## New Note Attacks Italy Mobilization

Early Action Asked Of League for Settlement

GENEVA, May 13, (P).—A new Ethiopian note to the League o Nations was made public today. It declared that Italian concen It declared that Italian concentration of troops and war materials in East Africa "leaves no doubt as to Italy's hostile intentions."

Ethiopia labelled as "absolutely false 'the Italian report that general mobilization had been ordered in Ethiopia. The note urged early action by the League to settle the Italo-Ethiopian dispute.

# **CENSORSHIP IS**

HONOLULU, May 13. (P).—A destroyer collision which killed one man and injured four and a plane plunge into the sea that took the life of an aviator were revealed here Sunday as the casualties in the American Fleet's secret midpacific "war" operations.

The casualties were disclosed when 32 of the 153 warships steamed into Pearl Harbor here this morning and Admiral J. M. Reeves suddenly lifted the rigid censorship that had shrouded the operations since last Thursday.

Simultaneously Admiral Reeves made known that the 43 planes which took off here last Thursday for a mass flight somewhere in the midpacific area had reached their secret destination safely 1,200 miles westward and were "executing their missions".



WASHINGTON, May 13, (A).-The senate interstate commerce committee today reported favorably the revised bill to abolish and regulate public utility holding companies over protest of two members who, in high dudgeon, stalked out of a committee session.



## **DEATH OF POLISH** DICTATOR CAUSES **MARKED CONCERN**

Peace Pact System Had Hinged on His Success

WARSAW, May 13, (A).-National mourning was proclaimed today for Marshal Joseph Pilsudski, Poland's dictator, whose death last night gave diplomats concern over the outlook for peace in Eastern Europe. Upon the question of Pilsudski's success had hinged the future peace pact system, which France' was attempting to promote, as well as Germany's future attitude toward France's program. It may also decide, diplomats said, whether Poland henceforth will cast her lot with France and Russia or continue along the lines of German rapprochement which Pilsudski himself had marked out.

WARSAW, May 13. (P).—Marshal Joseph Pilsudski, 67, Poland's man of power, died at 8:45 p. m. Sunday after an uremia attack, on the ninth anniversary of the 1926 coup that made him virtual dictator of the land.

Unconscious for the three days preceding, while his associates carried on their negotiations for security in Europe, he passed on calmly. The news was announced two hours later to a throng gathered before Belvedere Palace.

Authorities took all possible precautions to prevent his death from precipitating internal disturbances. Police were reinforced and officers patrolling the streets were equipped with tear bombs.

The cabinet gathered quickly in special session to deliberate on the political situation.

Death interrupted the career of Pilsudski, born an aristocrat and from youth a revolutionary, just as he had reached its peak.

Only recently constitutional reforms had been completed placing virtually limitless power in the hands of the president of the republic and the marshal was expected to assume this office upon the apparently impending resignation of President Ignace Ooscieki.

Since the reform of the constitution, the regime has had its power well in hand and no disturbances were expected generally to follow the marshal's death.




