48 Years, Smith Is Laid Wednesday

Blacksmith, Constable 45 Died Tuesday

Services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at the Ozona Methodist church for Tom Smith, 72, a resident of Ozona for 48 years, who died Tuesday at the San Angelo hospital after a period of several months' illness. Services were conducted by the Rev. Russell, pastor, with burial in Cedar Hill cemetery. Arrangements were made by Joe Sellers, Dempster Jones, Jake Marley and Beall of Ozona, J. R. Durango, Carl Gruber, and Landon Dorn City.

Carton in Hamilton 18, 1895, Mr. Smith of Civil War veteran and Mrs. Smith, nee Carolina but residing from early childhood in Tom Smith's home and later as a tenant in New Mexico for 1909 moved to county from Lamesa. Mr. Smith established machine shop, an early pioneer of the pioneer horse era of Crockett county from the open range stock empire into which he developed. He operated until 1920, housed in building now adjacent to the Ozona Wool &

was married to Allie daughter of pioneer Crockett family, Mr. and Mrs. S. R., in Ozona in 1914. He was the widow and two sons, Early Chandler and Williams, both of O-brothers, Frank Smith Lee, and John Smith of Ozona; three sisters, Mrs. M. of San Angelo, Mrs. M. of Robert Lee, and Mrs. M. of Pierce of Hico, and six grandchildren.

He was active in the community for many years, serving as constable of the Circle 3 ranch 24 years of Crockett county. In 1925 this position was the subject of a Ripley "Or Not" cartoon featuring his name. To that time, he had served as constable for many years, but never worn a badge. He made an arrest and had a nickel in fees on the job.

He had a droll sense of humor. Mr. Smith used to tell "jokes" when pressed for a plank, that if they'd "go to the ranch here like a good constable." His election to the office, however, was not by design, his name was new to the ballot, but by general consent, he was elected via the ballot method.

Member of the W. O. W. and its lodges, Mr. Smith was an organizer of the Sheep Raisers Assn., of Texas and a director and faithful member of the Crockett County Fair, which for many years has been the annual rodeo and which was a West Texas event highlight. Mr. Smith's friends were his honorary pallbearers.

Vote Set Sept. 9 For Members ASC County Committee

Slate Of Ten Nominated For Balloting By Ranchmen

Ballots will be mailed on September 3 to all Crockett county ranchmen participating during the past year in the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation program for the election of a county committee for 1958 to direct operations of the government agency during the coming year, Claude Russell, executive officer of ASC, announced this week.

Ballots must be marked and mailed back to the ASC office, postmarked not later than September 9, or returned to the office in person not later than 5 p. m. on that date.

A slate of ten nominees has been selected by a nominating committee from which a committee of three, with a fourth as alternate, will be selected. The new committee members will be selected on the basis of the highest number of votes received.

Following are the ten nominees whose names will appear on the ballot: Chas. E. Davidson, III, Joe Bean, Bud Cox, Fred Hagelstein, P. C. Perner, Joe Williams, Bob Bissett, Jimmy Read, Joe Friend and Martin Harvick.

If any eligible voter wishes to have the name or names of other persons appear on the ballot, such names will be included on the slate of nominees if a petition signed by ten or more eligible voters favoring such nomination is presented to the County Election Board, Brock Jones, chairman, not later than 15 days before the date set for return of ballots. In case of such petition, the names of persons so petitioned will be included in the list of nominees.

Football Booster Club Memberships Near 100; Barbecue Planned

Membership in the new Ozona High School Lions Booster Club, being organized among adult men to provide an organization devoted to boosting the football fortunes of Ozona High School, had climbed to near the 100 mark this week as fans volunteered to contribute the \$2 membership fee.

The immediate purpose of the new organization is to provide funds to finance the annual football banquet, honoring members of the team, their coaches and fathers held each fall here for the past five years. The barbecue supper and program has heretofore been financed from funds of the now defunct Crockett County Sheriff's Posse. A program has been arranged for this year's banquet and other events may be staged by the group during the football season.

The United States Air Force and the Kansas State Highway Patrol combined in a mercy mission Tuesday to bring Joe McMullan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ashby McMullan, to San Angelo to the bedside of his father who is gravely ill in a San Angelo hospital.

The round-trip flight of a B25 airplane from Goodfellow Air Force Base between San Angelo and Wichita, Kans., ended at 5:12 p. m. Tuesday bringing the young explorer Scout to his father's bedside.

Young McMullan had been on a Canadian canoe trip near Ely, Minn., with 15 other scouts from the Concho Valley Council. The group was en route home by bus when Milton Wyatt, San Angelo scout executive, learned of the elder McMullan's grave condition.

Through cooperation from Goodfellow Air Force Base officials and the Kansas Highway Patrol, the plan to bring a young boy home via the fastest available means started to unfold.

Goodfellow supplied the B25 and the young men to man it, 1st Lt. Frank Lowe and 2nd Lt. Ben Pierce.

The Kansas Highway Patrol was then contacted and informed of the emergency.

The patrol located the bus carrying the scouts on a turnpike, stopped the vehicle and then escorted it to nearby McConnell Air Force Base at Wichita.

Timing was perfect. The scout bus arrived at the air field at 1:30 p. m. and the B25 from Goodfellow touched down at McConnell at 1:47 p. m.

Not knowing the seriousness of his father's condition, young Joe crawled into the twin-engine ship with Lt. Lowe and Lt. Pierce, and to make conversation with the flyers, he remarked:

"I guess maybe Dad has been smoking too much."

Lowe and Pierce said the youth appeared to be in good spirits throughout the trip. They said Joe told them it was his first flight and that he enjoyed looking at the pattern the streams, fields and forests made below.

At Goodfellow, a crowd was on hand to watch the flight reach its final destination. A car was ready to whisk young McMullan to the hospital and well-wishers lined the way from the ramp to the car.

Tuesday night, the youth was in a still, quiet hospital room, giving what comfort he could to his ailing father.

The flight was over. He had arrived in time.

Construction Of Housing At Radar Station Cancelled

Budget Cuts Thought Responsible For Cancellation

Recently announced plans to ask for bids for construction of 27 housing units at the Ozona Air Defense Command radar installation five miles east of Ozona have been cancelled, according to an announcement from the Base Procurement Office, Richards-Gebaur Air Force Base, Missouri.

The announcement, signed by Leonard W. Shriver, contracting officer, merely stated that the anticipated calling for sealed bids on or about July 1 for construction of family housing units at the Ozona and six other radar unit installation sites had been withdrawn "in accordance with instructions received from higher headquarters."

It is presumed the economy wave in Congress which resulted in cut-backs in appropriations for the armed services is responsible for the retrenchment in expenditures for the new installations. Personnel attached to the base here now supervising installation of equipment, have been advised that married personnel will be required to seek housing in Ozona.

HOMEWORK TO DO

While the House of Representatives was deciding that we should send more foreign aid billions abroad in fiscal 1958, the City of New York was sending \$36 of its schoolboy cops to reinforce the "regulars" in the city's war against 110 known "fighting" teenage gangs and other "young punks and hoodlums" responsible for 22 deaths so far this year.

The rookie cops were taken out of training because the city can't afford the 5,000 more policemen Commissioner Kennedy says he needs to protect its nine million people. This is the city that produced the lion's share of nearly nine billion dollars of New York State tax money that went into foreign aid since World War II. The moral can be read in the reports of the McClellan Rackets Committee.

Stock Cattle Open Strong

FORT WORTH — Trade was very active on stocker and feeder classes of cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday and prices were from fairly steady to as much as 50 cents higher. There was a rather large representation of out-of-state buyers on hand, a factor which again lent strength to the bright prospects for the late Summer and Fall market for Texas cattle this year.

In the trade Monday good and choice stocker steer calves ranged from \$20 to \$24, the higher figures on some 517-pound steer calves, whose heifer mates cashed at \$21.50 and scaled over 100 pounds. Plainier stocker calves sold from \$14 to \$19, and stocker steer yearlings and feeder steers ranged mostly from \$21 down. Fleishy feeding heifers ranged from \$19.50 down. A few replacement cows sold from \$10 to \$14.

In the slaughter division good and choice fed cattle sold at the best prices since last Fall, as good and choice fed steers cashed at \$20 to \$26, the top for two loads of 950-pound fed steers from Oklahoma. Plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$13 to \$19.

Fat cows drew \$12 to \$15, and canners and cutters brought \$8 to \$12. Bulls cashed at \$10 to \$15. Good and choice fat calves sold from \$19 to \$22. Medium and lower grades cashed at \$10 to \$18.

Slaughter Lambs, Old Ewes Weaken

A small supply of sheep and lambs cleared at steady to weaker prices at Fort Worth Monday. Slaughter lambs and slaughter ewes sold weak to 50 cents lower, and stocker and feeder classes were steady to strong.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$20 to \$22.50, and cull to medium sold from \$15 to \$20. Stocker and feeder lambs cashed at \$17 to \$19, some 6-5 pounders at \$19. Good fat yearlings sold at \$18, and some older muttons sold at \$14.50 down.

Slaughter ewes cashed at \$6.50 to \$8.50. Some solid mouthed ewes sold as breeders around \$10 to \$11, and better young ewes were quoted to \$13 to \$15, with yearlings ewes to \$18 or \$20. Aged bucks sold around \$5 to \$6 for slaughter.

and the congregation will launch a building fund drive next Sunday to raise \$35,000 for constructing and furnishing the building. Architect W.H. Noonan of San Antonio drew the plans for the structure. Rev. M. M. Fulmer is pastor.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1927.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children and to provide for supplementing current legislative appropriations for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power by General Law, to provide subject to limitations and restrictions hereinafter stated, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature be secured for the payment of assistance to: "1. Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month shall not exceed Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month; provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government."

"2. Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or an amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) per year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"3. Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or an amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) per year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions hereinafter stated, provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year. "The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 31, 1927 and ending August 31, 1928: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of duly made inventories and other data shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws governing allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas from the 5th day of November, 1927, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in an amount of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children, from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year and supplementing current legislative appropriations for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in an amount of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children, from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year and supplementing current legislative appropriations for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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Bezar-Atascosa-Medina Water District, say somebody has to pay the piper. It demands payment of the back taxes unpaid by the first purchaser and of the taxes that accumulated during the period when the land was forfeited to the state. Without this money, say district officials, they'll have a hard time paying off their bonds.

Viewpoint of the state, however, is that taxes ceased when the land returned to the board and that the resale was free of tax debt. School "Wastes" Cited — Need for a little overhauling here and there in the Gilmer-Aikin school aid program is suggested in a new Texas Research League report.

Under the "minimum foundation" program the state contributes the money necessary to bring the smaller, poorer districts up to standard.

Research League pointed out that (1) under the scholastic apportionment formula (so much per pupil) some districts actually receive more money than their minimum foundation needs. And (2) guaranteed state contributions discourage local efforts to improve by raising taxes.

It's a system, says the League, that tends to perpetuate "educationally inadequate" districts.

Harrison Named — William A. Harrison, 47, apparently is to be the key man in a program designed to provide Texas with model insurance regulation.

Harrison, who has been serving temporarily without pay since

June 21, was named by the Insurance Board to a two-year term, beginning Sept. 1. Senate must confirm the appointment.

The former assistant state auditor moves into the second highest paid job in Texas government — \$20,000 per year.

One of his first tasks will be to expand the department's staff of insurance company examiners. Recent legislation provided for 26 new men, bringing the staff to 65. Former department officials had complained they didn't have enough examiners to keep tabs on the thousands of companies operating in Texas.

Business Plateau — Texas business activity for the first half of 1957 is up four per cent over 1956. This despite an 11 per cent drop from May to June, says the UT Bureau of Business Research.

UT analysts say it looks as if the breathtaking rise of the past few years has lost its momentum. But they see no "strong evidence of the beginning of a downward trend." They foresee, instead, Texas business continuing, with min-

or ups and downs, on its present high plateau.

It'll Cost Us Too — Texans who think the federal government is going to take care of all their highway problems now are due for disillusionment.

So says State Highway Commission Chairman Marshall Formby. Interstate highway paid for with federal funds will take care of only 16 per cent of the state's traffic load, said Formby. Bringing the other 84 per cent of state roads to first-class condition will cost \$2,000,000,000.

With present funds of \$80,000,000 to \$90,000,000 a year, it'll take 22 years, he said. "And by that time we'll need more four-lane roads."

Ask First — Various departments of the State are playing it safe today. They don't want to run afoul of what has been termed "the new moral atmosphere in Texas."

Indicative of the new trend is the "ask-first" attitude that has developed. Result: Many requests of the attorney general for rulings.

In an opinion given State Auditor C. H. Cavness it was ruled that it would be legal for a state college cafeteria to buy its milk from a dairy owned by a legislator.

Inasmuch as the Texas Constitution prohibits a lawmaker from receiving an office created during his legislative term, the Board of Pardons and Paroles asked if it would be legal for Rep. J. T. Ellis Jr. of Weslaco to be director of the new adult parole supervision system set up by the Legislature.

"This is a job, not an office," rules the attorney general.

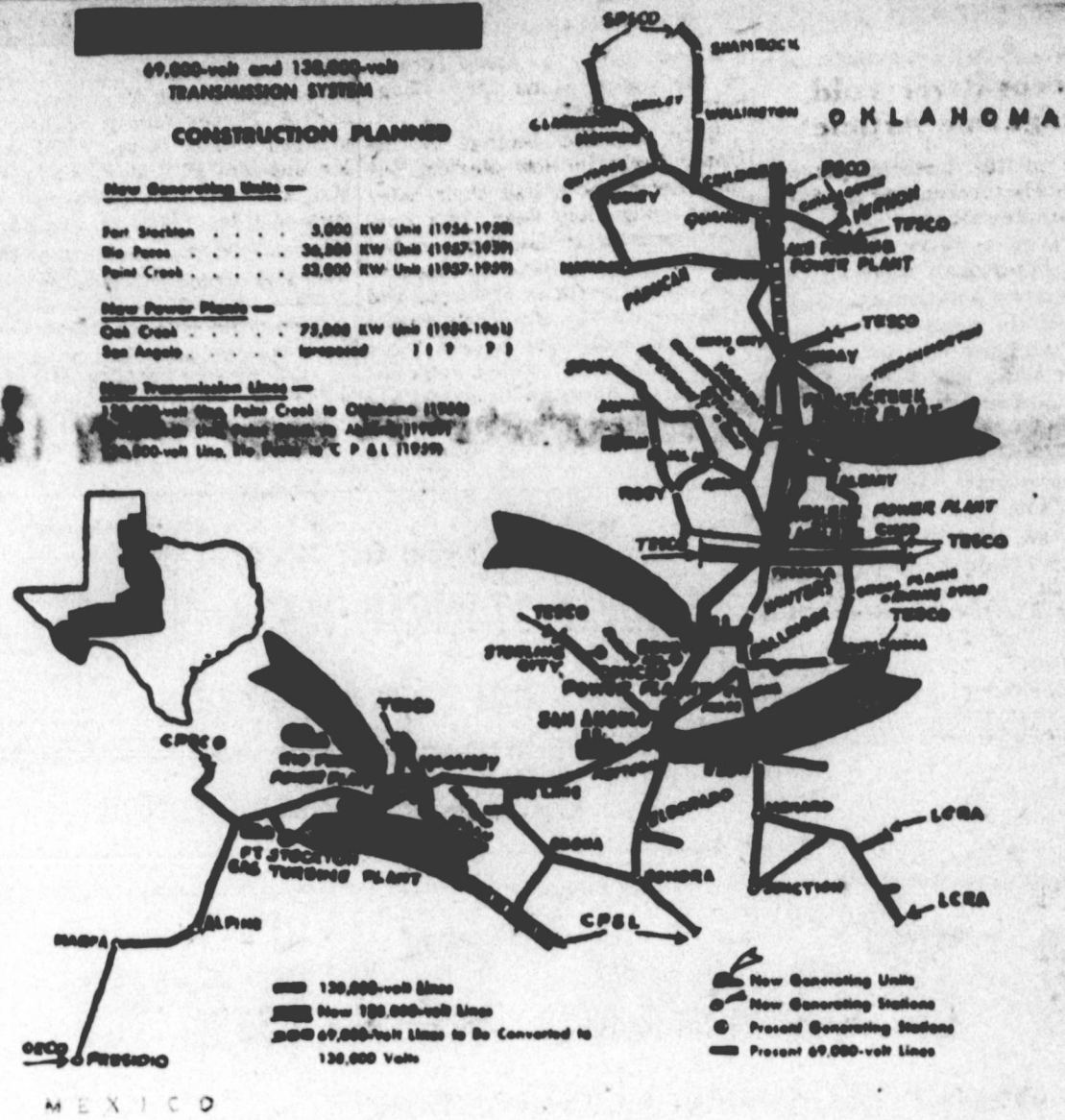

West Texas Utilities Co. Plans 51 Million Dollar Expansion Of Electric Facilities In West Texas To Meet Needs of Next Five Years

West Texas Utilities Company today announced plans to spend an estimated \$51,000,000 during the next five years for construction of new electric facilities in West Texas.

Cal Young, WTU President, said the company's expansion plans were based on recently completed surveys and studies which indicate that West Texas will greatly increase its use of electricity by 1961.

"Most of the proposed five-year outlay will go for the construction of new plants and installation of additional generating equipment, new transmission lines and expanded distribution facilities," Young said.

New generating equipment for WTU, including one new power plant, is expected to cost over \$22,500,000 and will increase by more than two-thirds the company's system generating capability.

WTU plans to spend almost

\$15 million during the next five years for the construction and improvement of distribution facilities. Another \$14,500,000 has been allocated for the building of new high voltage transmission lines connecting WTU power plants and

load centers. The remainder of the planned expenditure will be used primarily for general construction and improvement of WTU facilities.

"Electric power consumption is an accurate barometer of the health and prosperity of any area. Our undertaking this comprehensive construction program is indicative of our continued confidence in the future of the area we serve," Young said. "We are determined to do whatever is necessary to maintain a dependable and adequate supply of economical electric power for the anticipated industrial expansion of the area as well as for the expected increase in requirements of our domestic and commercial customers."

The announcement of the construction plans begins the second decade of the long-range expansion program begun at the end of World War II. Since then, WTU has invested \$60 million for new facilities and for enlarging existing facilities to provide electric power for West Texas.

Since 1949, the number of electric customers has increased 43% from 72,860 to 104,000. The peak load has more than tripled, increasing from 73,400 kilowatts to 243,500 kilowatts. During the decade, the company's generating capability has almost tripled, increasing from 88,180 to 250,500 kilowatts.

Study Possibilities Of Wool And Mohair Processing In Texas

College Station — Wool and mohair processing plants, like many other industries, can expect more economic production if located in Texas.

A preliminary study, "The Feasibility of Processing Wool and Mohair in Texas," made by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station outlines Texas' position as a wool and mohair producer, and the historical, physical, financial and human factors involved in previous and future attempts to establish a complete wool industry in this state.

Compared with New England, where the textile industry is highly concentrated, and the Southeast, where milling has expanded in recent years, savings would be much larger for wool processing plants in Texas, and they probably could produce and market woolen and worst fabrics cheaper, the study shows.

Texas flocks normally can produce about 70 million pounds of wool and does produce about 97 percent of the nation's mohair annually. Most of the state's wool is best suited for worsted goods; and its mohair is famous as one of the strongest and best natural fibers.

At present most of Texas' raw wool and mohair is shipped to eastern markets where it is processed and manufactured into textiles which sell for a many-fold increase in price over that received by the Texas producer.

With this in mind, the Texas Legislature provided an appropriation to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for an overall study of the industry's possibilities in the state. A committee of five top researchers has been named to plan the study.

Director R. D. Lewis of the Experiment Station said economic and industrial leaders from all over the state are being asked to assist in the planning. Final plans for the work will be discussed with leading wool and mohair growers, warehousemen and others interested in the sheep and goat industry.

Stories And Legends Of Pecos River Told In Magazine Article

Some of the historical stories and legends surrounding the Pecos River are described in the article, "The Pecos — River of Legends" in the September issue of The Progressive Farmer magazine.

One of the most famous crossings of the Pecos was called Horsehead Crossing. It links the present Texas counties of Crane and Pecos. It received its name because so many horses died at the crossing after drinking their fill of the briny water.

Mexicans came up the old Salt Road by Presidio and crossed the Pecos at Horsehead. They went on to Salt Lake, where they obtained all the salt they could carry home.

Charles Goodnight, Oliver Lov-

ing, and other cattle drovers crossed the Pecos taking their Longhorns to market.

Billy the Kid belongs to the Upper Pecos in New Mexico. But the Lower Pecos had their tales about Judge Roy Bean. In a box-like barroom at Langtry, at the edge of the Big Bend, he used to dispense liquor with one hand and justice with the other. He helped to disprove the saying that there was "no law west of the Pecos."

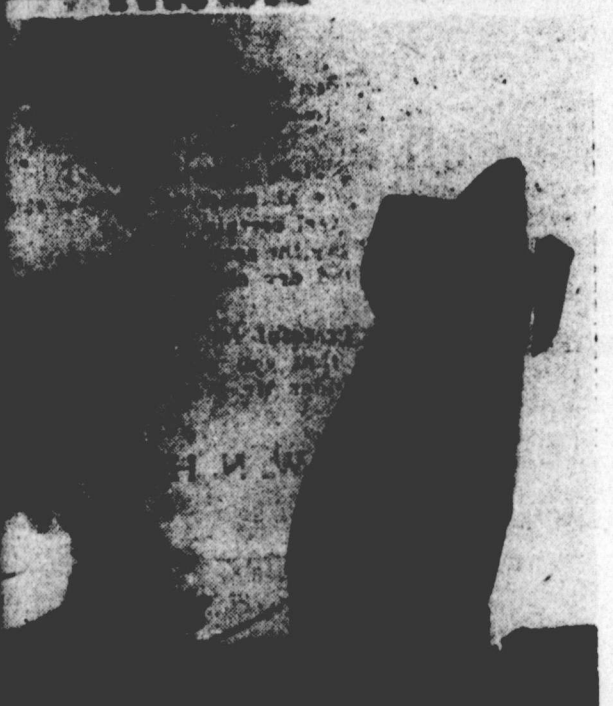

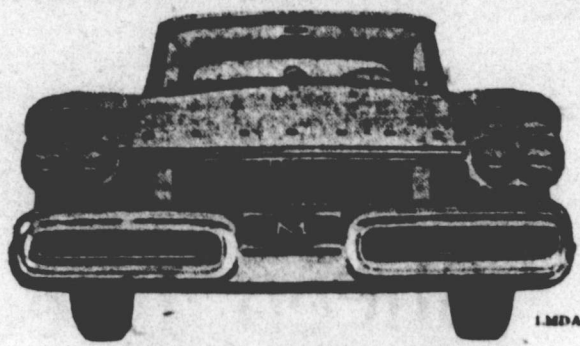
ped by crippling accidents, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy, strokes, etc.

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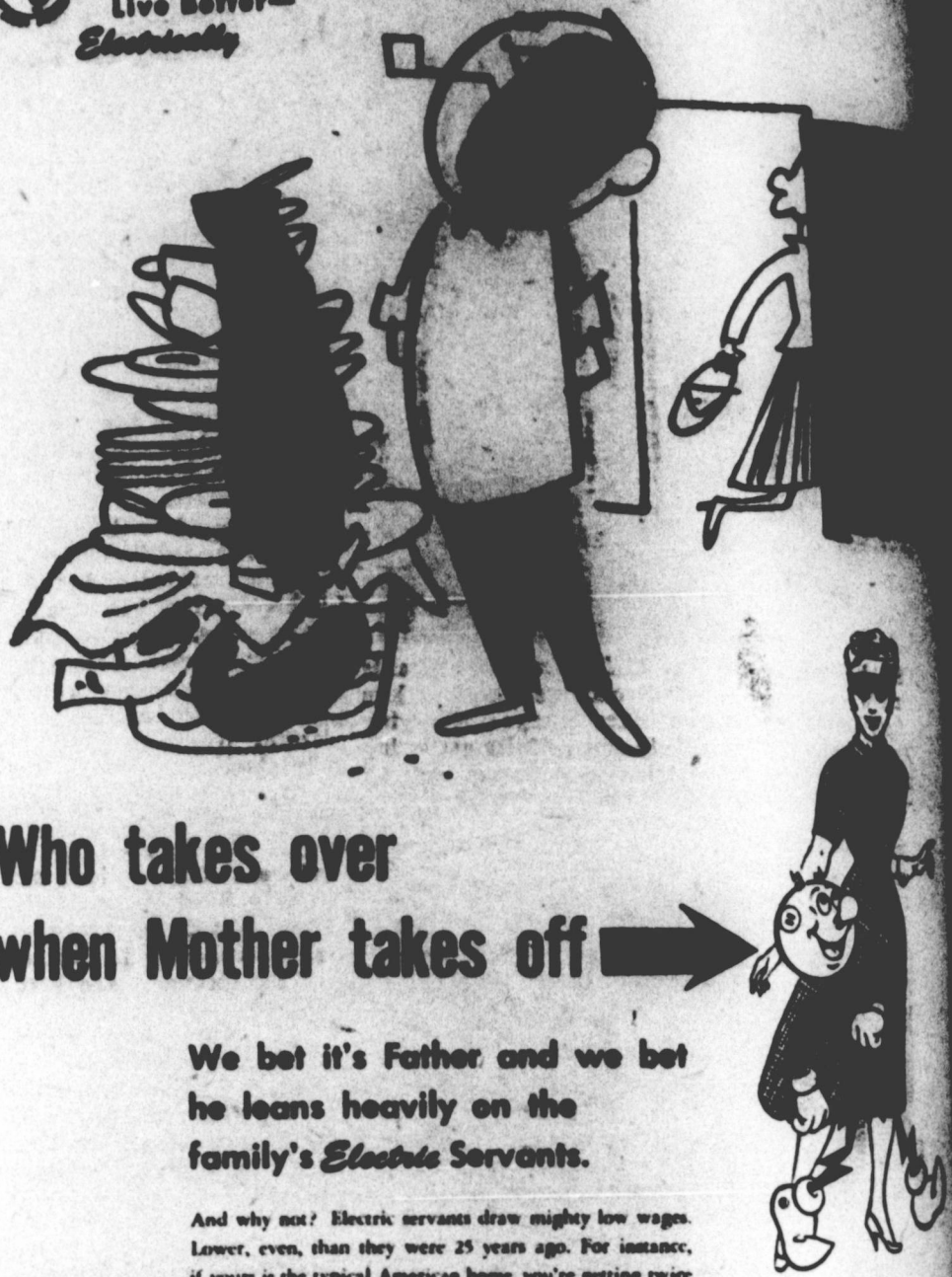
