#### **ONE GAINS, ANOTHER LOSES**

The Fascist government in Germany is trying a new method of approach to the problem of caring for the aged. It is going to abolish old age pensions for all persons between 65 and 80 who are capable of doing any kind of light work.

Special shops will be set up in which these people can earn their own living—with work especially adapted to their physical powers.

Robert Ley, leader of the Nazi Labor Front, explains that "Germany cannot afford to waste energies," and that enforced rest is prejudicial to the interests of the old people themselves.

The chief objection to this attitude would seem to be that there is an infinitely greater waste of energy involved in the disemployment of young, able-bodied men than there is in the pensioning of the aged.

Until the unemployment problem is completely solved, it is futile to talk about conserving energy by putting the aged to work.









 AUSTIN. April 23.—Authority to enroll 4,986 Texas boys in citizens conservation camps in the eighth corps area was received here last week by Neal E. Guy, enrollment supervisor for Texas. County administrators were noti-fied immediately to instruct boys selected to report to recruiting sta-tions between April 17 and 23. En-rollment will be for a six months period as usual with an opportunity to re-enroll for an additional s.x months. 118.75 117.03 113.47

to re-enroll for an additional s.x months. Nine boys from Midland county have enrolled in the CCC in ac-cordance with the new provisions and are expected to be sent to camps in Arizona in the near fu-ture

camps in Arizona in the near fu-ture. Effect of this new enrollment of boys will be to take approximately 5.000 Texas families off the relief rolls by June 1, at which time first checks will be received by bene-ficiaries of enrollees. Guy said approximately 2,725 young men will be sent out of the state to camps in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoning. The remainder will go to the 55 camps in Texas. Enrollment of these boys will again bring the quota of Texas young men in CCC camps to the maximum figure of slightly more than 14,000.

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
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
