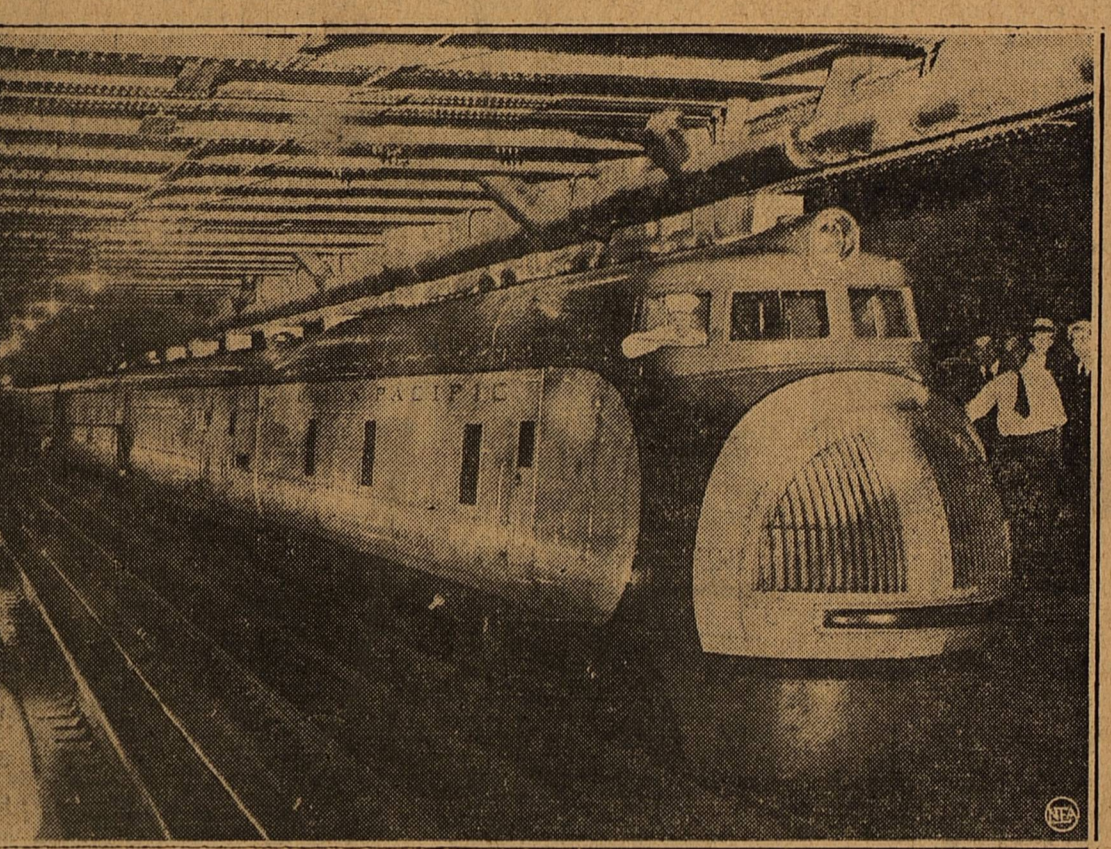

Mary Margaret McBride tells how one woman solves this vexing problem:

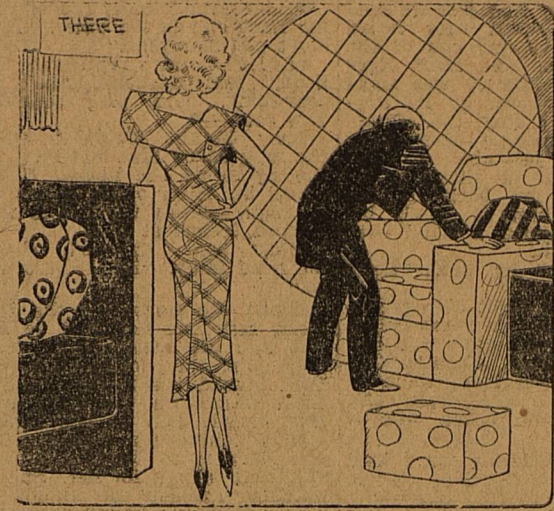

Mrs. Hutchins is no mere theorist about the dining-guest-room combination. She has one of them in her own home.

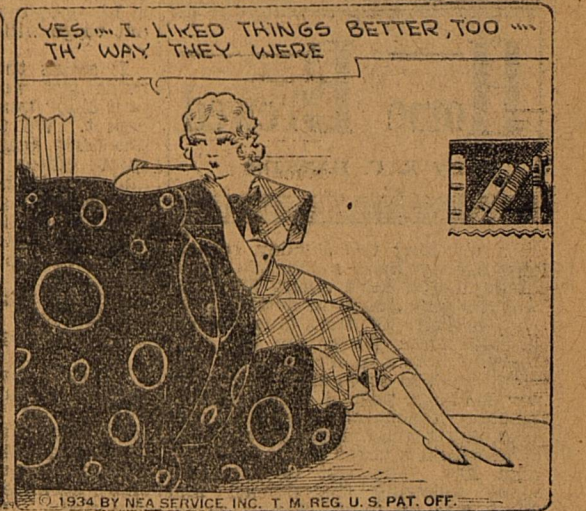
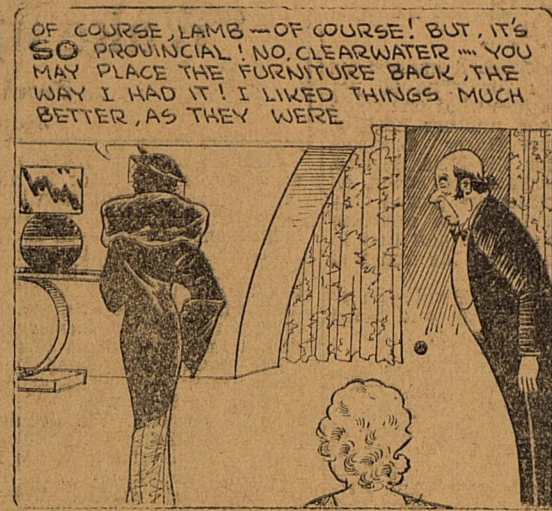
