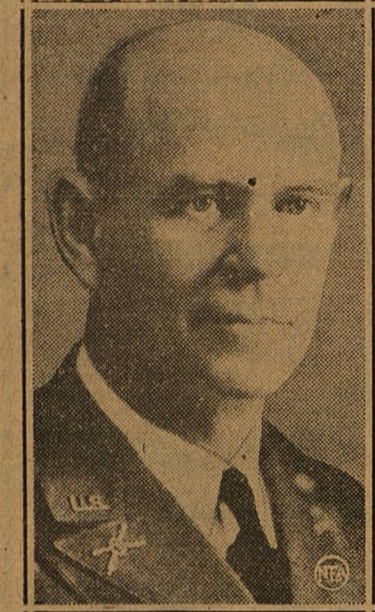

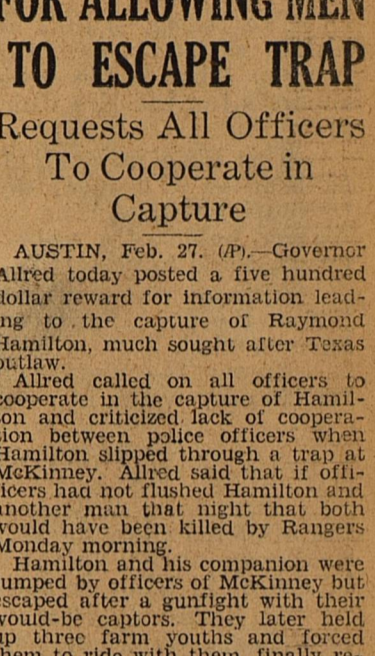

#### THOUGHT THROTTLED

Prof. Hermann Oncken, historian of Berlin University, has been ordered by the Nazi government to discontinue a course of lectures he has been giving to university students this year.

The reason is that he had the temerity to put on history an interpretation different from the official Nazi version. That is, he denied that the course of history supports the theories which Nazi leaders profess to find in it.

This little incident gives us a good glimpse at the suppression of thought which is inevitable under an authoritarian regime. The function of a university is to hunt for and publish the truth—to hunt for it without preconceptions and to present it without fear or favor.

A dictatorial government cannot permit that. It can permit the publication of only a certain kind of truth—its own kind.

Among the first casualties of a dictatorship is the free inquiry which is a university's excuse for existence.

#### HALT CHILD LABOR

Msgr. John A. Ryan, director of social welfare for the National Catholic Welfare Conference, is the latest public man to add his voice to the demand for ratification of the child labor amendment.

Dr. Ryan points out that, far from being the product of radicals, the amendment was drafted by such men as Senators Walsh of Montana and Pepper of Pennsylvania and was sponsored by Senator Shortridge of California.

He emphasizes the folly of permitting children to work while their elders are on relief, and reminds us that NRA's prohibition of child labor—in some 500 codes—is not, as far as we know, a permanent thing.

"It would be deplorable," he says, "if this amendment should be lost now that it is within sight of victory."

Twenty-four states have ratified it. Twelve more are needed. The job can be done this year, if friends of the amendment do not relax their efforts.

The economic cataclysm of the last few years has established a sympathetic bond among people.

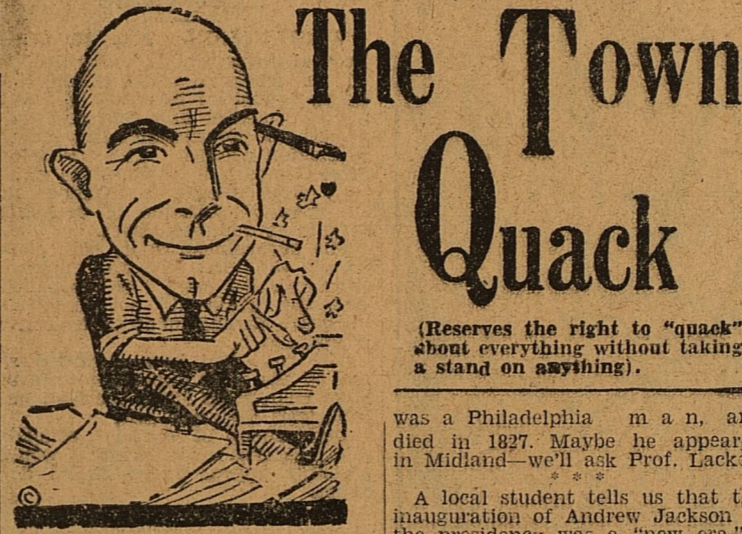

Irving is called the daddy of American literature.

By the way, Edwin Forrest was the first American actor to become famous.

He tried Shakespearean roles, but was most popular in dramas that featured Indian characters.

He caused a flood of Indian melodramas, many of which were so ridiculous that some said they created Indians that never existed.

But there but must be a start in everything, and Forrest is entitled to praise rather than censure. He

was a Philadelphia man, and died in 1827. Maybe he appeared in Midland—we'll ask Prof. Lackey.

A local student tells us that the inauguration of Andrew Jackson to the presidency was a "new era."

We are told every four years that a new era has arrived and we have become sick and tired of the phrase.

When we get to heaven we will look up Mr. Jackson, and slap him on the wrist for having started a "new era."

"New eras" are disgusting primarily because they lack sincerity, and in most cases are the phrasical gestures of politicians.

Seldom does a "new era" usher in a new principle or practice that endures.

Indeed, we go so far as to say that almost all eternal principles were founded and enunciated before the present generation of hokey manufacturers was born.

We hear a great deal about Andrew Jackson. The Democrats celebrate him quite often.

And he was quite a man, no doubt. But we might as well "bust out" with the truth:

Andy is overestimated, and his stubbornness and recklessness caused the panic that reached its climax in Van Buren's administration.

The DEATH MASK of SERBIA

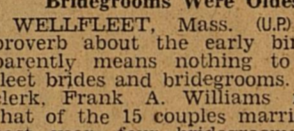


In a Serbian stamp of 1904 lies a tale of murder, intrigue, and gruesome revenge.

Karageorge, or Black George, Serbia's liberator in 1804, was killed by order of Milosh Obrenovich, whose dynasty ended in 1903 with the murder of Alexander I and his consort.

By this act, Karageorge's grandson, Peter I, ascended the throne, leaving desire for revenge in the heart of Alexander's mother, Dowager Queen Natalie.

The 1904 stamp shows the heads of Karageorge and Peter I. But turn it around and look closely at the area bounded by the dotted line. There the death mask of the slain King Alexander appears in all its grim detail.
