## FRANCE DELAYS **LEAVE FOR 60,000** MEN; ADD 120.000

Decision Keeps the Standing Army At 350,000

PARIS, April 6, (A).-More than 60,000 soldiers belonging to the class

60,000 soldiers belonging to the class that was due to leave the army April 13, will be kept under colors until July 14, the Ministerial council decided today. The men will be used to guard the frontiers and defensive organizations.

The decision keeps the active army stationed in France up to 350,000 trained men for the next three months. By that time it is expected that a 120,000 conscripts, due to enter the army immediately after Easter, will be sufficiently trained to take their place in the ranks.

### **NEW BILL SIGNED** TO CHANGE TERMS DISTRICT COURTS

### GIVE THE ADOPTED CHILD A CHANCE

An Act Amending Section 14, Acts 1927, as Amended

To legislators, a legally worded act of legislation, but to parents of adopted children, and to the children themselves, if they could understand and voice their opinion, a heart-touching and serious problem. To you and me, a just reason to pause and think.

Perhaps you have known parents who have adopted a child. As a tiny babe, he is taken into the home. Sleepless nights are given to caring for him. Constant vigil is kept over the innocent little one to guide him along a path originally rough but now smoother for him. Indeed, his care is often better than that of a child born to some parents, for only those whose desires are sincere will undertake to love and rear a child not of their own flesh and blood.

But picture a day later in this babe's life. Sheltered has he been from the fact that his Daddy and Mother are not his "real" Daddy and Mother. Sheltered because it is considered a point of convention that he be unaware. Then one day, someway, this hidden fact comes to light. In spite of convention, perhaps it comes from the outside world. At best, it must come as gently as possible from those who have held him close and shielded him.

Facts there are, in the office of the State Registrar of Vital Statistics, to prove the point, and facts there should be. It is right that the geneology of this child should be correctly recorded. But even more righteous is it that the record show his parents to be those whom he has learned to respect and love and follow. Let this technicality of law serve to smooth his path even more.

The amendment to Section 14 seeks not to destroy the original certificate of natural birth. Far different, this original record be sealed and filed, and in its place there be made a record of the birth in the new name or names of the adopting parent or parents. Should the adoption ever be annulled, the records are intact and can revert to the original there. it specifies that upon receipt of final order of adoption

revert to the original then.

Parents of adopted children are anxious that the amendment be adopted. To them it is a further means of sheltering that babe they took unto them. Others of us should be just as anxious; we should willingly demonstrate our appreciation of the home given to that babe,
