



LINDBERGHS' FLIGHT CAUSED BY YELLOW JOURNALISM AND CHEAP POLITICS

By BRUCE CATTON

The G-men probably could have given Col. Charles A. Lindbergh all the protection he needed against actual kidnapers. But there apparently is no power on earth which could have protected him against the great American army of cranks, Paul Prys, and plain, every-day Peep-

It would be a mistake to suppose that he fled to England merely because of the fear of kidnaping—although, all things considered, you couldn't blame him if he had. For the Lindbergh kidnaping is only a surface reflection of something that goes deeper—the simple, obvious fact that we have not learned how to give our public

men civilized treatment. We have forced Lindbergh to live in a glass house with the floodlights eternally turned on. We have kept long-nosed, swivel-necked Peeping Toms grinning over his shoulder every second. We have had a camera eye peering at him out of every rosebush. His life's most solemn and lonely moments-his honeymoon, the death of his child—have been lived to the tune of clicking shutters.

Let us be honest about this business. It was yellow journalism, the desire for the spotlight on the part of small-time politicians—and cheap politics—as much as anything, which drove Lindbergh out of America.

A short time ago certain newspapers decided they wanted a picture of the Lindbergh child, Jon. Their cameramen lay in ambush for the Lindbergh car, forced the driver to slow down, jabbed a camera against the window, photographed the child—and, presumably, went away highly pleased with themselves.

But that stunt only capped the climax. The Lindbergh kidnaping itself was turned into a field for those who like to look through windows. The Hauptmann trial was a three-ring circus.

What a picture! Cheap politicians, editors who disgrace the name of journalism, backed by a whole army of cranks, psychopaths, open-mouted nit-wits and plain, ordinary peepers—that mob has been at Lindbergh's elbow every minute for years. The wonder is not that he has at last moved to England, but that he didn't go raving mad long ago.

Our American society has inflicted on Lindbergh the greatest wrong any society can inflict on any man; it has completely robbed him of his privacy, his right to live an ordinary life behind the four walls of his home. And his tragic, despairing flight for sanctuary abroad is a searing comment on the quality of our civilization.

"PROFIT" OUT OF SCIENCE

The criticism is sometimes made that America devotes too little time and money to the interests of pure science.

We are long on scientific research, but we are accused of being so only because we want to see science applied for dollars and cents gains.

The research which will never make a dollar for anyone—that, say the critics, does not interest us. An excellent refutation of this criticism is to be found

in the recent completion of the casting of the 200-inch "eye" for the world's largest telescope. This enormous piece of glass was cast at Corning,

N. Y. It took a solid year to cast and cool it. It will take perhaps five years more to grind it. Then it can be mounted in a telescope that will enable men to peer off into space for the unimaginable distance of 1,200,000,000 light

Here is a tremendous and expensive bit of work which will never bring a nickel to anyone. Astronomy is "pure" science; it brings no useful inventions, no great new industries, nothing but knowledge.

And this greatest and most costly of all telescopes is being financed and constructed in money-grubbing America!

MISPLACED COURTSHIP

The Massachusetts courts have held that a motorist who zips along the highway at 35 miles an hour, while embracing a fair young thing who shares the front seat with him, is "grossly negligent" in operating his car.

A young gentleman who had been doing just that was involved in an accident. The lady whom he was hugging suffered a dislocated jaw, loosened teeth, and sundry cuts and sprains when he let his car get out of control and hit a tree.

She sued for damages and got them on the charge of gross negligence.

About all you can say about this ruling is that it states the case mildly. Hugging a girl can be a very enjoyable pastime, but the driver's seat of a moving auto is not the place to indulge in it.

The driver who combines hugging and driving is not merely grossly negligent; he is an eternal fool and a public menace as well.


Tankers Beat Way Into Port in Ice Breaker Role





Heroic Woman Is Active at Age of 104

PARIS. (U.P).—One of the most remarkable figures in France is frail, white-haired, little Mme. Carpenter de Sainte Opportune, who, although in her 105th year,

who, although in her 105th year, is still active and still keeps abreast of the times.

The little old lady has lived in the same historic old home for the last 83 years, the Chateau of Saint Quentin in the Eure department in Normandy. Although surrounded by memories of a century of stirring times, Mme de Sainte Opportune is keenly interested in 3-4 opportune is keenly interested in all that is going on today. She spends a great part of her day at her desk where she reads without the use of glasses, and she likewise spends an hour every day walking in the park of the chateau.

claims that the secret of her good
health and longevity rests in the
fact that she always has been able
to eat whatever she likes. It is her
boast that she has never had to

She advocates fruit as a healthful food and she eats some raw
fruit before every meal, even before rising in the morning. American apples are her favorite. Her
usual drink is Norman cider, although she occasionally drinks
wine.

Asked to recall her most vivid memories in her 104 years, the woman includes the Revolution of 1848, the plundering of the Tuileries, formerly the Paris residence of the French kings, and the fall of King Louis Philippe.

Heroine of 1870 War

One of her earliest memories is of her friendship with the wife of General de la Valette, whose husband served under Napoleon I, and she recalls the famous story of how the general was saved from death by his courageous wife. In the War of 1870 she had the courage to go

alone to the head of the German troops, General Mecklenbourg, and to plead successfully with him.

and to plead successfully with him, to spare her little commune of Sainte Quentin des Iles, which had been attacked by the Germans. For this act of bravery she was given the award of the Chevalier of the Legion of Honor.

Having been a devout Catholic for the past half century, Mme. de Sainte Opportune makes a yearly pilgrimage to the shrine at Lourdes with the national association of which she is president. This past year, again, she made a trip across France to the shrine, where, at the age of 104, she again bathed in the icy sacred waters.
