HARD TO BELIEVE

The taxpayers of the nation aubled their eyes in disbelief the other day to see in cold type the news that 18,000 civilian employes of the Navy will walk the plankmost of them by the end of Octobed, all by June 30 - for a saving of \$6 million a month!

Even though there will be 371 .-717 left on the payroll, the realization that an actual start is being made in reducing the swarm of Government workers, is something to cheer about. And while a similar announcement is expected from the Army, we hope that this reform will gather momentum rather than to stop with the armed services.

These, after all, are only token reductions, in terms of what could and should be done in throwing out entire bureaus that presently duplicate the work of one or more other bureaus. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, for instance, could well be cut back to the bureaus from which it sprang, and which, except for the administration of social security, are superfluous anyway.
