Gas in Area Crockett Located in Only 8 Mi. Opener

John I. Moore Finals Shannon Field Pumper

John I. Moore, et al, have completed a producer in the Shannon (San Andres) field, 27 miles northwest of Ozona. It is the No. 1-6 Shannon, finalized for a daily pumping potential of 66.64 barrels of 29 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 150-1. Production was through perforations between 2,398-2,414 feet and 2,428-431 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing cemented at 2,457 feet on total depth of 2,459 feet. Top of pay was picked at 2,398 feet, elevation unreported. Pay section was fractured with 30,000 gallons. Location is 1,821 feet from the north and 1,374 feet from the west lines of 6-FF-J. H. Edwards survey.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 34-GG-Archer csl. The project is 1 1/2 miles west-northwest of Permian production in the field.

Aliens Required To Report Address To U.S. Each Year In January

District Director, Harlon B. Carter, of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, San Antonio, estimated today that 150,000 aliens will report their address in the District during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program. The Immigration official said that 149,462 aliens reported their address during January 1957. Mr. Carter said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status, foreign representatives of certain international organizations and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, are required to file the address report. He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be fined up to \$200, imprisoned for 30 days, and deported. In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their address to the Service within 10 days after their return. The District Director, Harlon B. Carter, said that address report cards will be available at the Immigration Service office at Post Office Building, 615 East Houston Street, San Antonio, Texas, and local United States post offices beginning January 1, 1958.

Slow Falling Moisture Will Speed Weed Growth

Santa came a day early for West Texas ranchmen, to bring the most wanted gift of all, rain, to the range land. Slow falling moisture returned to the area Christmas Eve morning as the aftermath of a mild cold front which swept over the state. The reaction to the Christmas week front was in sharp contrast to one the previous week which brought high winds and dust to the area and sweeping back all promise of moisture for the moment. Winds shifted to the south and moisture from the gulf had poured across the state for several days prior to the entry of the front, a combination which often brings rain. Had the front been cold enough it might have spelled a white Christmas for West Texas, as the moisture turned to snow, but the ranch country was well pleased with the warm rain that came just as need for it was beginning to be felt in this long drought ridden area, rescued, at least temporarily, by drought breaking rains of 1957. The new moisture will speed the growth of winter weeds and grass, further promising ranchmen the gift of a feed-free winter for sheep and goats and further brightening an already bright promise of a good spring. OPERATION "BOOTSTRAP"

Hand in hand with reports from the Departments of Commerce and of Labor that employment had dropped and unemployment increased abnormally during the month of November came unanimous adoption by delegates to the AFL-CIO convention of a resolution demanding more pay, shorter hours and still more "benefits" in 1958.

The resolution vote disposed finally of the statesmanlike gesture of President William Gray of the Building and Construction Trades Department who had proposed earlier that Labor join the fight against inflation and recession by voluntarily adopting a one-year wage freeze. The decision of the 1,200 delegates, taken at the conclusion of Walter Reuther's only major speech to the convention was a fearsome demonstration of his ability to convince a multitude that black is white, and suggested as well that Mr. Meany is likely to remain titular head of the AFL-CIO as long as Mr. Reuther wants him to be.

Rather than ignoring or belittling the ominous employment trend Mr. Reuther pointed to rising unemployment and inflationary pri-

ces as indications of the need for higher wages that would boost purchasing power! Thus, both employers and workers — union workers, that is — will be able to spend themselves rich. A shorter work week will make it easier for the workers to do this, of course. Just how the majority of us — who are not regimented, who will not be getting more take-home pay and who will be paying for the new wage hike in the price of whatever we are able to buy — Mr. Reuther did not spell out. But he did insist that it was sheer nobility, patriotism and concern for the welfare of all that prompted him to demand still more money for doing still less.

"We go there (to the bargaining table) mindful of our broad, economic and social responsibilities," he declaimed. "American labor understands very well that we cannot make progress nor can we find the answers to our problems in an economic or social vacuum — that we can solve our problems only as we work with other people in the community in finding answers to the problems of all the people."

So you see — it's just us "other people" that aren't very bright.

LIBERTY OR LICENSE?

Decision of the State Department to lift the passports of the 42 defiant youngsters who went from the Moscow youth congress

to tour Red China as guests of that unrecognized forbidden land, is raising the question of the Department's authority. In short, can a US citizen go where he pleases? The only court ruling on the subject says that he can, but subject to "reasonable regulation under the law."

No doubt there will soon be further litigation to clear up this double-talk. But it seems to us it will be an unhappy development if the courts should hold that our Constitutional freedom is global in scope. The interest and welfare of the whole people should be safeguarded from irresponsible adventurers whose actions, or disappearance or demise in Communist lands could conceivably threaten our uneasy peace.

As for our young travellers who have precipitated this whole situation, they may never want to see a passport again.

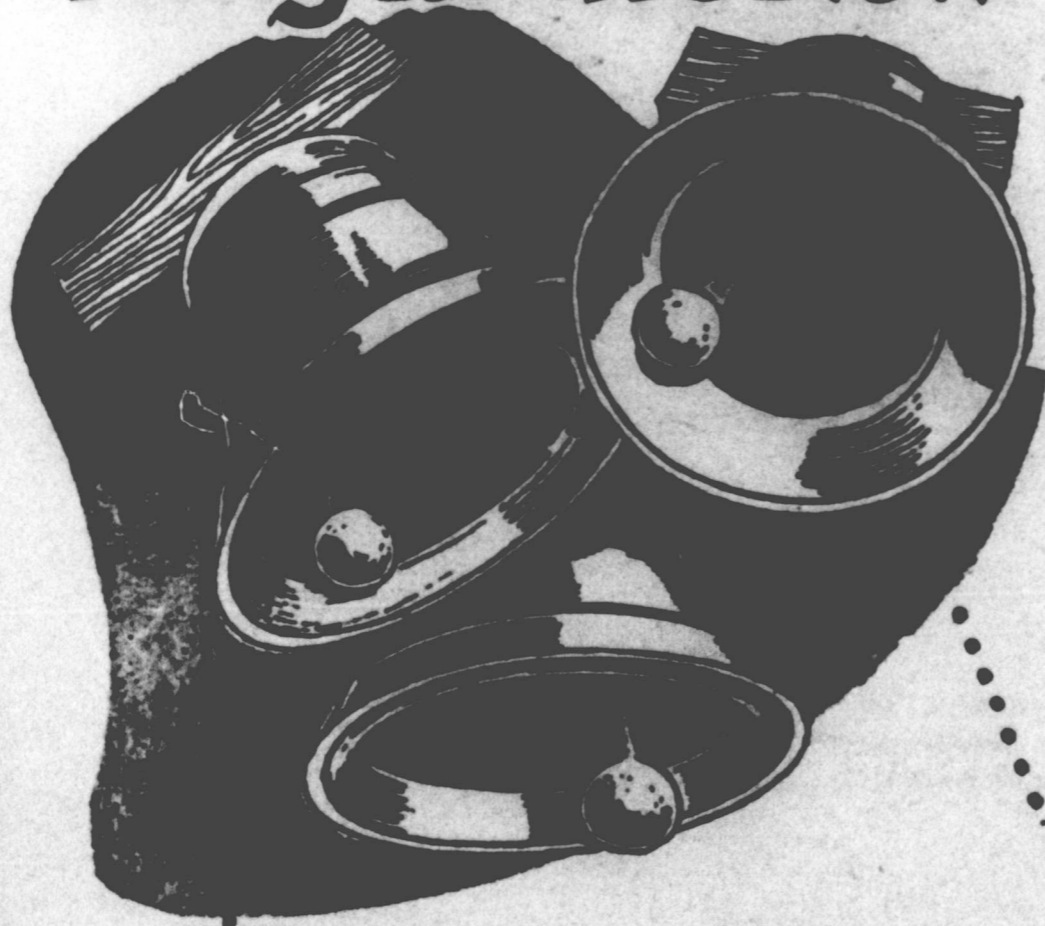

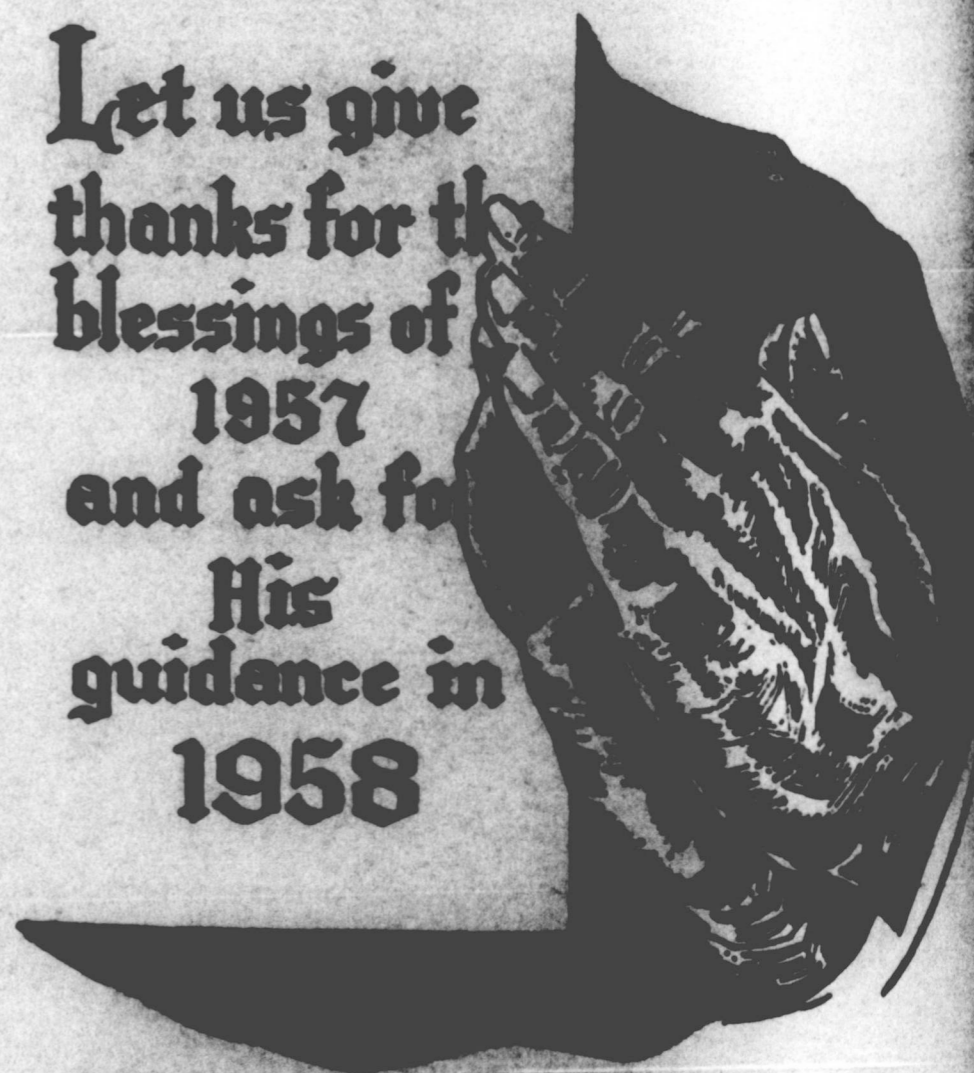

declared Gov. Price Daniel shortly
after taking office. Over strong
opposition, he pushed the insur-
ance reorganization bill through
the Legislature. It enabled him to
appoint new officials to the battle-
scarred department.

5. Cox Convicted — Things talk-
ed about for years erupted into
the open with the sensational re-
signation, indictment and convic-
tion of Rep. James E. Cox of Con-
gress. A tape recording of a con-
versation between Cox and a Na-
turopathic Association leader was
the prime evidence used to back
up a charge that Cox had agreed
to accept a \$5,000 bribe. This pro-
vided extra fuel for the reform
drive. A code of ethics and lobby
registration laws were passed.

6. New Segregation Laws—East
Texas legislators put plenty of
steam behind proposals designed
to preserve local authority over
school segregation. Futile filli-
busters caused delays, but five
bills were passed. They'll probably
be in the news again as opponents
bring them to tests in courts.

7. Oil Sags — Violent fluctua-
tions in Texas oil production gave
everyone the jitters. Pressure from
the Suez Canal crisis forced pro-
duction allowable to an all-time
high of 18 producing days in
March. But Suez reopened and
foreign oil came flooding back in-
to the U. S. A. Texas' allowable
had tumbled to 13 producing days
by July, skidded to an all-time
low of 12 in September. President's
order for voluntary import cuts
brought some hope.

8. Raids — Attorney General
WHI Wilson padlocked Galveston
gambling houses with less reper-
cussion on the Pleasure Isle's ec-
onomy than expected. Latest Wil-
son raids rounded up naturopaths
on charges of violating the Medi-
cal Practices Act.

9. Run-Offs Decried — Almost
forgotten now is the furor over
the Pool Bill to require a run-off
in special elections. Ralph Yar-

borough became junior U. S. sen-
ator in an old-style one-shot elec-
tion. Then the Legislature passed
a bill requiring run-off elections
in the future.

10. Money Shortage — It didn't
make black headlines, but it trou-
bled men in high places. By the
end of second special session, the
Legislature had scraped the bot-
tom of the state treasury. Com-
ptroller predicted the state would
be \$12,000,000 in the red by 1959.
Depressed oil, a prime tax source,
and extra sessions contributed to
the problem. But most people a-
greed that Texas was bursting its
fiscal seams from inevitable
growth. A special Tax Study Com-
mission is studying the issue over-
all. Observers say new taxes are
unavoidable.

Giles Parole Denied — Former
Land Commissioner Bascom Giles
faces another year in the State
Prison at Huntsville. The Board
of Pardons voted 2 to 1 against
recommending clemency. More
than 100 Austin Citizens, four
ministers and Giles' family pre-
sented pleas to the board.

Giles began serving a six-year
term for his part in veterans land
program frauds in January, 1956.
As a model prisoner and trusty,
he can complete the sentence by
January, 1959. His case has come
up twice for review by the Par-
dons Board. Each time it has been
rejected on grounds a pardon
might "depreciate the seriousness
of the offense."

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Dec. 27, 1928

Santa Claus may drive his reindeer in the frozen north, but when he comes to the sheep and cattle country he mounts a seasoned cowpony and kicks up a cloud of dust as he races over West Texas prairies. At any rate, that's how he arrived in Ozona Monday night to officiate at the Lions Club Community Christmas tree in the city park. And, old as he must be, Old Santa can dig a mean spur into a leathery flank.

A nightwatchman to guard the business section of Ozona against fire, thieves and robbers may soon be employed through cooperative action of business men of the town and the Commissioners Court.

A big Lincoln sedan, valued at \$5,000, belonging to W. J. Grimmer of the Grimmer Motor Co., was destroyed by fire between Eldorado and Sonora Tuesday. The body of the car, which was made of aluminum, was melted into a shapeless mass, but the motor and trunk rack on the rear were not damaged. The fire, of undetermined origin, started under the front seat of the car. Mr. Grimmer, with an employe, had gone to Eldorado to pick up a new Ford car.

The first meeting of the committee of forty appointed at the recent C. B. Hudspeth ranch party to consider ways and means of diminishing the ten million dollar loss from the blowfly in Texas each year, has been called by Roy Aldwell, the chairman, to meet in Sonora at 2 p. m. on Jan. 3.

F. M. Richards, president of the Brady National Bank, has refused an offer of \$62.50 per head for his 100 steer calves and is to carry them over.

The new predatory animal bill to be presented to the Texas legislature in January, provides for

a \$100,000 appropriation for the predatory animal and rodent control work in the state.

The day when the prairie dog will be as extinct in Texas as the dodo bird was pictured here this week by L. C. Whitehead, leader, rodent control, U. S. Bureau of Biological Survey, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. An appropriation of \$15,000 in Texas will be sought to extend the work, he said. Max Schneemann, appointed by the Crockett Commissioners Court to handle eradication efforts in this county, has the sizable task of eliminating the prairie dog from 10,000 acres estimated to be infested in this county.



There is an old saying about winter fishing separating the men and the boys. The men stay home by the fire and the boys go out.

Well, that isn't exactly true any more. Many Texans have learned that some of the finest fishing is had during the cold months.

Also there is a new kind of fishing. Men work at fishing nowadays. They don't just sit out trot lines or a few cane poles and let the fish do the work.

Today they get in fast boats and whip out across the fine lakes of Texas. They've learned new tricks for making fish hit the bait. Also they have learned how to find these fish.

For instance, right now there is wonderful white bass fishing. They are caught trolling and with minnows, still fishing. Most of the fun, however, is in following the gulls to find these fish.

Follow the Gulls

This is an old trick on the coast. Fishermen down there for years have followed the gulls, especially in finding trout schools. Now they are doing the same thing on Texas lakes.

It is necessary to have a rugged boat and a motor with enough power to put you there in a hurry. The custom is to work around the lake until you find a flock of gulls. Watch them and you'll find a place where you can load the boat down with these sandies.

As a rule one gull flies low over the water. When the white bass start chasing shad on the shad surface, the fun begins.

Other gulls nearby watch this searcher and when they see it has found the shad, they all join in and swoop down on the water.

That's the time you want to drop anchor and start jigging. Some call it jigging and others have still other names for it. Anyway, the process is simple. With a good spoon like the Dixie Jet, or the Abu spinner, you want a light action rod, capable of responding to the lightest action on the part of the fish.

Using Spinning Reels

Perhaps spinning equipment is best for this purpose. I personally use a Mitchell reel, with a 6 1/2 foot Mitchell spinning rod, with a 6 pound monofilament line. One of my fishing buddies uses one of those new free-spooling Ambassador reels, also produced by Garcia.

We drop our lures to the bottom, reel them back a turn or two and then start a tantalizing vibration of the rod, by raising and lowering the tip slightly, mostly with wrist movement. Sandies strike on the down movement of the lure. For that reason if your upward movement is too quick or severe you'll probably lose your fish.

With a little practice you can tell very easily when the fish has taken the lure. He'll telegraph you when he's ready and then you have a nice fight on your hands with this light equipment.

We mentioned the above equipment so that you will have some idea of tackle most suitable for this type of fishing. This same tackle also is very good for sand bass fishing in fast water, such as you'll find below our dams in Texas.

While some of this fishing also is done with spoons, this is a fine place for free minnow fishing. Use a bubble some 18 inches above your hook, with enough water-weight to carry it out.

Of course many fishermen sit on the banks with cane poles and use worms or drag spoons through the swift running water. Some of these catch fine strings of the whites or sandies.

Texas has a limit of 25 on sand bass. Oklahoma doesn't consider it a game fish and has revoked the limit. Still the fishermen are not able to catch them all.

Every large impoundment in Texas now has sand bass. They are lots of fun to catch.

Fishing for Blacks

Of course black bass also can be caught this time of the year. The process is not the same. While there are some plug casters who have just about as much luck in the winter, with top water plugs, as they do in the summer, generally the big ones dive deep and hit hard.

On Lake Texoma a few Sundays

Most of them were around a pound and a half, but some went as much as two pounds.

Some other Texoma fishermen have found they can use heavy salt water equipment, with Hellbenders or similar lures. These lures run real deep. With the heavy equipment the fisherman can jerk them loose from brush in the bottom of the lakes. They don't catch too many small fish, but occasionally they come up with some big lunkers.

A new lure also has been made by the Hellbender people. It is

called a stinger.

It looks like a long worm, with hooks in it. This usually is strung behind a Hellbender or similar plug, and not worked too fast. Cast it toward the shore and pull it out close to the bottom.

Here is a word of caution, how-

ever. A bass will take hold of the tail end of this lure and slowly suck it back into his big mouth. Don't jerk too quick. Be sure he's swallowed it.

This artificial worm is a wonderful lure for either summer or winter fishing, if worked right.

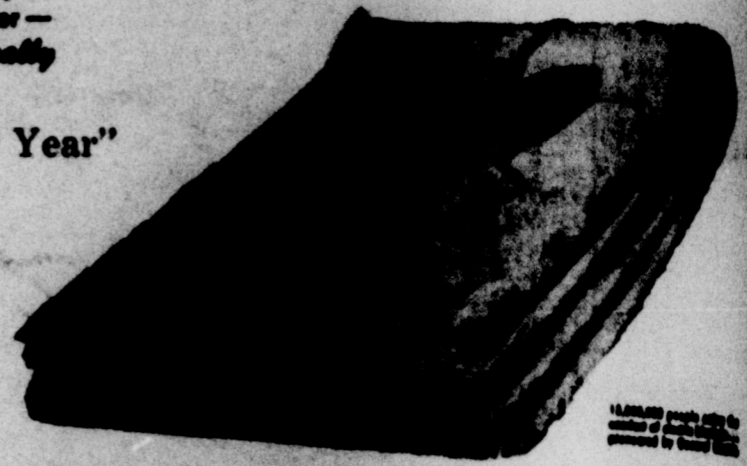

CONSERVATION NOTES —

Proper Management Of Range Essential For Brush Control Results

By Dick Ketchum, SCS

Brush control is practiced to eliminate the competition between the undesirable brush and the desirable forage. Although some types of brush are considered to be good forage, the grasses are three times as efficient users of water as are the woody species. In the climax condition most of the ranges of Texas were predominantly covered with grasses and

forbs, and the woody plants were in the minority.

Before brush control is to be practiced, there are several factors that should be considered: first, is the operation economically feasible; second, is there a satisfactory method of control; third, is there a maintenance problem; fourth, is there a possibility of natural control by plant competition; fifth, is there a possibility of producing forage at a satisfactory level with the existing stand of woody vegetation; and last the most important consideration of all, will the range be properly managed? Brush control without proper management will not pay

a return on the investment. Proper management may be considered to be that management necessary to establish a high producing perennial grass on the brush. There is little to be gained by brush control followed by grazing which will result in destruction of that last remaining seed source that was formerly protected by the woody plants. Proper management must be considered before brush control is practiced as well as after. If pasture does not have a sufficient seed crop upon it, the pasture should be deferred until the

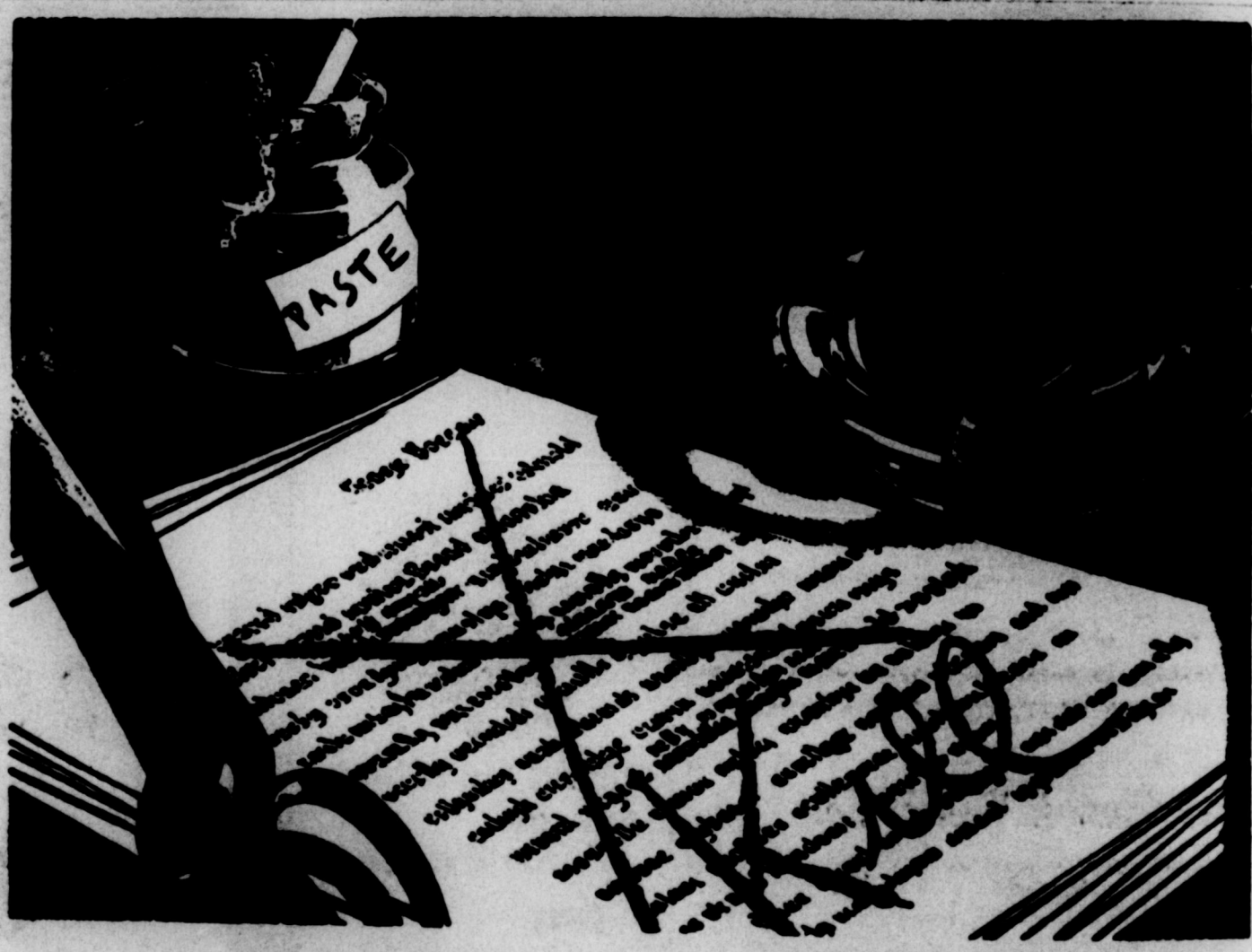

Right now most of us are putting our rifles away for a long time. We've been through a successful big game season, with more deer, antelope and javelinas killed in Texas than for many years. All have been in good condition.

Chances are you have a big bore rifle. It may be an ordinary lever action, a converted military model or a new model bolt or semi-automatic. Whatever it is, it deserves the best treatment you can give it.

If you've already sacked it away without a good cleaning job, then for your gun's sake, stop reading right now and clean that fowling piece.

While it is true that today's ammunition is loaded with non-corrosive primers, there still is residue in the barrel, and sweat marks on the outside. All must be removed. Run a good oil patch through the barrel, then give the gun a rundown with a good gun oil, like Hoppe's, or with a silicon cloth.

If you store your gun in a case, be sure there is no moisture in the case, or that no sweating is possible. Otherwise you may come up with a ruined gun. Finding rust flecks on a favorite gun isn't a comfortable feeling.

Store for Safety

Storage of your gun is just as important. Every man would like to have a good metal or even a knotty pine gun cabinet. But not every man can. Some keep their guns behind the bedroom door. Others keep them sitting in the corner. But mostly they are stored in closets.

All this is dangerous, especially where there are children.

If you are one who keeps a gun in your closet, then be sure it is cased, and that no ammunition is left around. A child simply cannot resist the temptation of playing with a gun, or trying to insert cartridges in one.

Game Warden Can Help You

Incidentally, the game warden is a good friend of the outdoorsman. He can be of great help to you in finding good places to hunt and fish.

Usually he and your county agent will know landowners who don't object to reasonable shoot-

ing. They'll even let you fish on their places if you ask them the right way.

These game wardens are very human persons. They are good citizens of your community and will be glad to help you every way they can.

You can help them, too. If you know someone who is killing game illegally, tip off the warden. If you have a question about the game laws, talk with him about it. That way there will be a much better understanding all around.

Time for Trotlines

If you are a catfisherman, now's the time to begin getting your lines ready.

If your line was used much during the last season, it may be pretty rotten by now. More than likely most of your stageons have become rotted. Perhaps your hooks also are dull or rusted. Clean them up, and put on new stageons.

REMINDER — Don't forget the suggestion made in this column a few weeks ago. Take out a package or two of flower seeds and scatter them on the banks of the creek. We can have a beautiful countryside this year, with millions of beautiful flowers in the great outdoors.

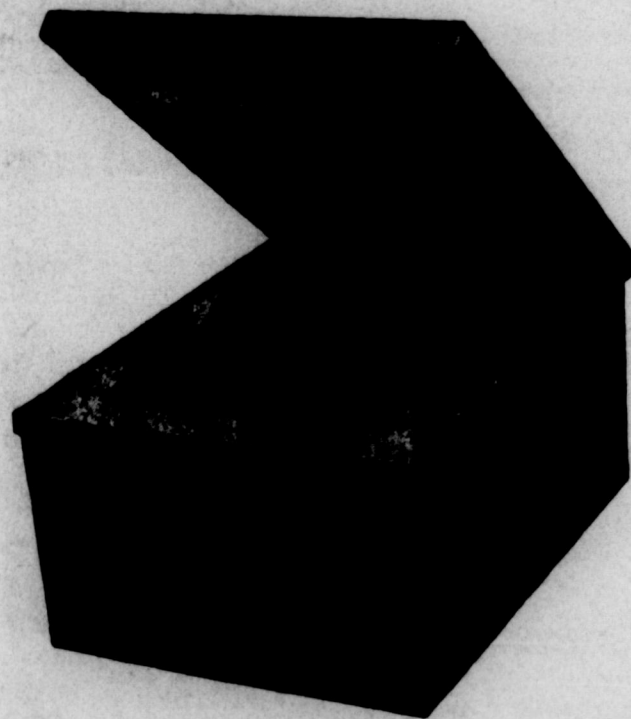

Allen Address Report Low Census Spurt in Citizenship Requests

District Director, Harlan B. Custer, San Antonio, of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their address each January. Throughout the United States, almost thirty percent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. Mr. Custer attributes this sudden rise to the Allen Address Report Program.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats, those accredited to certain international organizations and those who have entered temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.
