Month Of Rains End With Ranges Best In Years

Let Up In Rains Allow Ranchers To Complete Spring Shearing

A month of rains, coming persistently, sometimes daily, and bringing to what all fervently hope is the end of the most devastating drought in West Texas history, came to a let-up period this week, and the surge was welcomed, bringing it a temporary, by ranchmen who were anxious to get their sheep shered and back on the vastly improved ranges.

The end of the long continued rains also brought some relief to jittery Ozonans who for more than a week kept a constant vigil on rampaging Johnson draw and Gurley draw, both posing a constant flood threat with full waterholes and well soaked drainage areas.

West Texas range land is the wettest it has been in ten years or more, perhaps since 1941, and, although effects of ten years of drought have not been wiped out by the month of rain, the ranch country is definitely on the mend and with a full season of continued moisture, ranchmen can breathe easier as range vegetation starts its slow comeback.

Weeds are profuse throughout the area, the first step in the recovery, and where old grass was still at a stand, the recovery is much more rapid.

The total rainfall in Crockett county varied during the period, but practically every area was soaked and total falls for the entire period ranged in some sections from 15 to 20 inches. The total for April and May in Ozona, where the total fall was perhaps lighter than in almost any section of the county, was 6.79 inches.

HERE WE GO AGAIN!

Watch out for another "summit conference". The global scene-shifters, at home and abroad, are preparing for it. Russia frankly wants it, as Premier Bulganin revealed in a Soviet-Mongolian friendship speech in the Kremlin. That means every trick and every pressure will be used to include Red China.

President Eisenhower sees the Russians "growing more serious" in their attitude toward disarmament. Secretary of State Dulles suggested that we might begin the President's "aerial inspection" plan by flying over Siberia while the Reds fly over Alaska and northern Canada. Since such a plan would render our three radar warning lines in the north completely useless, we presume Mr. Dulles would have the Russians cross their hearts they won't drop any bombs without letting us know in advance.

There would be plenty to talk about, such as atoms-for-everybody at US expense, trade with Red China, whether to fill in the Suez Canal, perhaps even the Korean "truce." And as Bulganin says, " . . . experience has shown that such contacts are useful."

Furthermore, since Geneva, we know to whom!

MAKES YOU THE JUDGE

We feel no compulsion to review Alger Hiss' book, "In the Court of Public Opinion," beyond observing that its author emerged from the Federal "Country Club" at Lewisburg, Pa. with the standard attitude of the hardened convict — utter, complete innocence.

More newsworthy is the tempest among the book-sellers stirred up by Patriot Lyle Munson. He runs a service called the BOOKMAILER, which is sending a free copy of Whittaker Chambers' "Witness" to each buyer of the Hiss book (\$5), and pays the postage on both. This, he says, is to provide a balanced "Court of Public Opinion." But it has also caused book dealers to demand free copies of "Witness" from Hiss' publisher, Alfred Knopf!

Only Munson, Box 101 Murray Hill Station, New York 16, NY is this much of a hero!

HOW ABOUT AID FOR US?

In bringing to the public over the air waves his plea for support of his spending policies — support, in short, of his 71.3 billion dollar budget (less the 520 millions he said Thursday might be cut from foreign aid), President Eisenhower is asking the people to decide the foreign and domestic policies of the United States.

The President is asking, in effect, whether you think it is more to this country's advantage to continue economic support of wobbly nations who might otherwise be bought over by the Kremlin, or to strengthen our own precarious financial structure.

The President is asking whether you want to enlarge a bureaucracy of 2,500,000 civil employees; whether you want the Federal government to move further into control of state and local functions — specifically, at this time, whether you want Washington commissars to build your schools for you, when, where and as they dictate.

You are asked to approve or condemn what Virginia's Senator Harry Flood Byrd has described as "a luxury budget on a global basis." It is a precariously bal-

anced budget, as Senator Byrd points out in his analysis in the May 11th issue of National Review, dependent for its balance on the passage of postal rate increases "and further inflation of income." It comes at a time when, as the Senator says:

"This country is mortgaged to the hilt. The \$275 billion Federal debt is the equivalent of the assessed value of all the land, buildings, mines, machinery, factories, livestock — everything of tangible value in the United States." And it comes at a time when: "The equivalent of 33 cents out of every dollar people of the United States earn . . . goes for taxes of some kind. And we owe so much money that it takes ten percent of our taxes just to pay the interest."

And lest we blame the size of the budget on military spending, Senator Byrd reminds us that these items total two billions less than in fiscal 1954! But it provides for

"14 new state aid programs, 67 in all." Domestic-civilian activities, he says, account for \$25.9 billions of the budget!

The six billions that Senator Byrd insists can be cut from the budget "without harm to any essential federal function" could start us on the road back to fiscal stability for this country. It could even be the beginning of tax relief.

But the President is asking what you think. Can we afford to continue our global transfusions? Do

we want a socialist managed state? Tell him.

HAPPY WITH HIS LIBRARY

During the traditional early morning walk on his latest visit to New York, former President Harry Truman revealed to the customary trail of reporters that: "I wouldn't take New York if you gave it to me." Which, of course, should settle any plans of that sort which New Yorkers might have been making.

He also revealed that he had for exercise and "would like to go along with me." Maybe he would like to go along with me.

Lush Growth of Weeds First Step In Recovery Drouth Parched Ranges

There has been some concern expressed about the large number of weeds appearing on the ranges in the Crockett Soil Conservation District. Most of the weeds are annuals which means they have a short life span and will soon die and be converted to precious organic matter. The majority of the weeds will be found on bare ground which indicates the weeds are merely part of nature's normal ecological cycle. Since weeds are able to germinate and grow under moisture conditions unfavorable to grasses, the weeds will improve the environment sufficiently so the grasses will be able to establish themselves. The ecological cycle will always follow the same pattern unless there is outside interference by man. Bare ground will always progress to annual weeds, followed by annual grasses, to perennial grasses, and finally to good perennial, high producing grasses and forbs (weeds). Although weeds do use a large amount of moisture for their own growth, it has been found that evaporation from bare ground is about equal to evaporation plus transpiration (moisture used by plants) on vegetated areas. It must be considered that were it not for the cover and litter produced by weeds, very little moisture could be absorbed by the ground to begin with.
