

SUPREME COURT ADJOURNS FOR 2 WEEKS OF REST

No Action Taken on Bankhead, TVA Questions
ASK REHEARING
U. S. Asks for Review Of Processing Taxes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (AP)—The supreme court adjourned today for two weeks without passing on the constitutionality of the TVA after the government had asked dismissal of a suit brought by Governor Talmadge of Georgia against the Bankhead act, and had asked rehearing of the court decision on processing taxes.

GAINES WILDCAT DRILLING AHEAD

Walsh and Adams Test Is Again Active After Long Delay
The chief topic of interest today among oil men is the resumption of drilling in one of the Basin's most interesting wildcats, W. T. Walsh & Harry Adams Corp. No. 1. Avertit in Gaines county. The well has been delayed several weeks by a bad fishing job which started when tools were lost at 3132 feet. Efforts to fish them out or drill by them failed. Yesterday, however, operators were successful in running 7 inch casing past obstructions, finally getting it to 3142 feet. Drilling was resumed and new hole made without incident until a gas pocket was encountered at 3175 feet. The gas flow was exhausted in a short time. Last reports from the wildcat were that it was drilling ahead below 3210 feet.

King's Strength Lessening

Sandringham, Eng. Jan. 20. (AP)—A physician's bulletin issued today announced that the strength of King George, precariously ill here, was "diminishing" although oxygen is being given the ruler.

The king, propped up in bed early today, signed a document setting up a council of state to assume most of the royal duties during his illness. The council consists of Queen Mary and the four sons, the Prince of Wales, and Duke York, Gloucester and Kent.

At that time the privy council took place in the monarch's sick room at Buckingham Palace, and it was thought a similar procedure would be followed at Sandringham tomorrow.

CRANE DEEP WELL WILL SET BRIDGE

Gulf No. 1 Waddell to Shoot Simpson Section From 6090 Feet
The first new development in several weeks on Gulf's No. 1 Waddell, located today in the Tubbs area of Crane county, is the announcement that operators are trying to set a bridge at 6090 feet preparatory to shooting the upper section of the Simpson.

The well was given a shot of 440 quarts nearly two months ago from 6186 to 6300 feet and production on the well was increased to 100 barrels a day. The well attracted developed was plugged back to 6317 feet in the Simpson, middle Ordovician. Oil production is coming from the latter formation, and decision has been made to shoot the upper section of it in hopes of obtaining a greater increase than was registered when the lower section was shot.

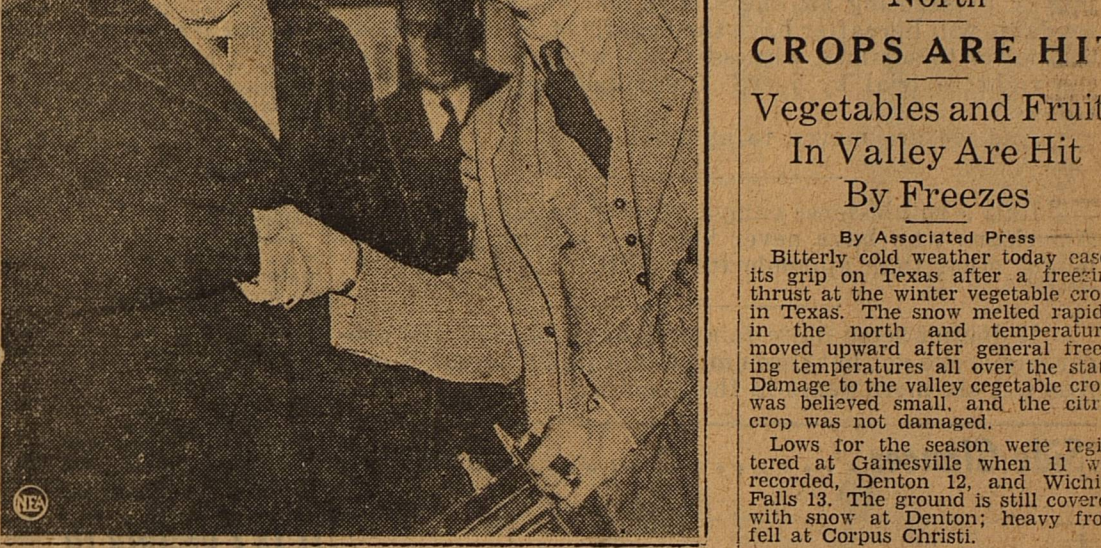

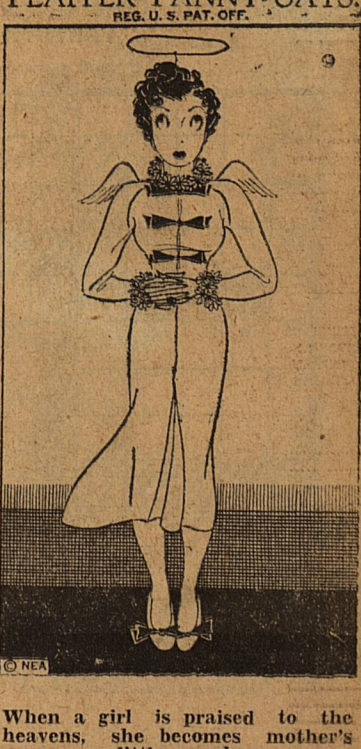

INDIAN GETS JUSTICE

Decision of the United States government to grant reservation Indians full court privileges is certainly long overdue.

Since 1884, tribesmen have been subjected to arrest, trial, and imprisonment by Indian service officials and judges appointed by reservation superintendents. At best it was a travesty on justice under American principle.

Now John Collier, Indian commissioner, announces that full court privileges will be granted all Indians charged with crimes.

"The judges of the Indian courts and the Indian agency superintendents over them cease to be judges, jailers, prosecuting attorneys, and policemen. Indian defendants will hereafter have the benefit of formal charges, the power to summon witnesses, the privilege of bail, and the right to trial by jury," Commissioner Collier guarantees.

And we are moved to applaud.

Italy's ruthlessness cannot readily be appreciated by Americans who have never been the victims of hospital bombs other than appendectomy bills.

AMARILLO (AP)—New Year's Day, C. M. Tyler, 63, assistant postmaster, began his thirty-first year of unbroken employment at the Amarillo post office.

Tyler came here Jan. 1, 1906, from Sherman, where he had been an employe of the postal service for seven and a half years. Since his arrival he has missed only one half day because of illness and has never asked for an afternoon off to go fishing, see a ball game or play golf.

Steam-Heated Golf Course

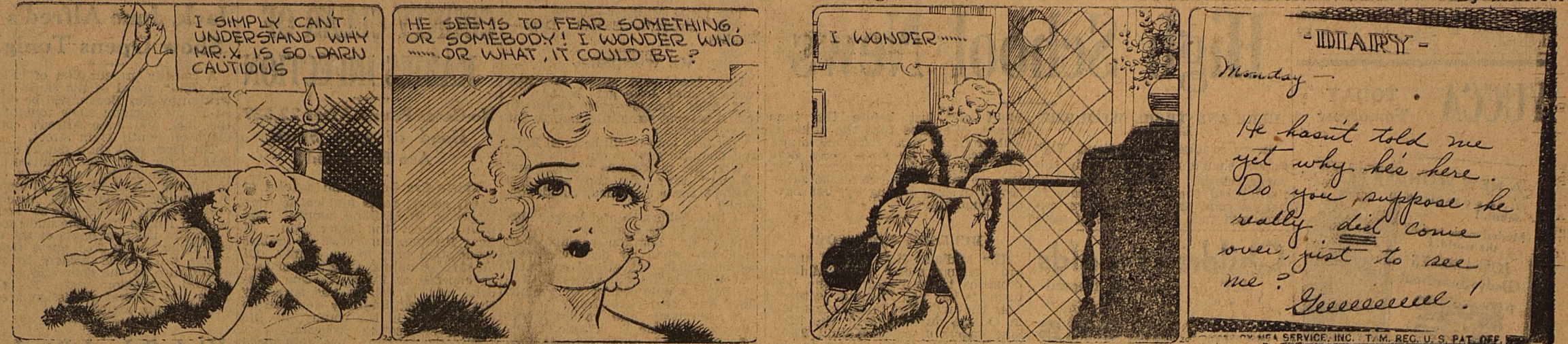

COUNTY CLEAR OF RABIES INFECTION

No Cases Found After 22,627 Head of Live Stock Are Examined

Of all stock examined none were classed as exposed or infected. High School Band Receives Gift of Foster Symphony

A beautiful and complete symphonic band arrangement of "Stephen Foster Melodies" by Luis Guzman has been received by Russell E. Shrader, director of the Midland high school band, from an organization in the University of Pittsburgh called Foster Hall.
Each score has a picture cover tied with blue cord.
The following letter was received from J. K. Lilly, of Foster Hall, the institution which sent the gift.
"Foster Hall is an institution devoted to the collecting of items relating to the life and work of Stephen Collins Foster. Begun late in 1930, this collection now numbers over ten thousand pieces. On completion of the Foster Memorial building, construction on the campus of the University of Pittsburgh, the Foster Hall collection will be presented to the University for preservation in perpetuity.
"As the collection grew, there was noted the lack of a medley of the better known Foster airs arranged for large bands. Foster Hall set about to remedy this deficiency. It commissioned Mr. Luis Guzman of the United States Marine Band to create such an arrangement, and when his work was completed, "Stephen Foster Melodies" was played for the first time in public on June 26, 1934, by the United States Marine Band at the Pan-American Union, Washington, D. C. So enthusiastically was the medley received that arrangements were immediately made for the printing of the score. This work completed, it is now Foster Hall's pleasure to present this medley of Foster airs to the large bands in this country, and through the Pan-American Union, to the large bands in Central and South America and the West Indies where the music of Foster is as popular, if perhaps not so well known, as in our own country.
"Your name having been supplied to Foster Hall as the director of a band, there is being sent to you with my compliments, by prepaid transportation, the band score of "Stephen Foster Melodies." It is hoped that this medley meets with your approval and will be included in the repertoire of your band. After you have had an opportunity to study it, a letter expressing your opinion would be deeply appreciated.
If Foster Hall can be of help to you in any way, please do not hesitate to write.

Evolution of Plow Shown by Research

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The plow, first among basic farm implements, reached present utility only after centuries of painful progress, says a statement from the United States Department of Agriculture.
Research by the bureau of Agricultural Engineering shows that the first plows, fashioned from crooked tree branches, were pulled by one or more men, another forcing the crude implement into the soil. The barbarous custom of hitching draft animals to plows by their tails was practiced as late as 1631.
The statement relates that when efforts was made to introduce cast-iron plows in the United States farmers declared they poisoned the soil and prevented crops growing. Sir Robert Peel, English statesman, in 1860 gave his farmers "two iron plows of the best construction." On his next visit they were using wooden plows, believing iron plows made weeds grow.
The working "year" lasts only from October to May, or the early days of June, in the whisky distilling trade.
