Has Rough Crossing On Long Trip From Fiji BULLETIN

HONOLULU, Oct. 29, (U.R)—Kingsford-Smith and Capt. P. S. Taylor landed the Lady Southern Cross at 10:55 a. m. (PST), on the second phase of their flight from Australia to California. They made the long sea hop in 24 hours and 54 minutes from the Fiji islands.

Following the addresses, court was adjourned in respect to him and to his family. A resolution was submitted and passed, and a copy will be published Tuesday by The Reporter-Telegram.



### OFFICERS MASS IN GREAT MANHUNT

GREAT MANHUNT

DICKENS, Oct. 29. (P).—Scores of West Texas peace officers massed on the Plains between Clairemont and Snyder Sunday night in the search for Virgil Staleup, desperado under sentences totaling 254 years, and Clarence Brown, his killer companion, slayers of Sheriff W. B. Arthur in the county jail here Saturday.

The hunt swung to that section after a previous report that the sheriff's automobile, used by the killers in their flight, had been found at Wood's Crossing, on the Salt Prong fork of the Brazos river, 20 miles south of Spur, proved erroneous.

Twelve carloads of officers dashed to the spot after receiving information that the machine, covered with dirt, had been located. They hunted fruitlessly for hours and reported that the machine was not in that section.

The story of several boys, who said they saw an automobile resembling that of the slain sheriff's, between Clairemont and Snyder, sent the big posse to that vicinity.

Officers of more than a dozen West Texas counties had been engaged in the manhunt since Sheriff Arthur was felled by a bullet from his own gun as he entered a cell on the second floor of the jail here, where Stalcup and Brown were confined.

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### LAW'S DELAY UNFAIR TO MAN AND SOCIETY

The law's delay has been proverbial since the time of Shakespeare. But—as Mark Twain once remarked en in his views of people and sub-about the weather—although everybody talks about it, jects is the first one to tell you he nobody ever seems to do anything about it.

These delays add a vexing and incalculable element to our administration of criminal justice. They cut two ways—against the interests of society as a whole, and against the rights of men accused of crime.

Consider the case of David A. Lamson, the young

Consider the case of David A. Lamson, the young Stanford University Press executive who was convicted a year ago of murdering his wife, and to whom the California supreme court has just granted a new trial.

Young Lamson's wife was found dead in their home on the morning of Memorial day, 1933. Lamson was accused of killing her and was brought to trial early in the fall. He was convicted and sentenced to hang, and was lodged in a condemned cell at San Overtime. was lodged in a condemned cell at San Quentin prison.

His attorneys prosecuted an appeal, and the case came before the supreme court several weeks ago. In its decision, just handed down, this court orders a new trial, stating that the evidence upon which the young man was convicted was "no stronger than a mere suspicion." Consider the implications of this for a moment.

Here is a man convicted of an atrocious crime on exceedingly flimsy evidence. Such things are bound to happen, occasionally, under the best legal systems; appellate courts exist to correct such mistakes. But think what society has done to this man, in the meantime.

It has confined him in the death house for a solid year—one of the most excruciating bits of mental torture. that can be inflicted on any man.

Our legal system, in other words, was unable to correct an obvious mistake without inflicting an appalling injustice which can never quite be righted.

Now look at it from the other angle—the case where a real criminal is convicted and appeals. In his case, too, there is a long delay. The deterrent effect of his sentence is automatically lessened.

If he awaits execution, he, too, suffers long-drawn mental torture; if convicted of a lesser crime, he may actually be out on bail for a year or more after his sentence, free to repeat the offense for which he was origi-

Either way, this long delay is an intolerable thing. If we are the efficient nation we believe ourselves to be, we should find some way of rushing things so that only

we should find some way of rushing things so that only a few weeks may elapse between sentence and final disposition of the case. The present system is unedurably clumsy.
