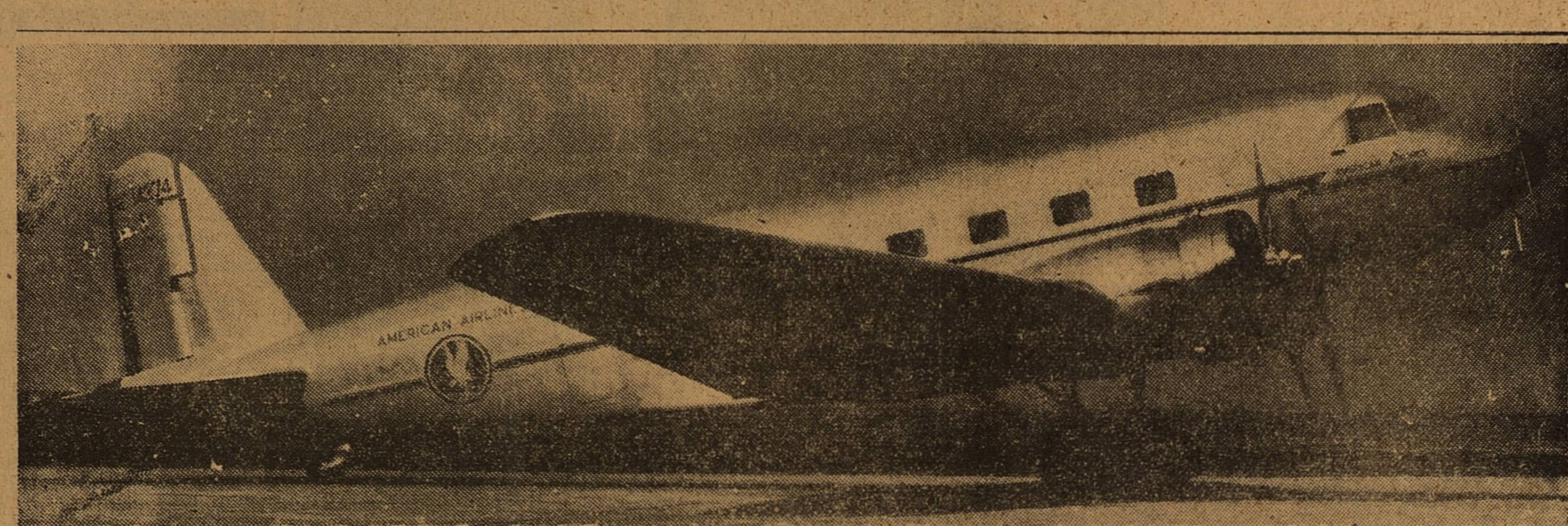

SMITH-ROOSEVELT TIFF IS GAIN TO POLITICS

Every so often the American public has to get its blood pressure raised by some argument that isn't very important, and today the question at issue seems to be: was Al Smith invited to sleep at the White House or was he not; if so, what of it?

Mr. Smith has been invited frequently, says the White House. Mr. Smith has been invited very rarely if at all, says Mr. Smith. The one sure thing seems to be that, regardless of the number or the warmth of the invitations, he has not been sleeping there and doesn't propose to.

This set-to, of course, puts the final stamp and seal on the breaking of a distinguished friendship. It was a friendship that had important consequences for the nation, while it lasted; for if it had not been for the urgings of Mr. Smith, Mr. Roosevelt would not have become governor of New York state, and if he had not been governor, he likely would never have gone on to the presidency.

But the friendship has gone sour, long since, and all that is left of it today is an undignified squabble which is entertaining, but hardly constructive.

The reason it has people talking, of course, is that the break is a symptom of an important change which is coming over American politics.

It would be a mistake to suppose that mere personal reasons are at the bottom of the row. They may enter into it, of course, but they are not fundamental.

At bottom, the quarrel is indicative of a strong new current which, running through the Democratic party, is bearing some men in one direction and sending others off in another.

Whatever the New Deal may or may not amount to, and whatever its virtues and its faults may add up to, one thing at least is obvious; in a more or less confused way it does represent a definite political philosophy, a definite view of the place which government ought to occupy in the nation's social and economic life.

By the same token the opposition to the New Deal, as exemplified by the non-White-House sleeping Mr. Smith, represents an equally definite opposing philosophy.

The mere fact that this cleavage is taking place is a good thing for politics. It should eventually bring back the sort of reality that infused American political struggles in the days of Jackson and Lincoln.

Modern campaigns, too often, have been mere scrambles for jobs, with the opposing candidates embodying much the same set of principles, if any.

Back of the Smith-Roosevelt row lies a revival of politics' old-time health. When political disagreements can be heated enough to turn good friends into bitter enemies, it is a pretty good sign that the electorate has stopped shadow boxing and is concerned with something really serious.

ALASKA COLONY WORTHWHILE

How long it may be before the famous Matanuska Valley colonization experiment in Alaska is declared unconstitutional is uncertain; meanwhile, it is announced that the venture has cost Uncle Sam exactly \$2,000,000 to date—the equivalent of \$12,000 for each family in the colony.

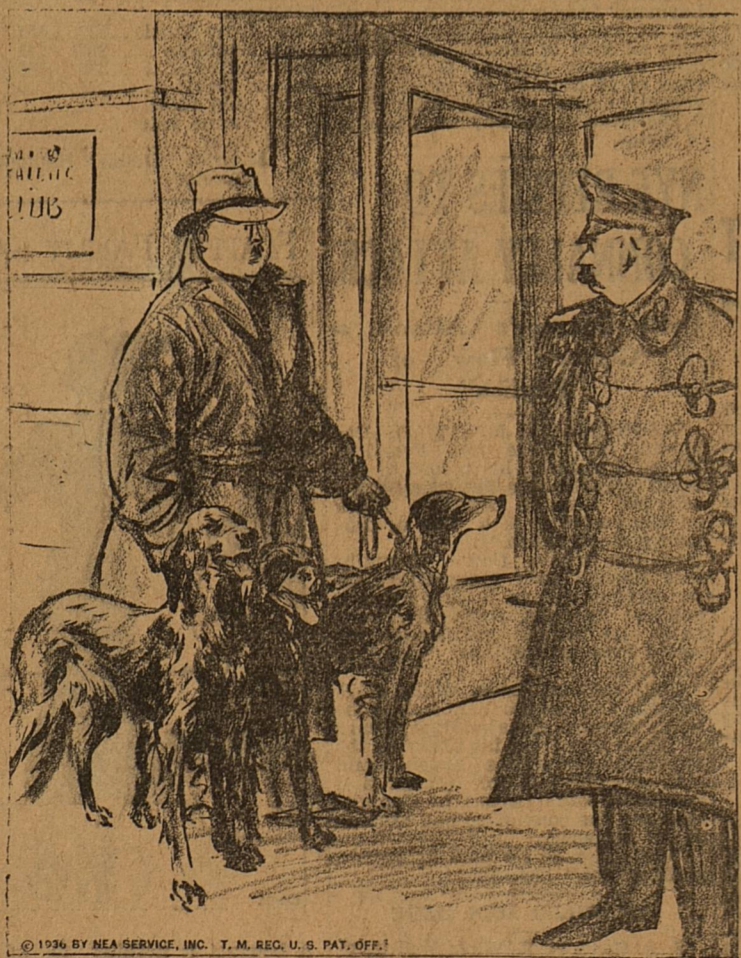
This includes the cost of transporting, feeding, and housing the colonists, and it does not represent a total loss—since the government will get back \$3000 from each family, payable over a 30-year period. Within three years, it is believed, the colony will become fully self-supporting.

Uncle Sam does not have \$9000 to spend on every needy family. Even so, it is quite possible that the money this Matanuska Valley affair has cost will prove to be money well spent.

The experiment, that is, was worth making; and if it leads to development of Alaska's potentially great agricultural richness, as it may, it will be exceedingly valuable.

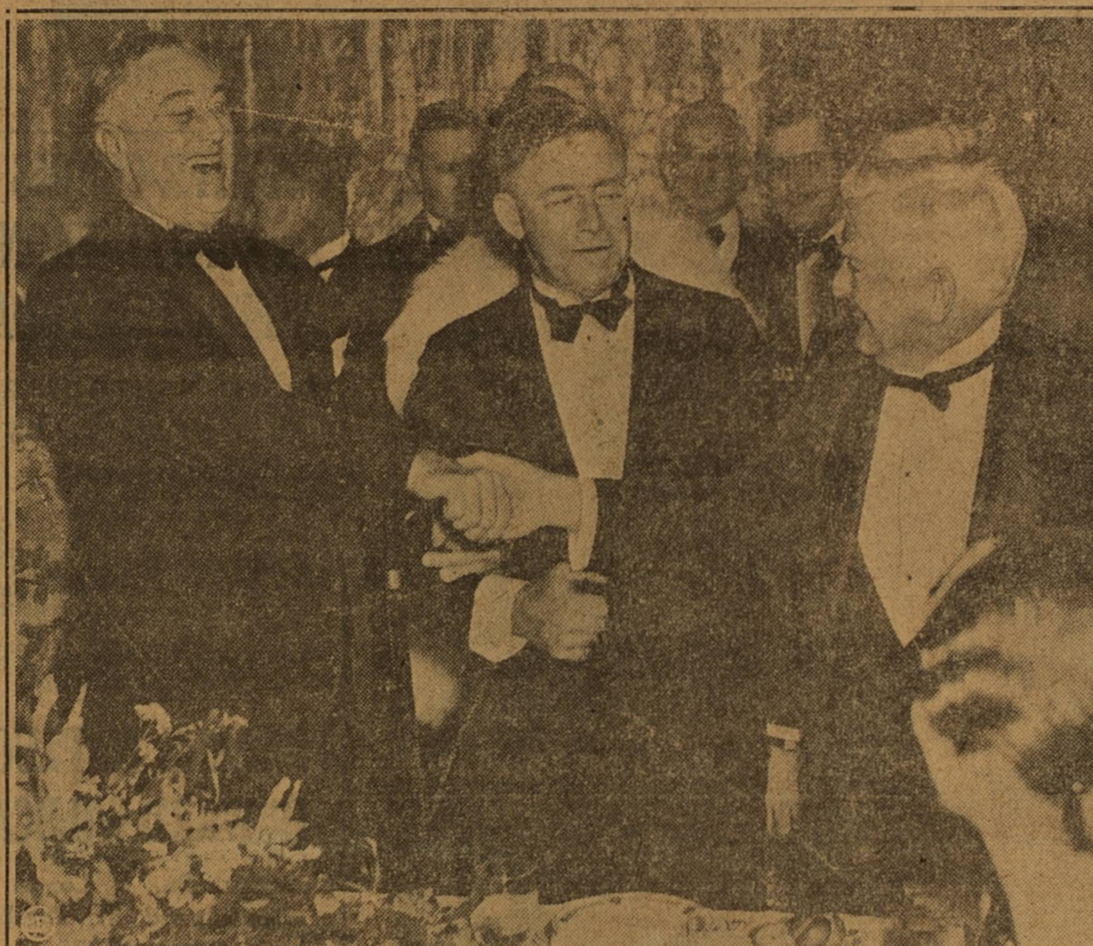

Record Number of Chevrolets Sold

On the heels of the news that Chevrolet sold the record-breaking total of 122,301 used cars in the month of December, the Chevrolet Motor Company this week divulged details of a countrywide program designed to assist every dealer in

keeping his used car inventory at a healthy low mark, thereby maintaining ideal conditions for the volume sale of new cars. This program is already well under way, it was announced. As outlined by W. E. Holler, vice president and general sales manager, it places at the disposal of all Chevrolet dealers the company's entire resources of knowledge on business management, with special reference to

the part which used car merchandising plays in the dealer's overall operation. Details of the program, Mr. Holler said, were worked out in November and December, soon after the organization of Chevrolet's national used car selling department, and the final steps toward its accomplishment were taken Jan. 6, when H. B. Hatch and Felix Doran Jr., assistant general sales managers, conducted all-day regional meetings at Detroit and Chicago respectively—the first of a series of similar meetings to be held at all nine regional

These meetings, attended by the entire regional personnel, and by that of all zones in each region, had two main purposes: the official announcement of the used car program to the wholesale organization, and the instruction of that body in its duty of relaying the news to dealers and salesmen throughout the country.

No sooner were the Detroit and Chicago regional sessions finished, said Mr. Holler, than the wholesale personnel attending them dispersed to their respective zones, there to hold all-day meetings with the dealer-and-salesman organization. The same plan is being carried out in all the other regions as fast as their meetings are concluded.

In addition, a special program of individual attention is being followed through in the case of dealers in larger cities. Some 4,000 dealerships have already been assisted in re-organization along lines that will separate the new car and the used car phases of the business, leaving each major division of the dealership free to concentrate on its own activities.

The principal item in the list of subjects discussed with the dealers is the Chevrolet co-operative used car disposal plan, announced Jan. 1, as a means of stimulating used car sales and retiring dangerously old cars from the highways. This program is being put into effect with the aid of a crew of central office business executives, whose collective background of practical knowledge about retail automotive business is probably unmatched in any other organization in the country today. That the Chevrolet dealer appreciates the advantage which their counsel and guidance place at his disposal is evident from the cooperation dealers are giving the plan, as well as in reports showing January used car sales on the way to a new high mark for all time.

Midnight Was Chief Hour for Antarctic Expedition of Byrd

Every important event of Admiral Byrd's second Antarctic Expedition took place at midnight, from the time it landed on the Ross sea ice barrier until it bade a last farewell to its snow covered base at Little America after spending 18 months in the polar regions.

Upon their return from the South Pole with the vanguard of Byrd's valiant crew, John L. Herrmann, Paramount cameraman, and Carl O. Petersen, radio expert, who filmed "Paranormal's," "Little America," now playing at the Yucca theatre, disclosed that the Antarctic venture began virtually at midnight and ended about the same hour.

The historic old Pacific coast revenue cutter, Bear of Oakland, reached the Bay of Whales at midnight, January 30, 1933. The dual-motored Condor biplane, equipped with pontoons, was lowered over the Ruppert's side in the early evening hours, and at midnight Chief Pilot Harold June took it into the air for the first flight of the expedition.

The midnight coincidence cropped up when the first reconnaissance expedition set out by dog sled. Seventy miles south of Little America, just at midnight, the party camped upon the old snowmobile abandoned five years earlier by the first Byrd Antarctic expedition.
The advance base where Admiral Byrd maintained his lonely vigil for seven winter months was completed at midnight.

PRESIDENT OF MEXICO AUTHORIZES A MONUMENT TO MARK ROAD COMPLETION

LAREDO, (U.P.)—Information from sources at Mexico City regarding a reliable, reveals that President Lazaro Cardenas has directed erection of a marble monument to cost 130,000 pesos to mark the completion of the Pan-American highway.
