WASHINGTON, April 29, (A).—A roposal to abolish the NRA and urn a portion of its authority over the Federal Trade commission to the Federal Trade commission and the Labor department was introduced in the Senate today by Senator King, Utah democrat and critic of the NRA. He offered the bill as a substitute for the administration measure to extend the recovery law two years.

He proposed to give the Trade commission jurisdiction over trade practices and the Labor department supervision over wages and hours.

Dupont was a chemist, captain of industry, politician and a philanthropist.






