Final Meeting On Flood Plan Clears It For Washington

Interested Agencies Consulted Before Project Goes to Congress

A year ahead of schedule because Crockett county advanced the necessary survey fund so that the Soil Conservation Service could make the survey a year sooner than its own funds would permit, the Johnson Draw watershed control plan now is on its way to Washington for final checking, editing, printing and distribution, and in another two to three months will stand approved by the federal government, barring unforeseen developments, and the million dollar-plus project will be ready for

the construction start. The final step on the local and state level to clear-the work plan for submission to Washington, was taken here Friday morning when representatives of various interested state and federal agencies met at the invitation of the Soil Conservation Service engineers to examine the completed work plan, to make suggestions or objections if they chose and to make reports to their agency superiors regarding points of the plan.
