WASHINGTON, Apr. 18, (A).—The Frazier-Lemke farm mortgage reinancing bill to which the adminis-

The bill provides for government refinancing at a low interest and amortization rates through a \$3,000,000,000 (billions) note issue.

The committee also approved a bill by chairman Jones of Texas to establish what would amount to a Federal Reserve Bank for agriculture.

C.M.T.C. Quota Has

C.M.T.C. Quota Has

Been Increased 1000

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.. April 18, (P).—The C. M. T. C. quota for the Eighth Corps Area, set at 1,100 earlier in the year, has been increased to 2,475, Eighth Corps Area headquarters at Fort San Houston, announces.

Camps will be operated at Fort Bullis, near this city, Fort Bliss and Fort Logan, Colo., from July 2 to 31. A camp at Fort Sull, Oklahoma, will run from July 8 to August 6, and the camp at Fort Huachuca, Ariz., will begin July 5 and end end August 3.
