FRED I. DUPONT DIES TODAY

PROPOSES ABOLISH NRA MADE BY SEN. FROM UTAH TODAY

Authority Would Be Turned Over to Labor Dept.

WASHINGTON, April 29, (AP)—A proposal to abolish the NRA and turn a portion of its authority over to the Federal Trade Commission and the Labor Department was introduced in the Senate today by Senator King, Utah democrat and critic of the NRA. He introduced the bill as a substitute for the administration measure to extend the recovery law two years.

SCHOOL RECORDS SHOW NEW HIGH IN ENROLLMENT

Reports for the eighth month, which closed Friday, show that the enrollment in the Midland public schools for the current year had increased to 1564 by the end of the month. This is an increase of 139 above the corresponding enrollment one year ago, and an increase of 116 over the high record enrollment of 1930-1931.

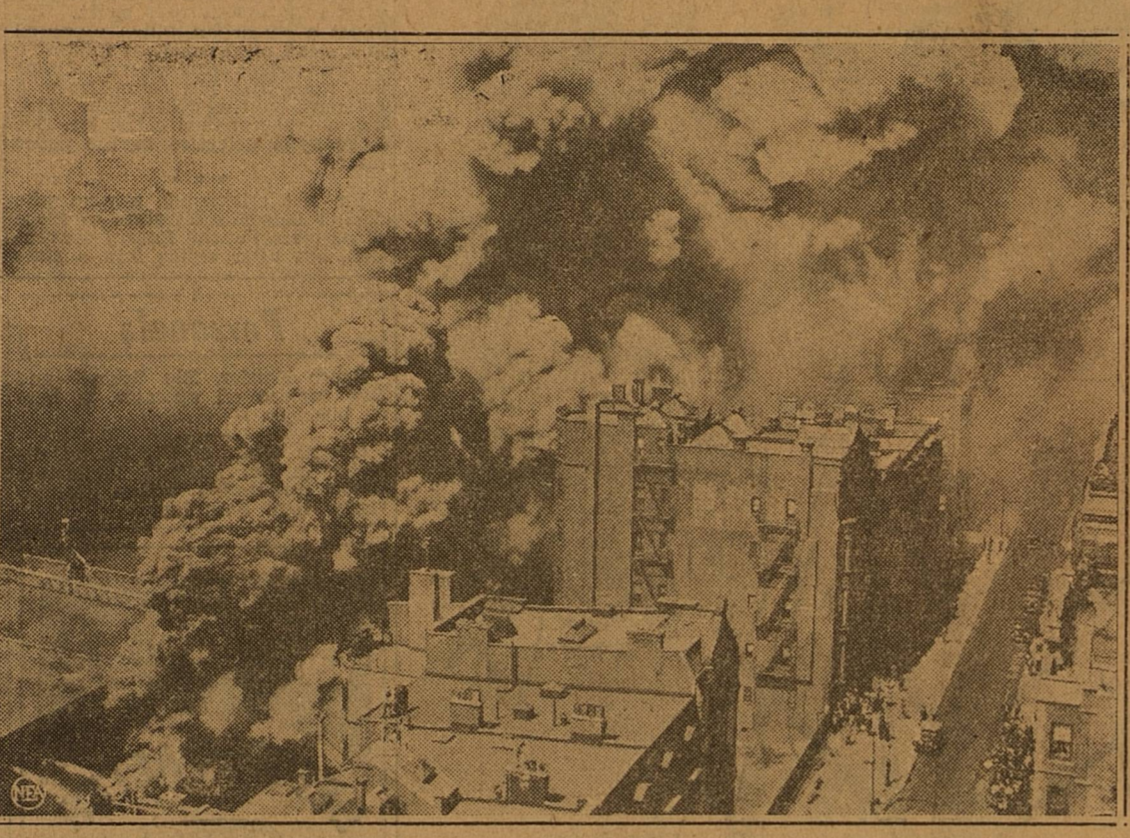

Somehow there is something rather encouraging about these replies. A congressman must be responsive to sentiment in his own district, of course; but he must also be his own man, with a mind of his own, ready to follow the course he thinks best and take the consequences at the polls.

A little more of this sentiment would give us a better Congress.

GARDEN Gossip

There is no such thing as a lawn entirely free from weeds. Soils contain weed seeds in spite of our precautions, and the slightest setback to the grass will cause them to sprout and struggle to take possession of the ground.

ing of the lawn with a complete plant food encourages vigorous growth. Naturally, the lawn grows quicker and requires cutting more often. While cutting has little effect on the grass, each cutting will "bleed" and weaken the weed. Thus the weed is prevented from making any substantial top growth or from going to seed. In the meantime, the dense grass roots resulting from the proper feeding and watering will crowd around the weed's roots and hinder growth.

To assure a practically weedless lawn follow the three pointers on lawn making and maintenance given below: 1. Feed the lawn at regular intervals with a complete plant food. 2. Water the lawn whenever the soil becomes dry. Soak it thoroughly and do not water again until the need becomes evident.

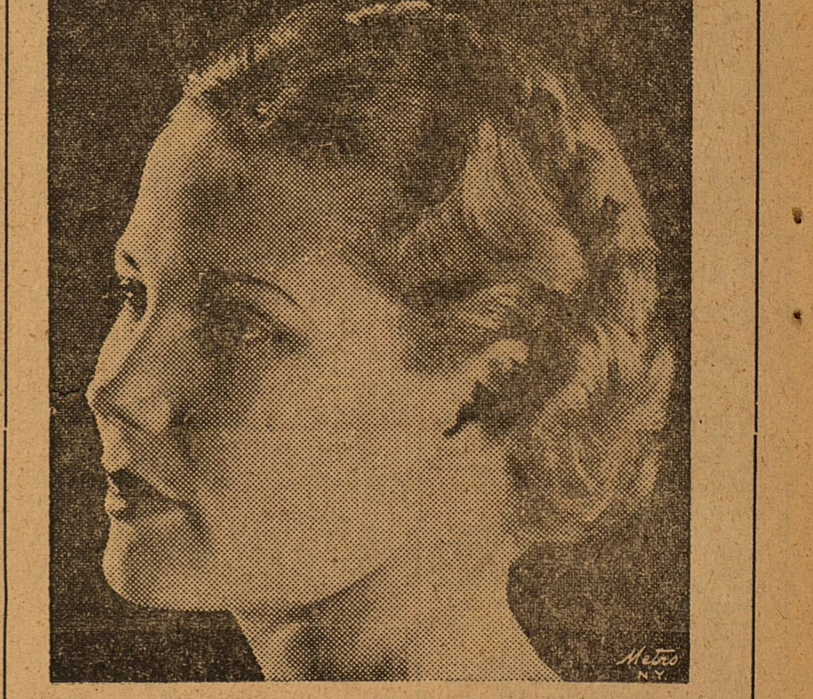

FERA Clients Paying Back Loans to Gov't

AUSTIN, April 29.—Rural rehabilitation clients, given a chance to support themselves on leased sustenance plots, are paying back their debts to their government.

Although the rural rehabilitation plan made it possible for many of them to repay advances in work, these clients have paid in cash more than \$2,000 into the treasury of Texas Rural Communities, Inc., holding corporation of the rural department of the Texas Relief Commission.

"Remarkable thing about these payments," said V. R. Smitham, head of the rural department, "is that they have been made before the crop season. Apparently, these payments have been made from cash received from the sale of garden produce, dairy and poultry products, and from day labor. We feel that our clients will make a fine showing after this year's crops have been harvested."

Another indication of determination to "pay back" is the fact that some 50 farmers to whom loans were extended for feed and seed, have al-

ready paid their notes, although they are not due until September. "This liquidation of their obligations on the part of these rehabilitation clients is most gratifying to me," said Adam R. Johnson, director of the Texas Relief Commission. "It shows that these loans, made with the belief that they could be repaid, were accepted by people conscious of a moral obligation to repay. The fact that they are doing it shows that these loans were NOT just another form of relief. We believe these people have accepted this responsibility and intend to meet it."

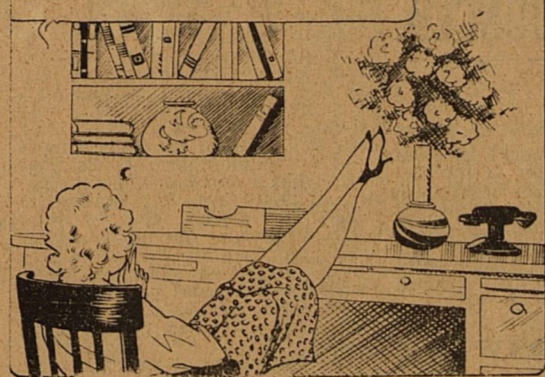
