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105 Crockett Voters Register Approval Of All Three Amendments

One hundred five Crockett county voters trudged to the polls Tuesday to make a token showing in voting on the three proposed amendments to the much patched Texas constitution.

As was the case over the state, voters here approved all three changes in the constitution. Number one on the ballot, which would establish a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, was approved here 77 to 25.

The second amendment, which will increase the monthly limit and annual limit on payments to aged needy persons in the state, won approval from Crockett county's handful of voters by a margin of 91 to 13.

The third proposal, that authorizing up to two hundred million dollars in state bonds for financial assistance to political subdivisions in the conservation and development of water resources did nearly as well as the pension amendment, being approved 88 to 15.

Highway Patrolman Points To Provisions Of Minor License Law

Highway Patrolman Walter Cawyer this week called attention to the provisions of the new Drivers License Law, effective May 23, 1957, which sets up new provisions for licensing of minors in certain cases.

Under this law, no minor under 14 years of age can secure a license to drive either a car or ride a motorcycle or scooter. Minors between the ages of 14 and 16 may secure a special restricted combination operators and commercial operator license for the purpose of riding motorcycles, motor scooters or motorized bicycles whose horsepower does not exceed 5-horsepower. To secure such a license, all the minor has to do is to fill out a standard drivers license application form, signed by himself and an authorized parent or guardian, pass the standard examination for the issuance of a Texas Operator's License and pay the statutory fee of \$3.

Two avenues re open to minors 14 to 16 years of age for drivers license to drive cars. One is to present a certificate showing satisfactory completion of a driver training course approved by the Texas Education Agency. The other is to secure approval of a minor's emergency application for drivers license from the Texas Department of Public Safety. Under the old law, such applications had to be approved by the county judge. In either case, the applicant is required to pass the standard driver examination.

There is no provision in the law whereby a minor under 14 years of age can secure a driver license of any sort, Officer Cawyer pointed out.

FEED COMPANY MOVES

The Devil's River Feed Co. owned by James Baggett, has nearly completed moving its stock and equipment to the new location in the old wool warehouse, the Owens building, at the corner of the highway intersection. The enlarged quarters will give the feed firm much more space for stocks of feeds and ranch supplies. It has been operating in the Meinecke building across from the post-office.

County Made Census Division In New Plan

In a joint program with the state of Texas and each of its counties, the Bureau of the Census is establishing areas known as "Census County Divisions for use in statistical reporting. James R. Kirby, a member of the Census staff, reported here last week. Mr. Kirby was here conferring with county officials and soliciting their advice regarding the proposed area for Crockett county.

Because Crockett county has a population less than the average size of most census county divisions, and because there is only one trading center in the county, Crockett county will consist of but one census county division, to be known as Ozona.

Mr. Kirby gave assurance that the county division setup by the Bureau of the Census would not in any way interfere or change the justice or commissioner precincts in the county.

Week-End Slow Rains Soak Wide West Texas Area

Ranch lands wettest in ten years; heavy falls south

More slow rains beginning the past weekend without let-up for four days added another most generous helping of moisture to the already well soaked West Texas ranch lands to make this area the wettest in more than a decade.

Rains of flood proportions hit a section of the southern part of Crockett county, the Wayne West ranch reporting a five-inch rain which put Devil's river on a big rise and closed the Ozona - Del Rio road from high water for a time. A heavy shower also fell about ten miles west of Ozona Sunday to make small draws run and to put water over Highway 290 in several places for a time.

The four-day total in Ozona was 68 of an inch but reports from surrounding ranches put the drizzle total up to around 1.50 for the total fall.

More but lighter drizzle returned Wednesday after a let-up Tuesday afternoon and heavy clouds and high humidity continued with its promise of even more moisture.

Two High School Girls Injured In Car-Truck Crash South Of Ozona

Two Ozona High School girls, Sally Baggett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Baggett, and Diane Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Phillips, were injured Saturday afternoon when the car in which they were riding was side-swiped by a dump truck on Highway 169 about four miles south of Ozona.

The girls were on their way to a fishing party on Devil's River in the Phillips car driven by Diane. The dump truck pulled across in front of the Phillips car as the girls attempted to pass it. The resulting crash badly damaged both the car and the truck.

Miss Baggett suffered a deep cut on her forehead which required surgery. A section of skin was nearly severed from her forehead and physicians were doubtful for a time that it would heal without grafting. However, midweek reports indicated that healing was in progress. Miss Phillips suffered a cut across her nose and both girls were severely shaken. The truck driver was unhurt.

Camey will drill a 1,500-foot cable tool wildcat in Crockett County, 17 miles northwest of Ozona. It will be the No. 1 W. E. West.

Operators are to begin immediately. Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 350 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of 2-Runnels est.

The project is 1/2-mile northeast of a 1 1/2-mile southeast extension to the Midway Lane field, but separated by dry holes.

Dr. Stanley Jones To Conduct Ozona Mission Nov. 17-22

World Renowned Evangelist, Missionary To Speak Twice Daily

A Spiritual Life Mission will be conducted in Ozona, November 17-22, by Dr. E. Stanley Jones, under the sponsorship of the Ozona Methodist Church, according to announcement by the Rev. Leroy Russell, pastor.

Dr. Jones is probably the best-known Methodist evangelist, missionary, and author of the world. This year he is observing the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of his evangelistic and missionary work in India. Though he was officially retired in 1954, Dr. Jones spends six months of each year in the eastern hemisphere, mainly Japan and India, and six months in America in evangelistic work, conducting Ashrams, and in the promotion of greater unity among Christians of all faiths.

Dr. Jones has written over twenty books, some of which have been on the best-seller list. His first major work was "Christ of the Indian Road." A number of his books have been written as daily devotional guides with a page for each day for a year. His latest book, "Christian Maturity," was published in September. A commitment of his books will be here during the Mission, for sale to the public, by the Methodist Church Librarian, Mrs. J. A. Fuesell.

Paul Fulwider, Minister of Music of First Methodist Church, Austin, will lead the congregational singing during the Mission.

Services will be held in the Methodist Church on Sunday, November 17, at 11:00 a. m., and 7:30 p. m. Evening services will be held Monday through Friday, in the High School Auditorium, 7:30 p. m. Morning services will be held at the Methodist Church at 10:00 a. m., Monday through Friday.

Plans are being made by the Methodist Commission on Membership and Evangelism, Mrs. Ralph Jones, chairman, for distributing bulletins describing the Mission throughout Ozona next Sunday afternoon, November 10. Members of all faiths and all races will be invited to attend the Mission. Visitors from near-by towns are anticipated for the services.

NO BRAKES!

Despite the assurances of Treasury officials that the \$275 billion Federal debt ceiling will not be punctured — even by sputnik — all other indications point to bigger and better Government spending and an all-out Administration drive to make economy a dirty word.

The \$38 billion limit on defense spending for the present fiscal year, that former Sec'y Charles E. Wilson tried manfully to preserve, was shattered by President Eisenhower when he told his press conference that the figure would probably be increased by something over \$400 million.

J. Sinclair Armstrong, an Assistant Secretary of the Navy, speaking in New York, was even more frank and described the spending limits to which Mr. Wilson was so dedicated as "but interim figures, stepping stones, if you will, on the road to very much larger appropriations and budgets for defense."

Asked whether he would be able to keep within the anticipated \$70 billion total expenditure for the fiscal year beginning next July, the President said he could not predict, but "would think it would require very serious retentions elsewhere."

However, there are no signs of "retentions," serious or otherwise on the Washington horizon.

Even in our most outrageous extravagance, foreign aid, the word is that the spending must be bigger and better. Unless the humble citizens back home can persuade their Congressmen between now and New Year's that the extra defense billions must be squeezed out of useless and wasteful Federal bureaus — notably the International Cooperation Administration and the US Information Agency — there will be no retarding done. In short, our Government will have no brakes!

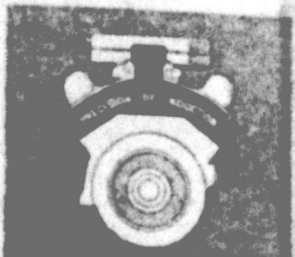

Ozona Junior High Cubs Rack Up Three Wins In Row Over Eldorado, Iraan and Big Lake

In a make-up game with Big Lake that was played here last Saturday morning, the Ozona Cubs came through as had been expected all year and played a pretty good game to win 34 to 0 from the boys of Big Lake.

The seventh and eighth grade boys from Big Lake had the ball most of the game but were unable to score. In fact they made only 100 yards net all morning in 39 tries at the Ozona line. The Cubs had the ball only 21 times and made a total of 327 yards. The difference was the play that goes all the way as did the Cubs.

A remarkable demonstration of running was turned in by Carl Montgomery as he carried the ball three times and gained a total of 154 yards. The distance from the goal determined the length of his run. He turned in two touchdown runs of 70 and 64 and then he was not allowed to carry the ball any more that day.

To open the scoring in the early part of the first quarter Carnes from the quarterback spot rolled out to his right and went 24 yards to score. This run was followed by the two by Montgomery and the half ended with the Cubs out front 20 to 0.

In an attempt to hold the score down Coaches Lewis and Womack replaced as many starters as possible with reserves. Martin moved to quarterback and immediately rolled out around the right side for another score, then later in the game received a pass from Carnes for a 65 yard-touchdown. The ball traveled 35 yards in the air.

Three of the Ozona backfield gained more yardage than the total output of the Iraan boys. Iraan gained only 51 yards from scrimmage in 19 attempts while Freeman picked up 52 yards on 16 tries and Parker had 110 on 7 carries and Ybarra had 137 in 10 attempts.

For the Cubs, Freeman attempted four passes, completed three of them for a total of 111 yards, two of them going for touchdowns. Two of these passes were to Parker, one good for 52 yards and a TD and the other good for 44 yards and a TD. The other Ozona TD came as a result of a 75 yard TD run by George Ybarra.

To open the game the Cubs took the ball on their own thirty and started goalward only to fumble in deep Iraan territory. Iraan then took over and started a drive that ended in a score in the early part of the second quarter. The Cubs took the kickoff and again started a drive that ended on the Iraan 1 foot line as the buzzer ended the first half.

One of the prettiest runs of the afternoon was a 74 yard dash by Ybarra that was called back because of over eagerness by one of the Cubs.

Twenty-five boys played in the contest with twelve of them having credit for two or more tackles.

Cubs 7 — Eldorado 6 October 24

The seventh and eighth grade boys of Eldorado came to Ozona Oct. 24th to play the Cubs of Ozona and went home with the score 7 to 6 in favor of the Cubs.

This was the first game for the Cubs since Oct. 3rd, and the first of the year for the seventh and eighth grade boys. They played this one without the services of one or two starters who were out with the flu.

Eldorado led in first downs with six to three for the Cubs but the Cubs were tight with yards when their goal line was in danger.

After an exchange of fumbles to start the game the Cubs started a drive from the fifty yard line only to fumble on the Eldorado one yard line to end the threat. One first down later Jim Runge, quarterback of the Eldorado boys rolled out around left end for 85 yards and a TD only to have it called back for clipping.

In the latter part of the third quarter Carl Montgomery ran 87 yards around right end for a touchdown and then went around the same right end for the extra point which was the margin of victory as Eldorado took the kickoff following and went 80 yards in 15 plays to score from the one yard line. In the try for the all-important extra point L. D. Long broke through to stop the ball carrier behind the line.

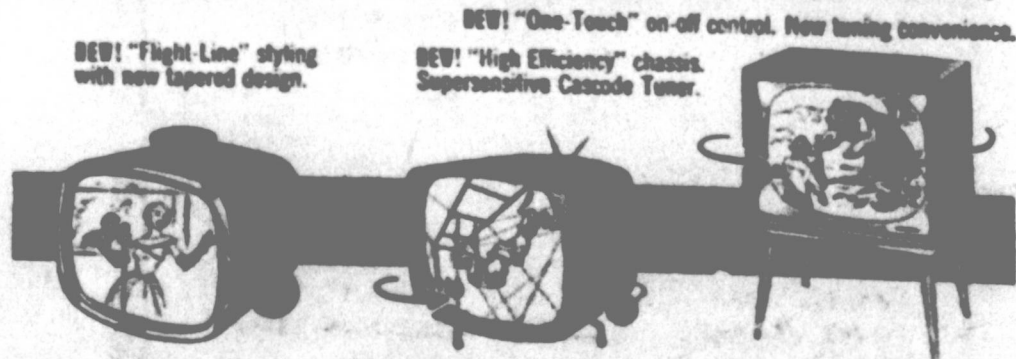



Ducks and geese are here! The hunting season opens one-half hour before sunrise on Friday, November 1. Duck season ends Jan. 14; geese season Dec. 30. All shooting must end one-half hour after sunset, daily.

This is the real beginning of Fall, football notwithstanding. When those honkers pass over in formation, we know winter is just around the corner. It won't be long until the frost is on the pumpkin.

If you are a novice at duck hunting there are a few fundamentals you should know.

First, you must get your hunting license, which costs \$3.15. Next get your Federal duck stamp, which costs \$2, and attach the stamp to the license. If caught without these you are out of luck.

Still another law is just as important. You must have your shotgun, not larger than 10 gauge, plugged to hold not more than three shots. And don't shoot from a motor boat. That's against the law.

With these rules complied with you may kill five ducks and six geese a day. You can have 10 ducks, but only six geese, in your possession at one time. You also can kill 10 coot and eight Wilson's snipe in one day. Possession is one day's bag.

Year 'round Fishing

Rains of the past week have muddied most of the Texas streams. Top-water fishing has been badly affected. With deep-topping plugs some big bass have been taken from the lower depths. There'll be rapid turnovers in the lakes now with the advent of cool weather. After settling there should be some excellent top-water fishing again. Meantime sandies and crappie are being taken in great numbers in most of the lakes.

Texas are lucky that they can fish throughout the year. In fact some of the best crappie and sand bass fishing is during the months of December and January. There was a big natural spawn of both this year.

A Few Warnings

A word of warning. Be sure when you take your outboard motor

off the boat now, that it is properly drained. Water left in the motor might freeze and crack the cylinder.

Also, remember, it is getting dark earlier each evening and will continue to do so until mid-December. This means on your return to camp you should start early enough to get in before dark.

Shooting Preserves

More hunters each year are taking advantage of shooting preserves to get their quail and pheasants. Texas now has several of these preserves. They are stocked with pen raised birds. The landowners permit shooting for fees. Some of them charge by the day. Others by the birds killed. In either event the total cost of a hunt with the bag limit filled might be less on one of these places than you would expect.

Game wardens and in most instances the sporting goods stores, know where there is one of these preserves close to you. Check into it.
