WITNESS SAYS HE SPENT EVENING WITH DEFENDANT

Says Fisch Brought Package Prior To Sailing

FLEMINGTON, Feb. 4. (A).-Mrs. Anna Bonesteel, restaurant proprietor, testified this afternoon that Violet Sharpe, carrying a gray blanket, came into her restaurant near Ferry, Yonkers, N. Y., the evening the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped, March 1, 1932.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Feb. 4. (P). Bruno Richard Hauptmann's second important alibi, for the night the \$50,000 futile ransom was paid in the Bronx cemetery, was supported in his trial today by Hans Kloeppenburg who said Hauptmann was at home that night.

Kloeppenburg testified that he was at the home all evening April 2, 1932, the date of the ransom payment, and that he and Hauptmann spent the evening playing the mandolin and the guitar.

He testified also that Isador Fisch came to a farewell party at the Hauptmann home before sailing for Germany, bearing a package fourteen inches long, from five to six inches high and seven to eight inches wide.

Hauptmann had testified that Fisch gave him a shoe box for safe keeping and the box, unknown to him, contained the block of Lindbergh ransom money found in his garage.

Another defense witness, Sebastian Benjamin Lupica, acknowledged that the man he saw in an automobile with a ladder near the Lindbergh home the day the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped, resembled Hauptmann but that he could not identify Hauptmann as the man.

Peter H. Sommer, "surprise" defense witness last week, again insisted that he saw two men and a woman with a blonde baby the night the Lindbergh baby was taken, identifying the picture of Isador Fisch as one of the men.

HAUPTMANN IS PAID VISIT BY HIS SON

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Feb. 4 (P)— Little Mannfried Hauptmann paid a 30-minute visit to his father Sunday—his first since the trial began. The baby emerged gurgling and laugh-

Germany. Italy and Belgium May Be In Alliance

LONDON, Feb. 4. (P).—The British government today invited Germany, Belgium and Italy to join with England and France in a military alli-

ance.

The alliance, agreed to in week end conversations between leaders of the British and French governments, would provide union military air forces by four of these signatories, provided the fifth signatory should suddenly attack one member of the alliance.

At the same time, British and French leaders agreed to support a move for general recognition of Germany's right to rearm, provided Germany returns to the League of Nations.

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FURTHER TRIAL FOR NRA

The policy to be adopted by Congress concerning the form in which NRA will be continued after June 16, when the present Recovery Act expires, continues to engross the attention of American business men. The consensus of a large proportion of opinion is that the present act should be extended temporarily without change. Such a temporary extension, its advocates declare, would give an opportunity for further necessary observation and study of the working of codes of fair

Discussing this proposal, the New York Journal of Commerce said: "Merchants who listened to S. Clay Williams at the banquet of the National Retail Dry Goods Association commended the suggestions he made in relation to a continuance of the codes of the NRA for a year or two more for further experiment and study before throwing it into Congress for revisions. The belief that something of permanent value to industry had been added by the codes has been strong in many places where their advent was unwelcome.'

The NRA from its inception has been carried out on the principle of trial and error. This was emphasized by Mr. Williams when he told the business men in New York that most of the 2-year term provided in the law had to go to the processes of setting up the codes and starting their operation.

"Little time for observation and study and remodeling has been afforded", he continued. "But observation and study and amendment are necessary. Many codes were necessarily put together hurriedly and applied without taking the too heavy penalties involved in too much delay. Also, many provisions were put into codes on a purely experimental basis. There was no precedent for any such undertaking as NRA. * * * But with the period of code building behind us and with some record of experience established on all code provisions, NRA has passed into a phase that presents a different and much less spectacular task, but on the other hand offers an opportunity for much more deliberative method than was possible in its less commonplace phase.

Discussing results already achieved under NRA, Mr. Williams went on to say it "would seem reasonable to assume that as far as business is concerned it will be permitted to follow its course largely along its recent lines without radical change within.

The speaker therefore asked for a further trial of the present NRA in order to determine out of further experimentation just what the future and permanent structure of the organization should embody.

"It", said he, "we may look back over our shoulders minute by way of comparing the current method of business with that which prevailed before NRA, we can mark the differences in two sentences: Business has been asked, in the general interest and particularly in the interest of that great group who work in the factories of the country and in the distribution and service trades, to accept and operate upon the principle that the wages of that group should not be submitted to competition below a minimum that represents a living wage for a fixed number of hours of labor.

"And, simultaneously, while wages were being taken out of competition below fixed minimums, provision was made for suspension of the antitrust laws to the extent that should be approved by the Administration as neces sary to provide against destructive or unfair competition and remove the barriers that were hindering business from becoming able to meet the increased wage demand without destroying its opportunity to operate successfully

"In application, those two provisions have ramified themselves out into scores of detailed provisions but fundamentally they are the whole of NRA, and the point here is that there is nothing in either that should destroy or weaken confidence in the future of business in this
