Early Mailing Of Out Of State Cards, Gifts Urged By Postmaster

In order to assure delivery on time of Christmas cards to out-of-state addresses, they should be mailed by December 10 if at all possible. Postmaster Floyd Hokit advised patrons of the Ozona postoffice this week. The Christmas mail rush, expected to be unusually heavy this year, severely taxes mail handling facilities, both locally and elsewhere, and results in much slower service.

Packages destined for out-of-state delivery likewise should be mailed by the Dec. 10 date if possible to avoid disappointment. "Tie your packages securely, and it would be wise to include an extra address label inside the package in case the one on the package is torn off or obliterated," Hokit said. "If you have packages that are of unusual size or weight, it would be advisable to check with the postoffice before mailing to be sure they are mailable."

All DPS Personnel Pressed Into Service Over Holiday Weekend

"Increased traffic control will be put into effect over the Thanksgiving weekend" said Capt. G. L. Morahan of the Department of Public Safety, Midland district.

Additional patrolmen will be placed on traffic detail as men from the License and Weight, and Motor Vehicle Inspection functions will join the Highway Patrol function in patrolling the rural highways in an effort to reduce motor vehicle traffic accidents. More radar units will be pressed into use both night and day in an effort to control speed violations which continue to be the leading causative factor in rural fatal and injury accidents.

Patrolmen will be on the alert for speed violations, drinking drivers, and other moving hazardous violations that contribute to the ever mounting traffic toll that is increasing daily on our streets and highways, and especially on our long holiday weekends.

November 24, last year was the most deadly day of 1956 as 29 people died in 16 fatal accidents, therefore every effort is being put forth to prevent a re-occurrence of this tragic loss this year.

"Your cooperation while driving is solicited by the Department of Public Safety in order that the annual Turkey day celebration will not be turned into a day of sorrow and regret," said Capt. Morahan.

Alpine's Bucks Win Bi-District On Penetrations

Fumbles Account For Difference Margin In Decision

The Ozona Lions closed their 1957 football season on Saturday night as they tied the Alpine Bucks of District 7-A 13 to 13 in a game played on an icy field covered with snow.

Alpine advanced into the next round of play by virtue of having scored 4 penetrations of the Lions twenty yard line to only two for the Lions.

The penetration department was the only phase of the game other than the score that the Bucks even compared with the Lions and costly Lion fumbles and poor snap backs in the first quarter accounted for everything the Alpine crew accomplished.

Manuel Espinoza, who, according to Alpine stories, was injured and supposed to be out of the game, scored both Alpine touchdowns and their extra point following a series of Lion misuses in the first quarter.

Alpine scored first when a bad snap sailed inside the Lion 20 on fourth down. With the ball on the Lions 17 Espinoza got four yards on second down after Leyva failed to gain on an off-tackle smash. On third down, Mark White knifed through and nailed Deanda for an eight yard loss and on fourth down the Bucks went into the air to try for the touchdown. Jerry Jacobs, defending in the Lion secondary, played the pass perfectly and flashed in to intercept but never gained complete possession of the ball and dropped it on the Lion four.

Three plays later, Espinoza bucked over from the one and added the extra point in the same manner.

The Lions were apparently rallying when Sutton fumbled on the Lion 36 and the Bucks were off again. Espinoza covered 31 yards and then scored from the one on third down to send the Bucks into a 13 to 0 lead.

After the two touchdowns, the longest Buck gainer of the night was a four yard gain. The Bucks did not make another first down or ever come close to doing so but the damage was done.

The Lions finally got a break, however, as Logan tried to catch Sutton's punt on his thirty-one yard line and dropped the ball with Humberto Cervantez capturing it. From here the Lions quickly punched to the Buck fourteen, where Jake Young broke over the middle, sidestepped the linebacker and raced over for the score. Sutton kicked the extra point and the half ended with the score 13 to 7.

The Lions played the third quarter deep in its own territory as a strong wind and deep snow combined to hamper the Lions wide attack, which seemingly, on a clear field, would have gone for big yardage.

The Lions finally cranked up an offense early in the fourth period and drove 79 yards for the tying score. Bobby Sutton and Stan Williams sparked the drive and Sutton romped over from the nineteen on a quickie up the middle.

Three or four plays prior to the touchdown Rod Franklin was hit in the head and could not focus his eyes. Being the Lions' only center, he was unable to snap the ball for the extra point try and the Lions decided to run and failed. In all likelihood this was the game's key play.

With six minutes left, the Lions decided to gamble on an on-side kick which also failed and instead of forcing the Bucks to punt from their own twenty, the Lions had to back up to take the kick from their own forty-five.

Despite all the mishaps the Lions continued to fight hard. Sutton raced around end for eighteen and Williams added twelve.

USELESS GOVERNMENT SPENDING

In the view of Vice President Nixon, military preparedness "must always take priority over the understandable desire to reduce our taxes."

Practically everyone in the country will agree with that — especially in the light of Soviet rocket achievements.

However, this certainly does not mean that there is no longer any point in talking about government economy. It should, instead, mean that every possible frill and non-essential in government is now to be cropped down to the root. And an excellent place to start would be in government activities in the field of commercial business. Most of these run at big losses. If they were returned to private enterprise, where they belong, all the financing would come out of private capital and private savings — and, to frost the cake, government would get big new tax revenues that could prevent tax increases or be the basis of tax reduction.

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
