# SHOWERS RELIEVE DUSTY RANGES

# INTERNATIONAL COWDEN MAKES 95 BARREL HEAD

Other Wildcats Are Being Closely Watched

By PAUL OSBORNE

International No. 1 Cowden, Ector county operation seeking production in the Harper area west of Odessa, made a head of 95 barrels early this morning, according to reports. The well is rebuilding derrick which was pulled in when it was attempted to lift the string of 10 inch pipe a few days ago

Elsewhere in the West Texas part of the Permian Basin, the principal activity was in advanced drilling depths of wildcat wells. In Andrews county, Honolulu and Llano No. 1-B Parker, drilling a half mile southwest of the No. 1 discovery well southwest of the town of Andrews, is drilling ahead at 1,185 feet in red rock, while farther north, west of the Means area, Wahlenmaier No. 1 Bitler and Goeble has reported a hole full of water in drilling to 1,115 feet in red rock.

Of the Ector county wildcats, Penrose et al No. 1 Kloh, in the extreme west central part of the county, is nearest a verdict, being at 4,030 feet in limestone. Empire No. 1 Cummins, northwest Ector, encountered gas in the Yates sand at 2,660 feet, and is preparing to drill ahead. Landreth No. 1 Cowden Brothers and Sisters, in the same vicinity, is drilling anhydrite at 3,630 feet, while their No. 2 Scharbauer is rigging up standard tools. Gulf No. 1 Goldsmith has reached a total depth of 3,970 feet, reporting nearly a million cubic feet of gas from 3900-05 feet.

Close watch is being kept of progress in Sid Richardson No. 1 Walton, northeast Winkler county wildcat operation, which is reported to have drilled the highest lime section in the county. Well, anyway, Japan seems to have what it takes.










BARSTOW, April 19. (P).—J. W. E. Bashman is the leading bee man in this section. He once shipped four carloads of beehives out of the state, the freight being \$1,650. He has been in the business 35 years in Nebraska and in Bandera county and Barstow, Texas. At one time he owned 800 hives but now has only 45 colonies.

The market on comb honey is 12½ cents a pound at present. Bashman said in 1919 he sold \$6,000 worth of honey, which was his best year.



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

SAN ANGELO, April 19. (P).—
Texas wool and mohair authorities are predicting a substantial jump in the price of mohair. Several firms have placed buyers in the field offering 20 cents for grown hair and 30 cents a pound for kid hair, an increase of two cents per pound over recent offers.

The price rose 2 cents a pound when a Boston concern represented by D. E. and Jack Hughes of San Angelo purchased about. 400,000 pounds of kid and grown hair at various concentration points at 18 to 20 cents for the grown and around 30 cents a pound for the kid hair.

### Shafter Mine Running 250 Tons of Ore Daily

SAN ANGELO, April 19. (P).—The American Metals mine at Shafter, said to be the second largest silver producing mine in the United States, is running 250 tons of ore daily through its 150-ton mill and is employing about 200 men, J. Howard Hell, independent mining operator from Terlingua, Brewster county, said here.

Hell said about 500 flasks of quicksilver are being produced monthly in the Terlingua district, the metal being worth \$76 a flask, or \$1 a pound. Around 400 men are working in the district.

Mule teams haul the quicksilver from the mines to Marathon and Alpine in a two-weeks' trip, making about 15 miles daily. Texas leads in quicksilver production.

Hell said many new claims are being staked in the district. There is much lead and silver activity in the Chinati mountain and Shafter areas and across the border in Mexico.
