night's big ground gainer with a total of 226 yards on 17 efforts for an average of 13.3 per carry. Sutton had 25 yards on 8 carries, Paulk had 22 yards on four efforts, Bobby Martinez picked 22 yards on five tries, Babb had 8 on two, Bunger had 6 on two and West had 17 on three.

For Grandfalls, Roy Smith picked up 19 yards on eight trips to become the only Grandfalls ball carrier who carried the ball more than once and come out on the plus side.

Grandfalls threw nine passes, completed five and had two intercepted while Ozona went aloft 13 times, completed 7 and had one fall into opposition hands.

In the matter of first downs the Lions ran up their biggest total of the year with 22. Grandfalls managed 4.

Coach Dorbandt Barton, in his first year as mentor at Junction, will be trying to upset the Lions and at the same time finish out the 1955 season on a victory note.

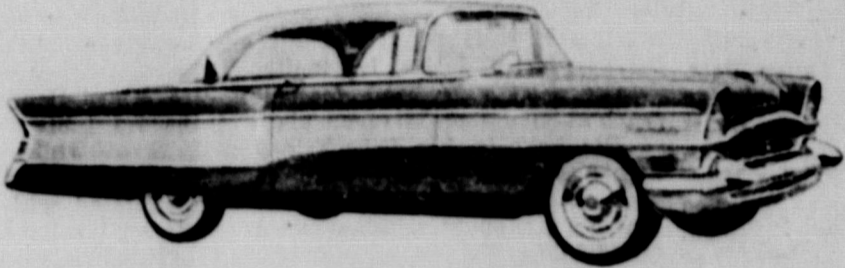
