

LAND FORFEITURES ARE POSTPONED

THAT HE DOES NOT KNOW FOR HOW LONG

Clerk Dunagan gave us a letter last week, written by Commissioner J. T. Robison. A week or two before we published Mr. Robison's telegram stating that forfeitures had been indefinitely postponed, and his letter to Mr. Dunagan is a confirmation of this telegram. We publish it, as follows: Dear Sir:

Having ascertained something about the money stringency and how utterly impossible it is for parties owning land to get the money with which to pay their interest, I am writing you this to say that I am not going to forfeit and place on the market land advertised to be forfeited and for sale January 1st even if the interest on it is not paid.

Please 'phone or write to all the banks in your county and to such other persons as you may desire and especially to local newspapers.

I do not know when forfeitures will be declared but the people will be given ample time before that event in which to get their money for payments here. I do not believe the Government should take the land from the people during a time of distress. They should be encouraged to knew that the Government will try to protect them in time of need.



Under our present system, this wealth, actually produced for the most part on the farms of the Agricultural West, flows to the big banks in Chicago and New York, then much of it to Europe, where it is lost to us for years, when a great part of it should immediately be employed in making possible the farm production on which this nation depends for its most vital needs and in safeguarding the prosperous continuance of that

process of production. As remedial measures for our prostrated farming industry, immediate and future, we might well reestablish the War Finance Corporation to assist in the financing of exports. This government has got to devise some plan to open foreign markets immediately to our grain and meat products. And the Federal Farm Loan Board should have authority to issue and sell in the open market short time securities based on warehouse receipts, also on an adequate pledge where the title must remain with the producer, until his products are marketed; these securities to be acceptable for re-discount by the Federal Reserve Banks.

Whatever the outcome of this credit crisis, in which American farmers face bankruptcy, the value of the present lesson must not be lost. It

The feeding value of grain sorghum has been determined by the Texas Experiment Station by digestion experiments and by feeding experiments, corn. The Experiment Station is now feeding out 45 head of steers at Substation No. 7 near Spur, one of the objects of which is to determine the profitableness of marketing grain sorghum on the hoof. The utilization of grain sorghum in this manner, also enables the cattlemen to market his cattle with high finish. Accordingly, both cattlemen and crop formers are watching this experiment with unusual interest, making regular visits to the feed lot.

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

TARIFF INTERESTS TEXAS GATTLEMEN

MANY EXPECTED TO ATTEND SOUTHERN TARIFF CON-GRESS JAN. 27-29

That a large attendance of cattlemen at the second tariff congress, to be held at Atlanta Jan. 27, 28 and 29, may be expected, is indicated by the letters received at Ft. Worth headquarters of the organization from leading stockmen throughout the Southwest, it was announced last Monday. The interest of cattle raisers in the tariff question probably exceeds that of any other class of producers, according to J. A. Arnold, manager of the Southern Tariff Association, who has been recently in New York and Wahhington.

"The next Congress will be confronted with the most monumental task of raising revenue that ever fell to any congress," Mr. Arnold said, "and apart from the question of raising revenues is that of protecting our industries from world competition when peace conditions prevail.

"Cattle raising is one of our largest industries and one to which the least consideration is given. The cattle upon the farms and ranches of Texas come in direct competition with those of South America and Australia. A beef carcass can be shipped from Buenos Aires to our Eastern seaports as cheaply as it can be shipped from Texas to the Eastern cities. South America has cheap land and free grass, and ignorant natives are available for labor. The difference in cost of production in South America and in Texas must be equalized by a tariff or living conditions on Texas farms and ranches must seek the South American level. according to the best thought of those who have given this matter serious study and consideration.

"The amount involved in the difference in the cost of production in the two countries is approximately \$10 a head, and every farmer and ranchman can multiply the number of head of cattle he possesses and get the difference between South America and Texas civilization. Under normal conditions we carry approximately 8,000,000 head of cattle upon the farms and ranches of Texas.
