Cerebral Hemorrhage Announced as Cause

BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 28. (AP).-Governor O. K. Allen of Louisiana died unexpectedly at 10:40 a. m. from what was announced as a cerebral hemorrhage. He was seized with a sudden attack at the executive mansion at 8:50 as he was preparing to leave the mansion for his executive offices in the state capitol. A corps of physicians were hastily summoned, but they failed to rally the governor. He had been in apparent perfect health.

The death was announced by A. P. White, Allen's secretary. As the news spread, a large number of officials and other friends hurried to the mansion and formed a great crowd around the building.

Lieut.-Gov. James A. Moe, Monroe, automatically succeeded Allen. Moe has always been a staunch supporter of the administrations of Huey Long and Allen.

Allen was born in Winnfield, La., in 1881, and grew up as a boyhood companion of Long, who carried Allen along with him to political power. He had been a member of the state legislature, chairman of the state highway commission, governor and was nominated last week for the short term as United States senator.

Highway Commissioner Harry K. Hines, in his speech at a Midland luncheon last week, made a highly pertinent statement with reference to highway No. 1, or the Broadway of America through Texas. He said it is just as important to the people of Midland to see that gaps between Dallas and Texarkana are improved, rebuilt and straightened out as it is to see the same work done in Midland county.

Declaring that every foot of the highway through Texas must be made a first class route for trans-continental tourists, he said "either highway number one is the number one highway or its number should be changed."

Midland people, undoubtedly, agree with Commissioner Hines. Regardless of rumors that changes in route are sought, people of this section are primarily interested in maintaining the "through route" which will continue to offer the best all-year, all-weather trail for citizens from Maine to California to traverse the continent.
