Residents See Beginning Of Wet Cycle As Drought Ends

There has been wrong with the weather for the past ten years that a long wet spell had cured. Carl Conklin Reaches Pinnacle Of Texas 4-H Club Honors By Being Designated Texas' Most Outstanding Four-Square 4-H Club Boy For 1956

College Station, May 2 — (Sp) Carl Franklin Conklin, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Conklin of Ozona, today was named Texas' most outstanding four-square 4-H Club boy for 1956.

State 4-H Leader Floyd Lynch made the announcement, saying that four-square signifies outstanding club leadership, character development, prominence in school and community activities as well as scholastic ability. Judges considered all these points along with general 4-H achievements in making the final selection.

Conklin will receive from the Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, a scholarship to the American Youth Foundation Camp at Camp Minewanna, Shelby, Michigan. He will attend the older boys session scheduled for August 12 through August 25. Travel funds for the trip will be provided by United Gas.

Lynch says the campers will receive special training in Christian ideals, personal foundations and enrichments, leadership principles and practices. Daily activities at the camp are divided between class work and recreation.

Seven years of active 4-H Club work has done a lot for this eighteen-year-old Ozona High School graduate. Fighting an uphill battle from the start, Conklin has compiled an enviable record in the nation's largest volunteer organization for farm boys and girls. A panorama of projects, judging events, and all-around youth leadership has carved for him a secure niche at the top rung of the 4-H success ladder.

Polio struck Conklin in early childhood, leaving his leg in a withered condition. Unable to participate in high school athletics, he turned all his efforts toward establishing a reputation in 4-H Club work. "I soon realized," Conklin relates, "that when learning by doing and really trying to make the best better, satisfaction usually comes in many guises — financially and mentally."

"My early years had their disappointments," Conklin says, "for it sometimes seemed that I worked harder than others only to lose out in the big competition. It hurt a lot, but I always tried to come back a little harder next time. I learned to be a good loser first, and later found that effort has its own reward."

2nd Annual Range Judging Contests Slated For May 18

Conservation Practices Range Management To Be Stressed

Supervisors of the Crockett Soil Conservation District will sponsor the second annual Crockett County Invitational Range Judging Contest to be held near Ozona on Saturday, May 18, starting at 9 o'clock a. m.

The annual contests, whose purpose is to acquaint 4-H Club and FFA members, ranchmen and the general public with proper range management methods and proper soil conservation practices in ranch operations, will be held on a spot to be selected on some nearby ranch.

The contests are to be set up by the Extension Service of A&M College and the Soil Conservation Service range specialists, on a site not previously examined by any of the contestants.

Teams will be divided into three age divisions: A, 12 years and under on Jan. 1, 1957; B, 13 years and older on Jan. 1, 1957, and 15 years and older on that date; and C, 16 years and older on Jan. 1, 1957. Younger members may be used on older age group teams, the oldest member determining the classification with at least one member of the proper age on each team. Two Crockett County 4-H Range Judging Teams left Tuesday afternoon for Oklahoma City to represent Texas in the National Range and Pasture Judging Contest being held Friday, May 3rd.

County Agent Pete Jacoby received authorization late last week to take two teams to the contest. The teams, the State Champion Range Judging Team and the County 4-H Judging Team, have been working almost daily for several weeks in preparation for district competition and the Oklahoma Contest. The group will spend about a day and a half in Oklahoma studying vegetation prior to the contest.

The eight team members making the trip are Erby Chandler, Jacquelyn Williams, Pierce Miller, P. L. Childress, Johnny Jones, Bob Childress, Bill Jacoby, and Frank Childress.

Accompanying the team members are Co. Agent Pete Jacoby, SCS Range Conservationist Dick Ketchum, Troy Williams G. O. Hoffman, Extension Service Range Specialist from Texas A&M College and James Childress.

Sponsors sending the teams to Oklahoma are the Ozona National Bank, Ozona Lion's Club, Ozona Rotary Club, The Crockett County Soil Conservation District and Crockett County.

The group will be staying at the Wingate Hotel, 17, W. Grand, Oklahoma City. They will return to Ozona Saturday.

Discuss Organization Of CAP Unit Here In Airport Meet Sunday

Organization of a Civil Air Patrol unit in Ozona will be discussed next Sunday afternoon at the County Airport when officers of the San Angelo unit will be here to explain the organization and its functions to those interested, Dick Henderson, airport manager and flying enthusiast, announced this week. Cooperating in the local organization effort is Walter Cawyer, highway patrolman, a former member of the San Angelo CAP unit.

Anyone interested in flying, not necessarily qualified as pilot, are invited to attend the meeting, Henderson said. The group will be particularly interested in organizing a CAP Cadet unit, composed of boys and girls from 14 through 18 years of age, he said.

In the event a CAP unit is organized, it may be possible to get an airplane assigned here from the Civil Air Patrol, Henderson said. The unit will study navigation, meteorology, aircraft structure and other points of aviation. Members of the Air Force reserve may serve as instructors and receive retirement points.

Minors who attend the meeting and who may get a chance for a plane ride must have release from parents to take such a ride, but not to belong to the CAP unit, it was pointed out.

Texita Finds Third Well In Shannon Field

A recently opened southeast portion of the Shannon (San Andres) field of Crockett County gained its third well and a location north extension with completion of Texita Oil Co. of San Antonio No. 3 J. A. C. Hoover, in 3-FF-B&B, 30 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was completed for flowing potential of 68.20 barrels of 30 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio 160-1.

Production was through a 14-64 inch choke and perforations between 2,232-2,244 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing set at 2,965 feet, the total depth. Pay section was acidized with 500 gallons. Top of pay was picked at 2,262 feet on ground elevation of 2,870

Ozona FFA Team Wins First In Wool Judging 2nd In Grass at Lubbock

Ozona FFA teams won a first place and a second place last Saturday in a regional judging meet at Texas Technological College in Lubbock in which more than 1500 agricultural students, representing a wide section of north and West Texas, participated and presented the most formidable competition ever faced by the local group.

Ozona's wool judging team, composed of Clayton Friend, Mike Miller and Chris Hagestein, won first place in the wool judging and grading contest. Clayton Friend was high individual of the entire contest. All three members of the local team scored in the top ten of the contest, Clayton first Mike eighth and Chris ninth.

The top five teams and their scores in the wool judging were Ozona, 1183; Apline, 1136; Marfa, 1129; Imperial, 1128, and Iraan, 1074.

The Ozona grass judging team, composed of Kenneth Deland, Mark White and Jim Williams, was edged out of first place by a margin of only eleven points, one grass, by a team from Snyder, in a field of 44 entries in this contest division.

Snyder FFA team scored 1052 for first place, Ozona was second with 1041, Imperial third with 1024, Robert Lee fourth with 992 and Big Lake fifth with 854. Again, all three members of the Ozona team placed in the top ten individuals of the contest, Kenneth Deland third high man of the contest, Mark White seventh and Jim Williams tenth.

Bill Black, Bob Cooke and Leslie Deland of the Ozona group entered the livestock judging contest, the largest contest of the meet, but failed to place among the top ten teams. There were a total of 106 teams competing in this division and winners had not been determined when the local group left for home.

Accompanying the FFA contest teams were M. A. Barber, VA instructor, and Foy Moody of the Ozona school faculty.

Man Drowns In Flooded Draw In Crockett County

Body Of Herschel Seay Of Midland Recovered Saturday

One man was drowned and a companion was rescued after clinging to a tree for three hours when they were swept down a flooded draw in north central Crockett County about noon Friday, while attempting to free their pickup truck which was stuck in the mud.

The body of Herschel Seay, 43, of Midland was recovered early Saturday morning nearly three-quarters of a mile downstream from where the pickup truck was mired in the stream bed. Sheriff Billy Mills and his deputies, Fire Chief Joe Tom Davidson of the Ozona department, Game Warden John Lockett and other volunteers searched the flooded stream until dark Friday, abandoning the search until daylight Friday. The body was found about 7:15 Friday morning by Chief Davidson and Warden Lockett.

The other man, Jimmy Foust, 24, also of Midland was rescued about 3:30 p. m. Friday after he had clung to a tree limb for about three hours. He was brought to the Crockett County Hospital and was released Saturday morning in good condition.

The draw in which the men were trapped is a main tributary of Heward Draw and was said to have reached nearly a half mile in width from the flood waters Friday. The two men were driving on the Powell Field road toward the highway when the pickup stuck. The men were trapped by the rising waters in the draw when they attempted to wade across to reach the highway.

The body of Seay was brought to Ozona and was prepared for burial by the Cody Funeral Home here. The body was later shipped to Midland for burial.

Sigma Alpha and is an art teacher.


She exhibited 52 pictures in this

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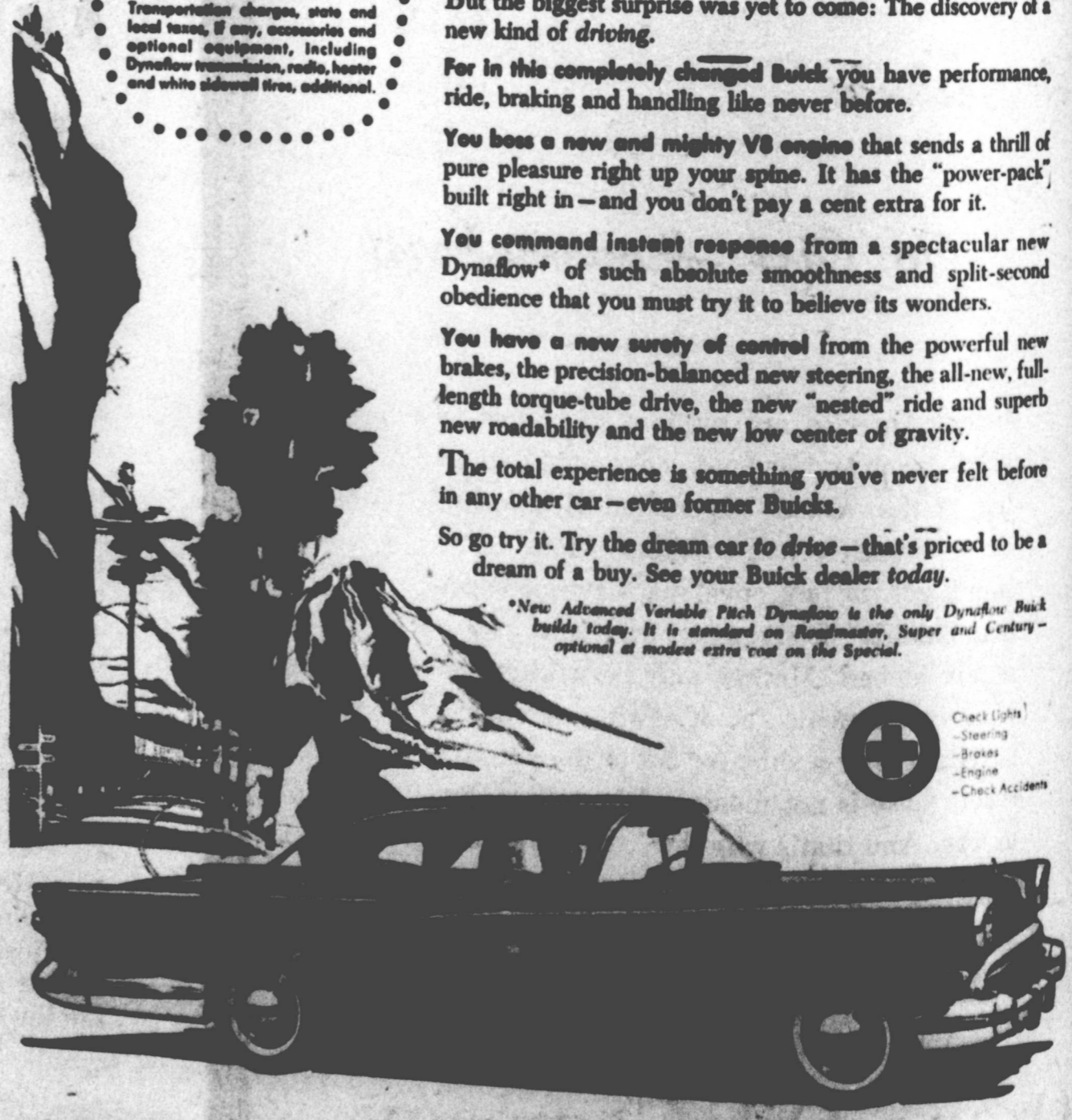

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, May 2, 1938

T. A. Kincaid suffered a deep cut on his foot Saturday when his knife slipped while he was sharpening it on his boot. The blade was unusually sharp and cut through the boot and opened a deep gash in the top of the foot.

The Crockett County Republican convention will be held in the courthouse at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, May 8, it was announced by S. E. Couch, chairman.

T. A. Kincaid of Ozona, president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association, has been appointed by Governor Moody, as a member of the Texas Industrial Board, a board created for the purpose of promoting the industrial development of Texas.

Coming just in time to save West Texas ranchmen from heavy losses and breaking a drought that was on the verge of causing serious consequences, a slow and steady rain, falling throughout Wednesday night, drenched a large area of this section of West Texas, ranging from an inch to three inches over parts of the area. The drought was measured almost to the moment of endurance, ranchmen declare. The situation was aggravated this year by a series of three spells of freezing weather, practically destroying the entire wood crop, on which livestock depend from February until May.

Brush also was destroyed by the cold weather and some ranchmen had already started feeding.

Four business buildings in the heart of the business section of Sonora were destroyed by fire about midnight Monday night, causing loss estimated at \$32,500. The fire started in the Rutledge Cafe, caused by an exploding gasoline stove, and spread to Joe Trainer's men clothing store, the City Meat

Market, operated by Troy White, and a tin shop owned by the Gilmore-Hardware Co.

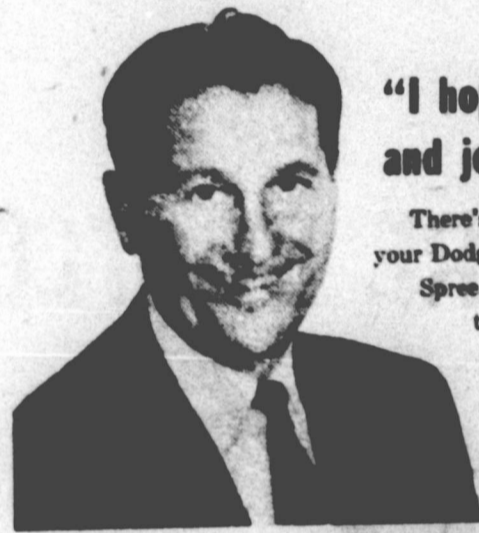
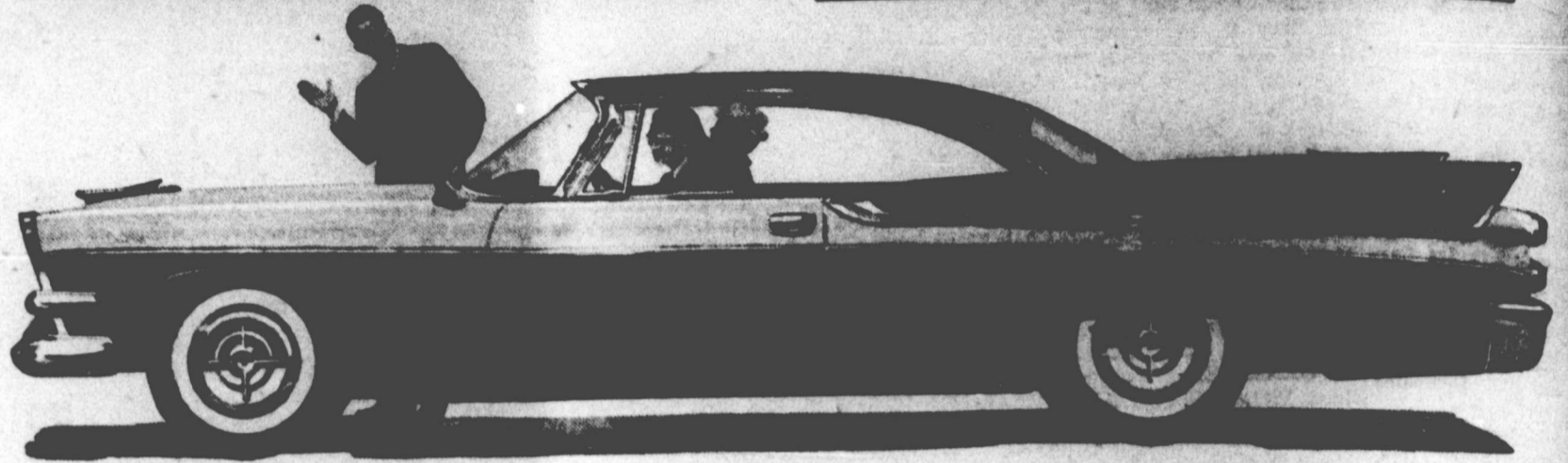

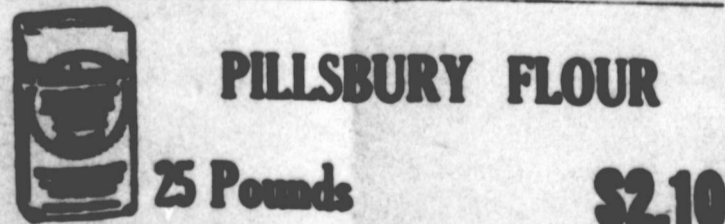
