“Worst” Dust Storm Strikes Texas

NORTHER DRIVES DUST TOWARD THE GULF DURING DAY

Visibility Is Zero as Midland in Path Stifling Fog

By ASSOCIATED PRESS The worst dust storm in the history of Texas engulfed most of the state today, drifting dense clouds of sediment southward from the ground parched states of the middle west.

A cold norther brought the dust into the state and moved it swiftly toward the Gulf during the night.

“Zero visibility” as result of the dust storm was the report given at the army airdrome station today.

Dallas reported visibility of one fifth of a mile, El Paso a quarter mile and San Antonio heavy dust clouds.

FARMERS LEAVE OKLAHOMA

KANSAS CITY, April 11.—Grimy clouds of families out of northwestern Oklahoma last night in full flight from an eight-storm dust storm.

Crop and livestock damages, already piled high in uncounted millions, increased rapidly, principally in Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado.

The swirling clouds, which late today reached Kansas City, were viewed by R. I. Throckmorton, head of the Kansas State college agronomy department.

More than 100 families have deserted Cimarron, in Texas counties in the northwestern Oklahoma Panhandle.

“This farm is the fruit of my labor ever since my wife and I married 28 years ago,” said T. J. Foster, of Texoma.

“We feared for the family’s health if we stayed here. We couldn’t make it go here, anyway, and we couldn’t be worse off anywhere else.”

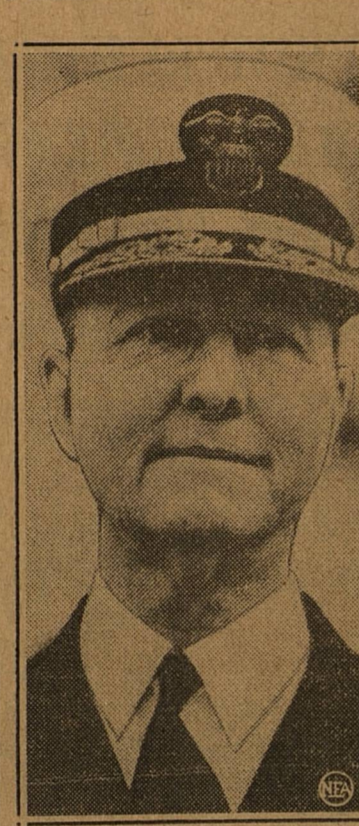

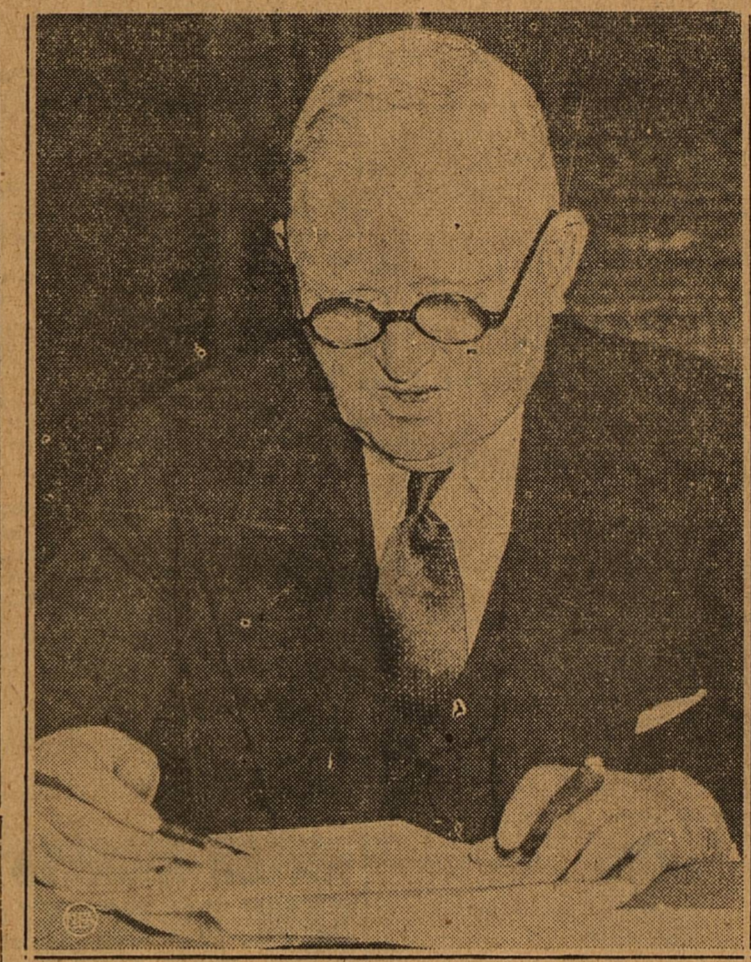

Spring Puts You in Fair Way to Get on The Greens-at Meals

Raw greens and other raw vegetables—carrots, turnips, cauliflower, even peas—are the favorite hors d'oeuvres of the moment.

At every tea or cocktail party you go to these days, there is sure to be a colorful tray of crunchy vitamin-rich vegetables and a good thing, too. Even children are being taught to eat a carrot with as much relish as they would a stick of candy.

We housewives really ought to be conscientious about putting greens, both raw and cooked, on our spring menus. Think of all the iron, sulphur, phosphorus and what have you considered so essential to bodily growth contained in a fine mess of

mustard greens, or a crisp chef's salad (so-called because the most famous chefs make that kind for themselves) of chicory, escarole, endive, lettuce and romaine.

Use Little Water
And whatever else you do when you cook them, don't drown greens in a lot of water.

Just wash spinach, young chard and beet greens and cook them with the drops of water clinging to the leaves—no extra. Coarser greens like dandelions, kale, chicory and escarole need a little boiling water.

Chicory and escarole should be cooked young if at all and when they are pale green in color. The leaves become yellowish on maturity and are more palatable eaten raw with a good tart salad dressing.

Beet greens are specially good to serve with ham. Boil the end of a ham with the greens, any kind from dandelion to spinach. What could be better for spring dinner than ham and eggs and

beet greens? And maybe old-fashioned strawberry shortcake to eat with them.

Baked escarole is a good quick luncheon dish. Accompany it by creamed tuna fish in rice border, nut rolls, milk and tea.

Baked Escarole

One bunch or two pounds escarole, 4 tablespoons fat or butter, 1 bouillon cube, 1-2 cup boiling water, salt and pepper.

Blanche escarole by plunging into boiling water for five minutes. This removes excess bitterness. Drain and put into a buttered baking dish. Dissolve bouillon cube in boiling water, add fat or butter and salt and pepper and pour over escarole. The amount of salt depends on the kind of fat you use. With bacon fat less salt will be necessary than if an unsalted fat is used. Cover baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) about 40 minutes, until tender. Serve from baking dish.

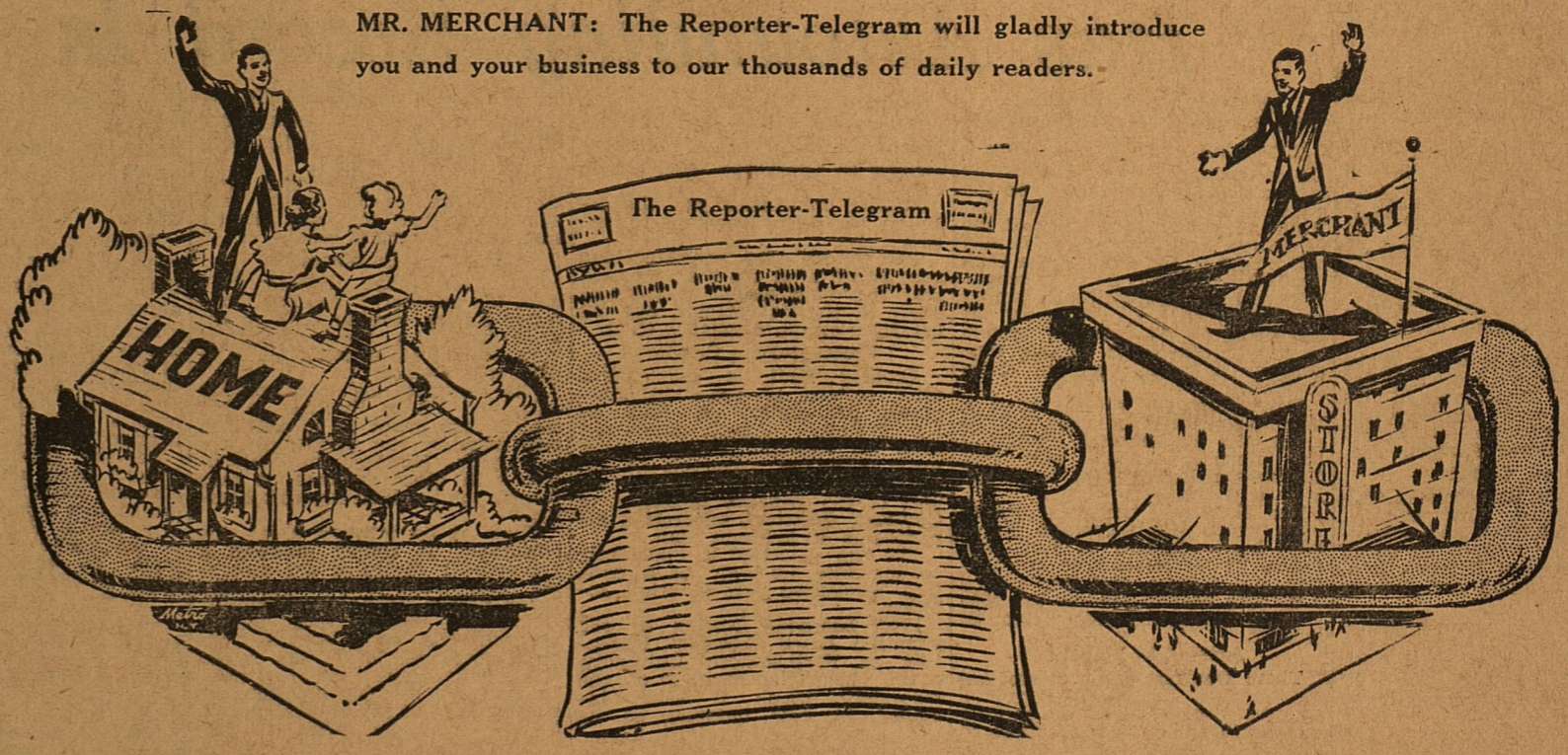

WITH COUNTY DEMONSTRATION CLUBS

Eight Midland county wardrobe demonstrators have made a total of 115 garments valued at \$127.65 for a cost of \$36.35 \$27.31 was the average expenditure for the period was county first year wardrobe demonstrator from August 1st, 1934 to April 1st, 1935.

The largest expenditure for any one kind of clothing was \$9.91 for four wear. \$8.22 was spent for dresses. The lowest item of expenditure was 89 cents for head wear. Second year demonstrators' average expenditure for the period was \$31.62.

Midland county women continue tailoring coats for themselves for a nominal sum. \$1.65 spent for lining buttons and thread was the cost of a top coat made by Mrs. A. L. Hallman, wardrobe demonstrator of the Bus Bee club, for herself from a suit of men's clothing.

By placing a flash light on the door of her clothes closet, Imogene Hale, wardrobe demonstrator of the Stokes girls' club, can find her clothing more easily and lighten fire hazards in her home. A light wall paper will be used for papering the interior, which will improve both natural and artificial lighting. The cost will be practically nothing.

dark lavender, Pearl Wilson, wardrobe demonstrator of the Warfield girls' club, has an attractive apron for a cost of 15c for bias binding and thread. Principal sport in the making of the apron were the fitting of a pattern, cutting flat fell seams, sewing bias tape on straight and curved edges, tailoring the pockets, joining facing on the bias, making button holes, sewing on buttons, labelling, pressing and folding. Twenty club girls have made aprons for housework. Other materials used were prints and muslin.

Thirty-two Midland county club girls plan to grow 100 feet of tomatoes for each member of the family, filling the tomato shelf of the family pantry as the goal of each club girl cooperating with the canning demonstrator of her club in food work.

Twenty-five quarts of tomatoes per person is an adequate canned supply according to Miss Lola Blair, extension specialist in nutrition.

Making a canning budget for her family of seven, Evelyn Lewis, garden food preservation demonstrator of the Stokes girls' club, planned a canning budget of 24 containers of leafy vegetables, 25 quarts of tomatoes, 30 quarts of fruit, 10 containers of meat and 56 of miscellaneous food, per person. A container of sweets and pickles per week were also included in the budget, making a total of 1014 containers of food.

The woman who wants to join the Easter parade with a sylph-like figure, hair as shining as the light from amber-colored Cathedral windows and skin that is fresh as her corsage of violets can't put off special spring beauty treatments a minute longer.

First of all, of course, the matter of health is important. You simply can't be at your best if your physical condition isn't up to par. Make sure that you will get eight hours sleep each night from now on until Easter; that you will drink eight glasses of water a day and eat sensible food. In addition, promise yourself to do daily exercises.

TENNIS, INDOOR EVENTS OPEN INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET FRIDAY

With more than 150 athletes entered from 15 different schools the district 31 track meet and indoor events will start here tomorrow.

However McCamey will be the favorite in the meet this season as they defeated most of the schools entered here in an invitation meet at Crane last week.

Four schools have entered girls teams in the volleyball games which start Saturday morning at ten-thirty. The schools are Rankin, Brown, Odessa and Garden City.

South Plains and Kermit have entered contestants in the tennis games and with all schools having entries in the track and field events also entering there will be 17 schools trying for the first places.

Midland's chances of copping the track and field events trophy are considered negligible but they are almost sure of two first places. J. D. Montgomery, dash man on the Midland team, is expected to come in first in both the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Montgomery won first in the 100 here last season but was a scant step behind Trojden of McCamey in the 220. In the meet at Crane last week Montgomery had no trouble showing his heels to the McCamey man in the 100 but the longest sprint was not run. It should be a very interesting duel between these two men with another Midlander, Sam Mickiff, liable to pass either of them unless they are "right." Mickiff finished just behind the two in the century at Crane last week.

In tennis, J. B. "Little Doc" Thomas is given a good chance of winning the singles title for Midland. Thomas has not lost a match this season in the several dual matches that he has entered.

Thomas and Prothro have been entered for the Midland school in the boys' doubles but their recent showing against Big Lake in a dual match does not give any indication that they will go far in the tournament.

The tennis games will start at one-thirty Friday afternoon and will be played on both the City courts and the Thomas court.

One spring the Holland brewmeister brought a quantity of his special Einbecker Bier with him on a visit to Germany for comparison with the product of his Munich friend. The contest was staged in a large beer garden located in the rural suburbs of Munich. Equal quantities of the two brews

were measured out and the joust began. After each tankard the needle-threading test was made. In the meantime the domestic animals and fowls of the peasantry on farms close by wandered about unmolested and unrestrained as was their wont. Among them were several goats—both billy and nanny.

Eventually the erstwhile steadiness of the hand of the Holland brewer wavered. He missed the elusive eye of the needle with the wetted end of thread. The German brewer claimed the bout. But the Holland brewer protested that a Buck Goat had butted his chair just as he was about to thrust the thread through the needle's eye, deflecting his aim.

As to whether the foul was allowed the narrator sayeth not, but it is recorded that in the subsequent argument the remark was made that it was the Buck that lost the bout and not the beer.

In any event, henceforward, this richer, heavier and stronger pure malt beer, especially brewed for spring festival drinking, became known as Bock Beer and the belligerent goat its symbol.

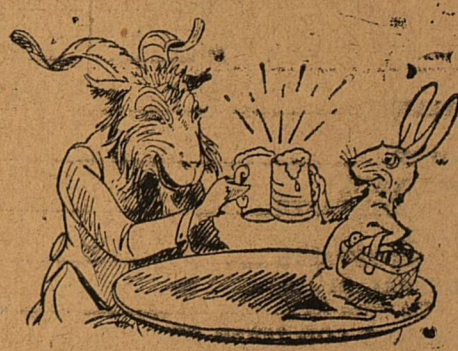

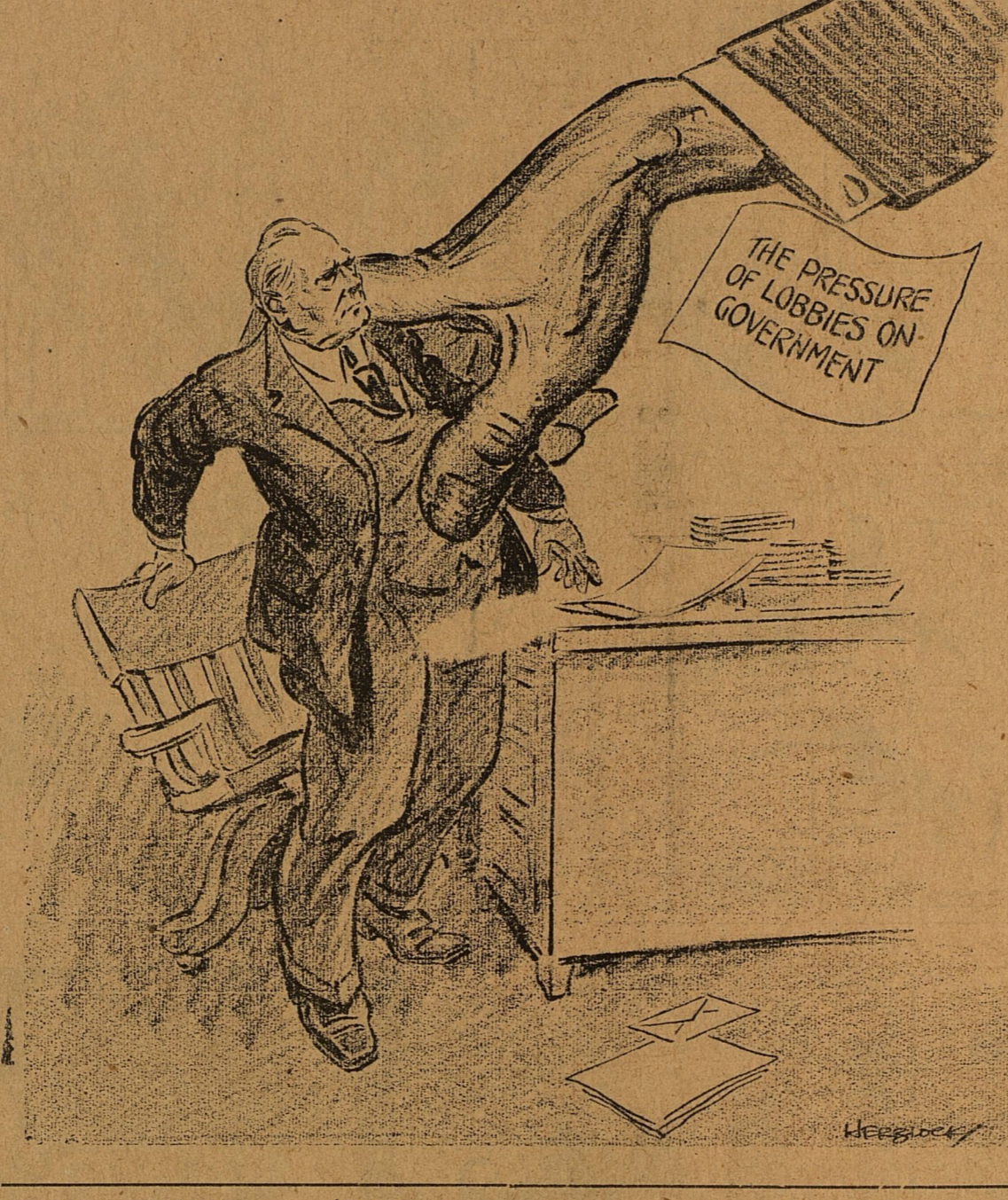
