## Ozons To Get Highway Patrol Station Nov. 1

### Patrolman W. M. Camer Assigned To Ozona Post

Establishment of a permanent Highway Patrol station in Ozona, effective November 1, was announced this week by Col. Tom Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin.

News of the action of the D. P. head in signing a patrolman to Ozona was contained in a letter received this week by County Judge Houston Smith from State Senator Dorsey E. Hardeman, Senator Hardeman had been active in transmitting requests of local groups, who have made the establishment of a Highway Patrol Station in Ozona their project for many years, to the Department of Public Safety for such action.

Col. Garrison announced the transfer of Patrolman W. M. Camer from San Angelo to the new station in Ozona. Patrolman Camer is the first of the week looking for living quarters for his family in anticipation of his move to the new station here the first of the month.

"I am sure that the citizens of Crockett County will find Mr. Camer most co-operative and that a program of highway safety may be developed that will reduce traffic accidents to a bare minimum," Senator Hardeman wrote Judge Smith. "He will need the full support and co-operation of the citizens of Crockett County if he is to succeed in making the highway station here the first of the month."

"It was a pleasure to be of assistance in having Mr. Camer transferred to Crockett County, and hope that if I can be of further service to the good citizens and friends of Crockett County, you and they will not hesitate to call on me."

Miss Hanks will be the Community Ambassador to Spain from San Angelo the past summer. She is at this time secretary to the president of the General Telephone Co. of the Southwest.

Miss Hanks is a graduate of San Angelo High School, San Angelo Junior College and of Texas Tech, with a major in English Literature and minor in Spanish. Mr. James was also advised that the emergency feed purchase orders will hereafter be at the rate of \$1.50 per hundredweight, allowing a reduction of \$1.50 a hundred on feed grains purchased to carry basic livestock herds.

Announcements have been made by the A. S. C. office that purchase orders bearing the old \$1 per hundredweight allowance which had not been used before October 11 may be returned to the ASC office and be exchanged for the new certificates at the \$1.50 rate.

The extension of the emergency feed grain program to December 31 now coincides with the assistance available under the roughage program for Texas, Mr. James pointed out, and enables county FFA committees to consider total feed requirements, both roughage and grain, through December 31.

## Lions Outclass Sanderson 42-13 In Last Non-Dist.

### Sutton Leading Scorer And Ball Carrier In One-Sided Contest

The Ozona Lions closed out their non-district play last Friday night by crushing a game but outclassed Sanderson eleven 42 to 13.

The Ozona win brought the season record to 4 wins and 2 losses as the Lions start to play for keeps in Sonora Friday night.

Bobby Sutton, who played left half and then filled in for the injured Stan Williams at quarterback, counted three touchdowns and split the uprights six times in succession to run up 24 points and lead the Lions. Sutton carried the ball eleven times and picked up 143 yards to rate as the top ball carrier in the one-sided contest.

Fans got a foretaste of what was in store on the first play from scrimmage when George Bunker popped into the open on a counter and raced 35 yards to set up the first score.

Fullback Kent Babb covered the fifteen yards to count the first time and Sutton converted to bring the score to 7 to 0 with just under two minutes gone in the first quarter.

The Eagles did not seem dismayed at the Lions quick score as they took the ensuing kickoff and launched a march that carried to the Ozona 28 before a fumble stopped the march.

From their own 28 the Lions moved to the next score with Sutton ripping off a twenty-four yard gain and Kent Babb adding an eleven-yard run before Sutton counted from the twelve and then converted to bring the score to 14 to 0.

The Lions ran the count to 21 mid-way in the second quarter when George Bunker got a 58 yard drive under way with a thirty yard run. Robert Martinez added the score from the fourteen yard line and Sutton once again converted.

With reserves on the field, Sanderson started from its own thirty and with Shurley and Escamilla leading the way, and a key pass keeping the drive alive, scored from the one after the time had run out in the half.

This unusual play was brought about when the Lions jumped off.

## Over 300 Visit New Hospital On Open House Day

### Modern 24-Bed Institution Open to Visitors Sunday Afternoon

More than 300 Ozonans filed through the gleaming hallways, operating room, laboratory, emergency room, kitchen, etc. of the new \$250,000 Crockett County Hospital, occupied three weeks ago, when the hospital board and staff observed open house Sunday afternoon from 2 until 4 o'clock.

Joining the hospital board and staff in welcoming guests were members of the County Commissioners Court, Manager and Mrs. J. Bailey Post, and ladies of the Ozona Woman's Club who prepared and served refreshments and assisted in guiding guests through the institution. In charge of the hostess group from the Woman's Club were members of the executive board, headed by Mrs. Bascomb Cox, president. Other members of the board are Mrs. Frank McMullan, Mrs. Ben Lemmons, Mrs. Stephen Perner, Mrs. S. M. Harvick, Mrs. Taylor Word, Mrs. Joe Pierce, Jr., and Mrs. A. C. Hoover.

For its formal opening day, the hospital had one new baby in its glass enclosed nursery, and nine patients in hospital rooms. The hospital has a normal capacity of 24 beds, with seven semi-private rooms and 10 private rooms, all equipped with private baths and ample closet space. It also has a fully equipped emergency room, operating room, delivery room and one out-patient treatment room. In addition, there is a fully equipped laboratory and x-ray rooms, a dining room for employees, nurses' and doctors' lounges and storage facilities. A very large kitchen, large enough, in fact, to accommodate future expansion of the facilities, has been provided. The entire building is air conditioned throughout.

The nursery, just off the main entrance and opposite the manager's office nurses station, boasts the finest equipment available, including an incubator, an Isolette, a special infant incubator, and infant resuscitator, in addition to the usual nursery equipment.

A musical therapy system, installed in the hospital by the Ozona Music Club, was in operation in time for the opening. Each room in the hospital is wired for speakers from a central control where records are played automatically, carrying music to each room. The individual speakers may be controlled by manual operation in each room. The hospital is also wired for television from the community antenna system to each patient room.

The hospital is a member of the American Hospital Association, the Texas Hospital Association and the Blue Cross Plan.

## General Rains Soak West Texas Ranch Country

### Best Rain In Months Dents Worst Drouth In History

Scattered rains which have been covorting about in this West Texas area for the past several days finally got together last night to bring the first general rain of consequence in many months to a drouth parched range country, making a dent at least in a seven-year drouth which had reached a climax as the worst in the area's history.

The rains covered an area from Sanderson to Midland on the west to San Angelo south to east of Ozona, ranging from a half inch to several inches in varying falls.

Ozona got .7 of an inch last night but sections of this county to the east of Ozona received up to an inch and a half in thunderstorms which spotted the area earlier in the week. West of Ozona, the rains were reported general to Fort Stockton. The rain fell slowly, causing little run-off in most areas and soaking into the denuded and long-parched land, giving drouth hardened ranchmen a glimmer of hope for at least a slight improvement in winter range prospects.

A Latin-American man was being held in jail here this week for investigation in connection with an attempted burglary of one of the Childress apartments.

Two women, alone in the apartment, saw a man at one of the apartment windows attempting to open the window after tearing the screen. The man ran when the women raised an alarm. Arrested by the sheriff's department, the suspect denied the attempted entry of the apartment but failed to furnish officers a satisfactory alibi. He will be taken to Austin late this week to submit to a lie detector test.

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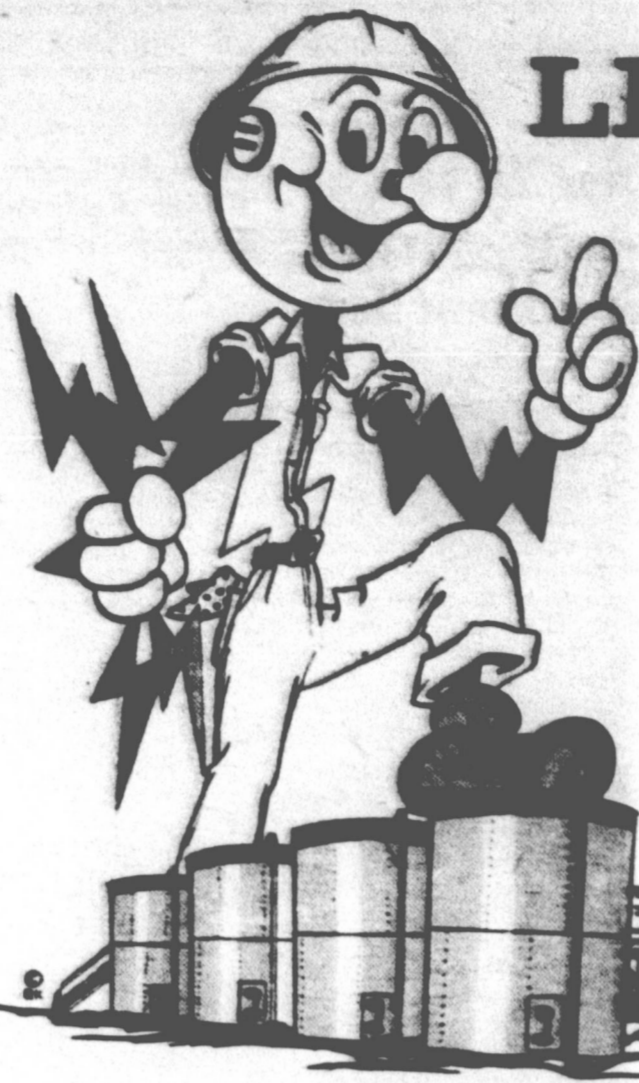

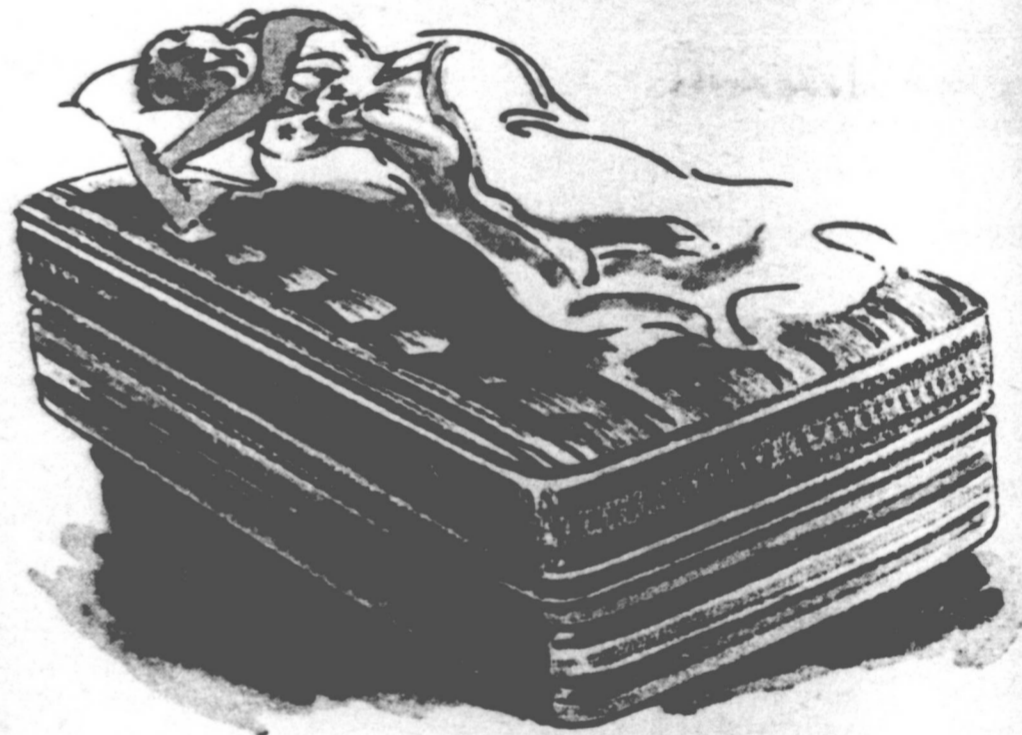

A large group of more than 50 girls thought it fitting to bring out bubble gum, cigars, and hats for the coming event!

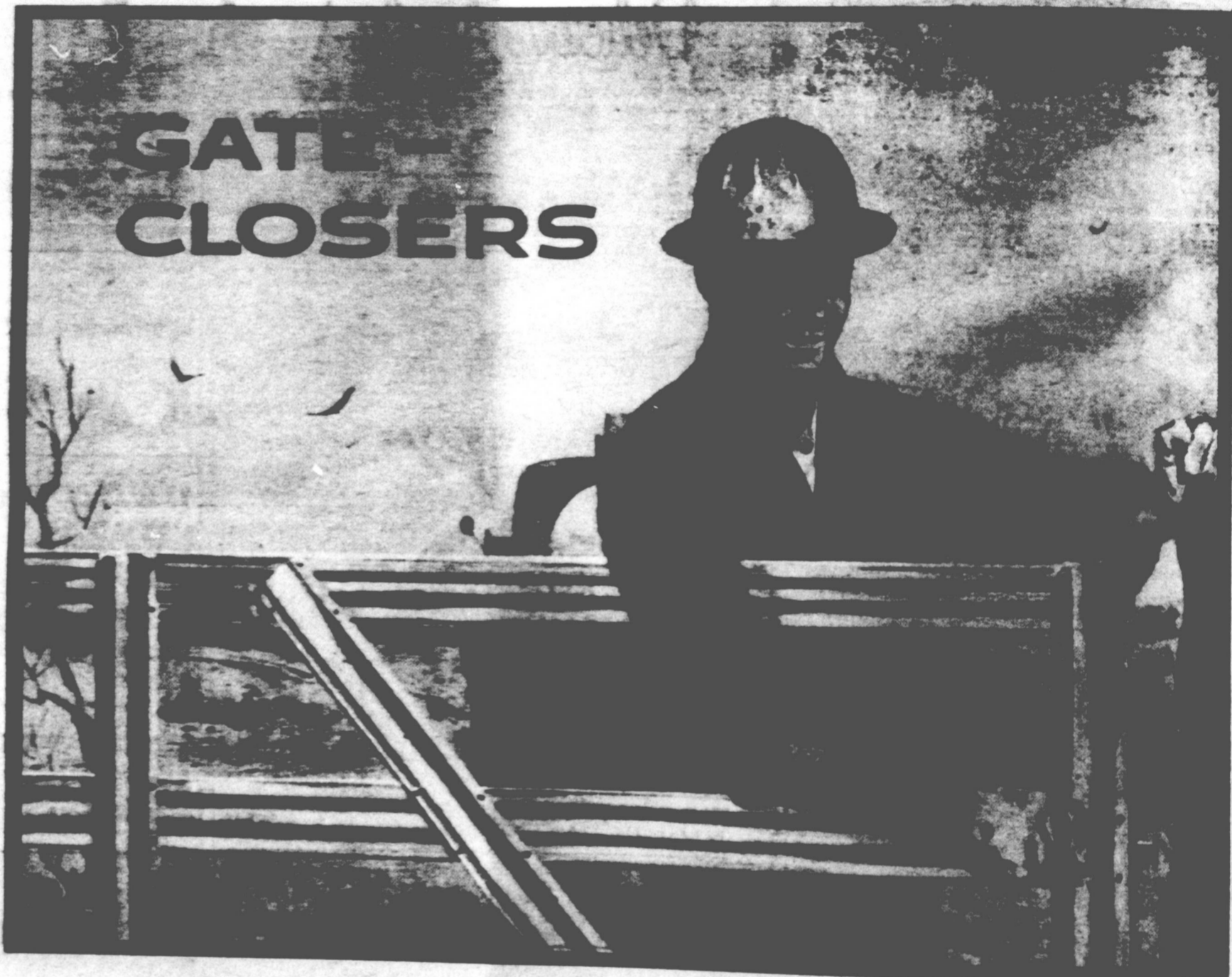

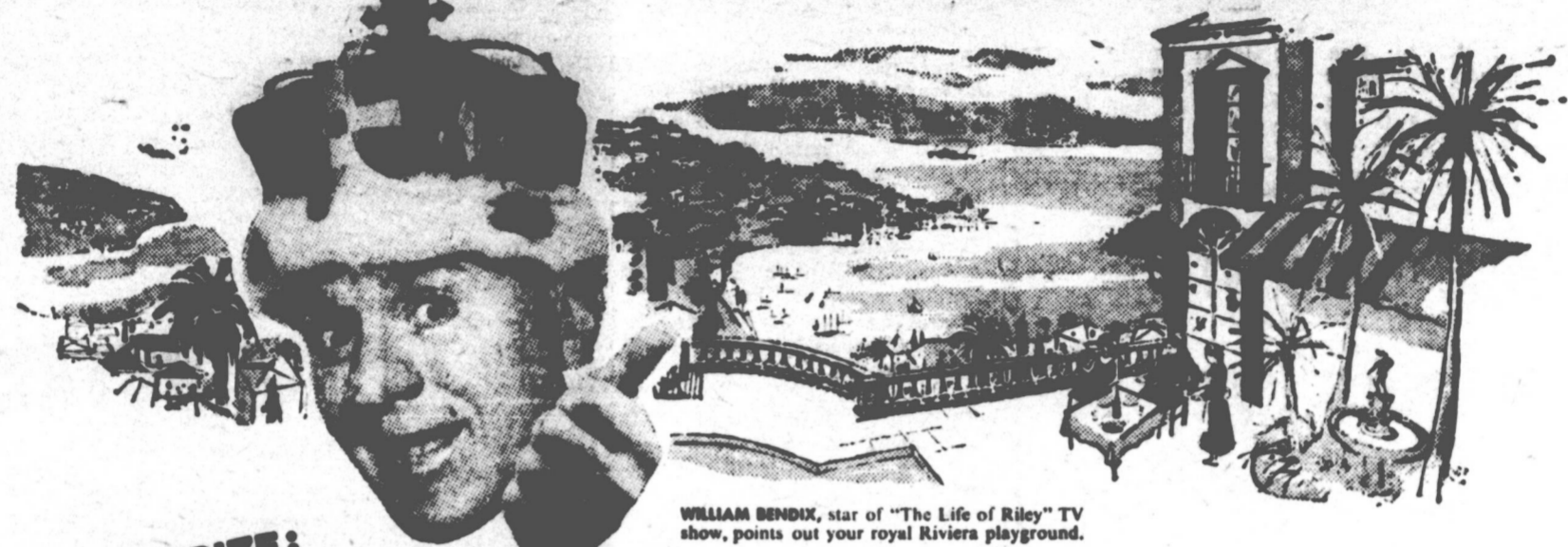

The "B" team plays Rankin here Tuesday 23rd at 4 p. m. and then the final game of the season is here with Del Rio on the night of Nov. 8th. This should easily be the best game of the season.

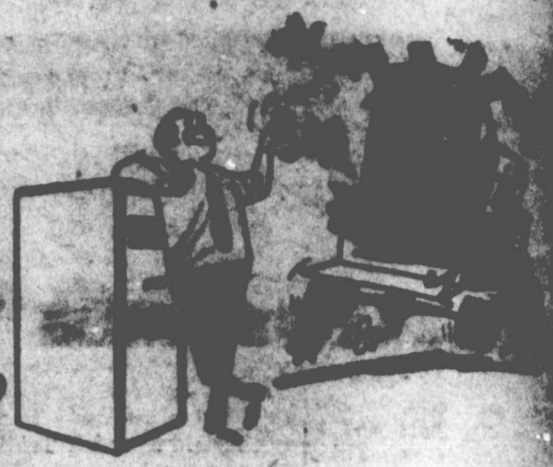

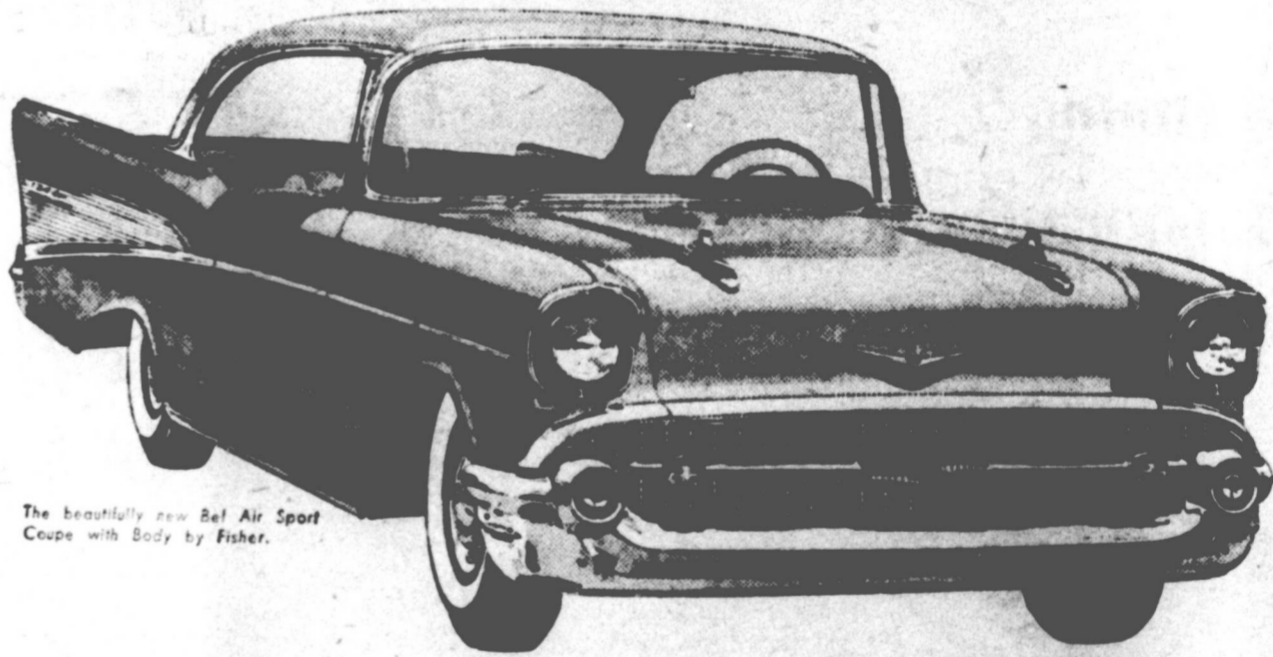

A fellow was in our town the other day selling war bonds. He was from St. Louis, and he said he was a conservative Republican. He called him a dry goods drummer, and Papa would have referred to him as a traveling salesman. This shows you how things change with time. But actually that fellow from St. Louis was doing just about what the similar victors did—trying to get votes.

You might say that he stayed in the same place but the money went off and left him. He looked me some of the political situation in Texas.

I was reading a letter in the daily newspaper last week, from a man who said he was going to vote for Eisenhower. "I am a Democrat," he wrote to the editor of the paper, "but I feel like the party has run off and left me."

Come to think of it, a lot of conservative-type Texas Democrats are in that shape today.
