Believed to be a good producer the making, with operators conident that it will flow naturally when tubing is run, the H. D. Lews. F. L. Graham and others No. 1 Noelke, second producer on the W T. Noelke ranch in extreme western Crockett county started vesterday. Two runs of the swab Wednesday morning recovered 35 barrels of oil, including that flowed in a 20 minute head after the first run of the swab.

The well had been shut in since last Thursday night and when it was opened Monday was full of oil. It was bailed and swabbed to clean out 30 feet of cavings, Both times the well was opened, Friday and Monday afternoon, it headed five to ten minutes into the pits an estimated 40 to 50 barrels

Operators announced yesterday that they intended to swab the well for three or four days and then run tubing, declaring it their belief that the well will flow when

The new building is to be constructed from proceeds of the sale of \$30,000 in bonds recently approved by the voters of Crockett county, the balance of \$5,195 to be used for the purchase of equipment for the building.

Construction work on the new structure is to begin within the next ten days, and is to be completed in a maximum of 110 consecutive days, with the usual provision for exceptions in the case of "acts of God," etc. Contractors assured the board, however, that the structure would be completed and ready for occupancy by the first of September, barring unforeseen difficulties. As much local labor as possible will be used on the job, the contractor assured members of the board.

Any national defense program which is to be at all adequate is going to cost money-incredible sums of money. And, in the present tangled state of our tax and fiscal structure, raising that money will demand intelligent thought and planning. It cannot be raised by heavy increases in taxation without driving us into a new and severe economic depression. It cannot be raised by lifting the debt limit and passing the buck to the taxpayers of the future without bringing closer the specter of national financial demoraliration. It must be raised, in part at least, by governmental economy and applying the savings to the national defense. On this point the New York Times said editorially,

We must drastically cut down the scandously over-generous subsidies, and duplications, that we have been scattering in all direcions . . . Engineers Survey Underground Water Supplies In Texas

AUSTIN.-University of Texas engineers have completed analy ses of underground water supplies in approximately one-third of the state's counties, Dr. E. P. Schoch. director of the bureau of indus rial chemistry, has announced. With the triple purpose of disovering water supplies suitable for industrial use, detecting sources of water contamination and checking drought shortage by spotting new fresh water taps, University chemists have already compiled reports on 23,000 water samples taken from 150 counties, Dr. Schoch said.

Findings of an 80-county survey-results of four years' workhave been published by WPA, a project co-sponsor.

Also working with University chemists are the United States geological survey and the state board of water engineers.

The total annual value of the wild life of Texas was placed at \$94,350,394 by a report of the U. S. forest service to Congress. This figure places Texas first among the states, with approximately three times the value of the second ranking state. Texas has 1264 game preserves with an acreage of 4,502,491.







He had planned a canal connecting Crystal lake with the Betsle river to open up a new territory for the Michigan lumbering industry; but instead he created a flood that killed one man, swept away hupdreds of livestock, and lowered the Crystal lake level to 15 feet. He had neglected to learn that the elevation of the lake was higher than the river's.



Cut match-like strips of pork from that portion of a piece of fat salt pork which lies just below the rind. Draw these into the best looking side of the liver. 




