MANY ETHIOPIANS REPORTED SLAIN IN ENGAGEMENTS Series of Battles Takes Heavy Toll Among Men CLAIMS DENIED Ethiopia Is Worried Over Lack of Any Resistance

By Associated Press Italy today announced that 10,000 Ethiopians had been slain in a series of battles on the southern front. Ethiopia was represented as being gravely concerned over the lack of resistance to the Italian attack in the south.

Reports reaching Rome said Italy's southern front on wheels column rumbled past Neghelli, aimed seemingly at Allata, major city of Sidamo Province, hundreds of miles from its starting point. Heavy hostilities apparently continued, too, on the Northern Ethiopian front, with conflicting Italian and Ethiopian claims of victory still unreconciled.

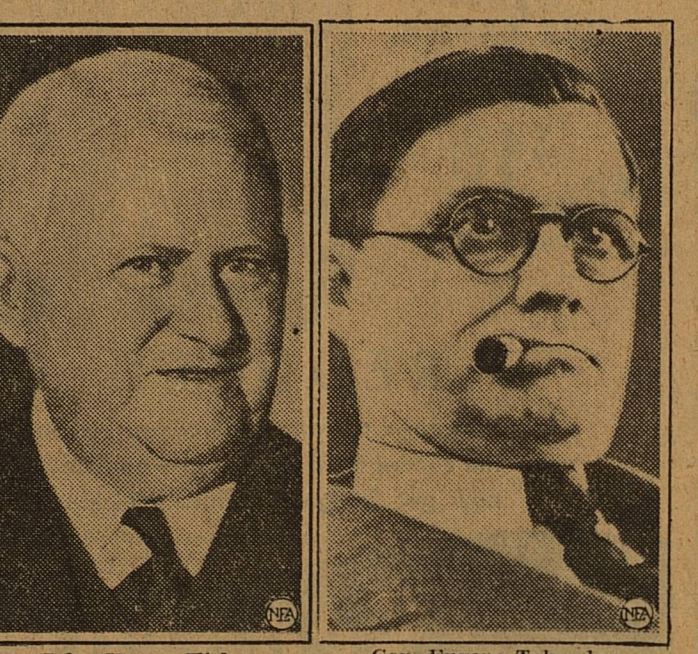

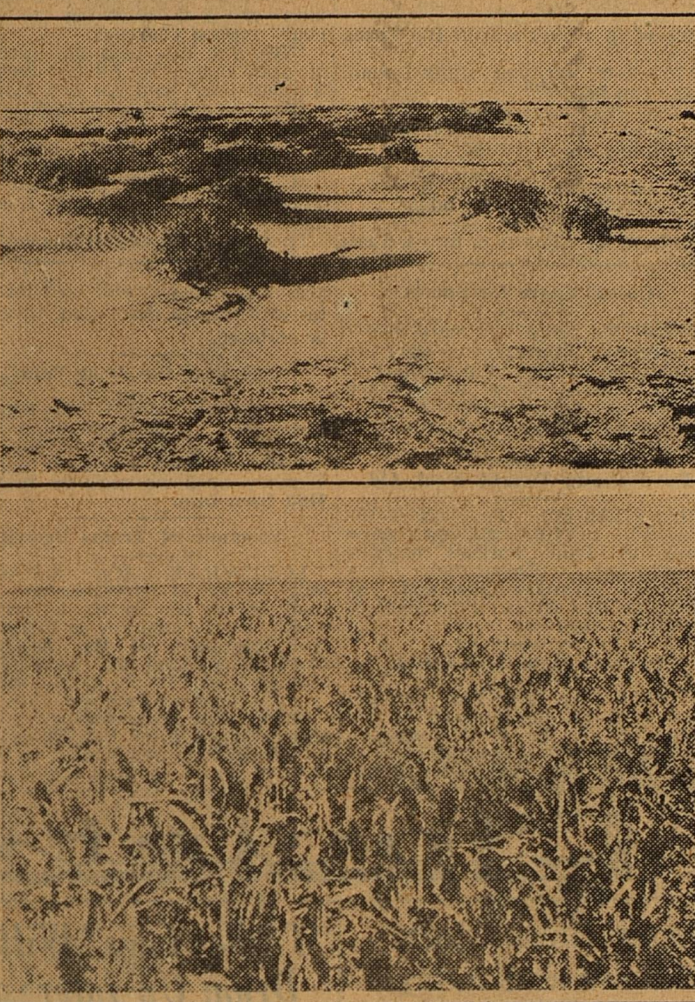
GEOLOGIST HEAD WILL MAKE TALK President of National Association Here Next Saturday

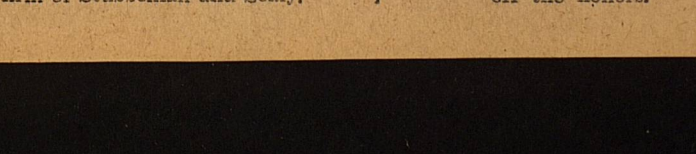
SNOW AND SLEET CHILL STATE AS MERCURY DROPS Colder Weather for South Texas Is Forecast

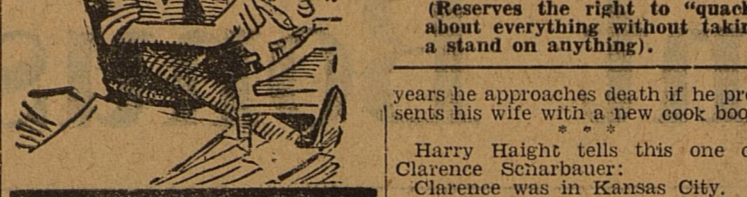

BREAKFAST: Tangerines, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon, nutmeg milk coffee. LUNCHEON: Scalloped kidney beans, toasted muffins, carrot straws, Spanish cream, milk tea. DINNER: Tomato juice cocktail, turkey legs, Martini-que potatoes, broccoli with cheese, stuffed apple salad, chocolate roll, milk, coffee. BUTTERED BAKING DISH. Pour over a thin white sauce to which grated cheese has been added. Cover with more grated cheese and bake in a hot oven until cheese is melted. Stuffed apple salad is rather out of the ordinary because the apples are baked before stuffing. CHOCOLATE ROLL Three eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 5 tablespoons boiling water, few grains salt, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and fold in yolks well beaten. Mix and sift flour, salt, sugar and baking powder and fold into egg mixture with boiling water. Add vanilla and turn into well oiled and floured shallow oblong pan. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for ten minutes. Turn out onto fresh tea towel which has been sprinkled with powdered sugar. Trim off edges of cake all the way around and spread with chocolate filling. Roll like a jelly roll and cut in slices to serve. CHOCOLATE FILLING Two squares baking chocolate, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 cup water, 1 teaspoon butter, 1-2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1-2 cup cream, few grains salt, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. Melt chocolate. Add sugar and water and stir until blended. Stir cornstarch to a smooth paste with a little cold milk and add to remaining milk. Stir into chocolate

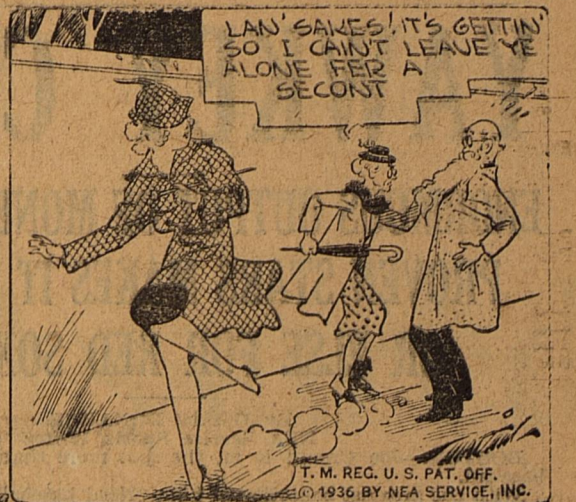
