CHINESE COLLEGE STUDENT SHOT

NAZI MOBS STORM LITHUANIAN LEGATION IN BERLIN, REPULSED

BERLIN, Mar. 28. (P)—A howling mob of Germans angered at the sentencing to death of four Nazis in Kaunas, Lithuania, bore down on the Lithuanian legation last night to meet determined police resistance and fell back.

Hastily summoned police used trucks to barricade the Kurfuerstendammstrasse—the street where the

Lithuanian legation is situated alongside the Polish legation.

The irate mob, part of 60,000 persons who attended one of Berlin's four protest meetings held tonight, broke through the first police cordon but were stopped by the next.

While the police continually reinfused, kept the throng from the darkened legation, cried "Hitler give it to them in the neck!" "Fuhrer bring Menel home!" and "Give us the murderers!" filled the air.

A telephonic inquiry at the legation late this evening elicited the laconic reply: "All over, no damage done."

PUBLIC HEALTH BD. OFFERS 3 SUMMER SCHOLARSHIPS

The Midland County Public Health Board announced today the offer by the Texas Tuberculosis Association of three summer school scholarships in health education for teachers in service. Each scholarship amounts to fifty dollars.

The purpose of the scholarships, according to Mrs. W. H. Sloan president of the Midland County Public Health Board, is to encourage teachers in service to take training in health education so that their training may be comparable to that of teachers just leaving college.

"Much of the work of the prevention and control of tuberculosis," Mrs. Sloan stated, "is among school children. The cooperation of teachers trained in health education is of inestimable value in furthering the campaign against tuberculosis. Application blanks for the scholarships are available through the Midland County Public Health Board or the office of the second floor of the court house, or the Texas Tuberculosis Association, 700 Brazos Street, Austin, Texas. I hope that one of the scholarships offered by the State Tuberculosis Association may be won by some teacher in Midland County."

AGREEMENT MADE IN EL PASO WAGE CONTROVERSY

EL PASO, March 28.—An agreement between the employees of the power and distribution departments of the El Paso Electric Co., and the management providing for increases averaging 11 per cent, was announced yesterday afternoon by M. C. Smith, president of the company. The announcement came following a week of negotiations between the employees' committee, after it had won the right to deal apart from the Employees Representation Plan of the company in the matter of wage negotiations.

Mr. Smith said the agreement had been made, and the committee representing 140 men in the department. This committee was headed by J. H. Roberts, N. P. Clay, E. E. Hartnett and John Gallagher.

The 11 per cent average increase was divided among the employees of the department on the basis of individual consideration, Mr. Smith said.

To Post Schedule

A schedule will be drawn up and posted immediately showing distribution of the salary increases, it was said.

The 11 per cent also includes the five per cent contribution announced last week, and this five per cent also will apply to the more than 300 other workers of the electric company.

The total wage increases for the 450 employees of the company will amount to approximately \$60,000 a year, Mr. Smith said.

In addition to the five per cent wage restitutions the workers also are given pay for time lost through reduction of hours caused by the NRA, it was said.

Elliott Helped

The negotiations which brought about the settlement were started last week following a true agreement signed Sunday, March 23, by representatives of the company, the Employees Representation Plan and the power and distribution plant committee in the presence of Dr. Edwin A. Elliott, regional director of the National Industrial Relations Board.

Dr. Elliott came here from his headquarters in Fort Worth after union men in the power plant struck at midnight, Feb. 28, for recognition of local 585 of the International Electrical Workers Union.

In the strike it was agreed the men would arbitrate their wage and hours difficulties with the company as employees and that their union membership would be no bar to their employment and that there would be no discrimination against union men in their employment.

The agreement was to last for six months, until Sept. 15, and if agreement had not been reached by that time, an arbitration board was to be

formed to settle the dispute.





LUFKIN, Tex.—Amelia Earhart Putnam is the manufacturer of the first true book ever seen. It is the richest bride in the United States; Gen. Hugh Johnson is the "capturer" of wild animals in Africa, and Marie Dionne is a French ruler.

This is the way, at any rate, that "Who's Who" in world headlines are identified by members of the Lufkin high school English and civic classes.

When 39 members of the graduating class took a "quiz" the Lufkin Daily News prepared at the request of teachers they were admitted to the quiz by members of the main world nations. With one exception all of the participating students correctly identified Franklin Delano Roosevelt as president of the United States.

While the names given the seniors may have been all in the day's work only a pain in the neck and another "busted" exam for the sheepskin applicants. To the 39 who were subjected to the ordeal of identifying the world's great, Sarah T. Hughes fought her way through the legislature and all the headlines of the state without avail. She was

everything from owner of the "Husky" Tool Co. to the daughter of Chief Justice Hughes but to none of the seniors was she Dallas' noted citizen and judge.

Donald Richberg's face also shouldered, because his name had appeared in the roll call every time he had been to the quiz, yet no senior placed him correctly. Among the six who even made the attempt to write something after his name were such associations as "tomb player," "a German," and "Congressman of the Senate."

The nearest guess by any of the struggling graduates was "a friend of President Roosevelt" who holds a government office."

Will Rogers, who drew only one miss with "Governor of Wyoming" and Babe Ruth, with "greatest football player," were a close second to President Roosevelt for correct answers.

Benito Mussolini ranked third with only three misses, all the wrong guessers making him "head or ruler of Germany."

Bernard Shaw is being tried for treason, but the author of the individual wrote on his exam paper. Another proved he read the newspaper with only a slight change in the descriptive noun, "bore," by saying he was "recently elected the world's greatest pest."

Leopold II, according to the students, is king over all he surveys

and that included Austria, Spain, Poland, Hungary and France as his dominions.

Amelia Earhart Putnam, who had apparently trying to remember where he had read that name before and as he proudly remembered, wrote "the boy who was sent to prison for murdering a boy—he is also wealthy."

Joe T. Robinson—"Speaker of the Texas Legislature."




How ROME Was FOUNDED



A STATUE that stood for centuries on the Capitoline Hill of Rome, and a stamp Italy issued in 1929 in four values, illustrate one of the most famous myths in history—that of the founding of Rome. It is the story of Romulus and Remus, twin sons of Mars and the Vestal Sylvia, who were cast away on the Tiber and were suckled back to health by a she-wolf. Eventually the twins became leaders of a shepherd tribe and founded the city of Rome at the spot where the wolf had suckled them.



Lent Puts Premium On Fish Dishes; Must Be Served Nicely

Editor's Note: Lent brings its own peculiar problems of meal planning for the housewife. Of course one article of food is first to come to mind at the mention of Lent and that is fish.

Mary E. Dague, NEA service staff writer, says of fish:

Somehow lots of women hate to cook fish. I think one reason is that it's rather hard to dish up attractively. For this reason, I'm advocating baked fish which is straight from the oven to the dinner table in the same good-looking casserole in which it was cooked. Do that and choose a less fishy fish, such as halibut.

Then see if you don't feel more kindly toward fish for dinner. A generous sprinkling of lemon juice over the fish cooking alleviates the fish flavor.

A fruit cup, tomato juice cocktail or almost any vegetable juice cocktail makes a splendid beginning for a fish dinner. Spinach with lemon sauce is a good vegetable and cabbage salad is suitable, though cress is my first choice when I eat fish. Endive and romaine are good, too.

Baked Fish

One pound fillets of fish or fish steaks, 1 cup sliced carrots, 1 cup diced celery, 1 small onion, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoons salt, 1 cup coarse stale bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons minced parsley,

Peel and slice onion and spread evenly in the bottom of a well-buttered shallow baking dish. Cut in sizes suitable for serving and sprinkle with lemon juice. Let stand ten minutes. Put diced vegetables over onion in baking dish and arrange fish over vegetables. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and cover with crumbs. Melt butter and pour over crumbs. Cover and bake forty-five minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Ten minutes before serving remove cover, sprinkle with parsley and paprika and brown crumbs. Serve from baking dish.

If it's too much for the family, having fish and spinach in the same meal, you might substitute Harvard beets for the vegetable.

Two cups diced cooked beets, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon cornstarch and 3 tablespoons sugar. 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 4 tablespoons vinegar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, few grains pepper.

Mix and sift sugar and cornstarch and add to butter which has been melted. Mix well and stir in lemon juice and vinegar. Cook and stir until sugar boils. Add beet salt and pepper and let stand on the back of the range in a place that will keep the dish hot but not continuously cooking for thirty minutes. The sauce becomes a rich red and thickens as it stands.






Too Costly to Use

Tile Irrigation Estimates Made

In connection with the tile-making demonstrations to be held in April by County Agent S. A. Debnam and Misses Miller, county agents who are interested will want an estimate of how much tile and how much water will be needed for the average garden under the tile irrigation system.

The following estimates are given by J. F. Roseborough, extension horticulturist:

Figuring on how much ground can be watered from a water supply it is well to consider the minimum requirements as one inch depth of water. This will be about 125 gallons for one application to a plot of ground 4 feet wide and 50 feet long or one line of 40 feet wide and 100 feet long or 4 lines of tile 100 feet long, it will require at least 1,000 gallons of water per application. It should not be necessary to apply water often, once every week and possibly once every two weeks will be often enough. It is usually considered that 400 feet of tile will meet the requirements for a garden for one family. In Northwest Texas the wells with windmills will usually supply water for its subirrigation of a garden of ample size for one other war.


TO NEW YORK
