SAFETY FOR ADMIRALS

A cablegram from Germany recently contained a little item which provokes interesting speculation as to the future happiness of naval admirals.

This item had to do with trials of a new "mystery ship" just completed for the German navy. It is described as a "non-fighting flagship," a 2200-ton vessel of the yacht type, intended for use of a fleet commander in battle.

And this leads one to remember that the admiral doesn't have as safe a life, in modern warfare, as the general of an army. The general occupies comfortable headquarters many miles from the front. Unless a stray airplane wanders his way, he is as safe as he would be at home.

But the admiral is out on the firing line with everybody else, when the fleets meet. If his ship is sunk, he goes down along with the stokers and gun-layers.

Have the Germans, at last, found a way of changing this? If this new non-fighting flagship can give the admiral a general's safety in battle, future naval wars will be a lot different from those of the past.

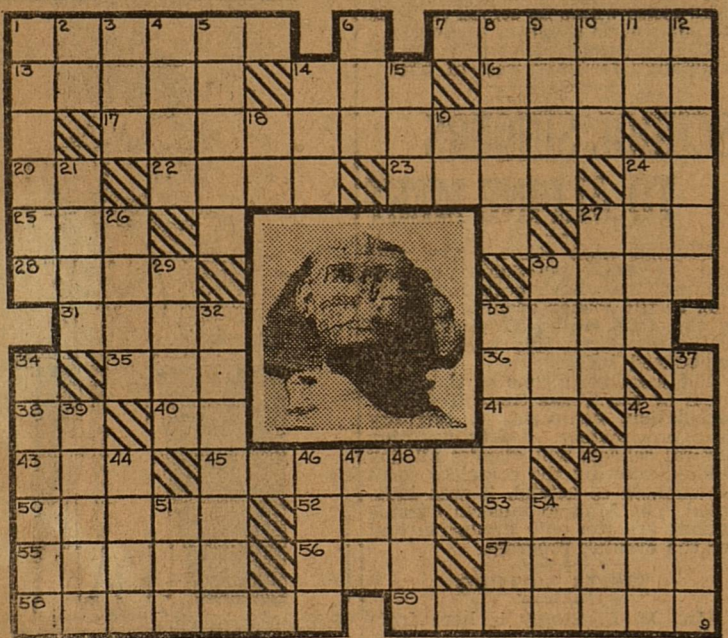

Quick Lunch Ideas For Gardening Days This Spring

Editor's Note: The following article was written by Mrs. Sybil Hallmark, director of home economics, Mary Hardin-Baylor college. It is offered to readers of The Reporter-Telegram in the hope that its suggestions may prove useful to the woman who wants to garden as well as keep house on these restless spring days.

What woman can enjoy the refreshing breath from fresh turned soil and the stimulating chill of the air if she is aggravated by thoughts of having to stop gardening in time to prepare lunch for the family? You can insure full enjoyment of gardening days by planning for lunches that provide maximum satisfaction for a minimum of work and time. A quick lunch might be unpopular on these cool days when one wants plenty to eat and something hot, too, unless the home gardener is a home manager too. Perhaps this menu will give you an idea:

Cream of Celery Soup Hard Cooked Egg and Olive Salad Crackers

Apricot Tartlets An egg salad that substitutes for meat, and a delicious, satisfying dessert; yet all of it can be prepared during breakfast, or before.

Heat a pot of water to boiling, cut the fire off, and drop in the eggs for the salad before starting breakfast. Set aside for forty-five minutes and they are ready for salad. In that time breakfast will be over and perhaps the dishes, too. Chop the eggs and mix with chopped olives, mayonnaise, and a dash of salt and mustard. Serve on lettuce leaves, already washed and kept crisp in a damp cloth in the refrigerator. Store in the refrigerator until ready for it.

During breakfast make a white sauce for the soup by melting in a double boiler one tablespoon of fat, then adding a tablespoon of flour for each cup of milk that is to be used. Allow three-fourths cup of milk for each person to be served. Stir occasionally until it thickens to the consistency of thick cream. Meanwhile boil as many cups of chopped celery as you have of sauce in a small amount of water. After breakfast, when the celery is cooked tender, pour it with the juice into the pan of white sauce and set aside to reheat when you come in from the garden.

Tarts are reputed to be queen's food; yet they are one of the easiest to prepare. From pie crust mould individual pastry cups in muffin tins, and bake in a hot oven. They keep well for several days so that you can plan ahead and have tarts on gardening days. Fill them with any fresh or canned fruit, as strawberries, peaches, bananas, pears, peaches, prunes, and apples. Top them with whipped cream or custard sauce.

Winkler Well Makes 801 Barrels in 12 Hrs.

Far surpassing any wells completed to date in the pool, Magnolia No. 6 Walton, easternmost producer in the Sayre field of northern Winkler county, gauged 810 barrels in 12 hours yesterday after shot.

Drilled to total depth of 2,960 feet and making only 65 to 75 barrels per day natural, but showing a good sand section, the well was shot with 110 quarts between 2,818 and 2,832 feet with the resulting major increase. Official proration test is scheduled for today.

The new large producer is the 12th completion of the Sayre area, one of the most recently discovered pools of the Permian Basin which is now being drilled up rapidly. It is an east offset to the same company's No. 5 Walton, previously the largest producer with a potential of 711 barrels daily. Most of the other wells in the field are capable of producing from 300 to 500 barrels daily, production coming from several sand horizons within the lime.

Average Cost Food Allowance Increases

AUSTIN, April 24.—Average cost of an adequate weekly food allowance for a family of five in Texas has increased 10 cents since October, 1934. It has been announced by Mrs. Helen Swanson, consultant dietitian of the Texas Relief commission, who recently completed a study of reports from 212 Texas counties.

Average division of the food dollar, if an adequate food allowance is to be provided at low cost, is 30 per cent for milk, 30 per cent for fruits, vegetables and legumes, 15 per cent for cereals, 13 per cent for fats and sugars, 9 per cent for meat and eggs, 3 per cent for coffee, soda, salt and other foods.

Average cost of milk in Texas in March was slightly more than 11 cents per quart, and very slightly less than it was six months ago.

Milk, fruit, vegetables and eggs show an expected seasonal decrease in price and relief clients have been urged to use more of these "protective foods."

Chief significance of the analysis, Mrs. Swanson said, is that although the price of some foods has increased appreciably, the low cost foods in the quantities sufficient to provide an adequate diet have shown only a slight increase in cost. In other words, the foods which have shown the greatest increase in price are not necessary in any considerable quantity for an adequate food allowance.

Mrs. Swanson stated that the food cost survey was taken in order that the social welfare department might have an itemized index to use as a guide in setting up food budgets, in adjusting prices for school lunches and in making specific recommendations to individual counties regarding economy of certain items; to guide the field administration department in appropriation of funds; the commodity distribution department in making available larger quantities in counties where the article being dis-

HENDERSON, Tex., April 24. (AP)—Receiving 1,281 votes, Houston was selected at the closing general session here Tuesday as the city for the 1936 convention of the ETEX Texas Chamber of Commerce.
