C. (Cleve) Phillips, 43, an oil scout for the California company until his health broke down a year ago, died at his home here last night. Funeral arrangements had not been completed.

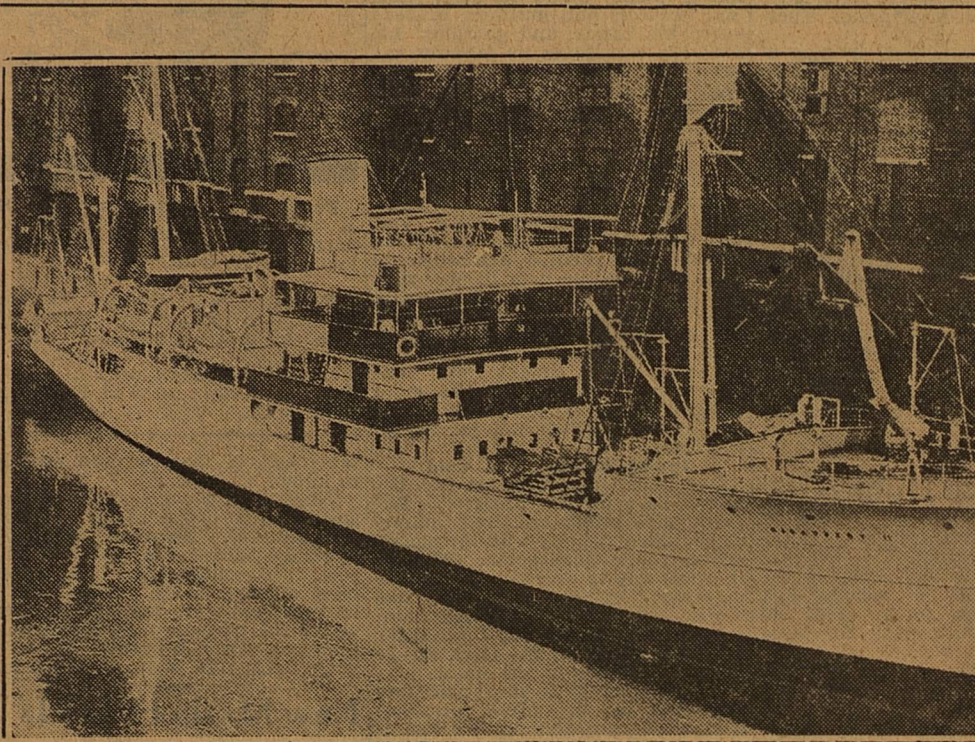
GULF DEEP WELL IS SHOT EARLY TODAY

Ordovician Discovery Fails To Clean Itself After 140 Quarts Nitro

Gulf's Ordovician discovery in the Tub area of Crane county, the No. 1 Waddell, was shot at 2 o'clock this morning with 140 quarts of nitro from 5980 to 6050 feet. The well failed to clean itself after the shot, indicating that the hole might have bridged. Operators are changing drilling line today preparatory to cleaning out.

Whether the shot has increased production in the well still remains to be seen. Prior to it, oil had been flowing up in the hole at the rate of 2000 feet in 19 hours. When the lower section of the Simpson, the producing horizon, was shot from 6185 to 6300 feet nearly two months ago, some increase was noted.

Ship That Found Ellsworth Camped on Ice



Penetrating the ice floes that hem in Little America in the Antarctic, the British royal research ship Discovery II, pictured at London as it was being provisioned, flashed to the world the news that the two-month search for Lincoln Ellsworth and his pilot, Herbert Hollick-Kenyon, had ended happily. The two explorers were found safe and in good health, encamped on the ice, missing since November 23, they were grounded when their plane ran out of gas twenty miles from their goal.

Start Removal Body Tomorrow to London

LONDON, Jan. 22. (AP)—A shrill fanfare of trumpets, climaxing a colorful age-old pageant with modern touches, today formally proclaimed Britain's new flying monarch as King Edward VIII.

Before a great crowd outside of St. James' palace, Sir Gerald Wollaston, garter king of arms, stepped to the balcony and proclaimed Edward King, emperor and defender of faith. Meanwhile, at Sandringham, saddened East England country folk mourned at his bier as final observance for King George were carried out.

Goldsmith Extension Is Good For 555 Barrels of Oil Per Day

The 24-hour production test taken on Pure & Phillips No. 3 Clyde Cowden, southeastern extension of the Goldsmith pool in northern Ector county, showed the well's potential as 555 barrels of oil per day. The test was made through 2 1/2 inch tubing, and no water was present. An estimated 700,000 cubic feet of gas accompanied the flow of oil.

Improvements On South Side Of Rio Are Being Rushed

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., (AP)—Thirty years ago water was diverted at several points on the Rio Grande to begin an agricultural development of an area described as "richer than the delta of the Nile."

Although \$100,000,000 has been spent in the three decades to bring that area, the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas, into fruition, corresponding lands on the Mexican side of the river remained comparatively dormant. Such development as occurred has been confined to dry land growing of cotton and corn.

Mexico's Lower Rio Grande Valley, however, is starting a new page in its history and this year will see a change in the picture south of the river.

Roberto Garcia, mayor of Matamoros, is back from Mexico City with the announcement that 10,000,000 pesos have been appropriated to finance a gigantic flood control program extending from a point east of Matamoros more than 100 miles to Camargo at the northwest.

West of Matamoros 2,200 men with 1,000 teams and machinery now are at work throwing up a levee that is mighty dikes compared to the flimsy structure that "Big Muddy" pushed aside at will in the past.

Eleven thousand pesos is being spent daily on this construction.

Garcia also announced that bids for contracts to build the Matamoros-Victoria highway have been asked and are expected to be awarded this month. Realization of the program, leading citizens of Matamoros believe, will restore to the ancient city some of the importance it enjoyed in 1867 when it was the metropolis of northern Mexico.

Projects started, or scheduled to begin early this year, with estimated costs, include: The San Juna dam and irrigation projects, 29,000,000 pesos; Flood control along the Rio Grande, 19,000,000; Irrigation in the Lower Rio Grande Valley in Mexico, probably exceeding 5,000,000; Rebuilding and improving of the Matamoros-Monterrey branch of the National Railways, 5,000,000; Construction of the Matamoros-Victoria highway, estimated, 5,000,000; and construction of a water works system, public park, air port and other improvements at Matamoros, 1,000,000.

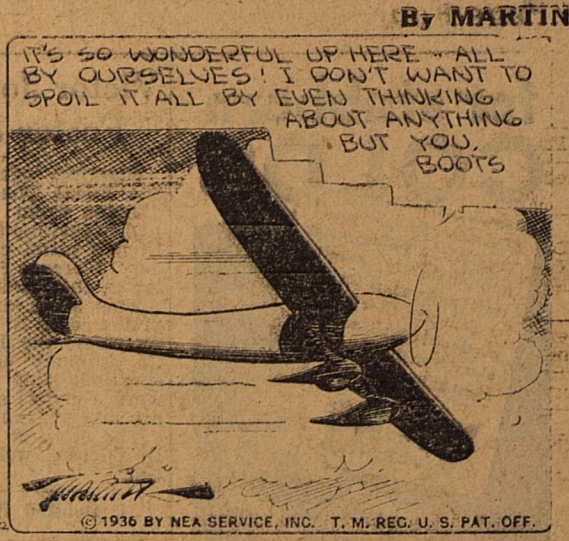
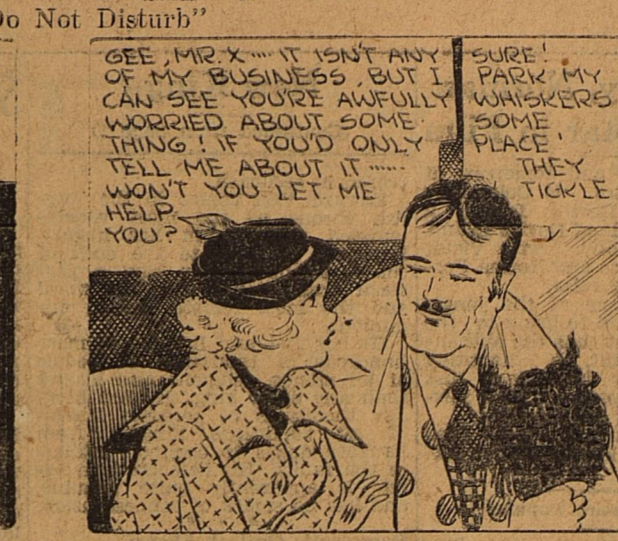
Pennsylvania Extends Forests

reared in seclusion. Edward VIII comes to the English throne as the most widely-traveled monarch in her history. Repeated journeys to the ends of the earth have given him a personal acquaintance with the world and the most remote British dominions.

He has met and listened to more hundreds of thousands of people of all climes, religions and classes than any other king. He has literally thousands of personal friends of all conditions, ranging from haughty dukes to common soldiers in the ranks.

His democratic manner is apparently quite genuine, and has no smack of condescension.

Democratic Outlook Shown in New Social Interests The spirit back of it is well illustrated by the story of his dry comment to a friend who remonstrated that because of his casual association with all kinds of people there were some in blue-blooded circles who objected that the prince was getting "commoner and commoner."

Titles Now Simplified, But a Bachelor Still Prince of Wales, Earl of Chester, Duke of Cornwall, Duke of Rothesay, Earl of Carrick, Baron of Renfrew, Lord of the Isles, Great Steward of Scotland, High Steward of Windsor, Knight of the Garter, Member of the Privy Council, Knight of the Order of the Thistle, Knight of the Order of St. Patrick, Grand Commander of the Order of the British Empire, Admiral of the Fleet, General of the army, and Chief Marshal of the Air Force—all these titles and impressive honors of the prince now merge and are swallowed up in the titles of King and Emperor.

SUBSTANTIAL INTEREST IN SPRING DELIVERY OF CATTLE IS REPORTED

SAN ANGELO, Tex., (P)—A substantial interest in contracting of cattle for spring delivery is reported in West Texas. Ranchmen are asking 7 cents a pound for steers and in view of the demand reflected by orders ranch leaders predict, the price will be higher. Bill Ferguson contracted 12,000 steers at 6 1-2 cents a pound for delivery in April.

Cattle are being bought in small bunches for immediate delivery all over the section, some as high as 7 1-2 cents a pound. Steer yearlings are selling up to 7 cents and heifers are going at 6 to 6 1-2 cents. High prices of cattle and low prices for

cake have brought a fair amount of feeding this winter. Several thousand head of cattle have been contracted in Mexico for delivery on this side in January and February by Ray Martin of Balmorhea and others. Mutton feeder lambs, which a year ago sold for 5 to 6 cents a pound, are bringing 9 cents with the demand brisk. A number of feeders are being shipped to northern lots from Texas wheat fields. Three buyers have sent 30,000 head north in the last month. Offers to contract 1936 mutton lambs at 7 1-2 cents a pound, delivery in September, are reported.

Douglas, Moreland Back From Meeting

De Lo Douglas and Bill Moreland, proprietors of the West Texas Appliance company, have returned from a meeting of all West Texas and New Mexico General Electric refrigerator salesmen in El Paso, headed by E. A. Cone, General Electric distributor.

The 1936 edition of the refrigerator was shown the assembled agents and sales campaigns for the year were discussed. The Midland men were highly enthusiastic over the new machines and the sales possibilities here this year. According to Douglas, many improvements have been made in them, operating costs being reduced as much as 40 per cent, along with other changes. Orders for several of the latest made machines were entered by the men, the first expected to arrive shortly and will be seen in the windows of the company.
