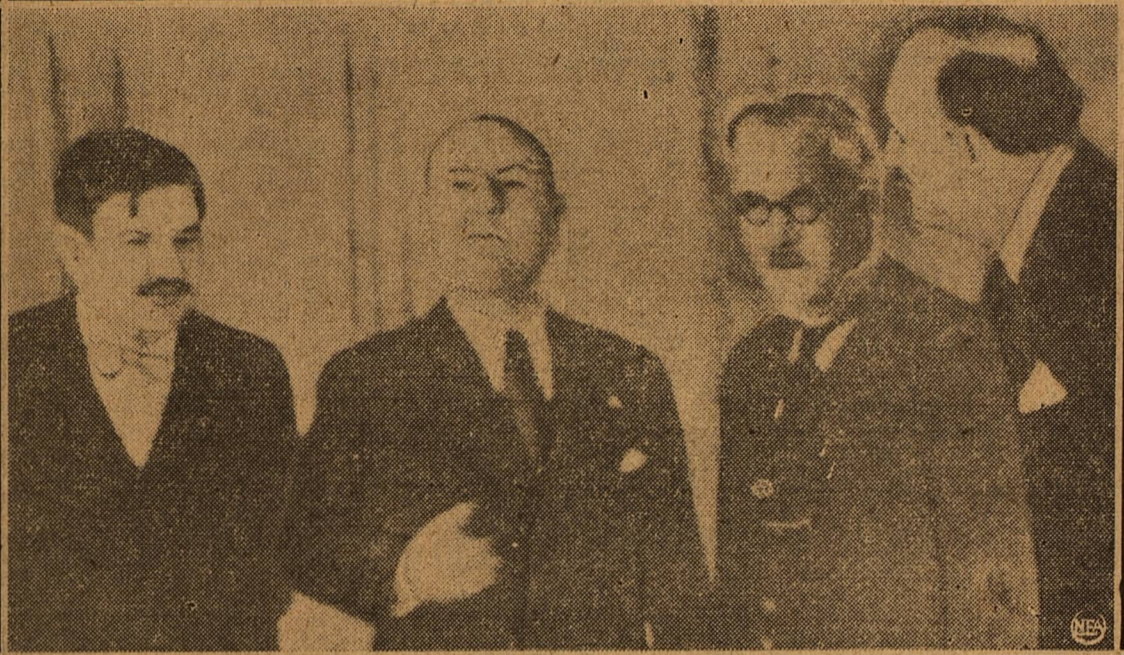

Dallas Members of House Called The Rescue Squad

AUSTIN, April 17.—Members of the Dallas delegation in the Texas House of Representatives are thankful that Centennials occur only once in 100 years and that they will not be in the legislature that considers provision for the state's 200th birthday party.

Dallas was named the main unit of the Centennial celebration and its representatives since have been under constant strain and fire in seeking to push to final passage a bill to give state aid to the observance.

They have been harassed by strong opposition to the appropriation at this session of the legislature and each member became almost gray headed overnight as a result of some of the most complicated procedure ever recorded when the bill was sent to conference committee.

The Dallas member have been named "the rescue squad" because of their brilliant work in reviving the Centennial bill.

Centennial advocates were distressed when the House after sending to conference committee, started a series of motions to instruct the conferees what to put in and keep out of the report. One of the motions, to instruct the committee to retain a House amendment to deduct 15 per cent of the gross receipts at Dallas to repay the state appropriation, would have rendered the bill ineffective.

The House ordered this instruction by a heavy vote and Centennial sponsors threw up their hands in despair. "We're ruined," Rep. Jeff Stinson, chief strategist, said, but determined on one last effort to get the House to reconsider. Another member of the delegation began preparing a press release saying that Dallas was abandoning its effort to obtain state aid and would go ahead unaided.

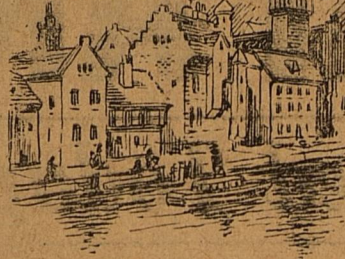
A motion to reconsider was made but a parliamentary motion also was offered to table that motion which, if carried, would kill the effort to revoke the instruction. The vote was announced as 38 for the motion to table and 55 against. On verification the vote was declared to be 55-38 and the motion to table lost. The House then revoked the instruction.

The next day it was discovered the votes of two members had been improperly recorded and that the motion to table had carried, 57 to 33.

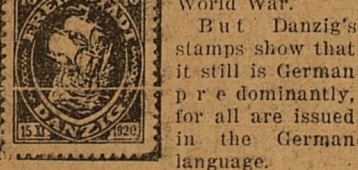
A motion was made to suspend the rules to permit a reconsideration of the vote by which the motion to table prevailed. It required a two-thirds majority vote and carried.

The LAST of the FREE CITIES



OUT of the glorious middle ages, when many cities of Europe became independent governments, only one city remains today to flourish a flag all its own. And even that city, Danzig, is a "Free City" only by virtue of the Treaty of Versailles and Poland's demand for a port on the Baltic. Danzig first was recognized as a free city in 1772, although it was virtually so long before that. It was annexed to Prussia in 1793, became free again for a short time under Napoleon, went back to Prussia in 1814, and remained under German rule until after the World War.



But Danzig's stamps show that it still is German pre-dominantly, for all are issued in the German language.

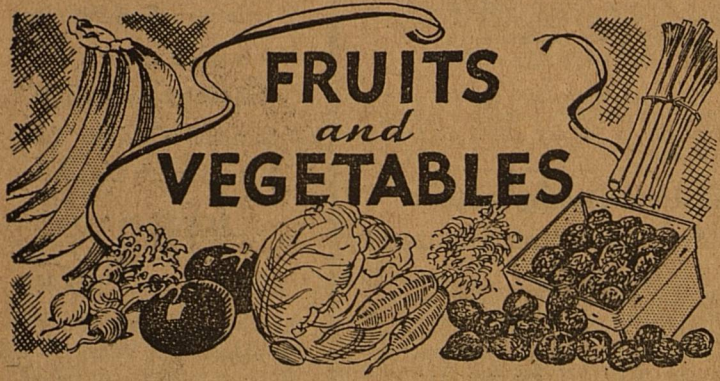

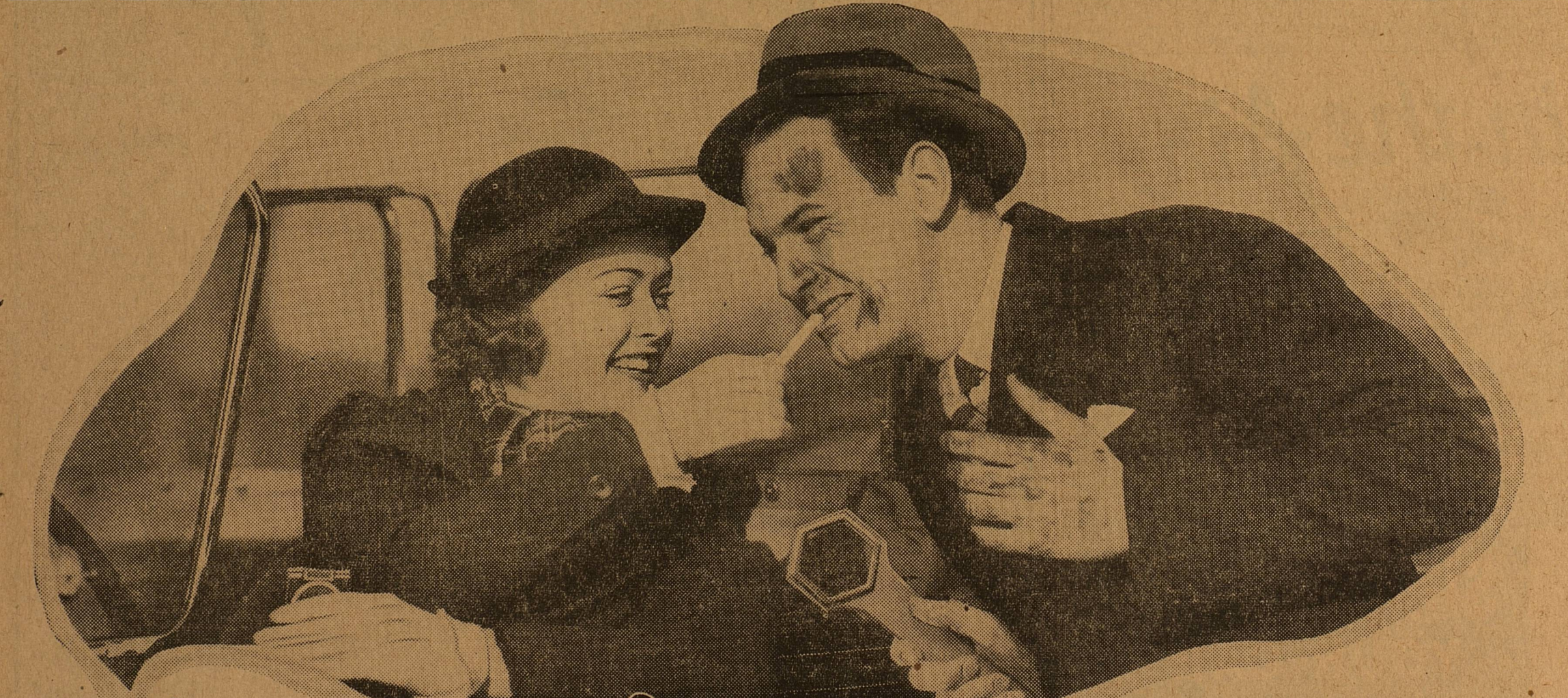

1000 to Participate In State League Meet

AUSTIN, April 18.—One thousand eager-eyed boys and girls from rural and high schools of Texas will through the University of Texas campus May 3 and 4 to participate in the silver anniversary State meet of the Texas Interscholastic League.

Registration for the twenty-fifth annual State meet will begin at 2:30 Thursday afternoon, May 2. Actual business of the meet opens at 8 o'clock Friday morning, with rehearsals of the one-act plays. On Friday, the following events will take place: Track and field preliminaries; news writing, copy-reading, head-line writing and proof reading contests in journalism; and two sessions of the journalism conference; first round in boys' and girls' tennis singles and doubles; first round and semi-finals in boys' and girls' debate; both preliminaries and finals in extemporaneous speech; preliminaries in the typewriting contest; preliminaries and finals in boys' and girls' declamation; rural and high school divisions; and presentation of one group of contestants in the one-act play.

Breakfast in the junior ballroom of the University Union Building on Saturday morning will precede the State Meeting of League Delegates at which time changes in the constitution and rules of the League and other problems will be discussed.

The Saturday program will include the following events: Editorial writing contests in journalism; finals in typewriting and the contest in shorthand; the Three-R contest; the art contest; second group of one-act plays; semi-finals in boys' and girls' tennis, singles and doubles; final session of the journalism conference; final in boys' and girls' debate; finals in track and field events, including the Rural Pentathlon; finals in tennis, boys' and girls' singles and doubles; and the final in the one-act play contest.

Brownsville Asks Dredging of Channel

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., April 18. (AP)—Briefs are being prepared for presentation to the United States army engineers before April 20, in support of an application of the Brownsville Navigation district for increasing the depth of the Brownsville port channel and turning basin to 30 feet. Five of the 17 miles of the channel to Brownsville have been dredged to 25 feet depth.

The Brownsville Navigation district is financing the work but the federal government would provide the funds for dredging the channel five feet deeper if the application is granted. The additional cost is estimated at \$500,000.

Two dredges are at work. The Orleans cut about five miles of the channel to a depth of 13 feet. The Texas then took up the work and will trail the Orleans, excavating to the maximum depth of 25 feet.

Later this month the large government hopper dredge, Baynard, will arrive here from Mobile and start dredging the outer pass at Brazos de Santiago to a depth of 28 feet or more. Huge jetties have been built there by the government at a cost of \$2,600,000 to protect the pass.

Open New Sign Service Here

Thurman Pylant and H. C. Kyle have announced the opening of the Pylant Sign company at 115 S. Main.

The company, which advertises a "complete sign service for Midland," will prepare show-cards, banners, truck lettering, electric and neon signs, and other forms of sign work.

Test Adaptability Grasses at Dalhart

DALLAS, Tex., April 18. (AP)—A test to determine the adaptability of various grasses and browse plants to the soil and climate of this region is planned near Dalhart.

The results will be used in connection with a proposed permanent program for retirement of cultivated areas.

Dr. L. B. Scott, senior pomologist of the federal bureau of plant industry nursery, Shreveport, La., and B. F. Killz, director of the southern soil erosion plant studies, Stillwater, Okla., were here recently to inspect sites for the experiments.

Grasses found adaptable will be propagated for general planting. H. H. Finnell, director of the federal wind erosion control project near here, said.

More than 20 varieties of grass and browse plants, including crested and western wheat, several species of gramma, viny mesquite and Dallas grasses, will be tested.
