HOSPITALS "HOLD THE BAG"

One of the things that give hospital superintendents gray hairs is, as you might expect, the automobile traffic accident.

David H. M. Pyle, president of the United Hospital Fund of New York, discloses that the average victim of an auto accident runs up a bill of \$33 when taken to a hospital for treatment; and an increasing percentage of these bills never get paid.

The hospital can't help itself. The traffic victim is an emergency case; treatment can't be refused while his financial standing is examined.

And, too often, when he recovers and gets the bill, he reveals that he can't pay it, but that he'll settle as soon as he collects damages from the driver of the other car. And that may be the last the hospital ever sees of him.

This means an added burden for the hospitals. If we don't insist on financial responsibility on the part of motorists, we must at least contribute more generously to hospital funds, so that the institutions can continue to care for the victims of our mad traffic situation.







WASHINGTON. (P).—The department of labor reported recently that the cost of goods purchased by Houston wage earners and low-salaried workers increased 1.4 per cent from July 15 to Oct. 15.

A survey of these expenditures showed that the average Houstonian in this class paid 3.4 per cent more for food, 2.4 per cent more for rent, 2.7 per cent more for fuel and light, 1.4 per cent more for clothing and 3 per cent more for house furnishing goods. The only decline—1 per cent—was registered in miscellaneous expenses. ous expenses.

Using the 1923-25 base as 100, the index costs were shown to have been, Oct. 15: all items, 79.4; food, 77.4; clothing, 74.1; rent, 65.3; fuel and light, 73.9; house furnishing goods, 80.5; miscellaneous, 94.7.

In 32 selected cities over the country, the department said living costs increased 4 per cent over the threemonth period.
