New Well Connected To Mains Relieves Threat Of Shortage

Water from a fifth well, flowing into the Ozona city mains at the rate of 275 galons a minute, this week brought some relief to a ticklish water situation developing through a record use for the past month as householders sought to combat the record summer heat to save their lawns and gardens. One of two wells recently drilled on the west hill by the Crock-

ett Water Control District was outfitted with a new pump and conrected to the city mains this week. The result has been to boost pressures over most of the city, especially in late afternoon when use is at a peak and the two storage tanks on the east hill are dangerously near the bottom, and to relieve the daily threat that use will exceed the pumping capacity of the four east hill wells, Manager W. D. Cooper reports.

The other well, capable of producing nearly 200 gallons a minute may later be tied into the system by moving a 200-gallon pump now in use on one of the four east hill wells to the new well and gallons a minute.
