Roosevelt Sets Deficit At More Than Billion For Yr.

NEW RELIEF COSTS GO UNESTIMATED IN THE STATEMENT

National Debt Will Reach New High This Year

NO TAXES ASKED

Balanced Budget Is Not Mentioned In Speech

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (A). President Roosevelt today forecast to congress an estimated treasury deficit for the next fiscal year of more than \$1,000,000 (billion) not counting the unestimated new relief costs. Unprecedentedly, he withheld a complete estimate of how much the government would spend. For

the government would spend. For the present he listed \$6,752,606,370 (billions), but said that later requests for work relief money would be forthcoming. He gave notice that next year's deficit and public debt would amount accordingly.

The president foresaw a debt at the end of the fiscal year of over \$31,000,000,000 (billions), which would be a new all-time high. He said that to run the regular activities of the government he will need over \$5,000,000,000. No hint was given of an immediately balanced budget. Political leaders withheld comment pending a study of the message.

Museum Links Gas Bombs to Chinese

CHICAGO, (U.P.)—Gas bombs are a comparatively recent invention to most people, but to Chinese they date back almost to invention of gunpowder, the Field Museum of Natural History reveals.

On exhibit at the museum are several "thunder stones," or "stink pots" as they were named by the Chinese, which were used in besteging cities, especially by the pirates who infested China's numerous rivers.

These bombs were jars filled with gunpowder, sulphur, shot and nails. The jars were encased in a bag to which was attached several ignited incense sticks. When the bombs were thrown they were smashed on landing, whereupon the incense sticks ignited the powder and sulphur, which exploded, wounding victims with the nails and shot while the fumes from the burning sulphur blinded and suffocated them.


