C., pro basketball team, in the Davidson Memorial Gymnasium here the evening of November 27. As long as two years ago, the Ozona Rotary Club began negotiations with Abe Saperstein, founder, owner and coach of the world-famed Negro specialists of basketball, and his staff to bring this outstanding entertainment to Ozona, with success coming this year when the team will come from a show in Abilene to present their two-in-one basketball and half time show in Ozona.

Patrons of this show will get double their money's worth, for not only is the Trotters' fantastic game of basketball a full evening's entertainment in itself, the half-time show alone is worth more than the admission price -- which, by the way, will be only \$2.50 for adults in reserved seats to be laid out in the gym. This top-flight entertainment this year will consist of a variety show presenting seven different acts of juggling, tumbling, tight-rope walking and a magician show.

## Moore To Drill Offset To Strike In Crockett Field

John I. Moore, et al, of Midland and San Angelo, have filed application to drill the No. 2-P Shannon (Grayburg), as a location northeast offset to the opener and zone producer in the Todd, Northwest (Grayburg) field of Crockett County, 22 miles south of Big Lake.

It will be drilled to 1,600 feet with rotary.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 2,310 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of H-9-D&SE.

The discovery, The Texas Co. No. 2-A-NCT-2 M. A. Shannon, was completed Sept. 7 for a daily flowing potential of 118.22 barrels of 33.9 gravity oil, no water, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 1,440 - 480 feet.

I. N. Anderson of Abilene has filed application to re-enter and clean out to 2,650 feet at a 6,914-foot wildcat failure in Crockett County, three miles east of Iraan. It will be the No. 3-C H. M. Harr Estate.

The project originally drilled by Moore & Olson was plugged and abandoned October 27, 1947.

Located on a 160-acre lease, it is 515 feet from the north line and 1,895 feet from the east line of 69-1-I&GN.

In a letter to his parents, Col. Charles L. Jackson, commanding officer of the post, advised of the selection of young Halydier for the honor, citing it as "a post of honor reserved for the most outstanding private of the Guard."

"Bobby received this honor by a process of competitive elimination," the Colonel wrote. He was considered to be superior in his knowledge of military subjects, his appearance and soldierly bearing. Bobby will accompany me on my inspection trips throughout the Battle Group area and will be cited in the Daily Bulletin as the Colonel's Orderly."

## Fate Of Three Amendments Up To Voters Tuesday

### Crockett Voters Cast Ballots In Special Election Nov. 5

Fate of three proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will be decided by Texas voters next Tuesday, Nov. 5, at a special statewide election called for that purpose.

A light vote, as usual on such issues, is expected in Crockett county, especially since no great campaign has been waged over the state on behalf of nor against any of the proposals.

Ozona voters will cast their ballot in only one box inside the city, that at the courthouse. However, polling places will be set up as usual in all of the rural boxes over the county. Since no precinct lines are involved in the voting, all Ozona voters will cast their ballots at the courthouse instead of the school buildings located in three of the four precincts.

The proposed amendment which is listed first on the ballot would establish a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, a measure which would call for a special tax levy to be fixed by the Legislature to create such a fund.

Place number two on the ballot is another of the perennial proposals to increase the monthly and annual payments to aged needy persons in the state.

The third proposed constitutional change would authorize the Legislature to issue up to a total of two million dollars in state bonds to afford financial assistance to political subdivisions for the conservation and development of water resources of the state.

## Rep. Rutherford Reviews National Events At Meeting

### Congressman Honored At Dinner By Clubs In Cafeteria

Congressman J. T. Rutherford of Odessa, representative of the sprawling 16th Texas district, brought his congressional office to Ozona via a borrowed house trailer, Monday and was honored at a supper in the school cafeteria by citizens of Ozona. Members of the Ozona Lions Club and the Ozona Rotary Club made it a joint ladies night meeting and with the dutch treat supper arranged, other citizens joined the groups in honoring the visiting Congressman and hearing his report on national affairs.

The meeting opened with the invocation by Sonny Cleere. After the meal, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes, acting as master of ceremonies, introduced special guests, including the Congressman's secretary, Larry King; District Judge Jim Langdon; District Attorney Connel Ashley and Major and Mrs. Frank Radzickas of the Ozona Air Force base. Also introduced were the presidents of the two sponsoring clubs, Gordon Aikman of the Rotary Club and Howard Lemmons of the Lions Club.

Congressman Rutherford was introduced by County Judge Houston Smith, who recounted the rise of the young Odessan from representative in the state legislature to State Senator and then to Congressman. Although serving his second term in Congress, Judge Smith pointed out, Congressman Rutherford is assigned to three important committees in the Congress, Interior committee, Insular Affairs committee and the powerful Commerce and Banking committee. The judge also took occasion to express again the appreciation of the people of Crockett County for the Congressman's assistance in pushing through the plan for flood control dams on Johnson draw.

The Congressman in an interesting talk to the good sized crowd reviewed some of the outstanding accomplishments of the 85th Congress, mainly the paring of the President's unprecedented peacetime budget. He expressed his continued opposition to foreign aid, needless spending and his support for strengthened armed forces for the U. S. The latter, he said, could be accomplished at a saving to the taxpayers by offering inducements through higher pay to service personnel to retain trained men rather than the expensive process of retraining new recruits in a constant stream of replacements.

At the conclusion of the talk, President Aikman of the Rotary Club, on behalf of the Lions and Rotary Clubs and the people of Ozona, presented Congressman Rutherford with a handsome spur clip tie clasp and set of cuff links.

**WHEN A FELLOW NEEDS A CONGRESS**

The real success of the visit of Her Majesty Elizabeth II to these shores began to be apparent as Americans again unrolled the red carpet to receive her Prime Minister, Harold MacMillan, for three days of White House conferences.

At the Washington National Airport, where Secretary of State John Foster Dulles greeted the arriving Prime Minister, both made pretty little speeches assuring all and sundry that whatever might happen would be good for "the freedom of all the free nations." But it should be noted that the meetings were very much of a British-American tete-a-tete until the last day, when Secretary General Paul Henri Spaak of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization was invited to join the huddle.

Early reports indicate agreement of the conferees on the pooling of nuclear and missile know-how and resources so that they may be "utilized to maximum efficiency" and so that this country and Britain "can be of greater service to the free world."

But decisions are not quite as simple as that. No matter how expansive President Eisenhower may be feeling, he can't go around sharing our atomic secrets with foreign countries while the McMahon Atomic Energy Act remains on the books — even though he can, perhaps, tell our British cousins all about our missiles and rockets if he wants to. Thus the word is that the President will start working on Congressional leaders now so that the Congress that reconvenes in January may be disposed to remove or remodel any laws that stand in the way of giving Britain what she wants.

It is to be hoped, however, that the Congressmen will consider realistically what it could mean to ship our most hush-hush military data, equipment and skills to a land that Russia can crush at will — and too quickly for outsiders to be of help. If there is pooling to be done, let it be done on our continent — where the chances for resisting surprise attack are somewhat better. Let the British scientists, whom we need, come here and work with our technicians, production specialists and facilities, which Britain needs.

We're a grown up country now. It's just not true that "Mother knows best!"

**Fable Explains For Disappointed Sonoras Their Broncos' Loss**

A Fable For Broncos From Sonora Devil's River News

Once upon a time the kingdom of Anozo was at war with the kingdom of Aronos which lies but 36 miles away. The generals of the armies of Anozo and Aronos agreed to meet in battle before the amassed subjects of the two kingdoms. **Garden Club Reminders**

Don't be a litter bug. Join the Ozona Garden Club and the Ozona Woman's Club to keep Ozona and our highways beautiful.

November is plant and pull month. Plant sweet peas now. Only a light covering if it turns cold will keep them from being killed. Fall and early spring are the best time to plant hedges. Evergreens should be moved now if they are to be moved.

Select Amaryllis bulbs soon. Do not buy inferior bulbs because they cost less, no blooms worth while will be produced. Planted in pots and given proper care, you will have blooms by Christmas.

When pulling up old plants, watch for knots on the roots. This indicates there are nematodes in the soil. Treat soil at once to kill the insects before another year.

Feed shade trees. Dig, divide, and reset such perennials as iris, daylilies, phlox, hollyhock, violets, and shasta daisies.

Don't fail to attend the Garden Club meeting November 6th, and hear Mr. Otto Scherz on contemporary landscaping.

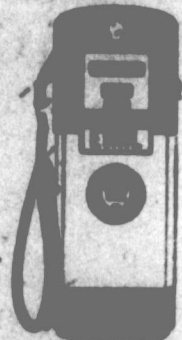
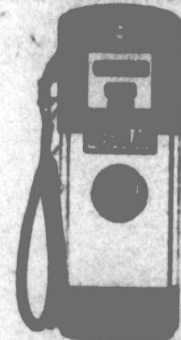

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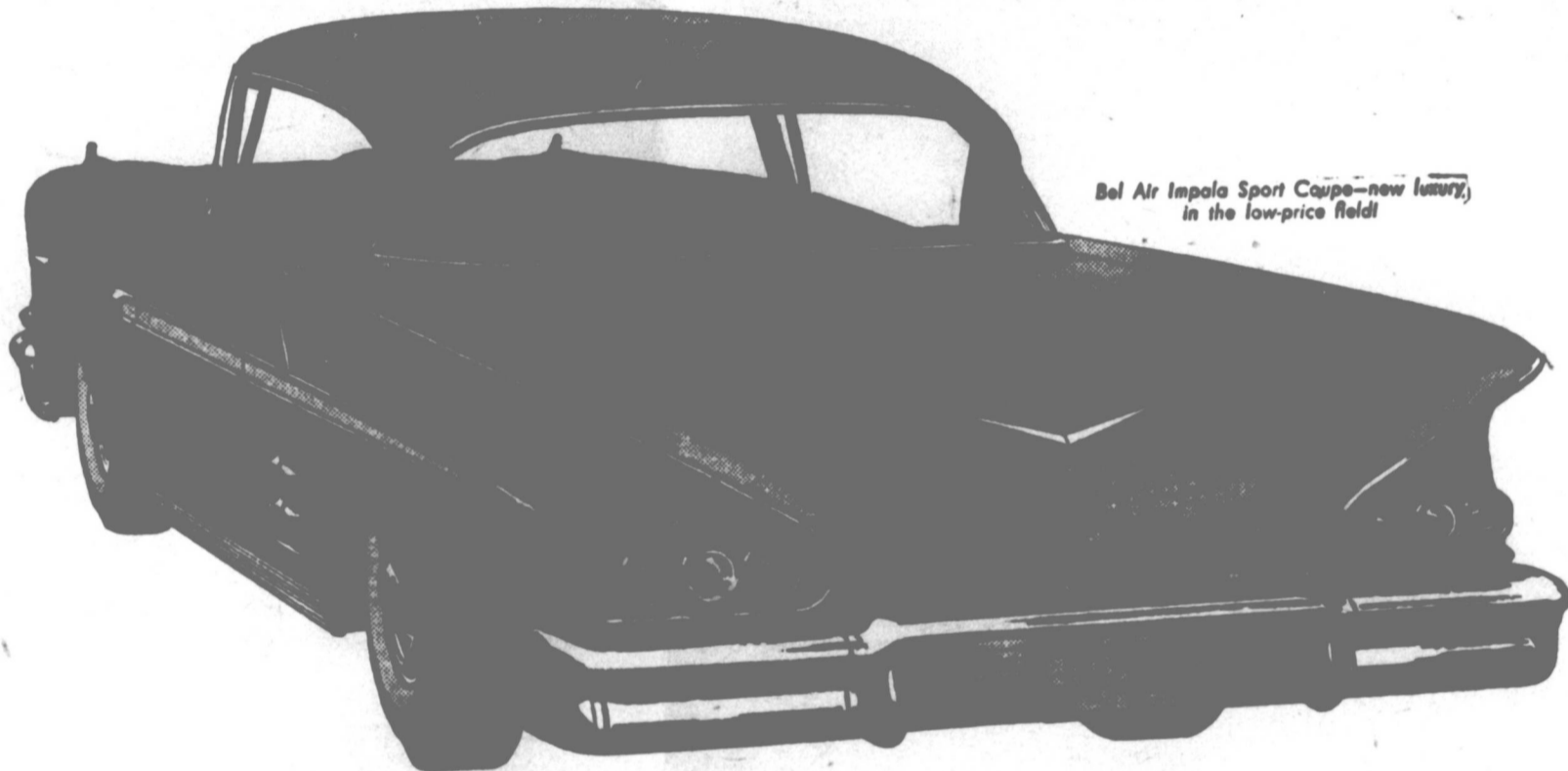

**Stocker Demand Dominates Trade**  
**PORT WORTH** — Cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday again met broad demand from stocker and feeder buyers, and prices on replacement kinds were fully steady to stronger. Almost any kind of animal that appeared capable of going back to the pasture and making a gain or raising a calf, moved to stocker buyers at prices well beyond the reach of the packer contingent.

This feature of the trade put a strong prop under most cattle and calves, and defeated efforts of any buyers who sought to lower costs. Feeder cattle were very scarce, and about steady.

Comparative prices included: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearling cased at \$19 to \$22, and common and medium offerings sold from \$14 to \$19. Fat cows cased at \$13 to \$14.50, and canners and cutters cased at \$8.50 to \$13. Bulls brought \$11 to \$16.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$19 to \$21.50, some baby beefs of yearling weights above that range. Common and medium offerings sold from \$14 to \$19. Culls cased at \$11 to \$13. Good and choice stocker steer calves drew \$20 to \$24.50, and heifer calves sold from \$22 downward. Stocker steer yearlings of good and choice grades sold from \$18 to \$22. Stocker cows cased at \$10 to \$16.

**Sheep and Lambs Sell Steady to 50 Cents Higher**

Good and choice slaughter lambs cased at \$21 to \$22, and call to medium lambs sold from \$17 to \$20. Stocker and feeder lambs of medium to good grades sold from \$19 to \$20.

Yearling muttons sold from \$17 to \$18, and slaughter ewes sold from \$7.50 to \$9.00. A few breeding ewes sold at \$20 per head. Aged bucks sold from \$5 to \$6.

A few goats sold from around \$6.00.
