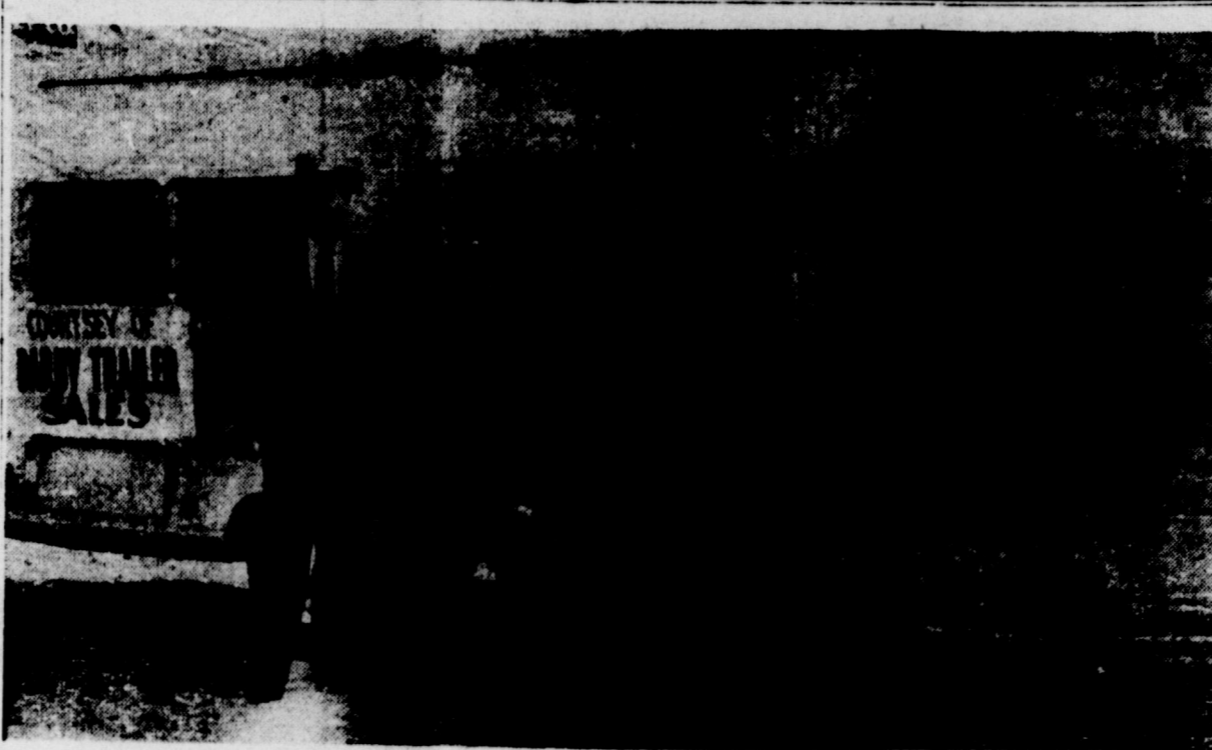

The Lions assumed the lead in the District chase last week by defeating Sonora, which together with a surprising tie between Junction and Menard, left the Lions in the lead. The game this week will be the district opener for the Eldorado team, which last year handed the Lions their most one-sided loss of the year.

The Eldorado victory was achieved through neglecting to use a substitute even to the point of playing injured regulars in order to run up the score.

The Lions are expected to be in good shape for the game this week with most of the flu ridden players back to near normal. Another crucial battle is scheduled to be played in Sonora when the Junction Eagles, who figured to be co-favorites with the Lions, will do battle with the Sonora Broncos with the loser just about out of the race.

The Ozona-Eldorado game will close the 1957 home season for the Lions and will mark the last home appearance of six Ozona seniors. Those finishing their eligibility will be, Jake Young, Clayton Friend, Rodney Franklin, Mark White, Jesus Ramos and Stan Williams.

Slow Rains Bring Best Soaking In Last Ten Years

8 Days Of Rain So Far In Oct. Totals 4.05 Inches Here

Finest rains in ten years soaked all of West Texas during the past week-end in a slow, steady falling three-day rain which perhaps wet the long drought parched ranch country deeper than it has been soaked in a decade.

The rains, coming on the heels of good rains which began the first week in October and continued at intervals through the first two-thirds of the month, drove already existing moisture deeper into the ground to assure a fine season for winter grazing and for next spring.

The slow rain began last Saturday night, continued at intervals through Sunday and Sunday night and fell in a slow drizzle almost without interruption through Monday and Monday night.

The week-end total in the slow rains reached 1.08 inches in Ozona to boost the month's total to 4.05 inches here. Oct. 8 brought 1.44 inches, Oct. 13, 1 inch; Oct. 14, .21; Oct. 15, .17 and Oct. 18, .15 of an inch. The rains were general over Crockett county and in fact almost all over Texas.

Capacity Crowd Sees Lions Take Sonora Broncos

Locals Cop 'Big One' 34-13 Despite Flu Outbreak

The Ozona Lions jumped into first place in the district 8-A flag chase Friday night when they whipped the Sonora Broncos 34 to 13 for their first win over their arch rivals in seven seasons.

The flu-weakened Lions were forced to use their most potent weapon, the forward pass, and in that sense the Broncos were unlucky, since had the Lions been in good health they would most likely not have passed as much and at least have held the score down in that manner.

Quarterback Stan Williams and halfback Bobby Sutton took turns throwing touchdown strikes to fleet end Jerry Jacobs, who tallied three of the Lion TDs, one going on the pass and run for eighty yards.

In all, the Lions threw twenty-one passes, connecting on nine of them for three touchdowns and setting up the other two and amassing 224 yards.

The Lions did not get in a single contact session last week and with a number of players, even though back, of doubtful value, things did not look too bright for Ozona partisans at kickoff time Friday night.

The game was viewed by the largest crowd of the season and marked the first time the new enlarged stadium had been filled.

Sonora kicked off and the Lions, after failing in two efforts to run, fell just short of a first down on a pass from Williams to Cervantez. Sutton got off a beautiful 51 yard kick to set Sonora deep in its own territory.

With Allen Wall and Vivian Vasquez doing most of the punching, the Broncos pushed to the Ozona forty where a penalty on a fourth down try gave the Broncos a new life. However, the Lions held on the next series and the game's first threat was broken.

Sonora did not wait much longer, however, as early in the second quarter, the Broncos went 65 yards for the game's first score. Big play in the drive was a 44 yard reverse by Eddie Sosa which would have gone all the way had Jerry Jacobs not run Sosa down on the Lion nine yard line. Wall ended the drive by plunging into the end zone from the one. Sosa scored the extra point on the same reverse on which the touchdown had been set up.

The Lions responded quickly and drove sixty yards for their first score. The tally came on a beautiful pass from Sutton to Jerry Jacobs in the end zone after Sutton, on the run pass option, suc-

Ozona To Honor Cong. Rutherford At Supper Oct. 28

Public Invited To Attend Event At High School Cafeteria

Ozona will be the official Congressional District office of Congressman J. T. Rutherford on Monday, October 28th.

Rutherford, traveling in a mobile trailer unit, will roll into Ozona at approximately 3:45 p. m. and will greet local residents at a downtown parking site adjacent to the park. Local officials will also be on hand to greet Rutherford, and welcome him to Ozona.

The Congressman will remain on the streets for about one hour, and later in the evening will be the guest of honor at a joint ladies night meeting of the Ozona Rotary Club and the Ozona Lions Club. A "dutch treat" supper will be served in the school cafeteria, and the general public will be invited to attend. Congressman Rutherford will address the group, and then will remain overnight here before continuing his trip.

The school cafeteria staff will prepare and serve the supper at 7:30 p. m. at \$1.25 per person. All Ozonans are invited to join the Lions and Rotary Clubs in honoring the visiting Congressman.

The visit here is part of a week-long tour Rutherford is making with the mobile office into 16 of the 19 counties he represents, during the week beginning October 28th. A few days later, he will go into the other three counties, which are in the El Paso area.

Rutherford says he looks forward to seeing many Ozona area residents during his stop here. The Congressman will have numerous Government publications and materials of interest on display in the mobile office, and will distribute them upon request.

Congressman Rutherford always tours the District by automobile during the adjournment period of Congress, but has never before brought along a mobile office.

"In fact," he says, "to my knowledge this is the first time it has been done, and it will be the first time Ozona has been the Congressional headquarters of the 16th District." He said many people cannot go to their Congressional offices in Washington, "so I decided to bring the office to them." Larry King, former West Texas newsman who now heads Rutherford's Washington staff, will also be on the tour.

Arrangements are being made for the Sheriff to meet Rutherford as he comes in from Big Lake and to escort him to the downtown parking site. After his overnight stay in Ozona, Congressman Rutherford will continue his trip that will cover 776 miles, through 16 counties and 23 towns.

Eldorado To Class B; Reshuffle Effective Fall Of 1958

A reshuffle of Interscholastic League District 8A, which will become effective with the opening of the football season in the fall of 1958, will put Big Lake into the district and oust Eldorado.

Eldorado will drop to Class B next year because of a drop in enrollment in high school. Reagan County High School of Big Lake had made application to the League some time ago for transfer to this district and had been approved by other schools in the district.

Notification of the change was received this week by Supt. L. B. T. Sikes from the League headquarters in Austin.

The new alignment of District 8A next year will include Big Lake, Ozona, Junction, Menard and Sonora.

Woodsen Club Reminders

Dig, dig, dig, those blues away! This isn't meant to be "cool cat" talk but plain garden English. Tension, nerves, Asiatic flu, atomic obliteration, too much social life, school report cards due this week, Sputnik - whatever your worries, an hour or two of digging in the yard is a sure cure for taking the kinks out. There are not many avid gardeners who take their tranquility from a bottle of pills, and what more inspiring time to work than now after our wonderful rains!

Whether you buy your seeds and bulbs from a local florist, grocery store, catalogue or patronize an exclusive gardening store - get them bought! Fall's racing by and Santa is going to catch of us with loads of good intentions but no seeds and bulbs making valuable root growth in the cold brown earth.

If you are your own landscape designer, or if you can afford a specialist to do it for you, take a little time to plan on paper the desired effects in your yard. Give your beds a background so that every lovely bloom will show up, and if you have only a few, plant them en masse. Use a long straight row only if you have loads of them.

Even the neophyte who may never have planted a seed can place a bulb in the autumn ground with reasonable assurance that he will find green shoots and blossoms the following spring, and usually several springs thereafter. As a rule, plant bulbs to a depth about three times their height - pointed end always up. Space between bulbs should be about the same distance as their planting depth. Success calls for a good root system before winter else they may come up stunted. In planting bulbs or other plants, roots must have loose soil to explore for food and moisture. If the ground is dry, you may need to soak it for hours and let it dry enough to dig. Remember it's the moisture under the bulb, where roots will be, that's vital. Make your hole deeper and wider than seems necessary and fill it with loose earth. You may set bulbs in a well-drained soil mixed with a little compost in the planting pocket, or this is the sure-fire professional way. Put half a cupful of bone meal and a little superphosphate in the bottom of the pocket, add some sand for drainage, place the bulb on this, and add dirt tightly to the top of the ground. If tulips about spring much more cheerily for you than daffodils, narcissus and hyacinths do, it's probably because their color range is so complete. Their bright cups seem always to have associated with violets, apple-blossoms and warm spring winds. A rain reminder to place them in flattering settings. You can more than double the effect of your spring's display by planting low spring flowering plants beside your tulips, such as pansies, English daisies, or forget-me-nots. Tulips may be planted later than most other bulbs. December is a good month.

Don't fail to plant a few of the tuber known they bulbs that are the earliest and most colorful of all. They are the "daredevils of spring" and will multiply year after year and require little care. They are usually in the garden in the fall, and are the first to appear in the spring.

from there Williams pegged to Jacobs for 55 yards and the score and Sutton added the extra point to make it 20 to 13.

The Lions really took over here and the game for all practical purposes was over, Sonora was beaten.

A Sonora kick went out on the Lion forty-nine and now the Lions began to run a little and a combination of short passes and runs moved the ball to the Sonora ten, where Williams faked beautifully and potted out to the weak side on a pass option. A run was in order and he danced into the end zone untouched. Sutton again converted the extra point.

The Lions were beginning to enjoy the ease with which they could score and after holding Sonora on the next series moved forty yards for the final score.

The touchdown was set up when the desperate Sonora defenders committed flagrant pass interference on the two-yard line and from there Sutton scored on a plunge.

Sonora gained 194 yards rushing to 103 for the Lions and made 17 first downs to the Lions 11 but the Lions gained 207 passing and 16 more on a penalty as compared to 61 for Sonora.

Defensively, Jake Young was a standout but Billy Bob Hodlen and B. B. Ingham along with Dizzy Reeves were in on tackles all over the field.

Sonora presented a big, well coached line that pretty well contained the Ozona ground game throughout the contest.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as planned from the files of The Ozona Newsman

From The Stockman, Oct. 25, 1959

After splitting open the heads of two Mexican companions while they slept, Juan Jasatena, Mexican section hand for the Orient railroad at Barnhart, about 2 o'clock Tuesday morning calmly walked outside the shack where the killing occurred and started digging a grave to bury the bodies of his victims. After digging the grave, Jasatena decided he needed help in moving the bodies, and awakened another companion and asked him to help. The latter promised his aid as soon as he could find a shovel and ran fifty yards to the home of the section foreman and reported the crime. Jasatena was gone when officers arrived and a search is on for him throughout this area.

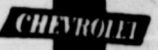
